HOUSE BILL NO. 706 (As Sent to Governor)

AN ACT TO CREATE THE MISSISSIPPI SCHOOL OF THE ARTS; TO DEFINE CERTAIN TERMS USED IN THE ACT; TO PROVIDE THAT THE SCHOOL 1 2 3 SHALL BE A RESIDENTIAL FACILITY FOR TALENTED ELEVENTH AND TWELFTH GRADE STUDENTS; TO PROVIDE THAT THE SCHOOL SHALL BE GOVERNED BY 4 THE STATE BOARD OF EDUCATION; TO REQUIRE THE BOARD TO DEVELOP A 5 PLAN FOR THE OPENING, OPERATION AND FUNDING OF THE SCHOOL TO BE PRESENTED TO THE 2000 LEGISLATURE; TO ESTABLISH AN ADVISORY PANEL 6 7 TO ASSIST IN DEVELOPING THE PLAN FOR THE SCHOOL; TO AUTHORIZE THE 8 9 BOARD TO HIRE A DIRECTOR OF THE SCHOOL; TO REQUIRE THE BOARD TO DEVELOP RULES AND REGULATIONS FOR THE ADMINISTRATION OF THE SCHOOL 10 AND TO PREPARE THE ANNUAL BUDGET FOR THE SCHOOL; TO AUTHORIZE THE 11 BOARD TO ACCEPT CONTRIBUTIONS FOR THE SUPPORT OF THE SCHOOL; TO 12 AUTHORIZE THE BOARD TO ENTER INTO AGREEMENTS WITH THE MISSISSIPPI 13 14 SYMPHONY ORCHESTRA AND OTHER PROFESSIONAL ORGANIZATIONS FOR 15 INSTRUCTION AND EDUCATIONAL SERVICES AT THE SCHOOL AND OTHER PUBLIC SCHOOLS; TO AMEND SECTION 37-3-13, MISSISSIPPI CODE OF 16 1972, TO PROVIDE THAT THE SALARIES OF EMPLOYEES OF THE MISSISSIPPI 17 SCHOOL OF ARTS SHALL BE SET BY THE STATE BOARD OF EDUCATION; AND 18 19 FOR RELATED PURPOSES.

20 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MISSISSIPPI: 21 SECTION 1. As used in this act, the following words and phrases shall have the meanings ascribed in this section unless 22 23 the context clearly indicates otherwise:

24 "Board" means the State Board of Education. (a)

"School" means the Mississippi School of the Arts. 25 (b)

SECTION 2. (1) There is created the Mississippi School of 26 the Arts, which shall be a residential school for eleventh and 27 28 twelfth grade high school students located on the campus of Whitworth College in Brookhaven, Mississippi. The purpose of the 29 30 school shall be to provide a more challenging educational experience for artistically talented and gifted students of the 31 32 state to develop their full potential, including the teaching of humanities, creative writing, literature, theater, music, dance 33 34 and visual arts, and the school's curriculum and admissions

35 policies shall reflect that purpose.

36 (2) The 2001-2002 school year shall be the first year that 37 the school shall admit students for enrollment, which shall be 38 limited to students in the eleventh grade during the school's 39 first year. Beginning with the 2002-2003 school year, the school 40 shall enroll students in the eleventh and twelfth grades.

41 <u>SECTION 3.</u> (1) The school shall be governed by the State 42 Board of Education. The board shall develop a plan relating to 43 the opening, operation and funding of the school to be presented 44 to the Legislature during the 2000 Regular Session. The plan 45 shall include an equitable and reasonable plan for student 46 recruitment without regard to race, creed or color.

47 (2) The State Superintendent of Public Education shall
48 appoint an advisory panel to assist the board in developing the
49 plan relating to the school. The advisory panel shall consist of
50 the following twelve (12) appointed or designated members:

(a) Three (3) licensed school teachers or
administrators, one (1) to be appointed from each of the three (3)
Mississippi Supreme Court Districts;

(b) Three (3) citizens or professionals representing the areas of dance, creative writing, literature, music, theater arts or visual arts, one (1) to be appointed from each of the three (3) Mississippi Supreme Court Districts;

(c) Three (3) citizens knowledgeable in business,
personnel management or public administration, with at least three
years' actual experience therein, one (1) to be appointed from
each of the three (3) Mississippi Supreme Court Districts.

One (1) member shall be a representative of the 62 (d) Mississippi Arts Commission to be designated by the commission, 63 64 one (1) member shall be a representative of the Mississippi Humanities Council to be designated by the council, and one (1) 65 member shall be a representative of the state institutions of 66 higher learning in Mississippi which offer degrees in visual, fine 67 68 and performing arts, to be designated by the Board of Trustees of 69 State Institutions of Higher Learning.

Appointments to the advisory panel shall be made within
ninety (90) days of passage of this act. The advisory panel shall

72 meet upon the call of the State Superintendent of Public Education 73 and shall organize for business by selecting a chairman and vice 74 chairman/secretary for keeping records of the panel. Members of 75 the advisory panel shall receive no compensation but may be 76 reimbursed for necessary expenses and mileage for attending 77 meetings and necessary business of the panel, in the amount 78 authorized for state employees under Section 25-3-41.

79 (3) The board may utilize the staff of the State Department 80 of Education and other state agencies as may be required for the implementation of this act. The department may employ any 81 personnel deemed necessary by the board for assisting in the 82 83 development and implementation of the plan relating to the 84 opening, operation and funding of the school. The board also may 85 contract or enter into agreements with other agencies or private entities which it deems necessary to carry out its duties and 86 87 functions relating to the opening and operation of the school.

88 To the extent possible, the board shall enter into (4) agreements with the Board of Trustees of the Brookhaven Municipal 89 90 Separate School District for the dual enrollment of students for 91 the purpose of teaching academic courses to students attending the 92 school, and the local school board shall be fully authorized to offer any such courses to students attending the school. 93 The 94 State Board of Education may develop and issue necessary 95 regulations for the coordination of such courses for these students, the preparation and transfer of transcripts, and the 96 97 reimbursement of any costs incurred by the school district for providing such services. 98

99 (5) The board may enter into agreements with public school 100 districts to authorize students enrolled in such school districts 101 to participate in the fine arts programs at the school to the 102 extent that adequate space is available. The parent or guardian 103 of any student participating in fine arts programs at the school 104 under this subsection shall be responsible for transporting the

105 student to and from the school.

106 <u>SECTION 4.</u> Subject to the availability of funding 107 appropriated therefor, the board may hire a director of the school, who shall serve at the will and pleasure of the board. 108 The director shall be the chief administrative officer of the 109 school and shall administer the school in accordance with the 110 policies established by the board. The director shall be 111 responsible for those administrative duties and functions 112 113 prescribed by the board, and the board, in its discretion, may 114 delegate to the director such powers and duties as it deems 115 appropriate.

116 SECTION 5. The board shall be the exclusive governing body of the school and shall promulgate rules and regulations required 117 for the administration and operation of the school. The emphasis 118 of the school shall be on the education and training of students 119 120 in the performing, visual and literary arts and in the humanities, 121 but this emphasis shall not preclude the teaching of those liberal arts and science courses, math and science deemed necessary by the 122 123 board to provide students with a well-rounded education.

124 SECTION 6. The board shall prepare the annual budget for the 125 school. For the operation and support of the school, the board 126 may receive contributions, donations, gifts, bequests of money, 127 other forms of financial assistance and property, equipment, 128 materials or manpower from persons, foundations, trust funds, corporations, organizations and other sources, public or private, 129 130 to be expended and utilized by the board in carrying out this act. SECTION 7. All expenditures for the school shall be paid by 131 132 the State Treasurer on warrants issued by the State Fiscal Officer, and the State Fiscal Officer shall issue his warrants 133 134 upon requisition signed by the proper person, officer or officers. 135 SECTION 8. (1) The State Board of Education may enter into 136 agreements with the Mississippi Symphony Orchestra for providing 137 classical music educational services to students in Grades

138 Kindergarten through 12 at the Mississippi School of the Arts or at any other public school facility in Mississippi, subject to 139 140 specific appropriation therefor by the Legislature. Such educational services shall include: (a) music history, music 141 142 instrument, and music performance instruction in the classroom; 143 (b) symphony concerts for the students, programmed to support and 144 enhance the teaching of history, literature and science; (c) 145 chamber ensemble and chamber orchestra performances where members 146 serve as educators as well as performers; (d) organizing and 147 developing student performing ensembles, where members serve as music instrument instructors, conductors and performers; (e) 148 149 symphony concerts for students, parents and other residents to enhance the position of the school as center of the local 150 151 community; and (f) other services to be determined by agreement.

(2) The State Board of Education is encouraged to enter into
contractual agreements with professional arts organizations,
including the Mississippi Museum of Art, New Stage Theatre and the
Mississippi Symphony Orchestra, for providing instruction,
concerts, exhibits, performances and other outreach programs at
the Mississippi School of the Arts or at any other public school
facility in Mississippi.

SECTION 9. Section 37-3-13, Mississippi Code of 1972, is amended as follows:

161 37-3-13. (1) Until July 1, 1984, the Assistant State Superintendent of Public Education, the directors, supervisors, 162 163 clerical assistants, and employees shall be selected by, and hold 164 office subject to the will of, the State Superintendent, except as provided in Section 37-3-17. The Assistant State Superintendent 165 166 may be authorized to act in the absence or disability of the State 167 Superintendent and shall perform such other duties as may be 168 assigned to him by the State Superintendent. The State 169 Superintendent shall have the power to assign to any division such 170 clerical help as he may deem necessary and to discharge such

171 clerical help among the divisions at any time necessity requires, 172 except as provided in Section 37-3-17.

173 From and after July 1, 1984, the deputy superintendents, (2) associate superintendents and directors shall be selected by and 174 175 hold office subject to the will of the State Superintendent of 176 Public Education subject to the approval of the State Board of 177 Education. All other personnel shall be competitively appointed by the State Superintendent and shall be dismissed only for cause 178 179 in accordance with the rules and regulations of the State 180 Personnel Board. The State Board of Education shall set the salary of the deputy superintendents, associate superintendents 181 182 and divisional directors, and the members of the teaching staffs 183 and employees of the Mississippi School of the Arts. The State 184 Superintendent, subject to the approval of the State Personnel Board, shall fix the amount of compensation of all other employees 185 186 of the State Department of Education. All salaries, compensation 187 or expenses of any of the personnel of the department shall be paid upon the requisition of the State Superintendent of Public 188 189 Education and warrant issued thereunder by the State Auditor out 190 of funds appropriated by the Legislature in a lump sum upon the 191 basis of budgetary requirements submitted by the Superintendent of 192 Education or out of funds otherwise made available. The entire 193 expense of administering the department shall never exceed the 194 amount appropriated therefor, plus funds received from other sources other than state appropriations. For a violation of this 195 196 provision, the superintendent shall be liable, and he and the 197 sureties on his bond shall be required to restore any such excess. SECTION 10. This act shall take effect and be in force from 198 199 and after July 1, 1999.
