- A CONCURRENT RESOLUTION COMMENDING THE MEMBERS OF THE
 MISSISSIPPI HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES WHO BEGAN THEIR TERMS IN 1980
- 3 FOR THEIR OUTSTANDING SERVICE.
- WHEREAS, there are 52 representatives who began their term in
- 5 office in 1980, which is one of the largest freshman classes of
- 6 legislators; and

- 31 WHEREAS, during their inaugural term of office, these
- 32 representatives passed significant legislation, including the
- 33 State Employee Variable Comprehensive Plan and the 1982 Education
- 34 Reform Act; and
- 35 WHEREAS, during the 1984-1988 legislative term,
- 36 representatives passed legislation, including the largest pay
- 37 raise for teachers in the state at that time; a massive
- 38 reorganization of state boards and commissions, including
- 39 abolishment of the old Budget Commission, the Building Commission
- 40 and Medicaid Commission; the Business Investment Act was hailed by
- 41 economic development officials as a landmark piece of legislation
- 42 to stimulate economic growth; and a major four-lane highway
- 43 program was enacted despite a gubernatorial veto; and
- WHEREAS, legislation enacted during the term from 1988-1992
- 45 included the approval of a new Economic Development Highway Act to
- 46 help build roads for major industrial prospects; the approval of a
- 47 county-unit bill providing for people in each county to vote on a
- 48 centralized system of road management; the adoption of the equity
- 49 funding plan to assist local school districts and reduce financial
- 50 disparities among districts; the approval of the Economic
- 51 Development Reform Act to stimulate new business; and the
- 52 replacement of the part-time State Parole Board with a full-time
- 53 five member board; and
- WHEREAS, some highlights of the 1992-1996 legislative term
- 55 were: the Education Enhancement Act, the multi-million dollar
- 56 prison construction program, the Alcohol Boating Safety Act, the
- 57 establishment of the Department of Transportation and the creation
- 58 of the intermediate Court of Appeals; and
- 59 WHEREAS, since 1996, the Legislature has passed important
- 60 legislation such as the authorization of 32 new assistant district
- 61 attorneys around the state, the enactment of the Mississippi
- 62 Adequate Education Program, the approval of welfare laws to comply
- 63 with federal mandates, and the creation of the Mississippi Prepaid

- 64 Affordable College Tuition Program to help defray rising costs in
- 65 attending college; and
- 66 WHEREAS, it is the policy of this Legislature to
- 67 recognize and commend excellence, especially when evidenced by
- 68 such a remarkable group of individuals who came together to
- 69 improve the quality of life for the citizens of Mississippi:
- 70 NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE HOUSE OF
- 71 REPRESENTATIVES OF THE STATE OF MISSISSIPPI, THE SENATE CONCURRING
- 72 THEREIN, That we do hereby commend the members of the House of
- 73 Representatives who began their term in 1980 for their outstanding
- 74 service to the people they represent and we extend to each member
- 75 our heartiest wishes of success in all their future endeavors.

- 77 furnished to each member of the House of Representatives named in
- 78 this resolution and members of the Capitol Press Corps.
