HOUSE BILL NO. 1051 (As Sent to Governor)

- AN ACT TO AMEND SECTION 37-157-1, MISSISSIPPI CODE OF 1972, TO INCREASE THE MAXIMUM ANNUAL GROSS INCOME ALLOWED IN ORDER TO QUALIFY FOR TUITION ASSISTANCE UNDER THE MISSISSIPPI COLLEGE TUITION PROGRAM FOR QUALIFIED STUDENTS IN FINANCIAL NEED
- 5 (H.E.L.P.); AND FOR RELATED PURPOSES.
- 6 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MISSISSIPPI:
- 7 SECTION 1. Section 37-157-1, Mississippi Code of 1972, is
- 8 amended as follows:
- 9 37-157-1. (1) The tuition at any institution of higher
- 10 education in the state shall be paid by the state on behalf of any
- 11 student who enrolls in such a school to pursue an academic
- 12 undergraduate degree, who applies for the payment thereof, and who
- 13 meets all of the following qualifications:
- 14 (a) Actual residence in Mississippi during the
- 15 twenty-four (24) months immediately preceding university
- 16 enrollment. For the purposes of this paragraph, residency shall
- 17 be demonstrated by proof of the following as required by the
- 18 administering agency:
- 19 (i) If registered to vote, being registered in
- 20 Mississippi.
- 21 (ii) If licensed to drive a motor vehicle, being
- 22 in possession of a Mississippi driver's license.
- 23 (iii) If owning a motor vehicle located within
- 24 Mississippi, being in possession of Mississippi registration for
- 25 that vehicle.
- 26 (iv) If earning an income, having filed a
- 27 Mississippi state income tax return and having complied with state
- 28 income tax laws and regulations.

- (f) Having no criminal record, except for misdemeanortraffic violations.
- 65 (g) Being in financial need.
- 66 (2) For purposes of this section:
- 67 (a) "Institution of Higher Education" shall mean any of
- 68 the following institutions of higher learning or community or
- 69 junior colleges located in Mississippi: Alcorn State University,
- 70 Delta State University, Jackson State University, Mississippi
- 71 State University, Mississippi University for Women, Mississippi
- 72 Valley State University, University of Mississippi, University of
- 73 Southern Mississippi, Coahoma Community College, Copiah-Lincoln
- 74 Community College, East Central Community College, East
- 75 Mississippi Community College, Hinds Community College, Holmes
- 76 Community College, Itawamba Community College, Jones County Junior
- 77 College, Meridian Community College, Mississippi Delta Community
- 78 College, Mississippi Gulf Coast Community College, Northeast

- 85 (b) "Tuition" shall mean the semester or trimester or
- 86 term charges and all required fees imposed by an institution of
- 87 higher education as a condition of enrollment by all
- 88 students. * * * However, * * * for a two-year nonpublic
- 89 institution of higher education defined in paragraph (a), the
- 90 tuition payments shall not exceed the average charges and fees
- 91 required by all of the two-year public institutions of higher
- 92 education defined in paragraph (a), and for a four-year nonpublic
- 93 institution of higher education defined in paragraph (a), the
- 94 tuition payments shall not exceed the average charges and fees
- 95 required by all of the four-year public institutions of higher
- 96 education defined in paragraph (a).

- 97 (3) The tuition at any institution of higher education in
- 98 the state shall be paid by the state on behalf of any student who
- 99 enrolls in such a school to pursue an academic undergraduate or
- 100 associate degree, who applies for the payment thereof, and who
- 101 meets the qualifications enumerated in paragraphs (a), (b), (f)
- 102 and (g) of subsection (1) but who fails to meet one (1) of the
- 103 particular requirements established by paragraph (c), (d) or (e)
- 104 of subsection (1) by an amount of ten percent (10%) or less.
- 105 (4) To maintain continued state payment of tuition, once
- 106 enrolled in an institution of higher education, a student shall
- 107 meet all of the following requirements:
- 108 (a) Make steady academic progress toward a degree,
- 109 earning not less than the minimum number of hours of credit
- 110 required for full-time standing in each academic period requiring
- 111 such enrollment;
- 112 (b) Maintain continuous enrollment for not less than
- 113 two (2) semesters or three (3) quarters in each successive
- 114 academic year, unless granted an exception for cause by the
- 115 administering agency;
- 116 (c) Have a cumulative grade point average of at least
- 117 2.5 calculated on a 4.0 scale at the end of the first academic
- 118 year and thereafter maintain such a cumulative grade point average
- 119 as evaluated at the end of each academic year;
- 120 (d) Have no criminal record, except for misdemeanor
- 121 traffic violations; and
- 122 (e) Be found to be in financial need.
- 123 (5) The provisions of this chapter shall be administered by
- 124 the Board of Trustees of State Institutions of Higher Learning in
- 125 conjunction with the State Board for Community and Junior
- 126 Colleges. The board may provide by rule for all matters necessary
- 127 for the implementation of this chapter.
- 128 (6) By rule, the board shall provide for:
- 129 (a) A mechanism for informing all students of the
- 130 availability of the assistance provided pursuant to this chapter

- 131 early enough in their schooling that a salutary motivational
- 132 effect is possible.
- (b) Applications, forms, financial audit procedures,
- 134 eligibility and other program audit procedures and other matters
- 135 related to efficient operation.
- 136 (c) A procedure for waiver through the 1996-1997
- 137 academic year of the program eligibility requirement for
- 138 successful completion of a specified core curriculum upon proper
- 139 documentation by the applicant that failure to comply with such
- 140 requirement is due solely to the fact that the required course or
- 141 courses were not available to the applicant at the school
- 142 attended.
- 143 (7) An applicant shall be found to be in financial need if:
- 144 (a) The family has one (1) child under the age of
- 145 twenty-one (21), and the two-year average annual adjusted gross
- 146 income of the family is less than Thirty-six Thousand Five Hundred
- 147 <u>Dollars (\$36,500.00)</u>; or
- 148 (b) The family has a two-year average annual adjusted
- 149 gross income of less than <u>Thirty-six Thousand Five Hundred Dollars</u>
- 150 (\$36,500.00) plus Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000.00) for each
- 151 additional child under the age of twenty-one (21).
- The two-year average annual adjusted gross income of the
- 153 family shall be verified by Internal Revenue Service returns or by
- 154 certified affidavits in cases of income that cannot be verified by
- 155 such returns.
- As used in this subsection, the term "family" for an
- 157 unemancipated applicant means the applicant, the applicant's
- 158 parents, and other children under age twenty-one (21) of the
- 159 applicant's parents. The term "family" for an emancipated
- 160 applicant means the applicant, an applicant's spouse, and any
- 161 children under age twenty-one (21) of the applicant and spouse.
- 162 (8) An appropriation of funds may annually be made to the
- 163 board sufficient to cover, in addition to any other available
- 164 funds, the costs of tuition required to be paid, both initial and

- 165 continuing, for the coming academic year. All such payments shall
- 166 be made directly to the institution to which such tuition is due
- 167 after notice to the school that the state shall pay the tuition of
- 168 a student and after notice from the school that the student has
- 169 actually enrolled.
- 170 (9) The board may seek, accept and expend funds from any
- 171 source, including private business, industry, foundations and
- 172 other groups as well as any federal or other governmental funding
- 173 available for this purpose.
- 174 (10) No student shall receive a grant pursuant to this
- 175 chapter in an amount greater than the tuition charged by the
- 176 school. The student must apply for a federal grant prior to
- 177 receiving state funds.
- 178 SECTION 2. This act shall take effect and be in force from
- 179 and after July 1, 1999.
