1 2 3 4	AN ACT TO AMEND SECTION 37-17-8, MISSISSIPPI CODE OF 1972, TO REQUIRE SCHOOL DISTRICTS TO DESIGNATE TWO IN-SERVICE STAFF DEVELOPMENT DAYS FOR BEHAVIOR MANAGEMENT TECHNIQUES; AND FOR RELATED PURPOSES.
5	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MISSISSIPPI:
6	SECTION 1. Section 37-17-8, Mississippi Code of 1972, is
7	amended as follows:
8	37-17-8. (1) The State Board of Education, through the
9	Commission on School Accreditation, shall establish criteria for
10	comprehensive in-service staff development plans. These criteria
11	shall: (a) include, but not be limited to, formula and guidelines
12	for allocating available state funds for in-service training to
13	local school districts; (b) require that a portion of the plans
14	be devoted exclusively for the purpose of providing staff
15	development training for beginning teachers within that local
16	school district and for no other purpose; and (c) require that a
17	portion of the school district's in-service training for
18	administrators and teachers be dedicated to the application and
19	utilization of various disciplinary techniques. The board shall
20	each year make recommendations to the Legislature concerning the
21	amount of funds which shall be appropriated for this purpose.
22	(2) Beginning with the 1998-1999 school year, school
23	districts shall not be required to submit staff development plans
24	to the Commission on School Accreditation for approval. However,
25	any school district accredited at Level 1 or Level 2 shall

include, as a part of any required corrective action plan,

provisions to address staff development in accordance with State

Board of Education requirements. All school districts, unless

- 29 specifically exempt from this section, must maintain on file staff
- 30 development plans as required under this section. The plan shall
- 31 have been prepared by a district committee appointed by the
- 32 district superintendent and consisting of teachers,
- 33 administrators, school board members, and lay people, and it shall
- 34 have been approved by the district superintendent.
- 35 (3) In order to insure that teachers are not overburdened
- 36 with paperwork and written reports, local school districts and
- 37 the State Board of Education shall take such steps as may be
- 38 necessary to further the reduction of paperwork requirements on
- 39 teachers.
- 40 (4) <u>Beginning with the 1999-2000 school year, each school</u>
- 41 <u>district shall provide</u>, as a component of its comprehensive
- 42 <u>in-service staff development plan, training to administrators,</u>
- 43 teachers and nonlicensed school personnel in the application and
- 44 <u>utilization of appropriate culturally specific behavior management</u>
- 45 <u>techniques</u>. The school board shall designate two (2) existing
- 46 <u>in-service training days for the study of behavior management</u>
- 47 <u>techniques</u>. In developing a training program on such behavior
- 48 <u>management techniques, school districts are encouraged to solicit</u>
- 49 <u>input from parents, local law enforcement agencies, youth court</u>
- 50 counselors and any other available resource groups dedicated to
- 51 working with children and youth.
- 52 <u>(5)</u> If any school district meets Level 4 or 5 accreditation
- 53 standards, the State Board of Education, in its discretion, may
- 54 exempt such school district from the provisions of this section.
- 55 SECTION 2. This act shall take effect and be in force from
- 56 and after July 1, 1999.
