HOUSE BILL NO. 471 (As Passed the House)

AN ACT TO AMEND SECTION 37-19-7, MISSISSIPPI CODE OF 1972, TO 1 INCREASE THE SALARIES OF PUBLIC SCHOOL TEACHERS; TO AMEND SECTION 37-19-21, MISSISSIPPI CODE OF 1972, TO INCREASE THE MINIMUM 2 3 4 PROGRAM ALLOTMENT FOR SUPPORTIVE SERVICES; TO AMEND SECTION 5 37-21-7, MISSISSIPPI CODE OF 1972, TO INCREASE THE SALARIES OF ASSISTANT TEACHERS; AND FOR RELATED PURPOSES. 6 7 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MISSISSIPPI: SECTION 1. Section 37-19-7, Mississippi Code of 1972, is 8 9 amended as follows: 37-19-7. (1) The allowance in the minimum education program 10 11 for teachers' salaries in each county and separate school district shall be determined and paid in accordance with the scale for 12 13 teachers' salaries as provided in this subsection for the number of teachers employed not in excess of the number of teacher units 14 allotted. For teachers holding the following types of licenses or 15 the equivalent as determined by the State Board of Education, and 16 17 the following number of years of teaching experience, the scale 18 shall be as follows: 1999-2000 School Year 19 20 and School Years Thereafter 21 Less Than 25 Years of Teaching Experience 2.2 23 24 AA <u>23,780.00</u> 25 A..... <u>22,730.00</u> 26 25 or More Years of Teaching Experience 27 AAAA..... <u>\$26,480.00</u> 28 29 471 H. 31 It is the intent of the Legislature that any state funds made 32 available for salaries of licensed personnel in excess of the funds paid for such salaries for the 1986-1987 school year shall 33 34 be paid to licensed personnel pursuant to a personnel appraisal and compensation system implemented by the State Board of 35 The State Board of Education shall have the authority 36 Education. to adopt and amend rules and regulations as are necessary to 37 establish, administer and maintain the system. 38

39 All teachers employed on a full-time basis shall be paid a minimum salary in accordance with the above scale. However, no 40 41 school district shall receive any funds under this section for any 42 school year during which the local supplement paid to any individual teacher shall have been reduced to a sum less than that 43 paid to that individual teacher for performing the same duties 44 45 from local supplement during the immediately preceding school 46 The amount actually spent for the purposes of group health year. and/or life insurance shall be considered as a part of the 47 48 aggregate amount of local supplement but shall not be considered a part of the amount of individual local supplement. 49

50 For teachers holding a Class AAAA license, the minimum base 51 pay specified in this subsection shall be increased by the sum of 52 Six Hundred Fifty-five Dollars (\$655.00) for each year of teaching 53 experience possessed by the person holding such license until such 54 person shall have twenty-five (25) years of teaching experience.

55 For teachers holding a Class AAA license, the minimum base 56 pay specified in this subsection shall be increased by the sum of 57 Five Hundred Ninety Dollars (\$590.00) for each year of teaching 58 experience possessed by the person holding such license until such 59 person shall have twenty-five (25) years of teaching experience.

For teachers holding a Class AA license, the minimum base pay specified in this subsection shall be increased by the sum of Five Hundred Twenty Dollars (\$520.00) for each year of teaching

For teachers holding a Class A license, the minimum base pay specified in this subsection shall be increased by the sum of Four Hundred Twenty-five Dollars (\$425.00) for each year of teaching experience possessed by the person holding such license until such person shall have twenty-one (21) years of teaching experience.

The level of professional training of each teacher to be used in establishing the salary allotment for the teachers for each year shall be determined by the type of valid teacher's license issued to those teachers on or before October 1 of the current school year.

75 (2) Prior to April 15 of any school year in which a teacher 76 meets the standard requirements, any licensed teacher who shall 77 have met the requirements and acquired a Master Teacher certificate from the National Board for Professional Teaching 78 79 Standards and who is employed by a local school board or the State 80 Board of Education as a teacher and not as an administrator shall receive a salary supplement in the amount of Six Thousand Dollars 81 82 (\$6,000.00) in addition to any other compensation to which the The teacher shall be reimbursed one (1) teacher may be entitled. 83 84 time for the actual cost of completing the process of acquiring the Master Teacher certificate, regardless of whether or not the 85 86 process resulted in the award of the Master Teacher certificate. 87 All such salary supplements and process reimbursement shall be paid directly by the State Department of Education to the local 88 89 school district and shall be in addition to its minimum education 90 program allotments and not a part thereof in accordance with regulations promulgated by the State Board of Education, and 91 subject to appropriation by the Legislature. Local school 92 districts shall not reduce the local supplement paid to any 93 94 teacher receiving such salary supplement, and the teacher shall receive any local supplement to which teachers with similar 95 training and experience are otherwise entitled. 96

97 SECTION 2. Section 37-19-21, Mississippi Code of 1972, is
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98 amended as follows:

99 37-19-21. In addition to other funds allowed in this 100 chapter, each school district shall be allotted <u>Four Thousand</u> 101 <u>Eight Hundred Seventy-seven (\$4,877.00)</u> annually per teacher unit 102 for use in supportive services.

103 SECTION 3. Section 37-21-7, Mississippi Code of 1972, is 104 amended as follows:

105 [From and after July 1, 1999, and until July 1, 2002, Section 106 37-21-7 will read as follows:]

107 37-21-7. (1) This section shall be referred to as the 108 "Mississippi Elementary Schools Assistant Teacher Program," the 109 purpose of which shall be to provide an early childhood education program that assists in the instruction of basic skills. 110 The State Board of Education is authorized, empowered and directed to 111 implement a statewide system of assistant teachers in kindergarten 112 113 classes and in the first, second and third grades. The assistant 114 teacher shall assist pupils in actual instruction under the strict supervision of a licensed teacher. 115

116 (2) (a) Each school district shall employ the total number 117 of assistant teachers funded under subsection (6) of this 118 section. The superintendent of each district shall assign the 119 assistant teachers to the kindergarten, first-, second- and 120 third-grade classes in the district in a manner that will promote the maximum efficiency, as determined by the superintendent, in 121 122 the instruction of skills such as verbal and linguistic skills, 123 logical and mathematical skills, and social skills.

If a licensed teacher to whom an assistant teacher 124 (b) 125 has been assigned is required to be absent from the classroom, the 126 assistant teacher may assume responsibility for the classroom in 127 lieu of a substitute teacher. However, no assistant teacher shall 128 assume sole responsibility of the classroom for more than three 129 (3) consecutive school days. Further, in no event shall any 130 assistant teacher be assigned to serve as a substitute teacher for any teacher other than the licensed teacher to whom that assistant 131 H. B. Assistant teachers shall have, at a minimum, a high 133 (3) 134 school diploma and shall show demonstratable proficiency in reading and writing skills. The State Department of Education 135 136 shall develop a testing procedure for assistant teacher applicants to be used in all school districts in the state. 137 (4) (a) In order to receive funding, each school district 138 139 shall: 140 (i) Submit a plan on the implementation of a 141 reading improvement program to the State Department of Education; 142 and 143 (ii) Develop a plan of educational accountability and assessment of performance, including pretests and posttests, 144 for reading in Grades 1 through 6. 145 146 (b) Additionally, each school district shall: 147 (i) Provide annually a mandatory preservice 148 orientation session, using an existing in-school service day, for administrators and teachers on the effective use of assistant 149 150 teachers as part of a team in the classroom setting and on the 151 role of assistant teachers, with emphasis on program goals; 152 (ii) Hold periodic workshops for administrators and teachers on the effective use and supervision of assistant 153 154 teachers; 155 (iii) Provide training annually on specific instructional skills for assistant teachers; 156 157 (iv) Annually evaluate their program in accordance with their educational accountability and assessment of 158 159 performance plan; and 160 Designate the necessary personnel to supervise (v) 161 and report on their program. 162 (5) The State Department of Education shall: (a) Develop and assist in the implementation of a 163 164 statewide uniform training module, subject to the availability of 165 funds specifically appropriated therefor by the Legislature, which Н. 166 shall be used in all school districts for training administrators, 167 teachers and assistant teachers. The module shall provide for the 168 consolidated training of each assistant teacher and teacher to 169 whom the assistant teacher is assigned, working together as a 170 team, and shall require further periodical training for 171 administrators, teachers and assistant teachers regarding the role 172 of assistant teachers;

Annually evaluate the program on the district and 173 (b) 174 state level. Subject to the availability of funds specifically 175 appropriated therefor by the Legislature, the department shall develop: (i) uniform evaluation reports, to be performed by the 176 177 principal or assistant principal, to collect data for the annual 178 overall program evaluation conducted by the department; or (ii) a program evaluation model that, at a minimum, addresses process 179 180 evaluation; and

(c) Promulgate rules, regulations and such other standards deemed necessary to effectuate the purposes of this section. Noncompliance with the provisions of this section and any rules, regulations or standards adopted by the department may result in a violation of compulsory accreditation standards as established by the State Board of Education and Commission on School Accreditation.

In addition to other funds allotted under the Minimum 188 (6) 189 Education Program, each school district shall be allotted Nine Thousand Seventy Dollars (\$9,070.00) per teacher unit as 190 191 prescribed in Section 37-19-5 for Grades 1, 2 and 3 for the 192 purpose of employing an assistant teacher. Assistant teachers 193 shall be paid a minimum annual salary of Nine Thousand Seventy 194 Dollars (\$9,070.00). However, no assistant teacher shall be paid 195 less than the amount he or she received in the prior school year. 196 In the 1995-1996 school year and school years thereafter, no school district shall receive any funds under this section for any 197 198 school year during which the aggregate amount of the local 199 contribution to the salaries of assistant teachers by the district H. 99\HR03\R720 PAGE 6 200 shall have been reduced below such amount for the previous year. 201 The assistant teachers shall not be restricted to working only in 202 the grades for which the funds were allotted, but may be assigned 203 to other classes as provided in subsection (2)(a) of this section.

204 (7) (a) As an alternative to employing assistant teachers, the State Board of Education may authorize any school district 205 meeting Level 3, 4 or 5 accreditation requirements to use the 206 207 minimum program allotment provided under subsection (6) of this 208 section for the purpose of employing licensed teachers for 209 kindergarten, first-, second- and third-grade classes; however, no school district shall be authorized to use the minimum program 210 211 allotment for assistant teachers for the purpose of employing licensed teachers unless the district has established that the 212 employment of licensed teachers using such funds will reduce the 213 teacher:student ratio in the kindergarten, first-, second- and 214 215 third-grade classes. All minimum program funds for assistant 216 teachers shall be applied to reducing teacher:student ratio in 217 Grades K-3.

It is the intent of the Legislature that no school district shall dismiss any assistant teacher for the purpose of using the minimum program assistant teacher allotment to employ licensed teachers. School districts may rely only upon normal attrition to reduce the number of assistant teachers employed in that district.

(b) In the event any school district meets Level 4 or 5 accreditation requirements, the State Board of Education, in its discretion, may exempt such school district from any accreditation requirements for the district's early childhood education program or reading improvement program.

238 (2) (a) Each school district shall employ the total number of assistant teachers funded under subsection (6) of this section. 239 240 The superintendent of each district shall assign the assistant 241 teachers to the kindergarten, first-, second- and third-grade 242 classes in the district in a manner that will promote the maximum 243 efficiency, as determined by the superintendent, in the instruction of skills such as verbal and linguistic skills, 244 245 logical and mathematical skills, and social skills.

If a certified teacher to whom an assistant teacher 246 (b) 247 has been assigned is required to be absent from the classroom, the 248 assistant teacher may assume responsibility for the classroom in 249 lieu of a substitute teacher. However, no assistant teacher shall 250 assume sole responsibility of the classroom for more than three (3) consecutive school days. Further, in no event shall any 251 252 assistant teacher be assigned to serve as a substitute teacher for any teacher other than the certified teacher to whom that 253 254 assistant teacher has been assigned.

(3) Assistant teachers shall have, at a minimum, a high school diploma or a GED equivalent, and shall show demonstratable proficiency in reading and writing skills. The State Department of Education shall develop a testing procedure for assistant teacher applicants to be used in all school districts in the state.

261 (4) (a) In order to receive funding, each school district 262 shall:

(i) Submit a plan on the implementation of a reading improvement program to the State Department of Education; and

The assistant 318 teachers shall not be restricted to working only in the grades for which the funds were allotted, but may be assigned to other 319 320 classes as provided in subsection (2)(a) of this section.

321 (7) (a) As an alternative to employing assistant teachers, 322 the State Board of Education may authorize any school district meeting Level 3, 4 or 5 accreditation requirements to use the 323 324 adequate education program allotments for the purpose of employing 325 certified teachers for kindergarten, first-, second- and third-grade classes; however, no school district shall be 326 327 authorized to use the funds for assistant teachers for the purpose of employing certified teachers unless the district has 328 established that the employment of certified teachers using such 329 funds will reduce the teacher:student ratio in the kindergarten, 330 first-, second- and third-grade classes. All adequate education 331 332 program funds for assistant teachers shall be applied to reducing teacher:student ratio in Grades K-3. 333

334 It is the intent of the Legislature that no school district 335 shall dismiss any assistant teacher for the purpose of using state H. B. No. 471 99\HR03\R720 PAGE 10 336 funds to employ certified teachers. School districts may rely 337 only upon normal attrition to reduce the number of assistant 338 teachers employed in that district.

(b) In the event any school district meets Level 4 or 5 accreditation requirements, the State Board of Education, in its discretion, may exempt such school district from any accreditation requirements for the district's early childhood education program or reading improvement program.

344 SECTION 4. This act shall take effect and be in force from 345 and after July 1, 1999.

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
