COMMITTEE SUBSTITUTE FOR HOUSE BILL NO. 999

AN ACT TO AMEND SECTION 37-21-7, MISSISSIPPI CODE OF 1972, TO 1 2 AUTHORIZE ANY SCHOOL DISTRICT, REGARDLESS OF ACCREDITATION LEVEL, 3 TO USE MINIMUM PROGRAM ASSISTANT TEACHER FUNDS TO EMPLOY 4 ADDITIONAL LICENSED TEACHERS IN GRADES K-3 AND TO INCREASE THE 5 SALARIES OF ASSISTANT TEACHERS; AND FOR RELATED PURPOSES. б BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MISSISSIPPI: 7 SECTION 1. Section 37-21-7, Mississippi Code of 1972, is 8 amended as follows: [From and after July 1, 1999, and until July 1, 2002, Section 9 10 37-21-7 will read as follows:] 37-21-7. (1) This section shall be referred to as the 11 "Mississippi Elementary Schools Assistant Teacher Program," the 12 13 purpose of which shall be to provide an early childhood education 14 program that assists in the instruction of basic skills. The 15 State Board of Education is authorized, empowered and directed to implement a statewide system of assistant teachers in kindergarten 16 classes and in the first, second and third grades. The assistant 17 teacher shall assist pupils in actual instruction under the strict 18 supervision of a licensed teacher. 19 (2) (a) Each school district shall employ the total number 20 21 of assistant teachers funded under subsection (6) of this section. The superintendent of each district shall assign the 2.2 23 assistant teachers to the kindergarten, first-, second- and third-grade classes in the district in a manner that will promote 24 the maximum efficiency, as determined by the superintendent, in 25 the instruction of skills such as verbal and linguistic skills, 26 27 logical and mathematical skills, and social skills. However, no assistant teacher shall 31 assume sole responsibility of the classroom for more than three 32 33 (3) consecutive school days. Further, in no event shall any assistant teacher be assigned to serve as a substitute teacher for 34 any teacher other than the licensed teacher to whom that assistant 35 36 teacher has been assigned.

The module shall provide for the 72 consolidated training of each assistant teacher and teacher to whom the assistant teacher is assigned, working together as a 73 74 team, and shall require further periodical training for 75 administrators, teachers and assistant teachers regarding the role 76 of assistant teachers;

77 Annually evaluate the program on the district and (b) 78 state level. Subject to the availability of funds specifically 79 appropriated therefor by the Legislature, the department shall 80 develop: (i) uniform evaluation reports, to be performed by the principal or assistant principal, to collect data for the annual 81 82 overall program evaluation conducted by the department; or (ii) a 83 program evaluation model that, at a minimum, addresses process evaluation; and 84

(c) Promulgate rules, regulations and such other standards deemed necessary to effectuate the purposes of this section. Noncompliance with the provisions of this section and any rules, regulations or standards adopted by the department may result in a violation of compulsory accreditation standards as established by the State Board of Education and Commission on School Accreditation.

92 (6) In addition to other funds allotted under the Minimum 93 Education Program, each school district shall be allotted <u>Nine</u> 94 <u>Thousand Seventy Dollars (\$9,070.00)</u> per teacher unit as 95 prescribed in Section 37-19-5 for Grades 1, 2 and 3 for the 96 purpose of employing an assistant teacher. 97 shall be paid a minimum annual salary of Nine Thousand Seventy Dollars (\$9,070.00). However, no assistant teacher shall be paid 98 99 less than the amount he or she received in the prior school year. In the 1995-1996 school year and school years thereafter, no 100 101 school district shall receive any funds under this section for any 102 school year during which the aggregate amount of the local 103 contribution to the salaries of assistant teachers by the district 104 shall have been reduced below such amount for the previous year. 105 The assistant teachers shall not be restricted to working only in 106 the grades for which the funds were allotted, but may be assigned 107 to other classes as provided in subsection (2)(a) of this section.

108 (7) (a) As an alternative to employing assistant 109 teachers, \* \* \* any school district \* \* \* <u>may</u> use the minimum program allotment provided under subsection (6) of this section 110 for the purpose of employing licensed teachers for kindergarten, 111 112 first-, second- and third-grade classes; however, no school 113 district shall be authorized to use the minimum program allotment for assistant teachers for the purpose of employing licensed 114 115 teachers unless the district has established that the employment of licensed teachers using such funds will reduce the 116 117 teacher:student ratio in the kindergarten, first-, second- and third-grade classes. All minimum program funds for assistant 118 119 teachers shall be applied to reducing teacher:student ratio in 120 Grades K-3.

121 It is the intent of the Legislature that no school district 122 shall dismiss any assistant teacher for the purpose of using the 123 minimum program assistant teacher allotment to employ licensed 124 teachers. School districts may rely only upon normal attrition to 125 reduce the number of assistant teachers employed in that district.

It is the intent of the Legislature that no school district shall dismiss any assistant teacher for the purpose of using state funds to employ <u>licensed</u> teachers. School districts may rely only upon normal attrition to reduce the number of assistant teachers employed in that district.

(b) In the event any school district meets Level 4 or 5 accreditation requirements, the State Board of Education, in its discretion, may exempt such school district from any accreditation requirements for the district's early childhood education program or reading improvement program.

246 SECTION 2. This act shall take effect and be in force from 247 and after July 1, 1999.
