## HOUSE BILL NO. 1002

1	AN ACT	TO T	AMEND	SECTION	$\sqrt{37-21-7}$	MISSISSIPPI	CODE	OF	1972,	TO
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- 2 AUTHORIZE PERSONS WHO HAVE SUCCESSFULLY COMPLETED THE GENERAL
- 3 EDUCATIONAL DEVELOPMENT (GED) TEST TO SERVE AS ASSISTANT TEACHERS;
- 4 AND FOR RELATED PURPOSES.
- 5 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MISSISSIPPI:
- 6 SECTION 1. Section 37-21-7, Mississippi Code of 1972, is
- 7 amended as follows:
- 8 [From and after July 1, 1999, and until July 1, 2002, Section
- 9 37-21-7 will read as follows:]
- 10 37-21-7. (1) This section shall be referred to as the
- 11 "Mississippi Elementary Schools Assistant Teacher Program," the
- 12 purpose of which shall be to provide an early childhood education
- 13 program that assists in the instruction of basic skills. The
- 14 State Board of Education is authorized, empowered and directed to
- 15 implement a statewide system of assistant teachers in kindergarten
- 16 classes and in the first, second and third grades. The assistant
- 17 teacher shall assist pupils in actual instruction under the strict
- 18 supervision of a licensed teacher.
- 19 (2) (a) Each school district shall employ the total number
- 20 of assistant teachers funded under subsection (6) of this
- 21 section. The superintendent of each district shall assign the
- 22 assistant teachers to the kindergarten, first-, second- and
- 23 third-grade classes in the district in a manner that will promote
- 24 the maximum efficiency, as determined by the superintendent, in
- 25 the instruction of skills such as verbal and linguistic skills,
- 26 logical and mathematical skills, and social skills.
- (b) If a licensed teacher to whom an assistant teacher
- 28 has been assigned is required to be absent from the classroom, the
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- 29 assistant teacher may assume responsibility for the classroom in
- lieu of a substitute teacher. However, no assistant teacher shall 30
- assume sole responsibility of the classroom for more than three 31
- (3) consecutive school days. Further, in no event shall any 32
- 33 assistant teacher be assigned to serve as a substitute teacher for
- any teacher other than the licensed teacher to whom that assistant 34
- 35 teacher has been assigned.
- (3) Assistant teachers shall have, at a minimum, a high 36
- 37 school diploma or shall have successfully completed the General
- Educational Development (GED) test and shall show demonstrable 38
- proficiency in reading and writing skills. The State Department 39
- 40 of Education shall develop a testing procedure for assistant
- 41 teacher applicants to be used in all school districts in the
- 42 state.
- (4) (a) In order to receive funding, each school district 43
- 44 shall:
- 45 (i)Submit a plan on the implementation of a
- 46 reading improvement program to the State Department of Education;
- 47 and
- 48 (ii) Develop a plan of educational accountability
- 49 and assessment of performance, including pretests and posttests,
- for reading in Grades 1 through 6. 50
- Additionally, each school district shall: 51
- 52 Provide annually a mandatory preservice
- orientation session, using an existing in-school service day, for 53
- 54 administrators and teachers on the effective use of assistant
- 55 teachers as part of a team in the classroom setting and on the
- 56 role of assistant teachers, with emphasis on program goals;
- (ii) Hold periodic workshops for administrators 57
- 58 and teachers on the effective use and supervision of assistant
- 59 teachers;
- 60 (iii) Provide training annually on specific
- instructional skills for assistant teachers; 61
- 62 (iv) Annually evaluate their program in accordance

- 63 with their educational accountability and assessment of
- 64 performance plan; and
- (v) Designate the necessary personnel to supervise
- 66 and report on their program.
- 67 (5) The State Department of Education shall:
- 68 (a) Develop and assist in the implementation of a
- 69 statewide uniform training module, subject to the availability of
- 70 funds specifically appropriated therefor by the Legislature, which
- 71 shall be used in all school districts for training administrators,
- 72 teachers and assistant teachers. The module shall provide for the
- 73 consolidated training of each assistant teacher and teacher to
- 74 whom the assistant teacher is assigned, working together as a
- 75 team, and shall require further periodical training for
- 76 administrators, teachers and assistant teachers regarding the role
- 77 of assistant teachers;
- 78 (b) Annually evaluate the program on the district and
- 79 state level. Subject to the availability of funds specifically
- 80 appropriated therefor by the Legislature, the department shall
- 81 develop: (i) uniform evaluation reports, to be performed by the
- 82 principal or assistant principal, to collect data for the annual
- 83 overall program evaluation conducted by the department; or (ii) a
- 84 program evaluation model that, at a minimum, addresses process
- 85 evaluation; and
- 86 (c) Promulgate rules, regulations and such other
- 87 standards deemed necessary to effectuate the purposes of this
- 88 section. Noncompliance with the provisions of this section and
- 89 any rules, regulations or standards adopted by the department may
- 90 result in a violation of compulsory accreditation standards as
- 91 established by the State Board of Education and Commission on
- 92 School Accreditation.
- 93 (6) In addition to other funds allotted under the Minimum
- 94 Education Program, each school district shall be allotted Eight
- 95 Thousand Seven Hundred Seventy Dollars (\$8,770.00) per teacher
- 96 unit as prescribed in Section 37-19-5 for Grades 1, 2 and 3 for

the purpose of employing an assistant teacher. Assistant teachers shall be paid a minimum annual salary of Eight Thousand Seven Hundred Seventy Dollars (\$8,770.00). However, no assistant teacher shall be paid less than the amount he or she received in the prior school year. In the 1995-1996 school year and school years thereafter, no school district shall receive any funds under this section for any school year during which the aggregate amount of the local contribution to the salaries of assistant teachers by the district shall have been reduced below such amount for the The assistant teachers shall not be restricted to previous year. working only in the grades for which the funds were allotted, but may be assigned to other classes as provided in subsection (2)(a) of this section. (7) (a) As an alternative to employing assistant teachers, 

(7) (a) As an alternative to employing assistant teachers, the State Board of Education may authorize any school district meeting Level 3, 4 or 5 accreditation requirements to use the minimum program allotment provided under subsection (6) of this section for the purpose of employing licensed teachers for kindergarten, first-, second- and third-grade classes; however, no school district shall be authorized to use the minimum program allotment for assistant teachers for the purpose of employing licensed teachers unless the district has established that the employment of licensed teachers using such funds will reduce the teacher:student ratio in the kindergarten, first-, second- and third-grade classes. All minimum program funds for assistant teachers shall be applied to reducing teacher:student ratio in Grades K-3.

It is the intent of the Legislature that no school district shall dismiss any assistant teacher for the purpose of using the minimum program assistant teacher allotment to employ licensed teachers. School districts may rely only upon normal attrition to reduce the number of assistant teachers employed in that district.

- 232 adequate education program allotments for the purpose of employing

- 233 <u>licensed</u> teachers for kindergarten, first-, second- and
- 234 third-grade classes; however, no school district shall be
- 235 authorized to use the funds for assistant teachers for the purpose
- 236 of employing <u>licensed</u> teachers unless the district has established
- 237 that the employment of <u>licensed</u> teachers using such funds will
- 238 reduce the teacher:student ratio in the kindergarten, first-,
- 239 second- and third-grade classes. All adequate education program
- 240 funds for assistant teachers shall be applied to reducing
- 241 teacher: student ratio in Grades K-3.
- It is the intent of the Legislature that no school district
- 243 shall dismiss any assistant teacher for the purpose of using state
- 244 funds to employ <u>licensed</u> teachers. School districts may rely only
- 245 upon normal attrition to reduce the number of assistant teachers
- 246 employed in that district.
- 247 (b) In the event any school district meets Level 4 or 5
- 248 accreditation requirements, the State Board of Education, in its
- 249 discretion, may exempt such school district from any accreditation
- 250 requirements for the district's early childhood education program
- 251 or reading improvement program.
- 252 SECTION 2. This act shall take effect and be in force from
- 253 and after July 1, 1999.
