HOUSE BILL NO. 1051

AN ACT TO AMEND SECTION 37-157-1, MISSISSIPPI CODE OF 1972, 1 2 TO INCREASE THE MAXIMUM ANNUAL GROSS INCOME ALLOWED IN ORDER TO 3 QUALIFY FOR TUITION ASSISTANCE UNDER THE MISSISSIPPI COLLEGE 4 TUITION PROGRAM FOR QUALIFIED STUDENTS IN FINANCIAL NEED 5 (H.E.L.P.); AND FOR RELATED PURPOSES. б BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MISSISSIPPI: 7 SECTION 1. Section 37-157-1, Mississippi Code of 1972, is 8 amended as follows: 37-157-1. (1) The tuition at any institution of higher 9 10 education in the state shall be paid by the state on behalf of any student who enrolls in such a school to pursue an academic 11 undergraduate degree, who applies for the payment thereof, and who 12 13 meets all of the following qualifications: 14 (a) Actual residence in Mississippi during the twenty-four (24) months immediately preceding university 15 16 enrollment. For the purposes of this paragraph, residency shall be demonstrated by proof of the following as required by the 17 administering agency: 18 (i) If registered to vote, being registered in 19 20 Mississippi. 21 (ii) If licensed to drive a motor vehicle, being in possession of a Mississippi driver's license. 2.2 (iii) If owning a motor vehicle located within 23 Mississippi, being in possession of Mississippi registration for 24 that vehicle. 25 (iv) If earning an income, having filed a 26 27 Mississippi state income tax return and having complied with state 28 income tax laws and regulations.

31 Graduation from high school within the two (2) (C)years preceding the application with a minimum cumulative grade 32 33 point average of 2.5 calculated on a 4.0 scale. Successful completion of seventeen and one-half 34 (d) 35 (17-1/2) units of high school course work (Grade 9 level or higher) which constitutes a core curriculum and meets standards 36 37 for admission to the desired college or university. The core curriculum is defined as follows: 38 English I, II, III and IV (four (4) units). 39 (i) 40 (ii) Algebra I and II (two (2) units). (iii) Geometry, Trigonometry, Calculus or 41 comparable Advanced Mathematics (one (1) unit). 42 (iv) Biology (one (1) unit). 43 44 (v) Chemistry (one (1) unit). 45 (vi) Earth Science, Environmental Science, Physical Science, Biology II, Chemistry II or Physics (one (1) 46 47 unit). (vii) American History (one (1) unit). 48 49 (viii) World History, World Cultures, Western Civilization or World Geography (one (1) unit). 50 (ix) Civics and/or Economics (one (1) unit). 51 52 Fine Arts Survey (one (1) unit; or substitute (x) two (2) units of performance courses in music, dance or theater; 53 or substitute two (2) units of studio art courses). 54 55 (xi) Foreign Language (two (2) units in a single 56 language). Computer Science, Computer Literacy or Data 57 (xii) 58 Processing (one-half (1/2) unit). 59 (xiii) Electives from the above (one (1) unit). Having a composite score on the American College 60 (e) Test of at least twenty (20) on the 1989 version or an equivalent 61 62 concordant value on an enhanced version of such test. H. B. No. 1051

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(g) Being in financial need.

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(2) For purposes of this section:

67 "Institution of Higher Education" shall mean any of (a) the following institutions of higher learning or community or 68 junior colleges located in Mississippi: Alcorn State University, 69 Delta State University, Jackson State University, Mississippi 70 71 State University, Mississippi University for Women, Mississippi 72 Valley State University, University of Mississippi, University of Southern Mississippi, Coahoma Community College, Copiah-Lincoln 73 74 Community College, East Central Community College, East Mississippi Community College, Hinds Community College, Holmes 75 76 Community College, Itawamba Community College, Jones County Junior 77 College, Meridian Community College, Mississippi Delta Community 78 College, Mississippi Gulf Coast Community College, Northeast 79 Mississippi Community College, Northwest Mississippi Community College, Pearl River Community College, Southwest Mississippi 80 81 Community College, Belhaven College, Blue Mountain College, Millsaps College, Mississippi College, Rust College, Tougaloo 82 83 College, William Carey College, Mary Holmes College, Magnolia Bible College and Wood College. 84

"Tuition" shall mean the semester or trimester or 85 (b) term charges and all required fees imposed by an institution of 86 higher education as a condition of enrollment by all 87 students. * * * However, * * * for a two-year nonpublic 88 89 institution of higher education defined in paragraph (a), the 90 tuition payments shall not exceed the average charges and fees required by all of the two-year public institutions of higher 91 education defined in paragraph (a), and for a four-year nonpublic 92 93 institution of higher education defined in paragraph (a), the tuition payments shall not exceed the average charges and fees 94 95 required by all of the four-year public institutions of higher 96 education defined in paragraph (a).

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(3) 97 The tuition at any institution of higher education in the state shall be paid by the state on behalf of any student who 98 99 enrolls in such a school to pursue an academic undergraduate or associate degree, who applies for the payment thereof, and who 100 101 meets the qualifications enumerated in paragraphs (a), (b), (f) 102 and (g) of subsection (1) but who fails to meet one of the 103 particular requirements established by paragraph (c), (d) or (e) 104 of subsection (1) by an amount of ten percent (10%) or less.

105 (4) To maintain continued state payment of tuition, once 106 enrolled in an institution of higher education, a student shall 107 meet all of the following requirements:

(a) Make steady academic progress toward a degree,
earning not less than the minimum number of hours of credit
required for full-time standing in each academic period requiring
such enrollment;

(b) Maintain continuous enrollment for not less than two (2) semesters or three (3) quarters in each successive academic year, unless granted an exception for cause by the administering agency;

(c) Have a cumulative grade point average of at least 2.5 calculated on a 4.0 scale at the end of the first academic year and thereafter maintain such a cumulative grade point average as evaluated at the end of each academic year;

120 (d) Have no criminal record, except for misdemeanor121 traffic violations; and

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(e) Be found to be in financial need.

(5) The provisions of this chapter shall be administered by the Board of Trustees of State Institutions of Higher Learning in conjunction with the State Board for Community and Junior Colleges. The board may provide by rule for all matters necessary for the implementation of this chapter.

128 (6) By rule, the board shall provide for:

(a) A mechanism for informing all students of the
 availability of the assistance provided pursuant to this chapter
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131 early enough in their schooling that a salutary motivational 132 effect is possible.

(b) Applications, forms, financial audit procedures,
eligibility and other program audit procedures and other matters
related to efficient operation.

(c) A procedure for waiver through the 1996-1997 academic year of the program eligibility requirement for successful completion of a specified core curriculum upon proper documentation by the applicant that failure to comply with such requirement is due solely to the fact that the required course or courses were not available to the applicant at the school attended.

143 (7) An applicant shall be found to be in financial need if: 144 (a) The family has one (1) child under the age of 145 twenty-one (21), and the two-year average annual adjusted gross 146 income of the family is less than <u>Thirty-five Thousand Dollars</u> 147 <u>(\$35,000.00)</u>; or

(b) The family has a two-year average annual adjusted
gross income of less than <u>Thirty-five Thousand Dollars</u>
(\$35,000.00) plus Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000.00) for each
additional child under the age of twenty-one (21).

152 The two-year average annual adjusted gross income of the 153 family shall be verified by Internal Revenue Service returns or by 154 certified affidavits in cases of income that cannot be verified by 155 such returns.

As used in this subsection, the term "family" for an 156 157 unemancipated applicant means the applicant, the applicant's 158 parents, and other children under age twenty-one (21) of the 159 applicant's parents. The term "family" for an emancipated applicant means the applicant, an applicant's spouse, and any 160 161 children under age twenty-one (21) of the applicant and spouse. (8) An appropriation of funds may annually be made to the 162 board sufficient to cover, in addition to any other available 163 164 funds, the costs of tuition required to be paid, both initial and H. 165 continuing, for the coming academic year. All such payments shall 166 be made directly to the institution to which such tuition is due 167 after notice to the school that the state shall pay the tuition of 168 a student and after notice from the school that the student has 169 actually enrolled.

170 (9) The board may seek, accept and expend funds from any 171 source, including private business, industry, foundations and 172 other groups as well as any federal or other governmental funding 173 available for this purpose.

(10) No student shall receive a grant pursuant to this chapter in an amount greater than the tuition charged by the school. The student must apply for a federal grant prior to receiving state funds.

178 SECTION 2. This act shall take effect and be in force from 179 and after July 1, 1999.
