SENATE BILL NO. 2137

1 AN ACT TO AMEND SECTIONS 25-3-35, 25-3-36 AND 9-9-11, 2 MISSISSIPPI CODE OF 1972, TO REVISE THE SALARIES OF THE JUDGES OF 3 THE SUPREME COURT, COURT OF APPEALS, CIRCUIT COURT, CHANCERY 4 COURT, COUNTY COURT AND JUSTICE COURT; AND FOR RELATED PURPOSES. 5 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MISSISSIPPI: 6 SECTION 1. Section 25-3-35, Mississippi Code of 1972, is 7 amended as follows: 25-3-35. (1) The annual salaries of the following judges 8 are fixed as follows, to begin at the commencement of the next 9 10 term of office immediately succeeding the existing term: Chief Justice of the Supreme Court..... \$112,900.00 11 12 Presiding Justice of the Supreme Court..... <u>110,900.00</u>

Associate Justices of the Supreme Court, each..... 110,300.00 However, in addition to their present official duties, there 14 15 are imposed upon the Supreme Court Justices the extra duties of making a special study of existing laws and reporting to each 16 17 regular session of the Legislature such constructive suggestions as they may deem necessary for the improvement of the 18 administration of justice, and of advising and counseling with the 19 20 State Librarian in the selection of law books for purchase and use in the State Law Library, advising with the librarian thereof upon 21 22 the removal from the library of any books which may be the least frequently used, and for the placing of same in a convenient 23 24 location so as to provide additional space for such books and 25 other current publications which may be more frequently used or 26 called for. For such extra services each justice, from and after the effective date of Senate Bill No. 2137, 1999 Regular Session, 27 shall receive a sum sufficient when added to the present salaries 28 S. B. 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30 <u>Hundred Dollars (\$112,900.00)</u> for the Chief Justice, <u>One Hundred</u> 31 <u>Ten Thousand Nine Hundred Dollars (\$110,900.00)</u> for the Presiding 32 Justice, and <u>One Hundred Ten Thousand Three Hundred Dollars</u> 33 <u>(\$110,300.00)</u> for Associate Justices, per annum. As each existing 34 term expires and the above-captioned salaries become effective in 35 due course, the extra duties and compensation provided for shall 36 cease.

41 (3) The annual salaries of the chancery and circuit court

45 In addition to their present official duties, there are 46 imposed upon the chancery and circuit court judges the extra duties of making a special study of existing laws relating to 47 48 trial courts and reporting to the Supreme Court of the State of 49 Mississippi such constructive suggestions as they may deem necessary for the improvement of the administration of justice, 50 which shall be recommended to the Legislature by the Supreme Court 51 in the manner provided by law. The judges shall advise and 52 supervise in the purchase of law books for the libraries of each 53 district, and shall study and evaluate the inventory of books and 54 55 facilities now existing in the libraries of each district to effect the removal and relocation of obsolete publications so as 56 57 to provide additional space for those books and current 58 publications more frequently used. The judges shall study the 59 existing rules promulgated by the circuit and chancery court 60 judicial associations governing the operation of chancery and circuit courts, and revise the same pursuant to existing laws. 61 For such extra services each judge, from and after the effective 62 63 date of Senate Bill No. 2137, 1999 Regular Session, shall receive a sum sufficient when added to the present salaries of the judges 64 to aggregate One Hundred Thousand Seven Hundred Dollars 65 66 (\$100,700.00) per annum for each judge. Upon the expiration of S. B. No. 2137 99\SS26\R111

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67 the existing term, the above-captioned salaries become effective 68 in due course, and the extra duties and compensation provided for 69 shall cease.

70 (4) The Supreme Court shall prepare a payroll for chancery
71 judges and circuit judges and submit such payroll to the
72 Department of Finance and Administration.

(5) The annual salary of the full-time district attorneys
shall be Seventy-nine Thousand Eight Hundred Thirty Dollars
(\$79,830.00).

(6) The annual salary of the full-time legal assistants
shall be not less than Fifteen Thousand Dollars (\$15,000.00) nor
more than Sixty-seven Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$67,500.00),
as established by the district attorney.

80 SECTION 2. Section 25-3-36, Mississippi Code of 1972, is 81 amended as follows:

82 25-3-36. (1) From and after October 1, 1998, every justice court judge shall receive as full compensation for his or her 83 services and in lieu of any and all other fees, costs or 84 85 compensation heretofore authorized for such justice court judge, an annual salary based upon the population of his or her county 86 87 according to the 1990 federal decennial census; however, no justice court judge shall be paid less than the salary authorized 88 89 under this section to be paid the justice court judge based upon 90 the population of the county according to the 1980 federal 91 decennial census. The amount of which salary shall be determined 92 as follows:

93 (a) In counties with a population of more than two
94 hundred thousand (200,000), a salary of <u>Fifty Thousand Two Hundred</u>
95 <u>Ninety-nine Dollars (\$50,299.00)</u>.

96 (b) In counties with a population of more than one
97 hundred fifty thousand (150,000) but not more than two hundred
98 thousand (200,000), a salary of <u>Forty-six Thousand Five Hundred</u>
99 <u>Four Dollars (\$46,504.00)</u>.

100 (c) In counties with a population of more than S. B. No. 2137 99\SS26\R111 PAGE 3 101 seventy-five thousand (75,000) but not more than one hundred fifty 102 thousand (150,000), a salary of <u>Forty-two Thousand Seven Hundred</u> 103 <u>Nine Dollars (\$42,709.00)</u>.

104 (d) In counties with a population of more than
105 forty-nine thousand (49,000) but not more than seventy-five
106 thousand (75,000), a salary of <u>Thirty-seven Thousand Three Hundred</u>
107 Ninety-six Dollars (\$37,396.00).

(e) In counties with a population of more than
thirty-four thousand (34,000) but not more than forty-nine
thousand (49,000), a salary of <u>Thirty-two Thousand Eight Hundred</u>
<u>Forty-two Dollars (\$32,842.00)</u>.

(f) In counties with a population of more than twenty-four thousand five hundred (24,500) but not more than thirty-four thousand (34,000), a salary of <u>Thirty-one Thousand</u> <u>Three Hundred Twenty-four Dollars (\$31,324.00)</u>.

(g) In counties with a population of more than twenty-one thousand (21,000) but not more than twenty-four thousand five hundred (24,500), a salary of <u>Twenty-eight Thousand</u> <u>Two Hundred Eighty-eight Dollars (\$28,288.00)</u>.

(h) In counties with a population of more than sixteen
thousand five hundred (16,500) but not more than twenty-one
thousand (21,000), a salary of <u>Twenty-five Thousand Two Hundred</u>
<u>Fifty-two Dollars (\$25,252.00)</u>.

(i) In counties with a population of more than twelve
thousand (12,000) but not more than sixteen thousand five hundred
(16,500), a salary of <u>Twenty-two Thousand Two Hundred Sixteen</u>
<u>Dollars (\$22,216.00)</u>.

(j) In counties with a population of more than eight thousand (8,000) but not more than twelve thousand (12,000), a salary of <u>Nineteen Thousand Dollars (\$19,000.00)</u>.

131 (k) In counties with a population of eight thousand
132 (8,000) or less, a salary of <u>Sixteen Thousand Dollars</u>
133 <u>(\$16,000.00)</u>.

134 The board of supervisors of any county having two (2)
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135 judicial districts and two (2) justice court judges for the county 136 shall pay the justice court judges an amount equal to that 137 hereinabove provided for judges in the next higher population category per year, if said justice court judges maintain regular 138 139 office hours and are personally present in the office they 140 maintain for at least thirty (30) hours per week. In any county having a population greater than eight thousand (8,000) but less 141 142 than eight thousand five hundred (8,500) according to the 1990 143 federal decennial census and in which U.S. Highway 61 and 144 Mississippi Highway 4 intersect, the board of supervisors may, in its discretion, pay such justice court judges an additional amount 145 146 not to exceed the sum of Eleven Thousand Five Hundred Fifty 147 Dollars (\$11,550.00) per year, payable beginning April 1, 1997. 148 In any county having a population greater than ten thousand (10,000) but less than ten thousand five hundred (10,500) 149 150 according to the 1990 federal decennial census and in which 151 Mississippi Highway 3 and Mississippi Highway 6 intersect, the board of supervisors may, in its discretion, pay such justice 152 153 court judges an additional amount not to exceed One Thousand Four 154 Hundred Fifty Dollars (\$1,450.00) per year, payable beginning 155 April 1, 1997. In any county having a population greater than 156 twenty-four thousand seven hundred (24,700) and less than twenty-four thousand nine hundred (24,900), according to the 1990 157 158 federal census, wherein Mississippi Highways 15 and 16 intersect, 159 the board of supervisors shall pay such justice court judge an 160 additional amount equal to Two Thousand Five Hundred Dollars 161 (\$2,500.00) per year.

(2) Notwithstanding the provisions of subsection (1) of this 162 163 section, in the event that the number of justice court judges 164 authorized pursuant to Section 9-11-2(1) is exceeded pursuant to 165 the provisions of Section 9-11-2(4), the aggregate of the salaries paid to the justice court judges of such a county shall not exceed 166 167 the amount sufficient to pay the number of justice court judges 168 authorized pursuant to Section 9-11-2(1) and such amount shall be S. 169 equally divided among those justice court judges continuing to 170 hold office under the provisions of Section 9-11-2(4).

171 (3) From and after January 1, 1984, all fees, costs, fines and penalties charged and collected in the justice court shall be 172 173 paid to the clerk of the justice court for deposit, along with 174 monies from cash bonds and other monies which have been forfeited 175 in criminal cases, into the general fund of the county as provided 176 in Section 9-11-19; and the clerk of the board of supervisors 177 shall be authorized and empowered, upon approval by the board of 178 supervisors, to make disbursements and withdrawals from the general fund of the county in order to pay any reasonable and 179 180 necessary expenses incurred in complying with this section, including payment of the salaries of justice court judges as 181 provided by subsection (1) of this section. The provisions of 182 183 this subsection shall not, except as to cash bonds and other 184 monies which have been forfeited in criminal cases, apply to 185 monies required to be deposited in the justice court clerk 186 clearing account as provided in Section 9-11-18, Mississippi Code 187 of 1972.

The salaries provided for in subsection (1) of this 188 (4) 189 section shall be payable monthly by warrant drawn by the clerk of 190 the board of supervisors on the general fund of the county; 191 however, the board of supervisors, by resolution duly adopted and 192 entered on its minutes, may provide that such salaries shall be paid semimonthly on the first and fifteenth day of each month. 193 Ιf 194 a pay date falls on a weekend or legal holiday, salary payments 195 shall be made on the workday immediately preceding the weekend or 196 legal holiday.

197 (5) Provided, that the salary of any justice court judge 198 shall not be reduced during his term of office as a result of a 199 population change following a federal decennial census.

200 (6) Any justice court judge who is unable to attend and hold 201 court by reason of being under suspension by the Commission on 202 Judicial Performance or the Mississippi Supreme Court shall not S. B. No. 2137 99\SS26\R111 PAGE 6 203 receive a salary while under such suspension.

204 SECTION 3. Section 9-9-11, Mississippi Code of 1972, is 205 amended as follows:

206 9-9-11. (1) Except as otherwise provided in subsections (2) 207 and (3), the county court judge shall receive an annual salary 208 payable monthly out of the county treasury in an amount not to exceed One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00) less than the salary which 209 210 is now or shall hereafter be provided for circuit and chancery judges of this state, in the discretion of the board of 211 212 supervisors of said county; provided, however, that the salary of 213 such judge shall not be reduced during his term of office. Provided further, that the office of county court judge in any 214 county receiving an annual salary of Thirty-six Thousand Dollars 215 216 (\$36,000.00) or more shall be a full-time position, and the holder 217 thereof shall not otherwise engage in the practice of law.

218 (2) In the event of the establishment of a county court by 219 agreement between two (2) or more counties as provided in Section 220 9-9-3, the county judge of the court so established shall be paid 221 a salary equal to one and one-half (1-1/2) times that salary that 222 he would be paid if he were the judge of the smallest of such two 223 (2) or more counties, such salary to be paid in monthly 224 installments as provided by law; provided that such salary shall not exceed One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00) less than the salary 225 226 of the circuit and chancery judges of this state.

(3) The county court judge shall receive an annual salarypayable monthly out of the county treasury as follows:

229 In any county having a population of seventy (a) 230 thousand (70,000) or more according to the 1980 federal census, 231 the county judge shall receive an annual salary of One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00) less than that paid to a circuit court judge. 232 233 The office of county judge shall be a full-time position, and the 234 holder thereof shall not otherwise engage in the practice of law. 235 In any county having a population of sixty thousand (b) 236 (60,000) or more but less than seventy thousand (70,000) according S. B. No. 2137 99\SS26\R111 PAGE 7

to the 1980 federal census, the county judge shall receive an annual salary of Forty Thousand Dollars (\$40,000.00). The office of county judge shall be a full-time position, and the holder thereof shall not otherwise engage in the practice of law. The county judge shall not be eligible for any additional salary except as may be authorized in subsection (4).

243 (c) In any county having a population of twenty-seven 244 thousand (27,000) or more but less than sixty thousand (60,000) according to the 1980 federal census, the county judge shall 245 246 receive an annual salary of not less than Twelve Thousand Dollars 247 (\$12,000.00) but not more than Forty Thousand Dollars 248 (\$40,000.00), in the discretion of the board of supervisors of said county. The county judge shall not be eligible for any 249 250 additional salary except as may be authorized in subsection (4). 251 In the event that the board of supervisors of said county elects 252 to pay such county judge an annual salary of Thirty Thousand 253 Dollars (\$30,000.00) or more, the office of county judge shall be 254 a full-time position, and the holder thereof shall not otherwise 255 engage in the practice of law.

256 In any county having a population of less than (d) 257 twenty-seven thousand (27,000) according to the 1980 federal 258 census, the county judge shall receive an annual salary of not less than Four Thousand Two Hundred Dollars (\$4,200.00) and not 259 260 more than Eight Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$8,500.00), in the 261 discretion of the board of supervisors of said county. The county 262 judge shall not be eligible for any additional salary except as may be authorized in subsection (4). 263

(4) The county judge of any county described in this
subsection shall be paid the compensation, and he shall be subject
to any restrictions, set forth in the following paragraphs:

(a) The county judge of any such Class 1 county with population according to the latest federal decennial census of forty-five thousand (45,000) or more and lying wholly within a levee district and having two (2) judicial districts shall, in the S. B. No. 2137 99\SS26\R111 PAGE 8 discretion of the board of supervisors of such county, receive an annual salary not exceeding Forty Thousand Dollars (\$40,000.00), or a sum which is One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00) less than the salary which is now or shall hereafter be provided for circuit and chancery judges of the state, whichever is greater.

276 The county judge of any Class 1 county having an (b) 277 area in excess of nine hundred twenty-five (925) square miles 278 shall receive an annual salary of not less than Thirty Thousand Dollars (\$30,000.00) but, in the discretion of the board of 279 280 supervisors of such county, such salary may be not more than Five 281 Hundred Dollars (\$500.00) less than the annual salary of a circuit 282 judge, payable monthly out of the county treasury, and the county 283 judge shall not practice law.

284 The office of county judge in any such Class 1 (C) 285 county with a population according to the 1970 federal decennial 286 census of greater than thirty-nine thousand (39,000), and where 287 U.S. Highway 61 and Mississippi Highway 6 intersect, shall receive an annual salary to be paid in monthly installments of not less 288 289 than an amount equal to ninety percent (90%) of the annual salary 290 which is now or shall hereafter be provided for circuit and 291 chancery judges of the state, as follows: The salary of the 292 county judge shall be increased by ten percent (10%) annually 293 above the base salary of the preceding year until such time as the 294 judge's salary is equal to the amount that is provided by this subsection. The office of county judge shall be a full-time 295 296 position and the holder thereof shall not otherwise engage in the practice of law. 297

(d) In any Class 1 county bordering on the Mississippi 298 299 River and which has situated therein a national military park and national military cemetery, the office of county judge shall be a 300 301 full-time position and the holder thereof shall not otherwise engage in the practice of law. The salary for the county judge in 302 303 said county shall be fixed at a sum which is One Thousand Dollars 304 (\$1,000.00) less than the salary which is now or shall hereafter S. B. No. 2137 99\SS26\R111 PAGE 9

305 be provided for circuit and chancery judges of this state.

306 (e) The county judge in any county having a population 307 of at least forty-two thousand one hundred eleven (42,111), according to the 1970 census, and where U.S. Highway 49E and U.S. 308 309 Highway 82 intersect, shall receive an annual salary to be paid in monthly installments of not less than Thirty Thousand Dollars 310 (\$30,000.00) but not more than Two Thousand Five Hundred Dollars 311 312 (\$2,500.00) less than the annual salary of the circuit judge, in the discretion of the board of supervisors of said county. 313

314 The county judge in any Class 1 county bordering on (f) 315 the Mississippi River and having an area of less than four hundred 316 fifty (450) square miles wherein U.S. Highways 84 and 61 intersect shall receive an annual salary of Four Thousand Dollars 317 (\$4,000.00) less than the annual salary of a circuit judge, and 318 such county judge shall not practice law in any manner. 319 The 320 county judge in such county shall not be eligible to receive any 321 additional salary authorized by this section or from any other source other than that set out and authorized by this paragraph. 322

(g) The county judge of any Class 1 county bordering on the Mississippi River on the west and the State of Tennessee on the north, and traversed north to south by Interstate Highway 55, shall receive an annual salary of ninety percent (90%) of the salary which is now or shall hereafter be provided for chancery and circuit judges of this state, but in any event not less than Sixty Thousand Two Hundred Dollars (\$60,200.00).

330 (h) The county judge of any Class 1 county with a population of greater than sixty-nine thousand (69,000) according 331 to the 1980 federal decennial census, and wherein U.S. Highway 80 332 and Mississippi Highway 43 intersect, shall receive an annual 333 334 salary in an amount not greater than the sum of Five Hundred 335 Dollars (\$500.00) less than the salary which is now or shall hereafter be provided for circuit and chancery judges of this 336 337 state, in the discretion of the board of supervisors of said

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county.

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339 (i) The county judge of any county having a population in excess of sixty-six thousand (66,000) according to the 1980 340 341 federal decennial census, wherein is located a state-supported university and in which U.S. Highways 49 and 11 intersect, shall 342 343 receive an annual salary of One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00) less than that paid to a circuit court judge. The office of such 344 county judge shall be a full-time position, and the holder thereof 345 346 shall not otherwise engage in the practice of law.

347 (j) The county judge of any county having two (2) 348 judicial districts, having a population in excess of sixty-one thousand nine hundred (61,900) according to the 1980 federal 349 350 decennial census, in which U.S. Interstate Highway 59 intersects with U.S. Highway 84, shall receive an annual salary of One 351 352 Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00) less than the salary which is now or 353 hereafter authorized to be paid circuit and chancery court judges 354 of this state. The office of such county judge shall be a 355 full-time position, and the holder thereof shall not otherwise engage in the practice of law. 356

357 The office of county judge of any Class I county (k) 358 wherein U.S. Highway 51 and U.S. Highway 98 intersect shall be a 359 full-time position and the holder thereof shall not otherwise 360 engage in the practice of law. The annual salary for the office 361 of county judge in said county may be fixed, in the discretion of 362 the board of supervisors of said county, at a sum not to exceed Two Thousand Dollars (\$2,000.00) less than the salary which is now 363 364 or shall hereafter be provided for circuit and chancery judges of 365 this state.

366 The county judge of any county having a population (1) 367 of more than forty-one thousand six hundred (41,600) but less than forty-one thousand six hundred fifty (41,650) according to the 368 369 1980 federal census, and wherein U.S. Highway 49 intersects with Mississippi Highway 22, shall receive an annual salary in an 370 371 amount established by the board of supervisors, but in no event to 372 exceed the salary provided now or hereafter for circuit and S. B. No. 2137 99\SS26\R111

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373 chancery judges of this state.

374 The county judge of any county having a population (m) 375 of more than fifty-seven thousand (57,000) but less than 376 fifty-seven thousand one hundred (57,100) according to the 1980 377 federal census, wherein U.S. Highway 45 intersects with Mississippi Highway 6, shall receive an annual salary in an amount 378 379 established by the board of supervisors, but in no event to exceed 380 the salary provided now or hereafter for circuit and chancery 381 judges of this state.

382 The county judge of any county having a population (n) 383 of more than fifty-seven thousand three hundred (57,300) according 384 to the 1980 federal decennial census, wherein is located a 385 state-supported university and wherein United States Highways 82 386 and 45 intersect, shall receive an annual salary in an amount 387 established by the board of supervisors, but in no event to exceed 388 the salary provided now or hereafter for circuit and chancery 389 judges of this state.

390 (5) The salary of a county court judge or justice court 391 judge shall not be reduced during his term of office as a result 392 of a population decrease based upon the 1990 federal decennial 393 census.

394 (6) The salary of a sheriff shall not be reduced during his
395 term of office as a result of a population decrease based upon the
396 1990 federal decennial census.

397 From and after October 1, 1993, or the effective date of (7) 398 this act [Laws, 1993, Ch. 550], whichever is later, in addition to 399 the salaries set forth in this section, the board of supervisors of any county, in its discretion, may pay any county court judge 400 401 whose salary is not established herein in relation to the salary paid to chancery and circuit court judges, an additional amount 402 403 not to exceed ten percent (10%) of the maximum allowable salary 404 for that judge.

405 (8) From and after October 1, 1999, or the effective date of 406 Senate Bill No. 2137, 1999 Regular Session, whichever is later, in S. B. No. 2137 99\SS26\R111 PAGE 12 407 addition to the salaries set forth in this section, the board of supervisors of any county, in its discretion, may pay any county 408 409 court judge whose salary is not established herein in relation to the salary paid to chancery and circuit court judges, an 410 411 additional amount not to exceed Four Thousand Dollars (\$4,000.00). SECTION 4. The Attorney General of the State of Mississippi 412 is directed to submit this act, immediately upon approval by the 413 Governor, or upon approval by the Legislature subsequent to a 414 415 veto, to the Attorney General of the United States or to the 416 United States District Court for the District of Columbia in 417 accordance with the provisions of the Voting Rights Act of 1965, 418 as amended and extended.

419 SECTION 5. This act shall take effect and be in force from 420 and after the date it is effectuated under Section 5 of the Voting 421 Rights Act of 1965, as amended and extended, or October 1, 1999, 422 whichever occurs later.
