1 2 4 5 6 7 8 9 10 11	AN ACT TO AMEND SECTION 25-3-33, MISSISSIPPI CODE OF 1972, TO REVISE THE SALARY OF THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR OF THE PEARL RIVER VALLEY WATER SUPPLY DISTRICT; TO AMEND SECTION 37-3-9, MISSISSIPPI CODE OF 1972, TO PROVIDE THAT THE STATE SUPERINTENDENT OF EDUCATION SHALL RECEIVE AN ANNUAL SALARY PRESCRIBED BY THE STATE BOARD OF EDUCATION, BUT NOT TO EXCEED THE SALARY OF THE COMMISSIONER OF HIGHER LEARNING; <u>TO AMEND SECTION 25-3-35</u> , <u>MISSISSIPPI CODE OF 1972, TO INCREASE THE SALARIES OF THE ELECTED</u> <u>JUDICIARY; TO AMEND SECTION 25-31-10, MISSISSIPPI CODE OF 1972, TO</u> <u>INCREASE THE COMPENSATION OF CRIMINAL INVESTIGATORS EMPLOYED BY</u> <u>DISTRICT ATTORNEYS;</u> AND FOR RELATED PURPOSES.
12	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MISSISSIPPI:
13	SECTION 1. Section 25-3-33, Mississippi Code of 1972, is

Section 37-3-9, Mississippi Code of 1972, is 147 amended as follows: 37-3-9. (1) * * * From and after July 1, 1984, there shall 148 149 be a State Superintendent of Public Education who shall be 150 appointed by the State Board of Education, with the advice and consent of the Senate, and serve at the board's will and pleasure. 151 152 He shall be the chief administrative officer for the State Department of Education and shall administer the department in 153 154 accordance with the policies established by the State Board of 155 Education. He shall receive such compensation in the amount 156 prescribed by the State Board of Education, but not to exceed the 157 salary of the Commissioner of Higher Education. The State Superintendent of Public Education shall have at least a master's 158 159 degree in any field and a minimum of five (5) years' experience in administration in the educational field. 160 (2) The state superintendent shall give bond in the penalty 161 162 of Seventy-five Thousand Dollars (\$75,000.00), with sureties to be 163 approved by the Governor, conditioned according to law. Said bond 164 when approved shall be filed and recorded in the office of the 165 Secretary of State.

166 <u>SECTION 3.</u> Section 25-3-35, Mississippi Code of 1972, is 167 amended as follows:

(1) The annual salaries of the following judges are fixed as follows, to begin at the commencement of the next 169 170 term of office immediately succeeding the existing term: Chief Justice of the Supreme Court..... \$108,400.00 171 172 Presiding Justice of the Supreme Court..... 106,400.00 Associate Justices of the Supreme Court, each..... 105,800.00 173 174 However, in addition to their present official duties, there are imposed upon the Supreme Court Justices the extra duties of 175 176 making a special study of existing laws and reporting to each 177 regular session of the Legislature such constructive suggestions as they may deem necessary for the improvement of the 178 179 administration of justice, and of advising and counseling with the 180 State Librarian in the selection of law books for purchase and use 181 in the State Law Library, advising with the librarian thereof upon 182 the removal from the library of any books which may be the least 183 frequently used, and for the placing of same in a convenient 184 location so as to provide additional space for such books and other current publications which may be more frequently used or 185 186 called for. For such extra services each justice, from and after 187 the effective date of <u>Senate Bill No. 2479, 1999 Regular Session</u>, 188 shall receive a sum sufficient when added to the present salaries of the justices to aggregate One Hundred Eight Thousand Four 189 Hundred Dollars (\$108,400.00) for the Chief Justice, One Hundred 190 191 Six Thousand Four Hundred Dollars (\$106,400.00) for the Presiding Justice, and <u>One Hundred Five Thousand Eight Hundred Dollars</u> 192 193 (\$105,800.00) for Associate Justices, per annum. As each existing term expires and the above-captioned salaries become effective in 194 195 due course, the extra duties and compensation provided for shall 196 cease.

197 (2) The annual salaries of the judges of the Court of 198 Appeals of Mississippi are fixed as follows:

205 In addition to their present official duties, there are 206 imposed upon the chancery and circuit court judges the extra 207 duties of making a special study of existing laws relating to 208 trial courts and reporting to the Supreme Court of the State of 209 Mississippi such constructive suggestions as they may deem 210 necessary for the improvement of the administration of justice, 211 which shall be recommended to the Legislature by the Supreme Court in the manner provided by law. The judges shall advise and 212 213 supervise in the purchase of law books for the libraries of each district, and shall study and evaluate the inventory of books and 214 215 facilities now existing in the libraries of each district to 216 effect the removal and relocation of obsolete publications so as 217 to provide additional space for those books and current 218 publications more frequently used. The judges shall study the existing rules promulgated by the circuit and chancery court 219 220 judicial associations governing the operation of chancery and 221 circuit courts, and revise the same pursuant to existing laws. 222 For such extra services each judge, from and after the effective date of Senate Bill No. 2479, 1999 Regular Session, shall receive 223 224 a sum sufficient when added to the present salaries of the judges 225 to aggregate <u>Ninety-six Thousand Two Hundred Dollars (\$96,200.00)</u> per annum for each judge. Upon the expiration of the existing 226 227 term, the above-captioned salaries become effective in due course, and the extra duties and compensation provided for shall cease. 228 229 (4) The Supreme Court shall prepare a payroll for chancery

judges and circuit judges and submit such payroll to theDepartment of Finance and Administration.

(5) The annual salary of the full-time district attorneys
shall be Seventy-nine Thousand Eight Hundred Thirty Dollars
(\$79,830.00).

235 (6) The annual salary of the full-time legal assistants
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shall be not less than Fifteen Thousand Dollars (\$15,000.00) nor more than Sixty-seven Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$67,500.00), as established by the district attorney.

239 <u>SECTION 4.</u> Section 25-31-10, Mississippi Code of 1972, is 240 amended as follows:

241 25-31-10. (1) Any district attorney may appoint a full-time
242 criminal investigator.

(2) The district attorneys of the Third, Fifth, Ninth,
Tenth, Eleventh, Twelfth, Fifteenth, Sixteenth, Seventeenth and
Twentieth Circuit Court Districts may appoint one (1) additional
full-time criminal investigator for a total of two (2) full-time
criminal investigators.

(3) The district attorneys of the First, Second, Fourth and
Seventh and Nineteenth Circuit Court Districts may appoint two (2)
additional full-time criminal investigators for a total of three
(3) full-time criminal investigators.

(4) No district attorney or assistant district attorney
shall accept any private employment, civil or criminal, in any
matter investigated by such criminal investigators.

255 The full and complete compensation for all public duties (5) 256 rendered by said criminal investigators shall be not * * * more 257 than Forty Thousand Dollars (\$40,000.00) per annum, to be 258 determined at the discretion of the district attorney based upon 259 the qualifications, education and experience of the criminal investigator, plus necessary travel and other expenses, to be paid 260 261 in accordance with Section 25-31-8. Provided, however, the 262 maximum salary under this subsection for a criminal investigator 263 who has a law degree may be supplemented by the district attorney 264 from other available funds, but not to exceed the maximum salary 265 for a legal assistant to a district attorney.

266 (6) Any criminal investigator may be designated by the 267 district attorney to attend the Law Enforcement Officers Training 268 Program set forth in Section 45-6-1 et seq., Mississippi Code of 269 1972. The total expenses associated with attendance by criminal S. B. No. 2479 99\SS26\R521PS PAGE 8 270 investigators at the Law Enforcement Officers Training Program 271 shall be paid out of the funds of the appropriate district 272 attorney.

273 <u>SECTION 5.</u> The Attorney General of the State of Mississippi 274 is directed to submit Sections 3 and 4 of this act, immediately 275 upon approval by the Governor, or upon approval by the Legislature 276 subsequent to a veto, to the Attorney General of the United States 277 or to the United States District Court for the District of 278 Columbia in accordance with the provisions of the Voting Rights 279 Act of 1965, as amended and extended.

280 SECTION 6. Sections 3 and 4 of this act shall take effect and be in force from and after July 1, 1999, if they are 281 282 effectuated on or before that date under Section 5 of the Voting 283 Rights Act of 1965, as amended and extended. If they are 284 effectuated under Section 5 of the Voting Rights Act of 1965, as amended and extended, after July 1, 1999, Sections 3 and 4 of this 285 286 act shall take effect and be in force from and after the date they are respectively effectuated under Section 5 of the Voting Rights 287 288 Act of 1965, as amended and extended.

289 <u>SECTION 7.</u> Sections 1 and 2 of this act shall take effect 290 and be in force from and after July 1, 1999.

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
