149	SECTION 2. Section 37-3-9, Mississippi Code of 1972, is
150	amended as follows:
151	37-3-9. (1) * * * From and after July 1, 1984, there shall
152	be a State Superintendent of Public Education who shall be
153	appointed by the State Board of Education, with the advice and
154	consent of the Senate, and serve at the board's will and pleasure.
155	He shall be the chief administrative officer for the State
156	Department of Education and shall administer the department in
157	accordance with the policies established by the State Board of
158	Education. He shall receive such compensation in an amount equal
159	to ninety percent (90%) of the salary of the Commissioner of
160	<u>Higher Education</u> . The State Superintendent of Public Education
161	shall have at least a master's degree in any field and a minimum
162	of five (5) years' experience in administration in the educational

164	(2) The state superintendent shall give bond in the penalty

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          However, in addition to their present official duties, there
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     are imposed upon the Supreme Court Justices the extra duties of
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     making a special study of existing laws and reporting to each
     regular session of the Legislature such constructive suggestions
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     as they may deem necessary for the improvement of the
     administration of justice, and of advising and counseling with the
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     State Librarian in the selection of law books for purchase and use
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     in the State Law Library, advising with the librarian thereof upon
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     the removal from the library of any books which may be the least
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     frequently used, and for the placing of same in a convenient
     location so as to provide additional space for such books and
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     other current publications which may be more frequently used or
     called for. For such extra services each justice, from and after
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     the effective date of Senate Bill 2479, 1999 Regular Session,
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     shall receive a sum sufficient when added to the present salaries
     of the justices to aggregate One Hundred Four Thousand Nine
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     Hundred Dollars ($104,900.00) for the Chief Justice, One Hundred
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     Two Thousand Nine Hundred Dollars ($102,900.00) for the Presiding
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     Justice, and One Hundred Two Thousand Three Hundred Dollars
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     ($102,300.00) for Associate Justices, per annum. As each existing
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     term expires and the above-captioned salaries become effective in
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     due course, the extra duties and compensation provided for shall
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     cease.

208	In addition to their present official duties, there are
209	imposed upon the chancery and circuit court judges the extra
210	duties of making a special study of existing laws relating to
211	trial courts and reporting to the Supreme Court of the State of
212	Mississippi such constructive suggestions as they may deem
213	necessary for the improvement of the administration of justice,
214	which shall be recommended to the Legislature by the Supreme Court
215	in the manner provided by law. The judges shall advise and
216	supervise in the purchase of law books for the libraries of each
217	district, and shall study and evaluate the inventory of books and
218	facilities now existing in the libraries of each district to
219	effect the removal and relocation of obsolete publications so as
220	to provide additional space for those books and current
221	publications more frequently used. The judges shall study the

306 and the mileage allowance provided by Section 25-3-41, for each mile of the distance by the most direct route usually traveled in 307 308 coming to and returning from the place where the Legislature sits. Beginning on April 16, 1997, each Senator and Representative shall 309 310 receive for attending each extraordinary session or called session the sum of Seventy-five Dollars (\$75.00) per day and mileage at 311 312 the same rate as per regular session. In addition to the above, beginning on April 16, 1997, each Senator and Representative and 313 314 the Lieutenant Governor shall receive the sum of One Thousand Five 315 Hundred Dollars (\$1,500.00) per month for expenses incidental to his office for every full month of his term, except any month or 316 317 major fraction thereof when the Legislature is convened in regular 318 or extraordinary session; and payments shall be made to each 319 Senator and Representative and the Lieutenant Governor by the 320 State Treasurer between the first and tenth day of each month following the month for which the payments are due. \* \* \* 321 322 SECTION 6. The Attorney General of the State of Mississippi is directed to submit Sections 3 and 5 of this act, immediately 323 324 upon approval by the Governor, or upon approval by the Legislature subsequent to a veto, to the Attorney General of the United States 325 326 or to the United States District Court for the District of 327 Columbia in accordance with the provisions of the Voting Rights 328 Act of 1965, as amended and extended. 329 SECTION 7. Sections 1, 2 and 4 of this act shall take effect and be in force from and after July 1, 1999.
