SENATE BILL NO. 2609 (As Passed the Senate)

AN ACT TO DIRECT THE STATE BOARD OF EDUCATION TO ESTABLISH A PRE-KINDERGARTEN "PARENTS AS TEACHERS PILOT PROGRAM" IN THE SCHOOL DISTRICTS IN THE STATE TO ASSIST PARENTS IN THE DEVELOPMENT OF 3 4 LEARNING SKILLS OF THEIR CHILDREN FROM BIRTH TO AGE FIVE; TO SET FORTH THE OBJECTIVES OF THE PROGRAM; TO SET FORTH THE COMPONENTS 5 OF THE PROGRAM; TO SET FORTH PROCEDURES FOR APPLICATION; TO 6 7 PROVIDE FOR FUNDING; AND FOR RELATED PURPOSES. BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MISSISSIPPI: 8 9 SECTION 1. (1) The State Board of Education shall provide 10 for the establishment of a pre-kindergarten pilot program in the 11 public schools of Mississippi for children under the age of five 12 (5) years, which shall be designated the "Parents as Teachers 13 Pilot Program" following the procedures set forth in this section. 14 The Parents as Teachers Pilot Program shall provide parent education services, including resource materials on home learning 15 activities, private and group educational guidance, individual and 16 17 group learning experiences for the parent and child, and other 18 activities that enable the parent to improve learning in the home. 19 The objectives of the Parents as Teachers Pilot Program shall be as follows: 20 The program shall be an early childhood parent 21

education and family support program designed to empower all

parents to give their child the best possible start in life, based

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- 24 on the philosophy that parents are their children's first and most
- 25 influential teachers.
- 26 (b) The program shall be a home-school-community
- 27 partnership providing parents with information on child
- 28 development from birth to age five (5) which suggests learning
- 29 opportunities that encourage language and intellectual growth,
- 30 basic skills leading to reading instruction, and physical and
- 31 social skills.
- 32 (c) The program shall be voluntary.
- 33 (2) Components of the Parents as Teachers Pilot Program
- 34 shall include, but shall not be limited to:
- 35 (a) Personalized home visits by certified parent
- 36 educators, trained in child development, who assist parents in
- 37 understanding what to expect in each stage of their child's
- 38 development, and recommend methods to encourage learning and
- 39 promote strong parent-child relationships.
- 40 (b) Parent group meetings in which parents share
- 41 concerns and successes and participate in group parent-child
- 42 activities.
- 43 (c) Periodic screening services of the child's overall
- 44 development, language, hearing and vision, in order to provide
- 45 early detection of potential learning problems.
- 46 (d) Provide families with access to other early
- 47 childhood services and related community services.
- 48 <u>(e) A presentation of facts regarding the importance of</u>
- 49 <u>a two-parent family to the child's emotional, mental and physical</u>
- 50 <u>development</u>, and the significance of the marriage of the child's
- 51 parents in this development.
- 52 (3) The State Board of Education shall establish rules and
- 53 <u>regulations for the submission of school district applications for</u>
- 54 the Parents as Teachers Pilot Program and criteria and procedures

55 for the operation of the program by local school districts, which

56 shall be consistent with standards established by the Parents as

57 <u>Teachers National Center, Inc. Every parent educator</u>

58 participating in the program shall meet certification standards

59 <u>established by the Parents as Teachers National Center, Inc.</u> The

60 State Board of Education shall receive and review applications for

61 the program from local school boards and may award program funding

62 to up to six (6) local school districts throughout the state, with

63 one (1) district in each Mississippi congressional district as

such districts exist on the effective date of this and at least

one (1) local school district situated in the Delta region of the

state, unless there are no applications submitted from a

67 particular congressional district or the Delta.

68 (4) A Parents as Teachers Pilot Program may be funded by:

federal funds, nonminimum or nonadequate education program school

70 district funds, grants, gifts or donations from any private

71 sources, and any state funds appropriated for the support of the

72 Parents as Teachers Pilot Program. Any state funds shall be

specifically appropriated for the purpose of supporting the

74 Parents as Teachers Pilot Program.

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75 (5) School districts that offer an approved Parents as

Teachers Pilot Program shall be eligible for state reimbursement

subject to appropriations therefor for each participating family.

78 If a school district fails or is unable to offer an approved

79 program the district shall enter into a contract which meets the

80 requirements of this subsection with another district or public

81 agency offering an approved program for such services. If the

82 district finds that no approved program is available in another

83 district or through public agencies, it shall request the State 84 Department of Education to assist it in obtaining from an approved program services at the reimbursable rate. Costs of contractual 85 86 arrangements shall be the obligation of the school district of 87 residence of each preschool child. Costs of contractual arrangements shall not exceed an amount equal to an amount 88 89 reimbursable to the school districts under the provisions of this section. No program shall be approved or contract entered into 90 which requires any additional payment by participants or their 91 92 parents or guardians. Payments for participants for Parents as 93 Teachers Pilot Programs shall be uniform for all districts or 94 public agencies.

- 95 (6) No person shall be required to participate in any 96 Parents as Teachers Pilot Program.
- 97 (7) The State Board of Education shall evaluate the Parents
 98 as Teachers Pilot Program in participating school districts and
 99 shall report to the Legislature and the Governor on or before
 100 August 1, 2000, identifying exemplary programs and making
 101 recommendations regarding methods and criteria for funding such
 102 programs.
- The State Department of Education shall develop an annual
 reporting process to inform the Legislature, local school district
 personnel and the general public as to all existing Parents as
 Teachers programs in the state:
- 107 <u>(a) Number of students and families served;</u>
- 108 (b) Number of teachers and other personnel,
- 109 <u>certification and experience levels;</u>
- (c) Source of funds for each program;

111	(d) Budget, administrative costs and other pertinent
112	fiscal information;
113	(e) Salary and fringe benefit information for each
114	employee in a Parents as Teachers program;
115	(f) Cost of materials and other instructional costs
116	related to a Parents as Teachers program;
117	(g) Other information as directed by the State Board of
118	Education; and
119	(h) Analysis of this program's impact on Grades K-3.
120	SECTION 2. This act shall take effect and be in force from
121	and after July 1 1999
