## SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION NO. 603 (As Adopted by House and Senate)

- 1 A CONCURRENT RESOLUTION COMMENDING HAROLD RAY WATSON FOR HIS
- 2 MANY YEARS OF CONTRIBUTIONS AND DEDICATED SERVICE AS AN
- 3 AGRICULTURAL EVANGELIST.
- WHEREAS, Harold Ray Watson was born April 17, 1934, on a farm
- 5 in Brooklyn, Mississippi, 14 miles south of Hattiesburg,
- 6 Mississippi; and
- 7 WHEREAS, Harold Ray Watson studied at McLaurin Elementary
- 8 School and Forest County Agricultural High School, graduating from
- 9 high school in 1952; and
- 10 WHEREAS, after graduation, Harold Ray Watson served in the
- 11 United States Air Force from 1952 to 1956, where he was stationed
- 12 at Randolph Air Force Base Texas, as a clerk, and soon volunteered
- 13 to organize church activities for children; and
- 14 WHEREAS, the satisfaction he found in youth work, and his
- 15 growing personal Christian commitment, suggested to Watson a
- 16 career in the ministry, and eventually he gave himself wholly to
- 17 the "call" and determined to study for the ministry upon
- 18 discharge; and
- 19 WHEREAS, Watson was discharged from the Air Force in 1956,
- 20 and within a week married Elizabeth Joyce Daniel, whom he had met
- 21 in Texas and who would become his life-long mission partner; and
- 22 WHEREAS, Harold Ray Watson attended Hinds Junior College in
- 23 Raymond, Mississippi, for one year, and then transferred to
- 24 Mississippi State University to pursue an undergraduate degree in
- 25 agriculture; and
- 26 WHEREAS, since Christian fellowship and volunteer church work

- 27 were central to the young couple's life at Starkville,
- 28 Mississippi, Harold Ray Watson was asked to be the Baptist pastor
- 29 at the nearby Union Church, and soon, another church in Ashland,
- 30 Mississippi, invited him to preach on alternate Sundays; and
- 31 WHEREAS, Harold Ray Watson received his Bachelor of Science
- 32 degree in 1959, and Master of Science degree in 1960, in
- 33 agriculture from Mississippi State University; and
- 34 WHEREAS, after spending one year at Southwestern Baptist
- 35 Theological Seminary in Fort Worth, Texas, and one year teaching
- 36 vocational agriculture at North Forest High School in Eatonville,
- 37 Mississippi, Harold Ray Watson applied to the Foreign Mission
- 38 Board of the Southern Baptist Convention and received an
- 39 appointment as agricultural evangelist to the Philippines in May
- 40 1964; and
- WHEREAS, from 1965 to 1970, Watson served at Southern Baptist
- 42 College in M'Lang, Cotabato, on the island of Mindanao, as an
- 43 agricultural consultant and also worked with rural farmers and
- 44 churches in the area; and
- WHEREAS, in 1971, Harold Ray Watson opened the Mindanao
- 46 Baptist Rural Life Center, a training center for farmers which
- 47 integrated agricultural development with Bible teaching and church
- 48 planting and development, and served as director for the center
- 49 until his retirement in 1997; and
- 50 WHEREAS, in 1998, Harold Ray Watson established the Asian
- 51 Rural Life Development Foundation for the purpose of extending
- 52 agricultural technologies for poor upland farmers to other
- 53 countries in Asia, and later, developed various farming
- 54 technologies for small farmers of Mindanao, such as FAITH
- 55 gardening (Food Always In The Home) and SALT (Sloping Agricultural
- 56 Land Technology); and
- 57 WHEREAS, Harold Ray Watson received many honors and awards
- 58 during his service as an agricultural missionary, including the
- 59 Achievement Award in Technology Development from the Crop Science

60 Society of the Philippines (1984); the Ramon Magsaysay Award in
```

- 61 International Understanding for his encouraging international
- 62 utilization of the SALT technology created by him and his
- 63 co-workers to help the poorest of small tropical farmers (1985);
- 64 the Outstanding Farm Technology Award from the Department of
- 65 Science and Technology of the Philippine Government; the citation
- 66 from President Corazon C. Aquino, President of the Philippines,
- 67 for his work with poor upland farmers in the Philippines
- 68 (presented in Washington, D.C. during her visit to the United
- 69 States); the World Food Day Award presented by Food and
- 70 Agriculture Organization (FAO) of the United Nations for his
- 71 efforts in promoting an awareness of the dangers in unlimited
- 72 exploitation of the world's forests and for the development and
- 73 promulgation of technologies promoting the use of trees to
- 74 conserve the soil and minimize erosion on steep hillsides; and
- 75 WHEREAS, Harold Ray Watson returned to the United States in
- 76 November 1997, for final furlough until retirement on January 31,
- 77 1999, and presently resides in Terry, Mississippi; and
- 78 WHEREAS, Harold and Joyce Watson have three children, James
- 79 Allen of Madison, Mississippi, presently the State Veterinarian
- 80 for the State of Mississippi; Daniel Gene of Walnut Ridge,
- 81 Arkansas, presently on staff of William Baptist College; and Mark
- 82 Bradley of Cumming, Georgia, presently a computer analyst at AT&T;

- WHEREAS, Harold and Joyce Watson have a total of 14
- 85 grandchildren, ages one month to 15 years; and
- WHEREAS, it is the policy of this Legislature to commend the
- 87 tireless devotion and dedicated service of its citizens:
- NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE SENATE OF THE STATE OF
- 89 MISSISSIPPI, THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES CONCURRING THEREIN, That
- 90 we do hereby commend Harold Ray Watson for his many years of
- 91 contributions and dedicated service as an agricultural evangelist.
- 92 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That copies of this resolution be
