COMMITTEE SUBSTITUTE FOR HOUSE BILL NO. 106

AN ACT TO AMEND SECTION 37-21-7, MISSISSIPPI CODE OF 1972, TO 1 2 ALLOW PERSONS POSSESSING A GED EQUIVALENT TO QUALIFY AS ASSISTANT 3 TEACHERS AND TO AUTHORIZE ANY SCHOOL DISTRICT, REGARDLESS OF 4 ACCREDITATION LEVEL, TO USE MINIMUM PROGRAM ASSISTANT TEACHER 5 FUNDS FOR EMPLOYING ADDITIONAL LICENSED TEACHERS IN KINDERGARTEN 6 AND GRADES 1-3; AND FOR RELATED PURPOSES. 7 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MISSISSIPPI: SECTION 1. Section 37-21-7, Mississippi Code of 1972, is 8 9 amended as follows:[BD1] [Until July 1, 2002, this section will read as follows:] 10 11 37-21-7. (1) This section shall be referred to as the "Mississippi Elementary Schools Assistant Teacher Program," the 12 13 purpose of which shall be to provide an early childhood education program that assists in the instruction of basic skills. 14 The State Board of Education is authorized, empowered and directed to 15 implement a statewide system of assistant teachers in kindergarten 16 classes and in the first, second and third grades. The assistant 17 18 teacher shall assist pupils in actual instruction under the strict supervision of a licensed teacher. 19 20 (2) (a) Except as otherwise authorized under subsection 21 (7), each school district shall employ the total number of assistant teachers funded under subsection (6) of this section. 22 23 The superintendent of each district shall assign the assistant teachers to the kindergarten, first-, second- and third-grade 2.4 25 classes in the district in a manner that will promote the maximum 26 efficiency, as determined by the superintendent, in the 27 instruction of skills such as verbal and linguistic skills, logical and mathematical skills, and social skills. 2.8

29 (b) If a licensed teacher to whom an assistant teacher 30 has been assigned is required to be absent from the classroom, the assistant teacher may assume responsibility for the classroom in 31 32 lieu of a substitute teacher. However, no assistant teacher shall assume sole responsibility of the classroom for more than three 33 34 (3) consecutive school days. Further, in no event shall any assistant teacher be assigned to serve as a substitute teacher for 35 any teacher other than the licensed teacher to whom that assistant 36 37 teacher has been assigned.

38 (3) Assistant teachers shall have, at a minimum, a high 39 school diploma or a GED equivalent, and shall show demonstratable 40 proficiency in reading and writing skills. The State Department 41 of Education shall develop a testing procedure for assistant 42 teacher applicants to be used in all school districts in the 43 state.

44 (4) (a) In order to receive funding, each school district 45 shall:

46 (i) Submit a plan on the implementation of a
47 reading improvement program to the State Department of Education;

49 (ii) Develop a plan of educational accountability
50 and assessment of performance, including pretests and posttests,
51 for reading in Grades 1 through 6.

(b) Additionally, each school district shall:

53 (i) Provide annually a mandatory preservice 54 orientation session, using an existing in-school service day, for administrators and teachers on the effective use of assistant 55 56 teachers as part of a team in the classroom setting and on the 57 role of assistant teachers, with emphasis on program goals; 58 (ii) Hold periodic workshops for administrators 59 and teachers on the effective use and supervision of assistant 60 teachers;

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(iii) Provide training annually on specific

62 instructional skills for assistant teachers;

63 (iv) Annually evaluate their program in accordance
64 with their educational accountability and assessment of
65 performance plan; and

66 (v) Designate the necessary personnel to supervise67 and report on their program.

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(5) The State Department of Education shall:

(a) Develop and assist in the implementation of a 69 70 statewide uniform training module, subject to the availability of 71 funds specifically appropriated therefor by the Legislature, which shall be used in all school districts for training administrators, 72 73 teachers and assistant teachers. The module shall provide for the 74 consolidated training of each assistant teacher and teacher to 75 whom the assistant teacher is assigned, working together as a team, and shall require further periodical training for 76 77 administrators, teachers and assistant teachers regarding the role 78 of assistant teachers;

79 (b) Annually evaluate the program on the district and 80 state level. Subject to the availability of funds specifically appropriated therefor by the Legislature, the department shall 81 82 develop: (i) uniform evaluation reports, to be performed by the principal or assistant principal, to collect data for the annual 83 84 overall program evaluation conducted by the department; or (ii) a program evaluation model that, at a minimum, addresses process 85 evaluation; and 86

(c) Promulgate rules, regulations and such other standards deemed necessary to effectuate the purposes of this section. Noncompliance with the provisions of this section and any rules, regulations or standards adopted by the department may result in a violation of compulsory accreditation standards as established by the State Board of Education and Commission on School Accreditation.

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(6) In addition to other funds allotted under the Minimum

95 Education Program, each school district shall be allotted Nine Thousand One Hundred Fifteen Dollars (\$9,115.00) per teacher unit 96 97 as prescribed in Section 37-19-5 for Grades 1, 2 and 3 for the 98 purpose of employing an assistant teacher. Assistant teachers 99 shall be paid a minimum annual salary of Nine Thousand One Hundred Fifteen Dollars (\$9,115.00). However, no assistant teacher shall 100 be paid less than the amount he or she received in the prior 101 school year. * * * No school district shall receive any funds 102 103 under this section for any school year during which the aggregate 104 amount of the local contribution to the salaries of assistant teachers by the district shall have been reduced below such amount 105 106 for the previous year. The assistant teachers shall not be 107 restricted to working only in the grades for which the funds were 108 allotted, but may be assigned to other classes as provided in subsection (2)(a) of this section. 109

110 (7) (a) As an alternative to employing assistant 111 teachers, * * * any school district <u>may</u> use the minimum program 112 allotment provided under subsection (6) of this section for the 113 purpose of employing licensed teachers for kindergarten, first-, 114 second- and third-grade classes; however, no school district shall be authorized to use the minimum program allotment for assistant 115 116 teachers for the purpose of employing licensed teachers unless the 117 district has established that the employment of licensed teachers using such funds will reduce the teacher:student ratio in the 118 119 kindergarten, first-, second- and third-grade classes. All 120 minimum program funds for assistant teachers shall be applied to 121 reducing teacher: student ratio in Grades K-3.

122 It is the intent of the Legislature that no school district 123 shall dismiss any assistant teacher for the purpose of using the 124 minimum program assistant teacher allotment to employ licensed 125 teachers. School districts may rely only upon normal attrition to 126 reduce the number of assistant teachers employed in that district. 127 (b) In the event any school district meets Level 4 or 5

accreditation requirements, the State Board of Education, in its discretion, may exempt such school district from any accreditation requirements for the district's early childhood education program or reading improvement program.

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37-21-7. Noncompliance with the provisions of this section and any rules, regulations or standards adopted by the department may result in a violation of compulsory accreditation standards as established by the State Board of Education and Commission on School Accreditation.

(6) No assistant teacher shall be paid less than the amount 216 217 he or she received in the prior school year. * * * No school district shall receive any funds * * * for any school year during 218 219 which the aggregate amount of the local contribution to the salaries of assistant teachers by the district shall have been 220 221 reduced below such amount for the previous year. The assistant 222 teachers shall not be restricted to working only in the grades for 223 which the funds were allotted, but may be assigned to other 224 classes as provided in subsection (2)(a) of this section.

(7) (a) As an alternative to employing assistant
teachers, * * * any school district <u>may</u> use the adequate education

227 program allotments for the purpose of employing <u>licensed</u> teachers for kindergarten, first-, second- and third-grade classes; 228 229 however, no school district shall be authorized to use the funds 230 for assistant teachers for the purpose of employing <u>licensed</u> 231 teachers unless the district has established that the employment 232 of <u>licensed</u> teachers using such funds will reduce the 233 teacher:student ratio in the kindergarten, first-, second- and 234 third-grade classes. All adequate education program funds for 235 assistant teachers shall be applied to reducing teacher:student 236 ratio in Grades K-3.

It is the intent of the Legislature that no school district shall dismiss any assistant teacher for the purpose of using state funds to employ <u>licensed</u> teachers. School districts may rely only upon normal attrition to reduce the number of assistant teachers employed in that district.

(b) In the event any school district meets Level 4 or 5 accreditation requirements, the State Board of Education, in its discretion, may exempt such school district from any accreditation requirements for the district's early childhood education program or reading improvement program.

247 SECTION 2. This act shall take effect and be in force from 248 and after July 1, 2000.
