## SENATE BILL NO. 2004

AN ACT TO AUTHORIZE THE STATE BOARD OF EDUCATION TO IMPLEMENT 1 A PILOT PROGRAM TO ASSIST IN THE ESTABLISHMENT OF PARENT/FAMILY 2 EDUCATION PROGRAMS; TO SPECIFY CERTAIN MODELS TO BE MADE AVAILABLE 3 THROUGH THESE PROGRAMS; TO DIRECT THE STATE BOARD OF EDUCATION TO 5 ESTABLISH A COUNCIL FOR PARENT/FAMILY EDUCATION SERVICES; TO ESTABLISH AN APPLICATION PROCESS FOR PARTICIPATION IN THE PILOT 6 7 PROGRAM; TO REQUIRE APPLICANTS TO HAVE IN PLACE AN ADVISORY BOARD FOR THE PROGRAMS; TO AUTHORIZE THE DEPARTMENT TO USE AVAILABLE 8 FUNDING FOR GRANTS TO PARTICIPATING PROGRAMS; TO REQUIRE THE STATE 9 BOARD OF EDUCATION TO RECOMMEND TO THE LEGISLATURE WHETHER OR NOT 10 11 THE PROGRAM SHOULD BE PERMANENTLY ESTABLISHED; TO REQUIRE THE COUNCIL TO DEVELOP A REPORTING PROCESS ON EXISTING EARLY CHILDHOOD 12 PROGRAMS IN THE STATE; AND FOR RELATED PURPOSES. 13 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MISSISSIPPI: 14 <u>SECTION 1.</u> (1) The State Board of Education, in its 15 discretion, may develop and implement a pilot program to implement 16 17 voluntary in-home parent/family education programs for families 18 with children aged pre-natal through four (4) years. The parent/family education programs shall provide parents with 19 20 opportunities to voluntarily obtain support and services that will enable them to provide optimum learning environments for their 21 children, particularly from birth to the age of four (4) years, 22 within the home. These programs shall use research-based, 23 independently-evaluated, proven research models showing the 24 25 following outcomes: (a) parents are more confident in their 26 parenting knowledge and skills; (b) parents who read more to their 27 children; (c) children with enhanced language, problem-solving and 28 social development; (d) lower incidence of child abuse and

29 neglect; (e) children entering school with increased readiness

30 skills; (f) fewer children placed in special education or remedial

- 31 classes; (g) more parental involvement when children enter school;
- 32 and (h) higher scores on standardized reading and math tests in
- 33 elementary grades. Program outcomes shall be determined through a
- 34 long-range evaluation that tracks participating children through
- 35 the third grade.
- 36 (2) The State Board of Education shall appoint a State
- 37 Council for Parent/Family Education Services to (a) determine a
- 38 process for interested school districts and other nonprofit
- 39 entities to apply for grant funds in order to participate in the
- 40 programs; (b) monitor program operations; (c) evaluate program
- 41 effectiveness; and (d) develop rules for the administration of the
- 42 program. Members of the "council" shall include, but not be
- 43 limited to, representatives of the following categories: parents;
- 44 local school districts' parent education programs staff; the
- 45 Department of Human Services, Division of Family and Children's
- 46 Services; head start; the cooperative extension services and USOE
- 47 funded parental assistance programs.
- 48 (3) As part of the application process for participation in
- 49 the pilot program, applicants must demonstrate to the council that
- 50 the program is a collaborative undertaking of various community
- 51 organizations. School districts and other nonprofit entities in
- 52 partnership with a school district applying for funds shall be
- 53 required to develop a collaborative plan that includes, but is not
- 54 limited to, participation of the local extension service, head
- 55 start, health department, human services and other agencies as
- 56 deemed by the advisory board in the local development plan.
- 57 Programs shall be required to provide a twenty-five percent (25%)
- 58 match. Programs shall be housed in parent/family resource centers

- 59 developed around existing DHS Families First criteria and the
- 60 State Department of Education Parent/Family Center guidelines.
- 61 Parent education programs shall have a broad-based community
- 62 advisory board including, but not limited to, representatives of
- 63 the following categories: parents, local school districts' parent
- 64 education programs staff, DHS-Division of Family and Children's
- 65 Services, head start/private child care providers, cooperative
- 66 extension services and State Department of Health.
- 67 (4) The State Department of Education may accept any funds,
- 68 public or private, made available to the department for the pilot
- 69 program. The funds shall be used to award grants to the
- 70 participating parent/family education services programs for the
- 71 support of such programs. A parent/family education services
- 72 program may use any available funding to support the
- 73 administration of the program.
- 74 (5) If the parent/family education services pilot programs
- 75 authorized by this section are implemented, the State Board of
- 76 Education shall report to the Legislature, within three (3) years
- 77 after the pilot program's implementation, on the desirability of
- 78 expanding and permanently establishing the program.
- 79 (6) The State Council for Parent/Family Education Services
- 80 shall develop an annual reporting process to inform the
- 81 Legislature, local school district personnel and the general
- 82 public as to all programs funded under this section:
- 83 (a) Number of students and families served;
- 84 (b) Number of parent educators and other personnel,
- 85 qualifications, training related to home visit programs and
- 86 parent/family resource center establishment and experience levels;

- 87 (c) Source of funds for each program;
- 88 (d) Budget, administrative costs and other pertinent
- 89 fiscal information;
- 90 (e) Salary and fringe benefit information for each
- 91 employee in the program;
- 92 (f) Cost of materials, training and other instructional
- 93 costs related to the program;
- 94 (g) Cost of program on a per-family basis;
- 95 (h) Other information as directed by the State Board of
- 96 Education;
- 97 (i) Advisory board members' names and titles; and
- 98 (j) Analysis of this program's impact on Grades K-3 as
- 99 indicated in an independent evaluation.
- 100 SECTION 2. This act shall take effect and be in force from
- 101 and after July 1, 2000.
