SENATE BILL NO. 2528

AN ACT TO AMEND SECTIONS 37-3-81 AND 37-3-83, MISSISSIPPI 1 2 CODE OF 1972, TO DIRECT THE STATE DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION TO 3 ESTABLISH A SCHOOL SAFETY CENTER TO PROVIDE TECHNICAL AND CRISIS ASSISTANCE TO SCHOOL DISTRICTS, TO REQUIRE LOCAL SCHOOL DISTRICTS 4 5 TO ADOPT COMPREHENSIVE SCHOOL SAFETY PLANS, AND TO AUTHORIZE SCHOOL SAFETY GRANTS TO LOCAL SCHOOL DISTRICTS TO FINANCE CERTAIN 6 7 PROGRAMS TO PROVIDE SCHOOL SAFETY; TO ESTABLISH A SCHOOL CRISIS 8 MANAGEMENT PROGRAM WITHIN THE STATE DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION, TO 9 PROVIDE FOR A TEAM OF PROFESSIONAL INDIVIDUALS TO RESPOND TO TRAUMATIC OR VIOLENT SITUATIONS THAT IMPACT STUDENTS AND FACULTY 10 11 IN THE PUBLIC SCHOOLS; TO PROVIDE PROCEDURES FOR THE OPERATION OF THE PROGRAM AND TO AUTHORIZE FUNDING FOR THE PROGRAM; AND FOR 12 13 RELATED PURPOSES.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MISSISSIPPI: SECTION 1. Section 37-3-81, Mississippi Code of 1972, is amended as follows:

17 37-3-81. The Department of Education shall establish and maintain a <u>School Safety Center</u>, which shall operate a statewide 18 information clearinghouse that (a) provides assistance to school 19 20 districts and communities during school crisis; and (b) provides 21 technical assistance, training and current resources to public school officials and parents who need assistance in researching, 22 developing and implementing school safety plans and in maintaining 23 24 a safe school environment.

25 SECTION 2. Section 37-3-83, Mississippi Code of 1972, is 26 amended as follows:

37-3-83. (1) There is established within the State
Department of Education a School <u>Safety</u> Grant Program, available
to all eligible public school districts, to assist in financing
programs to <u>provide school safety</u>.

31 (2) <u>The school board of each school district shall, with the</u>

32 assistance of the Department of Education School Safety Center,

33 adopt a comprehensive local school district school safety plan,

34 and update the plan on an annual basis.

35 <u>(3)</u> Subject to the extent of appropriations available, the 36 School <u>Safety</u> Grant Program shall offer any of the following 37 specific preventive services, and other additional services 38 appropriate to <u>the most current school district</u> school <u>safety</u> 39 <u>plan</u>:

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(a) Metal detectors;

41 (b) Video surveillance cameras, communication equipment 42 and monitoring equipment for classrooms, school buildings and 43 school buses;

44 (c) Crisis management/action teams responding to school
45 violence; \* \* \*

46 (d) Violence prevention training, conflict resolution
47 training, and other appropriate training designated by the State
48 Department of Education for faculty and staff; and

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## (e) School safety personnel.

50 (4) Each local school district of this state may annually apply for \* \* \* school <u>safety</u> grant funds subject to 51 appropriations by the Legislature. School safety grants shall 52 53 include a base grant amount plus an additional amount per student 54 in average daily attendance in the school or school district, to be determined by the State Board of Education subject to specific 55 appropriation therefor by the Legislature. In order to be 56 57 eligible for such program, each local school board desiring to participate shall apply to the State Department of Education by 58 59 May 31 before the beginning of the applicable fiscal year on forms 60 provided by the department, and shall be required to establish a local School Safety Task Force to involve members of the community 61 62 in the school <u>safety</u> effort. The State Department of Education shall determine by July 1 of each succeeding year which local 63 64 school districts have submitted approved applications for school

65 <u>safety</u> grants.

66 <u>(5)</u> As part of the School <u>Safety</u> Grant Program, the State 67 Department of Education may conduct a pilot program to research 68 the feasibility of using video camera equipment in the classroom 69 to address the following:

70 (a) Determine if video cameras in the classroom <u>reduce</u>
71 student disciplinary problems;

(b) Enable teachers to present clear and convincing
evidence of a student's disruptive behavior to the student, the
principal, the superintendent and the student's parents; and

(c) Enable teachers to review teaching performance and
receive diagnostic feedback for developmental purposes.

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(6) Any local school district may use <u>audio/visual</u>
 <u>monitoring</u> equipment in classrooms for the purpose of monitoring
 school disciplinary problems.

<u>(7) The State Department of Education shall annually report</u>
 <u>to the Chairmen of the Education Committees in the House of</u>
 <u>Representatives and Senate on the operation of the School Safety</u>
 <u>Center and the School Grant Program, with any recommendations for</u>
 <u>expansion or revision of the program.</u>

SECTION 3. (1) There is established a School Crisis 86 87 Management Program which shall be attached to the State Department of Education. Under this program, the State Department of 88 Education shall create an office to provide a quick response team 89 90 of personnel trained in school safety and crisis management, to respond to traumatic or violent situations that impact students 91 and faculty in the public schools in Mississippi. The School 92 Crisis Management Program shall meet the following conditions: 93

94 (a) The basic response team shall consist of those
95 personnel designated by the State Superintendent of Education or
96 his designee depending on the size of the school and the nature of
97 the event.

98 (b) In order to access the services of a response team, 99 the request shall be made by the local school principal or the 100 superintendent of schools who shall make the request to the State 101 Department of Education, or its contact designee.

102 (c) The requesting school or school district shall 103 commit student time to the response team during the school day 104 either individually or in groups.

105 (d) A response team shall enter a school to work with 106 students and faculty for no more than a three-day period, unless 107 otherwise requested by the school district.

108 (e) Response teams shall be organized on a regional109 basis in order to provide immediate access to these services.

(f) The State Department of Education, or its contact designee, shall operate a toll-free incoming wide area telephone service for the purpose of reporting suspected cases of school violence, and other traumatic situations impacting on students and faculty in the public schools.

(g) Subject to the availability of funds specifically appropriated therefor by the Legislature, the expenses of the quick response teams and their administrative support shall be provided from state funds, and the State Department of Education may apply for and expend funds for the support and maintenance of this program from private and other funding sources.

(2) Local school districts, school superintendents and principals shall be fully authorized to request and utilize the services of quick response teams provided for under this section. This section shall not be construed to require school officials to request the services of quick response teams provided for under this section.

127 SECTION 4. This act shall take effect and be in force from 128 and after July 1, 2000.
