1 2 3 4 5 6 7 8 9 10 11 12	AN ACT TO AUTHORIZE AND DIRECT THE DEPARTMENT OF HUMAN SERVICES TO ESTABLISH AND OPERATE A STATEWIDE TANF WORK PROGRAM TRAINING AND RESOURCE CENTER, FOCUSING ON COMPREHENSIVE ASSESSMENT, EDUCATION, SKILL DEVELOPMENT, TRAINING, SUBSTANCE ABUSE, MENTAL AND PHYSICAL BARRIERS, OUT OF WEDLOCK PREGNANCY, PREVENTION OF TEEN PREGNANCY, ABSTINENCE EDUCATION, AND ENTREPRENEURIAL DEVELOPMENT; TO INTEGRATE THE TANF WORK PROGRAM IN MISSISSIPPI'S WORK FORCE BY ALLOCATING FUNDING FOR LOCAL EMPLOYERS TO TRAIN AND HIRE TANF PARTICIPANTS; TO PROVIDE FOR FUNDING FOR THE PROGRAM; TO AMEND SECTION 43-17-5, MISSISSIPPI CODE OF 1972, TO REQUIRE DHS TO PROVIDE CHILD CARE, TRANSITIONAL CHILD CARE AND TRANSPORTATION SERVICES FOR TANF RECIPIENTS; TO REVISE CURRENT CHILD CARE AND TRANSPORTATION POLICY; AND FOR RELATED PURPOSES.
14	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MISSISSIPPI:
15	SECTION 1. (1) The Department of Human Services shall
16	establish and operate statewide TANF Work Program Training and
17	Resource Centers focusing on a comprehensive assessment process.
18	Initial attention will focus on the assessment of the
19	participant's barriers to self-sufficiency. Assessment will be an
20	ongoing process which begins with the initial contact with the
21	TANF worker and continues in subsequent contacts with each of the
22	partners in the collaboration and typically involves multiple,
23	sequential formal appraisals of participant's characteristics and
24	needs. The appraisal of the participant's skills and needs will
25	be an ongoing process with first comprehensive assessment
26	completed when it is determined that the individual is not
27	employable. At a minimum, this assessment will include the
28	following:

30	(b) Job history and skills assessment;

- The TANF Work Program Training and Resources Centers 56 (5)
- 57 shall provide funding for local employers to hire and train TANF
- The work activities are as follows: 58 participants.

- a regular status employee. Through a contractual arrangement, the 61
- 62 employer is provided funding to offset the cost of training the
- employee. A training plan is established by the employer, and the 63
- 64 employer agrees to retain the employee upon successful completion

- 65 of the training plan.
- (b) Work experience provide participants an
- 67 opportunity to develop basic work habits, practice old skills,
- 68 learn new skills and demonstrate ability to a prospective
- 69 employer. This activity is limited to customers not otherwise
- 70 able to locate unsubsidized employment and who need experience to
- 71 move into public or private sector unsubsidized employment. The
- 72 participant is paid a minimum wage or slightly above minimum wage
- 73 for hours worked.
- 74 (6) The TANF Work Program Training and Resources Centers
- 75 shall provide transportation and child care for participants until
- 76 participants have reached a level of self-sufficiency.
- 77 (7) The Department of Human Services shall allocate to the
- 78 maximum extent possible federal Temporary Assistance for Needy
- 79 Families (TANF) funds for eligible recipients for the TANF Work
- 80 Program Training and Resource Centers programs authorized under
- 81 this section, and shall transfer as necessary TANF funds to the
- 82 Child Care Development Block Grant Fund or the Social Services
- 83 Block Grant Fund for those program services that cannot be funded
- 84 from TANF directly, subject to specific appropriation therefor by
- 85 the Legislature.
- 86 (8) The TANF Work Program Training and Resource Centers may
- 87 accept any funds, public or private, made available to it for the
- 88 program. The funds shall be used to award grants to the
- 89 participating centers for the support of such programs.
- 90 SECTION 2. Section 43-17-5, Mississippi Code of 1972, is
- 91 amended as follows:
- 92 43-17-5. (1) The amount of Temporary Assistance for Needy
- 93 Families (TANF) benefits which may be granted for any dependent
- 94 child and a needy caretaker relative shall be determined by the
- 95 county department with due regard to the resources and necessary
- 96 expenditures of the family and the conditions existing in each
- 97 case, and in accordance with the rules and regulations made by the

Standard of Need in effect for 1988, and shall be sufficient when 99 100 added to all other income (except that any income specified in the federal Social Security Act, as amended, may be disregarded) and 101 102 support available to the child to provide such child with a 103 reasonable subsistence compatible with decency and health. 104 first family member in the dependent child's budget may receive an 105 amount not to exceed One Hundred Ten Dollars (\$110.00) per month; 106 the second family member in the dependent child's budget may 107 receive an amount not to exceed Thirty-six Dollars (\$36.00) per 108 month; and each additional family member in the dependent child's 109 budget an amount not to exceed Twenty-four Dollars (\$24.00) per 110 month. The maximum for any individual family member in the dependent child's budget may be exceeded for foster or medical 111 112 care or in cases of mentally retarded or physically handicapped 113 children. - 146 activities directed toward the attainment of a high school diploma
- 147 or its equivalent, or an alternative educational or training
- 148 program approved by the department;
- (f) Any individual who has not attained eighteen (18)
- 150 years of age, is not married, has a minor child in his or her
- 151 care, and does not reside in a place or residence maintained by a
- 152 parent, legal guardian or other adult relative or the individual
- 153 as such parent's, guardian's or adult relative's own home;
- 154 (g) Any minor child who has been, or is expected by a
- 155 parent or other caretaker relative of the child to be, absent from
- 156 the home for a period of more than thirty (30) days;
- 157 (h) Any individual who is a parent or other caretaker
- 158 relative of a minor child who fails to notify the department of
- 159 the absence of the minor child from the home for the thirty-day

- (j) A parent or caretaker relative who has not engaged in an allowable work activity once the department determines the parent or caretaker relative is ready to engage in work, or once the parent or caretaker relative has received TANF assistance under the program for twenty-four (24) months, whether or not consecutive, whichever is earlier;
- (k) Any individual who is fleeing to avoid prosecution,
  or custody or confinement after conviction, under the laws of the
  jurisdiction from which the individual flees, for a crime, or an
  attempt to commit a crime, which is a felony under the laws of the
  place from which the individual flees, or who is violating a
  condition of probation or parole imposed under federal or state
- 183 (1) Aliens who are not qualified under federal law;
- (m) For a period of ten (10) years following

  conviction, individuals convicted in federal or state court of

  having made a fraudulent statement or representation with respect

  to the individual's place of residence in order to receive TANF,

  food stamps or Supplemental Security Income (SSI) assistance under

  Title XVI or Title XIX simultaneously from two (2) or more states;

- (n) Individuals who are recipients of federalSupplemental Security Income (SSI) assistance.

- 232 The signature of a person on an application for TANF benefits constitutes permission for the release of school 233 234 attendance records for that person or for any child residing with 235 that person. The department shall request information from the child's school district about the child's attendance in the school 236 237 district's most recently completed semester of attendance. 238 information about the child's previous school attendance is not 239 available or cannot be verified, the department shall require the 240 child to meet the monthly attendance requirement for one (1) 241 semester or until the information is obtained. The department 242 shall use the attendance information provided by a school district
- to verify attendance for a child. The department shall review
  with the parent or caretaker relative a child's claim that he or
  she has a good cause for not attending school.

  A school district shall provide information to the department
- about the attendance of a child who is enrolled in a public school 247 248 in the district within five (5) working days of the receipt of a 249 written request for such information from the department. 250 school district shall define how many hours of attendance count as 251 a full day and shall provide that information, upon request, to 252 the department. In reporting attendance, the school district may 253 add partial days' absence together to constitute a full day's 254 absence.
- (e) A child who is required to attend school to meet the requirements under this subsection shall comply except when there is good cause, which shall be demonstrated by any of the following circumstances:
- 259 (i) The minor parent is the caretaker of a child 260 less than twelve (12) weeks old; or
- 261 (ii) The department determines that child care 262 services are necessary for the minor parent to attend school and

- 263 there is no child care available; or
- 264 (iii) The child is prohibited by the school
- 265 district from attending school and an expulsion is pending. This
- 266 exemption no longer applies once the teenager has been expelled;
- 267 however, a teenager who has been expelled and is making
- 268 satisfactory progress towards obtaining a GED equivalent shall be
- 269 eligible for TANF benefits; or
- 270 (iv) The child failed to attend school for one or
- 271 more of the following reasons:
- 1. Illness, injury or incapacity of the child
- 273 or the minor parent's child;
- 274 2. Court-required appearances or temporary
- 275 incarceration;
- 3. Medical or dental appointments for the
- 277 child or minor parent's child;
- 278 4. Death of a close relative;
- 5. Observance of a religious holiday;
- 280 6. Family emergency;
- 7. Breakdown in transportation;
- 282 8. Suspension; or
- 9. Any other circumstance beyond the control
- 284 of the child, as defined in regulations of the department.
- 285 (f) Upon determination that a child has failed without
- 286 good cause to attend school as required, the department shall
- 287 provide written notice to the parent or caretaker relative
- 288 (whoever is the primary recipient of the TANF benefits) that

- 290 (i) That the family will be sanctioned in the next
- 291 possible payment month because the child who is required to attend
- 292 school has failed to meet the attendance requirement of this

caretaker relative (whoever is the primary recipient of the TANF 297 298 benefits) to request a fair hearing under this subsection. The child's parent or caretaker relative (whoever is the 299 300 primary recipient of the TANF benefits) may request a fair hearing 301 on the department's determination that the child has not been 302 attending school. If the child's parents or caretaker relative 303 does not request a fair hearing under this subsection, or if, 304 after a fair hearing has been held, the hearing officer finds that 305 the child without good cause has failed to meet the monthly attendance requirement, the department shall discontinue or deny 306 307 TANF benefits to the child thirteen (13) years old, or older, in 308 the next possible payment month. The department shall discontinue 309 or deny twenty-five percent (25%) of the family grant when a child 310 six (6) through twelve (12) years of age without good cause has 311 failed to meet the monthly attendance requirement. Both the child 312 and family sanction may apply when children in both age groups fail to meet the attendance requirement without good cause. A 313 314 sanction applied under this subsection shall be effective for one (1) month for each month that the child failed to meet the monthly 315 316 attendance requirement. In the case of a dropout, the sanction 317 shall remain in force until the parent or caretaker relative 318 provides written proof from the school district that the child has 319 reenrolled and met the monthly attendance requirement for one (1) calendar month. Any month in which school is in session for at 320 321 least ten (10) days during the month may be used to meet the attendance requirement under this subsection. This includes 322 323 attendance at summer school. The sanction shall be removed the 324 next possible payment month. All parents or caretaker relatives shall have their 325 326 dependent children receive vaccinations and booster vaccinations against those diseases specified by the State Health Officer 327 328 pursuant to Section 41-23-37 in accordance with the vaccination

(iii) The right of the child's parents or

329 and booster vaccination schedule prescribed by the State Health Officer for children of that age, in order for the parents or 330 331 caretaker relatives to be eligible or remain eligible to receive TANF benefits. 348 work, or once the parent or caretaker relative has received TANF 349 assistance under the program for twenty-four (24) months, whether 350 or not consecutive, whichever is earlier. No TANF benefits shall 351 be given to any person to whom this section applies who fails 352 without good cause to comply with the Employability Development Plan prepared by the department for the person, or who has refused 353 354 to accept a referral or offer of employment, training or education 355 in which he or she is able to engage, subject to the penalties 356 prescribed in subsection (6)(d). A person shall be deemed to have 357 refused to accept a referral or offer of employment, training or education if he or she: 358

359 (i) Willfully fails to report for an interview 360 with respect to employment when requested to do so by the 361 department; or

461 conciliation and a hearing if requested by the recipient:

462 (i) For the first violation, the department shall

463 terminate the TANF assistance otherwise payable to the family for

464 a two-month period or until the person has complied with the

465 required work activity, whichever is longer;

466 (ii) For the second violation, the department

467 shall terminate the TANF assistance otherwise payable to the

468 family for a six-month period or until the person has complied

469 with the required work activity, whichever is longer;

470 (iii) For the third violation, the department

471 shall terminate the TANF assistance otherwise payable to the

family for a twelve-month period or until the person has complied

473 with the required work activity, whichever is longer;

474 (iv) For the fourth violation, the person shall be

475 permanently disqualified.

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For a two-parent family, unless prohibited by state or

477 federal law, Medicaid assistance shall be terminated only for the

478 person whose failure to participate in allowable work activity

479 caused the family's TANF assistance to be sanctioned under this

480 subsection (6)(d), unless an individual is pregnant, but shall not

481 be terminated for any other person in the family who is meeting

482 that person's applicable work requirement or who is not required

483 to work. Minor children shall continue to be eligible for

Medicaid benefits regardless of the disqualification of their

485 parent or caretaker relative for TANF assistance under this

486 subsection (6), unless prohibited by state or federal law.

(e) Any person enrolled in a two-year or four-year

488 college program who meets the eligibility requirements to receive

489 TANF benefits, and who is meeting the applicable work requirements

490 and all other applicable requirements of the TANF program, shall

491 continue to be eligible for TANF benefits while enrolled in the

492 college program for as long as the person meets the requirements

493 of the TANF program, unless prohibited by federal law.

494 (f) No adult in a work activity required under this subsection (6) shall be employed or assigned (i) when any other 495 496 individual is on layoff from the same or any substantially equivalent job within six (6) months before the date of the TANF 497 498 recipient's employment or assignment; or (ii) if the employer has 499 terminated the employment of any regular employee or otherwise 500 caused an involuntary reduction of its work force in order to fill 501 the vacancy so created with an adult receiving TANF assistance. 502 The Mississippi Employment Security Commission, established under 503 Section 71-5-101, shall appoint one or more impartial hearing 504 officers to hear and decide claims by employees of violations of 505 this paragraph (f). The hearing officer shall hear all the evidence with respect to any claim made hereunder and such 506 507 additional evidence as he may require and shall make a 508 determination and the reason therefor. The claimant shall be 509 promptly notified of the decision of the hearing officer and the 510 reason therefor. Within ten (10) days after the decision of the hearing officer has become final, any party aggrieved thereby may 511 512 secure judicial review thereof by commencing an action, in the circuit court of the county in which the claimant resides, against 513 514 the commission for the review of such decision, in which action 515 any other party to the proceeding before the hearing officer shall 516 be made a defendant. Any such appeal shall be on the record which 517 shall be certified to the court by the commission in the manner provided in Section 71-5-531, and the jurisdiction of the court 518 519 shall be confined to questions of law which shall render its decision as provided in that section. 520 521

(7) The Department of Human Services <u>shall</u> provide child care for eligible participants who require such care so that they may accept employment or remain employed. The department <u>shall</u> also provide child care for those participating in the TANF program when it is determined that they are satisfactorily involved in education, training or other allowable work

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528 to provide child care services to TANF recipients. The department 529 may also arrange for child care by use of contract or vouchers, provide vouchers in advance to a caretaker relative, reimburse a 530 531 child care provider, or use any other arrangement deemed 532 appropriate by the department, and may establish different 533 reimbursement rates for child care services depending on the 534 category of the facility or home. Any center-based or group home 535 child care facility under this paragraph shall be licensed by the 536 State Department of Health pursuant to law. When child care is being provided in the child's own home, in the home of a relative 537 538 of the child, or in any other unlicensed setting, the provision of 539 such child care may be monitored on a random basis by the 540 Department of Human Services or the State Department of Health. 541 Transitional child care assistance <a href="mailto:shall">shall</a> be continued if it is 542 necessary for parents to maintain employment once support has 543 ended, unless prohibited under state or federal law. Transitional child care assistance <a href="mailto:shall">shall</a> be provided for up to twenty-four (24) 544 545 months after the last month during which the family was eligible for TANF assistance, if federal funds are available for such child 546 547 care assistance.

activities. The department may contract with Head Start agencies

- 548 (8) The Department of Human Services <u>shall</u> provide 549 transportation or provide reasonable reimbursement for 550 transportation expenses that are necessary for individuals to be 551 able to participate in allowable work activity under the TANF 552 program.
- 553 (9) Medicaid assistance shall be provided to a family of
  554 TANF program participants for up to twenty-four (24) consecutive
  555 calendar months following the month in which the participating
  556 family would be ineligible for TANF benefits because of increased
  557 income, expiration of earned income disregards, or increased hours
  558 of employment of the caretaker relative; however, Medicaid
  559 assistance for more than twelve (12) months may be provided only

- if a federal waiver is obtained to provide such assistance for more than twelve (12) months and federal and state funds are available to provide such assistance.
- (10) The department shall require applicants for and recipients of public assistance from the department to sign a personal responsibility contract that will require the applicant or recipient to acknowledge his or her responsibilities to the state.
- The department shall enter into an agreement with the 568 (11)569 State Personnel Board and other state agencies that will allow 570 those TANF participants who qualify for vacant jobs within state 571 agencies to be placed in state jobs. State agencies participating in the TANF work program shall receive any and all benefits 572 573 received by employers in the private sector for hiring TANF 574 recipients. This subsection (11) shall be effective only if the 575 state obtains any necessary federal waiver or approval and if 576 federal funds are available therefor.
- (12) No new TANF program requirement or restriction

  affecting a person's eligibility for TANF assistance, or allowable

  work activity, which is not mandated by federal law or regulation

  may be implemented by the Department of Human Services after the

  effective date of this act, unless such is specifically authorized

  by an amendment to this section by the Legislature.
- SECTION 3. This act shall take effect and be in force from and after July 1, 2000.
