SENATE BILL NO. 3186

AN ACT TO BE KNOWN AS THE COMPREHENSIVE WORKFORCE TRAINING 1 2 AND EDUCATION CONSOLIDATION ACT OF 2000; TO CODIFY SECTIONS 3 37-4-11 THROUGH 37-4-17, MISSISSIPPI CODE OF 1972, TO TRANSFER RESPONSIBILITIES AND FUNDS FOR ALL WORKFORCE TRAINING PROGRAMS 4 5 THAT PROVIDE POSTSECONDARY TRAINING SERVICES TO ADULTS CURRENTLY ADMINISTERED BY THE STATE DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION TO THE STATE BOARD FOR COMMUNITY AND JUNIOR COLLEGES; TO AUTHORIZE THE STATE 6 7 BOARD FOR COMMUNITY AND JUNIOR COLLEGES TO BE THE ADMINISTRATOR AT 8 9 THE STATE LEVEL FOR ALL SUCH ADULT WORKFORCE TRAINING FUNDS; TO AMEND SECTIONS 37-3-25 AND 37-31-205 THROUGH 37-31-211, 10 11 MISSISSIPPI CODE OF 1972, IN CONFORMITY AND TO PRESCRIBE ACCOUNTABILITY MEASURES FOR VO-TECH PROGRAMS TO BE IMPLEMENTED BY 12 THE STATE BOARD FOR COMMUNITY AND JUNIOR COLLEGES; AND FOR RELATED 13 14 PURPOSES.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MISSISSIPPI: SECTION 1. The following provision shall be codified as Section 37-4-11, Mississippi Code of 1972:

18 <u>37-4-11.</u> This act shall be known and may be cited as the 19 "Mississippi Comprehensive Workforce Training and Education 20 Consolidation Act of 2000."

21 SECTION 2. The following provision shall be codified as 22 Section 37-4-13, Mississippi Code of 1972:

23 <u>37-4-13.</u> It is the intent of the Legislature by passage of 24 this act to establish one (1) comprehensive workforce training 25 system in the State of Mississippi that is focused on achieving 26 results, using resources efficiently and ensuring that workers and 27 employers can easily access needed training services.

The purpose of this act is to provide workforce training activities, through statewide and local workforce training systems, that increase the employment, retention and earnings of participants, and increase occupational skill attainment by participants and, as a result, improve the quality of the

33 workforce, reduce welfare dependency and enhance the productivity 34 and competitiveness of the state.

In recognition of the differences in secondary and 35 postsecondary vocational-technical education and that in an effort 36 37 to achieve maximum effectiveness for the delivery of both 38 secondary and postsecondary vocational-technical education, it is determined that consolidating responsibility for postsecondary 39 vocational-technical education under the authority of the State 40 Board for Community and Junior Colleges and secondary 41 vocational-technical education under the authority of the State 42 Department of Education would be in the best interest of the State 43 of Mississippi. This action being an attempt to respond to the 44 45 above-described differences by allowing a special focus to be made in enabling the two (2) systems to operate in the most effective 46 This will enable the State 47 and efficient means possible. Department of Education and secondary vocational-technical 48 education programs to receive the maximum support and attention 49 50 while in turn giving the community and junior colleges and the State Board for Community and Junior Colleges the opportunity to 51 52 consolidate and streamline vocational-technical education and workforce development. 53

54 SECTION 3. The following provision shall be codified as 55 Section 37-4-15, Mississippi Code of 1972:

56 <u>37-4-15.</u> (1) The following training programs and funds 57 shall be transferred to the State Board for Community and Junior 58 Colleges on July 1, 2000:

(a) Postsecondary vocational-technical funds and programs presently administered by the State Department of Education, to include secondary programs currently operated by community and junior colleges;

(b) Postsecondary Carl Perkins programs and funds
presently administered by the State Department of Education; and
(c) Postsecondary Tech Prep programs and funds
presently administered by the State Department of Education.
(2) (a) All powers, duties and functions of the State

68 Department of Education that are being exercised or performed by 69 the Division of Vocational Education on June 30, 2000, utilizing

70 funds from all sources for all postsecondary vocational-technical education training funds, all postsecondary Tech Prep funds and 71 72 Carl Perkins funds, are hereby transferred to the State Board for Community and Junior Colleges on July 1, 2000. All records, 73 74 property and contractual rights and obligations of, and unexpended 75 balances of appropriations and any other allocations to, the State 76 Department of Education that relate to the powers, duties and 77 functions exercised or performed for such programs on June 30, 78 2000, shall be transferred to the State Board for Community and 79 Junior Colleges on or before July 1, 2000. The State Fiscal Officer shall transfer to the State Board for Community and Junior 80 81 Colleges all funds that are allocated to the State Department of Education for such programs and such funds shall be used by the 82 83 State Board for Community and Junior Colleges under the same terms and conditions as specified for those funds in the applicable 84 85 appropriation bill. Sufficient staff shall be transferred from 86 the agencies that will, by virtue of this act have a reduction in 87 training and educational responsibilities, to the State Board for 88 Community and Junior Colleges to assure that those transferred 89 responsibilities shall be properly managed and administered. 90 Determinations as to which jobs shall be transferred shall be made by agreement between the Executive Director of the State Board for 91 92 Community and Junior Colleges and the chief executive of the 93 affected transferring agency. Reassignments shall be created by the Legislature through the agencies' appropriation bills. 94 95 Authorized transition activities may include, but not be limited to, the enhancement of the State Board for Community and Junior 96 Colleges to manage the additional federal and state funds, 97 98 budgeting, accounting, grant management, property management, 99 personnel, legal and/or other administrative services. The State 100 Department of Education shall retain responsibility to manage the 101 closeout of all grants relating to postsecondary 102 vocational-technical programs and postsecondary Carl Perkins

programs at the end of June 30, 2000, and shall be authorized to 103 104 retain sufficient grant funds to properly close-out said grant 105 activities. Upon closeout of such grants, any remaining funds will be transferred to the State Board for Community and Junior 106 107 Colleges by the State Fiscal Officer. The State Department of Education shall assist the State Board for Community and Junior 108 109 Colleges with the greatest degree of cooperation to carry out the intent and purpose of this act and to accomplish an orderly 110 111 transition.

112 (b) The State Board for Community and Junior Colleges shall enter into a contract with the State Department of Education 113 114 that clarifies that the State Department of Education will continue to be the designated recipient of the Carl Perkins funds 115 at the state level and said funds will continue to be administered 116 117 and used in accordance with federal guidelines. The contract 118 shall specify that all Carl Perkins funds used for postsecondary 119 training to include secondary programs operated by the community and junior colleges and other purposes will be transferred to the 120 121 State Board for Community and Junior Colleges and that the State Board for Community and Junior Colleges shall have the 122 123 responsibility and authority to direct and oversee such programs 124 as may be financed with such funds.

SECTION 4. The following provision shall be codified as Section 37-4-17, Mississippi Code of 1972:

<u>37-4-17.</u> (1) The Legislature shall appropriate to the State 127 128 Board for Community and Junior Colleges those state funds to be expended for postsecondary vocational-technical education to 129 include secondary programs operated by community and junior 130 The State Board for Community and Junior Colleges shall 131 colleges. 132 set standards for, approve and expend funds for all postsecondary 133 vocational and technical education programs. The Executive Director of the State Board for Community and Junior Colleges 134 135 shall be responsible to the State Board for the proper

administration of the programs of postsecondary vocational and technical education in conformity with the policies adopted by the State Board for Community and Junior Colleges and shall be responsible for appointing any necessary employees to assist in carrying out said programs.

141 (2) The State Board for Community and Junior Colleges is 142 hereby authorized to cooperate with or enter into agreements with 143 any agency, official, educational institution or political 144 subdivision of this state, any agency or official of the 145 government of the United States of America, or any private person, 146 firm, partnership or corporation in order to carry out the 147 provisions of this section.

148 (3) The State Board for Community and Junior Colleges is
149 authorized to promulgate such rules and regulations as may be
150 necessary to carry out the provisions of this section.

151 (4) To the maximum extent practicable, all programs 152 embracing an institutional training component shall be coordinated 153 with and complementary to the existing state public educational 154 systems and shall not be duplicative or competitive in nature to 155 such systems.

156 (5) The State Board for Community and Junior Colleges, the 157 State Department of Education, the board of trustees of any 158 community or junior college district, and the school board of any 159 school district shall cooperate in carrying out the provisions of 160 this act.

161 SECTION 5. Section 37-3-25, Mississippi Code of 1972, is 162 amended as follows:[LR1]

163 37-3-25. (1) The Director of the Division of Vocational and 164 Technical Education of the State Department of Education who shall 165 be an associate state superintendent of education shall be 166 appointed by the State Superintendent of Public Education. The 167 director's salary shall be set by the State Board of Education 168 subject to the approval of the State Personnel Board. His salary,

169 compensation, travel expenses or other expenses shall be provided for out of any funds made available for such purpose by the 170 171 Legislature, the federal government, or other gifts or grants. The director shall be responsible to the State Superintendent of 172 173 Public Education for the proper administration of the programs of 174 primary and secondary vocational and technical education in 175 conformity with the policies adopted by the State Board of 176 Education and shall be responsible for appointing any necessary supervisors, assistants, and employees to assist in carrying out 177 178 the programs of primary and secondary vocational and technical 179 education. The director shall have the authority to employ, 180 compensate, terminate, promote, demote, transfer or reprimand 181 employees of the division. The salary and compensation of such 182 employees shall be subject to the rules and regulations adopted 183 and promulgated by the State Personnel Board as created under 184 Section 25-9-101 et seq.

185 (2) The Director of the Division of Vocational and Technical
186 Education, subject to the approval of the State Board of
187 Education, shall have charge of and be responsible for primary and
188 <u>secondary</u> vocational and technical education training in:

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- (a) Agriculture;
- 190 (b) Occupational and consumer home economics;
- 191 (c) Consumer and homemaking education;
- 192 (d) Trades and industry;
- 193 (e) Distributive education;
- 194 (f) Secondary adult education;
- 195 (g) Teacher training and supervision;
- 196 (h) Business and office;
- 197 (i) Health;
- 198 (j) Industrial arts;
- 199 (k) Guidance services;
- 200 (1) <u>Secondary</u> technical education;
- 201 (m) Cooperative education; and

202 (n) All other specialized <u>primary and secondary</u>

203 training * * *.

204 SECTION 6. Section 37-31-205, Mississippi Code of 1972, is 205 amended as follows:[LR2]

206 37-31-205. (1) The State Board of Education shall have the 207 authority to:

208 (a) Expend funds received either by appropriation or209 directly from federal or private sources;

(b) Channel funds to secondary schools * * * according
to priorities set by the board;

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(c) Allocate funds on an annual budgetary basis;

213 Set standards for and approve all primary and (d) secondary vocational and technical education programs in the 214 public school system * * * or other agencies or institutions which 215 receive state funds and federal funds for such purposes, 216 217 including, but not limited to, the following primary and secondary 218 vocational and technical education programs: agriculture, trade 219 and industry, occupational home economics, consumer and homemaking 220 education, distributive education, business and office, health, 221 industrial arts, guidance services, secondary technical education, cooperative education, * * * all other specialized primary and 222 223 secondary training * * *. The State Board of Education shall 224 authorize local school boards, within such school board's 225 discretion, to offer distributive education as a one-hour or 226 two-hour block course. There shall be no reduction of 227 reimbursements from state funding for distributive education due 228 to the selection of either the one-hour or two-hour course 229 offering;

(e) Set and publish certification standards for primary
 and secondary vocational and technical education personnel;

(f) Require data and information on program performancefrom those programs receiving state funds;

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(g) Expend funds to expand career information;

(h) Supervise and maintain the division of vocational and technical education and to utilize to the greatest extent possible said division as the administrative unit of the board responsible for coordinating programs and services with local institutions;

(i) Promulgate such rules and regulations necessary to
carry out the provisions of this chapter in accordance with
Section 25-43-1 et seq.;

(j) Set standards and approve all <u>primary and secondary</u> vocational and technical education equipment and facilities purchased and/or leased with state and federal vocational funds;

(k) Encourage provisions for lifelong learning and changing personal career preferences and advancement of vocational and technical education students through articulated programs between high schools and community/junior colleges;

(1) Encourage the establishment of new linkages with
business and industry which will provide for a better
understanding of essential labor market concepts; and

(m) Periodically review the funding and reporting processes required of local school districts by the board or division with the aim of simplifying or eliminating inefficient practices and procedures.

257 * * *

(2) <u>The State Board for Community and Junior Colleges shall</u>
 set standards for, approve and expend funds for all postsecondary
 vocational and technical education programs and those secondary
 vocational programs operated by community and junior

262 <u>colleges.</u> * * *

(3) The State Board of Education and the State Board for Community and Junior Colleges may provide that beginning with the 1995-1996 school year, every vocational and technical education course or program in Mississippi may integrate academic and vocational-technical education through coherent sequences of

268 courses, so that students in such programs achieve both academic 269 and occupational competencies. The boards may expend federal 270 funds available from the 1990 Perkins Act, or other available federal funds, for the alignment of vocational-technical programs 271 272 with academic programs through the accreditation process and the teacher certification process. The State Board of Education and 273 274 the State Board for Community and Junior Colleges shall make a joint report to the 1995 Regular Session of the Legislature to the 275 276 Senate and House Committees on Education regarding the various 277 methods or models of integrating academic and vocational-technical 278 courses and setting forth a specific state plan for the 279 integration or realignment of these programs in the secondary and 280 postsecondary schools for implementation in the 1996-1997 school 281 year.

282 SECTION 7. Section 37-31-207, Mississippi Code of 1972, is 283 amended as follows:

284 37-31-207. The State Board of Education shall have the 285 following duties:

(a) To seek the best available projections ofemployment and occupations for Mississippians;

(b) To utilize these projections and other
considerations to set primary and secondary vocational and
technical education priorities;

(c) To utilize the services of all state agencieshaving information regarding the purposes of this chapter;

(d) To cooperate with the <u>State Board for Community and</u> Junior Colleges to prevent duplication and provide continuity of employment and training services;

(e) To conduct evaluations of the success or failure of primary and secondary vocational-technical programs, including the extent to which training actually leads to jobs in the field in which the student was trained;

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(f) Obtain and publish data and information on program

301 performance from those primary and secondary vocational-technical 302 programs receiving state funds; and

303 (g) To notify local school districts * * prior to 304 March 1 annually of any discontinuation of ongoing vocational 305 programs which would affect the renewing of contracts with 306 vocational personnel.

307 SECTION 8. Section 37-31-209, Mississippi Code of 1972, is 308 amended as follows:

309 37-31-209. (1) Any advisory council, other than the special 310 management advisory board, serving the board shall include five 311 (5) members who are presidents of public community/junior colleges 312 located in the State of Mississippi, and three (3) members who are 313 superintendents of education of a countywide, municipal separate 314 or consolidated school district.

315 (2) In addition to any other requirements of law, it is made 316 the duty of the advisory council and it is hereby granted the 317 authority to:

318 (a) Advise the State Board of Education in the 319 development of comprehensive policies and programs for the 320 improvement of <u>primary and secondary</u> vocational-technical 321 education in the state;

322 (b) Assist in the formulation of rules, regulations and 323 standards relating to <u>primary and secondary</u> vocational-technical 324 education programs by submitting written recommendations prior to 325 their adoption and promulgation by the board; and

326 (c) Assist in the promotion of public understanding of
 327 the purposes, policies and practices regarding primary and
 328 <u>secondary</u> vocational-technical education in this state.

329 (3) The additional members of the advisory council may meet
330 with the board in a nonvoting capacity at regular meetings of the
331 board when the board is not in executive session.

332 (4) The additional members required by this section shall be333 reimbursed for their expenses in the same manner and from the same

334 source as other members.

335 SECTION 9. Section 37-31-211, Mississippi Code of 1972, is
336 amended as follows:

337 37-31-211. (1) The Legislature shall appropriate to the 338 State Board of Education those state funds to be expended by the 339 board through the Division of Vocational and Technical Education 340 of the State Department of Education <u>for primary and secondary</u> 341 <u>vocational-technical education</u>.

342 (2) The Legislature shall appropriate to the State Board for
 343 Community and Junior Colleges those state funds to be expended for
 344 postsecondary vocational-technical education and those secondary
 345 centers operated by community and junior colleges.

346 (3) That portion of the funds expended for workforce
 347 education and postsecondary vocational-technical education at
 348 Mississippi State University's Research and Curriculum unit shall

349 be specifically appropriated to the State Board for Community and

350 Junior Colleges to provide this service to the community and

351 junior colleges for workforce education and postsecondary

352 <u>vocational-technical education.</u>

353 (4) The State Board for Community and Junior Colleges shall 354 develop accountability standards that will include, in part, the 355 following items:

356 (a) The State Board for Community and Junior Colleges
 357 shall develop a formula for the distribution of

358 vocational-technical funds for equipment to the local community 359 and junior colleges;

360 (b) The State Board for Community and Junior Colleges

361 shall develop guidelines for vocational-technical instructors,

362 professional staff and administrator qualifications. These

363 guidelines shall be in accordance with Southern Association of

364 <u>Colleges and Schools criteria;</u>

365 (c) The State Board for Community and Junior Colleges,
366 in conjunction with the State Department of Education, shall

367 develop an articulation agreement for secondary vocational 368 students matriculating into postsecondary vocational-technical 369 programs. (d) Each of the fifteen (15) Mississippi community 370 371 colleges are governed by local boards and these boards have 372 legislative authority to govern vocational-technical programs. In addition, each of the community/junior colleges are accredited by 373 the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools, an accrediting 374 375 agency that has rigorous accountability standards. 376 (5) The Mississippi State Board for Community and Junior Colleges, with the Mississippi Association of Community/Junior 377 378 Colleges, shall include, but not be limited to, developing accountability standards for implementation of on-going operations 379 of vocational-technical education programs. Measures of 380 accountability with program outcome intent are: 381 382 (a) Where applicable, national or state-developed 383 assessment instruments will measure student achievement and 384 program outcome; 385 (b) Program advisory committees composed of labor, 386 management and current/perspective employers will be a vital part 387 of the curriculum development and on-going modification; (c) Employer satisfaction with education in 388 389 postsecondary vocational-technical programs will be evaluated and 390 recorded for public review; (d) Support from alumni will be solicited, encouraged 391 392 and sought to promote quality and public awareness of programs; 393 (e) Positive placement rate of students who complete postsecondary vocational-technical programs will be a necessary 394 395 element for program continuation; (f) Student retention in postsecondary 396 397 vocational-technical programs shall be measured by a sufficient number of students completing and passing all levels of 398 399 instruction in any individual program;

400	(g) Related studies in education for postsecondary
401	vocational-technical students will support students needing
402	developmental help for successful completion of their career
403	<u>objective;</u>
404	(h) Each individual institution will be accountable for
405	providing administrative support to effectively operate programs;
406	(i) Counselors will be available to help in student
407	placement and appropriate career choices;
408	<u>(j) Average enrollment per full-time equivalent (FTE)</u>
409	teacher unit for postsecondary occupational programs should be
410	evaluated to address labor demand for the service area of each
411	individual community college;
412	(k) A comprehensive safety and health plan is
413	implemented to ensure safe working conditions and practice in the
414	postsecondary vocational-technical labs; included shall be
415	adequate facilities and equipment to house and provide quality
416	instruction for the number of students enrolled in such programs;
417	(1) Program completers are placed in a field related to
418	their training. In addition, continuing education is to be
419	provided in a related field;
420	(m) Adequate numbers of individuals are educated in
421	postsecondary vocational-technical education and workforce
422	education;
423	(n) Each community/junior college will be responsible
424	for submitting an annual report card to the Mississippi State
425	Board for Community and Junior Colleges.
426	SECTION 10. This act shall take effect and be in force from
427	and after July 1, 2000.
