SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION NO. 539

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- 2 STUDY AND MAKE RECOMMENDATIONS CONCERNING THE ESTABLISHMENT OF
- 3 OUT-PATIENT CLINICS IN THE RURAL AREAS OF MISSISSIPPI FORMERLY
- 4 SERVED BY STATE CHARITY HOSPITALS OR COMMUNITY-OWNED HOSPITALS
- 5 WHICH HAVE CLOSED; TO DIRECT THE JOINT COMMITTEE TO MAKE A WRITTEN
- 6 REPORT OF ITS FINDINGS AND RECOMMENDATIONS BEFORE DECEMBER 1,
- 7 2000; AND FOR RELATED PURPOSES.
- 8 WHEREAS, on July 1, 1989, the South Mississippi State
- 9 Hospital at Laurel, Kuhn Memorial State Hospital at Vicksburg and
- 10 the Matty Hersee Hospital at Meridian were closed by act of the
- 11 Legislature; and
- 12 WHEREAS, Mississippi's health care population is unique in
- 13 that 20% of our population is on Medicaid, with another 20%
- 14 uninsured; and
- WHEREAS, Mississippi is also unique in the structure and
- 16 resource of our health care system, we have only one teaching
- 17 hospital, and the state has fewer primary care physicians for its
- 18 population than any other state; and
- 19 WHEREAS, persons who are uninsured or underinsured tend to
- 20 delay seeking health care until their health problem becomes so
- 21 severe that they must obtain treatment usually in a hospital
- 22 emergency room, and this delay in seeking care and the use of the
- 23 emergency room both cause treatment costs to be much higher than

- 24 if the medical care could be provided early and in a more
- 25 appropriate outpatient setting; and
- 26 WHEREAS, these excessive costs are passed on through cost
- 27 shifting to others who pay their medical bills, and this cost
- 28 shifting results in higher insurance premiums and deductibles for
- 29 the State of Mississippi and the private sector; and
- 30 WHEREAS, for these reasons it is important for Mississippians
- 31 to develop proposals for the development of a rural outpatient
- 32 clinic access system in Mississippi, keeping in mind our unique
- 33 needs:
- NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE SENATE OF THE STATE OF
- 35 MISSISSIPPI, THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES CONCURRING THEREIN, That
- 36 a special joint study and oversight committee is created to Study
- 37 and make Recommendations Concerning the Establishment of
- 38 Out-Patient Clinics in Underserved Rural Areas of the State and to
- 39 recommend a funding source for such clinics. The joint committee
- 40 shall be composed of the Chairman of the Senate Public Health and
- 41 Welfare Committee, the Chairman of the House Public Health and
- 42 Welfare Committee, the Chairman of the Senate Appropriations
- 43 Committee, the Chairman of the House Appropriations Committee, one
- 44 (1) member of the public and one (1) member who is a health care
- 45 provider to be appointed by the Lieutenant Governor, one (1)
- 46 member of the public and one (1) member who is a health care
- 47 provider to be appointed by the Speaker of the House and one (1)
- 48 member of the public and one (1) member who is a health care
- 49 provider to be appointed by the Governor.
- Within fifteen (15) days after sine die adjournment of the
- 51 2000 Regular Session of the Legislature, the Lieutenant Governor,
- 52 Speaker and the Governor shall appoint the members of the
- 53 committee. After the members are appointed, the joint committee
- 54 shall meet on a date designated by the Governor in Jackson,

55 Mississippi, to select a chairman, organize the committee and 56 establish rules for transacting its business and keeping records.

57 An affirmative vote of a majority of the members shall be

58 required in the adoption of rules, resolutions and reports. All

59 members of the joint committee shall be notified in writing of all

regular and special meetings of the committee, which notices shall

be mailed at least five (5) days before the dates of the meetings.

The joint committee may establish any subcommittees that it deems desirable to study and report to the committee with respect

to any matter that is within the scope of this resolution.

The joint committee shall make a written report of its findings and recommendations, and shall mail copies of the report to each member of the Legislature not later than December 1, 2000.

In carrying out the provisions of this resolution, the joint committee may utilize the services, facilities and personnel of all departments, agencies, offices and institutions of the state, including the state universities and the community and junior colleges. In particular, the joint committee shall consult with the Division of Medicaid, and the Division of Medicaid shall cooperate with the committee and provide the committee with any information and other assistance requested by the committee. The joint committee may consult and seek advice from various groups in the state in order to understand the effect of any existing laws or any changes in law being considered by the committee.

For attending meetings of the joint committee, each member shall be paid per diem compensation in the amount authorized by Section 25-3-69 and a mileage allowance and an expense allowance in the amount authorized by Section 5-1-47. Legislative members

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83 shall be paid from the contingent expense fund of the member's 84 respective house, and nonlegislative members shall be paid from 85 funds made available by appropriation of the Legislature for the purpose of this resolution. However, no per diem compensation, 86 87 mileage allowance or expense allowance shall be paid for attending meetings of the joint committee while the Legislature is in 88 session, and no per diem compensation, mileage allowance or 89 90 expense allowance shall be paid without prior approval of the 91 proper committee in the member's respective house.
