## SENATE RESOLUTION NO. 58

1 A RESOLUTION REQUESTING THE GOVERNOR AND ALL STATE 2 HEALTH-RELATED AGENCIES TO SERVE THE HEALTH NEEDS OF WOMEN IN 3 MISSISSIPPI.

WHEREAS, for many years, the topic of women's health has primarily dealt with reproductive health, and only recently has the focus expanded to encompass all aspects of wellness and disease, including prevention and treatment; and

8 WHEREAS, for too long, public health policy in the United 9 States has failed to recognize the unique nature of women's health 10 in contrast to men's health, which has resulted in the health of 11 women being neglected; and

12 WHEREAS, while many people think of cardiovascular disease as 13 a man's disease, more women than men have died as a result of 14 cardiovascular disease every year since 1984, with heart disease 15 being the leading cause of death in women in the United States; 16 and

WHEREAS, women are twice as likely as men to suffer from clinical depression; more than eleven million American women suffer from clinical depression every year; and

20 WHEREAS, cancer is the second leading cause of death in 21 American women who suffer from many different types of the 22 disease; the incidence and mortality rate for many of these 23 cancers are higher in women compared with men, with many cancer 24 proving to be fatal; and

25 WHEREAS, results from the National Health Interview Survey 26 showed that self-reported cases of women who suffer from asthma

increased an astonishing 82% from 1982 to 1992, compared with a 27 28 29% increase for men and not only is the self-reported incidence increasing at a faster rate, but the rate of hospitalizations is 29 also higher for women than men in most age groups; and 30 31 WHEREAS, schizophrenia occurs equally in women and men, but 32 the onset of the illness generally occurs at a later age for women than for men, the result of which is that the disease has a 33 34 greater impact on women with more developed families and careers; 35 and

WHEREAS, osteoporosis is the loss of bone mass and 36 deterioration of bone tissue, primarily among women, leading to 37 38 enhanced bone fragility and an increase in the risk of fracture, 39 and this loss can also be extensive over a woman's lifetime; and WHEREAS, it is known that activities which focus on wellness 40 41 and prevention are two important elements to better health and yet women are not taking advantage of these opportunities to improve 42 their health; and 43

WHEREAS, until very recently, women were significantly underrepresented in clinical trials for drugs, due in large part to concerns about the impact of drugs on their reproductive health, particularly on fetal health in pregnancies that might begin during trials; however, it is now recognized that results from male-only trials do not equally apply to women or provide data on effective treatments that are important to women:

51 NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE MISSISSIPPI STATE 52 SENATE, That we urge and request the Honorable Ronnie Musgrove, 53 Governor of the State of Mississippi, to continue to make women's health a priority in this state, and encourage all state health 54 55 programs, including those administered by the State Department of 56 Health, the Division of Medicaid, the Office of Mental Health, the State Health Insurance Management Board, the Mississippi Insurance 57 58 Department and the Department of Finance and Administration to diligently seek to serve the health needs of Mississippi women, 59 60 and to aggressively educate them of their own unique health needs. 61 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That enrolled copies of this 62 resolution be transmitted to the Governor, and all department heads noted above. 63
