SENATE RESOLUTION NO. 3
(As Adopted by Senate)

1 A RESOLUTION COMMENDING THE LIFE AND ACCOMPLISHMENTS OF
2 REPRESENTATIVE JIMMY THORNTON AND EXPRESSING DEEPEST SYMPATHY TO
3 HIS FAMILY AND FRIENDS UPON HIS PASSING.

5 WHEREAS, Representative Jimmy Thornton, born August 26, 1932,
6 in Leland, Mississippi, departed this life on November 4, 2000,
7 causing great loss and sorrow to his family, legislative
8 colleagues and many friends; and

9 WHEREAS, Representative Thornton dedicated eight years of
10 service to the people of District 50 of the Mississippi House of
11 Representatives, which includes Bolivar and Washington Counties,
12 by serving with honor and distinction as a member of the
13 Apportionment and Elections, Investigation of State Offices, Oil,
14 Gas and Other Minerals, Penitentiary and Transportation
15 Committees; and

16 WHEREAS, Representative Thornton attended Coleman High School
17 and Wendell Phillip High in Chicago and furthered his education at
18 Arkansas AM & N College in Pine Bluff, where he received a degree
19 in Industrial Arts and also completed barber school; and

20 WHEREAS, Representative Thornton, a philanthropist and avid
21 civil rights participant, marched with some of the most prominent

22 NAACP leaders and local civil rights activists fighting for human
23 rights; and

24 WHEREAS, Representative Thornton distinguished himself as
25 highly revered among his peers by exhibiting unparalleled
26 resistance to opposition and unpopularity, taking a strong stance
27 for causes he believed in; and

28 WHEREAS, Representative Thornton stood firm in his efforts to
29 change the form of government and to reapportion the City Council
30 in Greenville, while simultaneously attacking issues to better
31 society as a whole; and

32 WHEREAS, Representative Thornton proved to be a man of
33 remarkable talent, serving in the United States Army Air
34 Corps--the forerunner of the United States Air Force--and being
35 skilled as a brick mason and an amateur boxer; and

36 WHEREAS, Representative Thornton also served as a police
37 officer, advisor to Governor Cliff Finch, a blues public relations
38 promoter and with the Department of Human Services; and

39 WHEREAS, Representative Thornton, in appreciation for his
40 courage and commitment to serving the public, received numerous
41 awards and acknowledgements, such as, Legislator of the Year Award
42 from MAACC; Mississippi Firefighter Memorial Burn Association
43 Medal of Distinction; Black Achievers Hall of Fame; Magnolia Bar
44 Association, Inc. Award; Alpha Kappa Alpha Political Award;
45 Friends of Education Leadership Award; and the Washington County
46 NAACP Award, as well as many other honors and recognitions; and

47 WHEREAS, Representative Thornton was an active member of his
48 community and involved in such organizations as the Serene Lodge
49 #567 Elks, the Washington County Voter League, the NAACP, the
50 Political Action Committee and the Mississippi Legislative Black
51 Caucus; and

52 WHEREAS, in addition, Representative Thornton was a faithful

53 member of St. Matthew A.M.E. Church for 42 years, where he served
54 as an active member of the Steward Board and as the pastor's
55 personal steward for more than 20 years; and

56 WHEREAS, Representative Thornton is survived by his loving
57 and devoted wife, Lillie G. Thornton, and their children,
58 Jermaine, Jamar, Ian, Jacques, Shelia, Tina, Dwight, Marsha and
59 Quincy; and

60 WHEREAS, it is the policy of this Legislature to recognize
61 and commend outstanding public servants such as Representative
62 Jimmy Thornton, who distinguished himself as a highly revered
63 legislator, dedicated to improving the quality of life for all
64 Mississippians:

65 NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE SENATE OF THE STATE OF
66 MISSISSIPPI, That we do hereby commend the life and
67 accomplishments of our friend and colleague, Representative Jimmy
68 Thornton, and express our deepest appreciation for the tremendous
69 example of character, courage and humanitarianism that
70 Representative Thornton displayed as an outstanding leader and
71 citizen of the State of Mississippi.

72 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That we do hereby express and extend
73 our heartfelt sympathy to the devoted wife and family of
74 Representative Jimmy Thornton upon the demise of this fine
75 gentleman and public servant.
