- BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MISSISSIPPI:
- SECTION 1. Section 25-3-3, Mississippi Code of 1972, is
- amended as follows:
- 26 25-3-3. The term "total assessed valuation" as used in this
- 27 section only refers to the ad valorem assessment for the county
- 28 and, in addition, in counties where oil or gas is produced, the
- 29 actual value of oil at the point of production, as certified to
- 30 the counties by the State Tax Commission under the provisions of
- 31 Sections 27-25-501 through 27-25-525, and the actual value of gas
- 32 as certified by the State Tax Commission under the provisions of
- 33 Sections 27-25-701 through 27-25-723.
- 34 The salary of assessors of the various counties is * * *
- 35 fixed as full compensation for their services as county assessors
- 36 and tax collectors. The annual salary of each assessor shall be
- 37 based upon the total assessed valuation of his respective county

- 38 for the preceding taxable year in the following categories and for
- 39 the following amounts:
- 40 (a) For counties with a total assessed valuation of Two
- 41 Hundred Fifty Million Dollars (\$250,000,000.00) or more, a salary
- 42 of Fifty-one Thousand Eight Hundred Ninety-five Dollars
- 43 (\$51,895.00);
- 44 (b) For counties having a total assessed valuation of
- 45 at least Seventy-five Million Dollars (\$75,000,000.00) but less
- than Two Hundred Fifty Million Dollars (\$250,000,000.00), a salary
- 47 of Fifty Thousand Forty-four Dollars (\$50,044.00);
- 48 (c) For counties having a total assessed valuation of
- 49 at least Thirty-five Million Dollars (\$35,000,000.00) but less
- 50 than Seventy-five Million Dollars (\$75,000,000.00), a salary of
- 51 Forty-six Thousand Six Hundred Eleven Dollars (\$46,611.00);
- 52 (d) For counties having a total assessed valuation of
- at least Twenty Million Dollars (\$20,000,000.00) but less than
- 54 Thirty-five Million Dollars (\$35,000,000.00), a salary of
- Forty-three Thousand One Hundred Twenty Dollars (\$43,120.00);
- (e) For counties having a total assessed valuation of
- 57 at least Twelve Million Five Hundred Thousand Dollars
- 58 (\$12,500,000.00) but less than Twenty Million Dollars
- 59 (\$20,000,000.00), a salary of Thirty-nine Thousand Six Hundred
- 60 Twenty-eight Dollars (\$39,628.00);
- (f) For counties having a total assessed valuation of
- 62 less than Twelve Million Five Hundred Thousand Dollars
- 63 (\$12,500,000.00), a salary of Thirty-six Thousand One Hundred
- 64 Thirty-seven Dollars (\$36,137.00).
- The annual salary established for the assessor-tax collector
- 66 shall not be reduced as a result of a reduction in total assessed
- 67 valuation. The salaries may be increased as a result of an
- 68 increase in total assessed valuation.
- In addition to all other compensation paid to assessor-tax
- 70 collectors in counties having two (2) judicial districts, the

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board of supervisors shall allow that * * * assessor-tax collector
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- 72 <u>to</u> be paid an additional Three Thousand Five Hundred Dollars
- 73 (\$3,500.00) per year. In addition to all other compensation paid
- 74 to assessors or tax collectors, in counties maintaining two (2)
- 75 full-time offices, the board of supervisors may allow that * * *
- 76 assessor or tax collector to be paid an additional Three Thousand
- 77 Five Hundred Dollars (\$3,500.00) per year.
- 78 In addition to all other compensation paid to assessor-tax
- 79 collectors, the board of supervisors of a county shall allow for
- 80 such assessor-tax collector to be paid additional compensation
- 81 when there is a contract between the county and one or more
- 82 municipalities providing that the assessor-tax collector shall
- 83 assess and/or collect taxes for the municipality or
- 84 municipalities; and such assessor-tax collector shall be
- 85 authorized to receive such additional compensation from the county
- 86 and/or the municipality or municipalities in any amount allowed by
- 87 the county and the municipality or municipalities for performing
- 88 those services.
- When any tax assessor holds a valid certificate of
- 90 educational recognition from the International Association of
- 91 Assessing Officers or is a licensed appraiser under Section
- 92 73-34-1 et seq., he shall receive an additional One Thousand Five
- 93 Hundred Dollars (\$1,500.00) annually beginning the next fiscal
- 94 year after completion. When any tax assessor is a licensed state
- 95 certified Residential Appraiser (RA) or licensed state certified
- 96 Timberland Appraiser (TA) under Section 73-34-1 et seq., or when
- 97 any tax assessor holds a valid designation from the International
- 98 Association of Assessing Officers as a Cadastral Mapping
- 99 Specialist (CMS) or Personal Property Specialist (PPS) or
- 100 Residential Evaluation Specialist (RES), he shall receive an
- 101 additional Six Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$6,500.00) annually
- 102 beginning the next fiscal year after completion. When any tax
- 103 assessor holds the valid designation of Certified Assessment

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- 104 Evaluator (CAE) from the International Association of Assessing
- 105 Officers or is a state certified General Real Estate Appraiser
- 106 (GA) under Section 73-34-1 et seq., he shall receive an additional
- 107 Eight Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$8,500.00) annually beginning
- 108 the next fiscal year after completion.
- 109 The salaries * * * set out in this section shall be the total
- 110 funds paid to the county assessors and tax collectors and shall be
- 111 full compensation for their services, with any fees being paid to
- 112 the county general fund.
- 113 The salaries * * * provided in this section shall be payable
- 114 monthly on the first day of each calendar month by chancery
- 115 clerk's warrant drawn on the general fund of the county; however,
- 116 the board of supervisors, by resolution duly adopted and entered
- 117 on its minutes, may provide that such salaries shall be paid
- 118 semimonthly on the first and fifteenth day of each month. If a
- 119 pay date falls on a weekend or legal holiday, salary payments
- 120 shall be made on the workday immediately preceding the weekend or
- 121 legal holiday.
- The salary scale in this section shall not apply in any
- 123 county in which the office of assessor has been separated from
- 124 that of tax collector. In the event of such separation, the
- 125 salary scale set forth in Section 25-3-5 shall control.
- 126 SECTION 2. Section 25-3-5, Mississippi Code of 1972, is
- 127 amended as follows:
- 128 25-3-5. In any county where the office of tax collector has
- 129 been separated from the office of tax assessor, the annual salary
- 130 of the assessor or tax collector shall be based upon the assessed
- 131 valuation of his respective county for the preceding taxable year
- in the following categories and for the following amounts:
- 133 (a) For counties with a total assessed valuation of Two
- Hundred Fifty Million Dollars (\$250,000,000.00) or more, a salary
- of Fifty-seven Thousand Eighty-five Dollars (\$57,085.00);

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     tax collectors, in counties having two (2) judicial districts, the
     board of supervisors shall allow that * * * assessor or tax
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     collector to be paid an additional Three Thousand Five Hundred
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     Dollars ($3,500.00) per year. In addition to all other
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     compensation paid to assessors or tax collectors, in counties
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     maintaining two (2) full-time offices, the board of supervisors
     may allow that * * * assessor or tax collector to be paid an

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In addition to all other compensation paid to tax assessors

172 and tax collectors, the board of supervisors of a county shall 173 allow for such tax assessor and/or tax collector to be paid 174 additional compensation when there is a contract between the county and one or more municipalities providing that the tax 175 assessor shall assess taxes and/or tax collector shall collect 176 taxes for the municipality or municipalities; and such tax 177 assessor and/or tax collector shall be authorized to receive such 178 179 additional compensation from the county and/or the municipality or municipalities in any amount allowed by the county and the 180 181 municipality or municipalities for performing those services. When any tax assessor holds a valid certificate of educational 182 recognition from the International Association of Assessing 183 Officers or is a licensed appraiser under Section 73-34-1 et seq., 184 he shall receive an additional One Thousand Five Hundred Dollars 185 186 (\$1,500.00) annually beginning the next fiscal year after completion. When any tax assessor is a licensed state certified 187 188 Residential Appraiser (RA) or licensed state certified Timberland Appraiser (TA) under Section 73-34-1 et seq., or when any tax 189 190 assessor holds a valid designation from the International Association of Assessing Officers as a Cadastral Mapping 191 Specialist (CMS) or Personal Property Specialist (PPS) or 192 193 Residential Evaluation Specialist (RES), he shall receive an additional Six Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$6,500.00) annually 194 195 beginning the next fiscal year after completion. When any tax assessor holds the valid designation of Certified Assessment 196 197 Evaluator (CAE) from the International Association of Assessing Officers or is a state certified General Real Estate Appraiser 198 (GA) under Section 73-34-1 et seq., he shall receive an additional 199 200 Eight Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$8,500.00) annually beginning the next fiscal year after completion. 201

The salaries * * * set out in this section shall be the total 202 203 funds paid to the county assessors or tax collectors and shall be full compensation for their services, with any fees being paid to 204

205 the county general fund.

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206 The salaries * * * provided in this section shall be payable monthly on the first day of each calendar month by chancery 207 208 clerk's warrant drawn on the general fund of the county; however, 209 the board of supervisors, by resolution duly adopted and entered on its minutes, may provide that such salaries shall be paid 210 semimonthly on the first and fifteenth day of each month. 211 212 pay date falls on a weekend or legal holiday, salary payments shall be made on the workday immediately preceding the weekend or 213

- 228 (C) For counties with a total population of more than fifty thousand (50,000) and not more than one hundred thousand 229 (100,000), a salary not to exceed Twenty-four Thousand Nine 230 Hundred Fifty-five Dollars (\$24,955.00). 231
- For counties with a total population of more than 232 (d) 233 thirty-five thousand (35,000) and not more than fifty thousand

- 234 (50,000), a salary not to exceed Twenty-three Thousand Four
- 235 Hundred Sixty Dollars (\$23,460.00).
- (e) For counties with a total population of more than
- 237 twenty-five thousand (25,000) and not more than thirty-five
- 238 thousand (35,000), a salary not to exceed Twenty-two Thousand One
- 239 Hundred Ninety-five Dollars (\$22,195.00).
- 240 (f) For counties with a total population of more than
- 241 fifteen thousand (15,000) and not more than twenty-five thousand
- 242 (25,000), a salary not to exceed Twenty Thousand Three Hundred
- 243 Fifty-five Dollars (\$20,355.00).
- 244 (g) For counties with a total population of more than
- ten thousand (10,000) and not more than fifteen thousand (15,000),
- 246 a salary not to exceed Eighteen Thousand Five Hundred Fifteen
- 247 Dollars (\$18,515.00).
- 248 (h) For counties with a total population of more than
- 249 six thousand (6,000) and not more than ten thousand (10,000), a
- 250 salary not to exceed Sixteen Thousand Six Hundred Seventy-five
- 251 Dollars (\$16,675.00).
- 252 (i) For counties with a total population of six
- 253 thousand (6,000) or less, the board of supervisors, in its
- 254 discretion, may appoint a county prosecuting attorney, and it may
- 255 pay such county prosecuting attorney an annual salary not to
- 256 exceed Fourteen Thousand Eight Hundred Thirty-five Dollars
- 257 (\$14,835.00).
- In all cases of conviction there shall be taxed against the
- 259 convicted defendant, as an item of cost, the sum of Three Dollars
- 260 (\$3.00), which shall be turned in to the county treasury as a part
- of the general county funds; however, the Three Dollars (\$3.00)
- 262 shall not be taxed in any case in which it is not the specific
- 263 duty of the county attorney to appear and prosecute.
- * * * In addition to the salaries provided for in this
- 265 subsection, the board of supervisors of any county, in its
- 266 discretion, may pay the county prosecuting attorney an additional

- amount not to exceed ten percent (10%) of the maximum allowable salary prescribed in this subsection.
- 269 (2) In the following counties, the county prosecuting 270 attorney shall receive for his services an annual salary to be 271 paid by the board of supervisors, as follows:
- In any county bordering upon the Mississippi River 272 and having a population of not less than thirty thousand (30,000) 273 and not more than thirty-five thousand five hundred (35,500) 274 according to the federal census of 1990, and in counties having a 275 population of not more than thirty-seven thousand (37,000) 276 according to the federal census of 1990 in which Interstate 277 Highway 55 and U.S. Highway 98 intersect, the county prosecuting 278 attorney shall receive a salary equal to the justice court judge 279 280 of such county; and in any county wherein is located the state's oldest state-supported institution of higher learning and wherein 281 Mississippi State Highways 7 and 6 intersect, the county 282 prosecuting attorney shall receive an annual salary equal to that 283 284 of a member of the board of supervisors of such county.
- 285 In counties having a population in excess of fifty 286 thousand (50,000) in the 1960 federal census, wherein is located a 287 state-supported university and in which U.S. Highways 49 and 11 288 intersect, the salary of the county prosecuting attorney shall be not less than Seventeen Thousand Four Hundred Dollars (\$17,400.00) 289 per year. The Board of Supervisors of Forrest County, 290 291 Mississippi, may, in its discretion, and by agreement with the county prosecuting attorney, employ the county prosecuting 292 attorney as a full-time elected official during his/her term of 293 office, designate additional duties and responsibilities of the 294 295 office and pay additional compensation up to, but not in excess 296 of, ninety percent (90%) of the annual compensation and salary of the county court judge and the youth court judge of Forrest County 297 298 as authorized by law and provide a reasonable office and 299 reasonable office expenses to the county prosecuting attorney.

The salary authorized by this paragraph (b) for the county
prosecuting attorney shall be the sole and complete salary for
such prosecuting attorney in each county to which this paragraph
applies, notwithstanding any other provision of law to the
contrary.

- 305 (c) In any county wherein is housed the seat of State
 306 Government, wherein U.S. Highways 80 and 49 intersect, and having
 307 two (2) judicial districts, the board of supervisors, in its
 308 discretion, may pay the county prosecuting attorney an annual
 309 salary equal to the annual salary of members of the board of
 310 supervisors in the county.
- In any county which has two (2) judicial districts 311 and wherein Highway 8 and Highway 15 intersect, having a 312 population of greater than seventeen thousand (17,000), according 313 to the 1980 federal decennial census, the board of supervisors 314 315 shall pay the county prosecuting attorney a salary equal to that of a member of the board of supervisors of such county; provided 316 317 that if such county prosecuting attorney is paid a sum for the purpose of defraying office or secretarial expenses, then the 318 319 salary prescribed herein shall be reduced by that amount.
- (e) In any county bordering the State of Tennessee and in which Mississippi Highways No. 4 and 15 intersect, and having a population of less than twenty thousand (20,000) in the 1970 federal census, the salary of the county prosecuting attorney shall be no less than Six Thousand Dollars (\$6,000.00).
- (f) In any county having a population of more than
 twenty-five thousand (25,000) and in which U.S. Highways 72 and 45
 intersect, the salary of the county attorney shall be paid not
 less than Eight Thousand Dollars (\$8,000.00).
- In addition, such county prosecuting attorney shall receive the sum of One Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$1,500.00) per month for the purpose of defraying secretarial expense.

332	(g) In any county wherein 1-20 and State Highway 15
333	intersect; and in any county wherein I-20 and State Highway 35
334	intersect, the salary of the county prosecuting attorney shall be
335	not less than Eight Thousand Four Hundred Dollars (\$8,400.00).
336	(h) In any Class 1 county bordering on the Mississippi
337	River, lying in whole or in part within a levee district, wherein
338	U.S. Highways 82 and 61 intersect, bounded by the Sunflower River
339	and Stales Bayou, the board of supervisors, in its discretion, may
340	pay an annual salary equal to the annual salary of members of the
341	board of supervisors in the county. In addition, such county
342	prosecuting attorney shall receive the sum of One Thousand Dollars
343	(\$1,000.00) per month for the purpose of defraying secretarial
344	expenses.
345	(i) In any county bordering on the Gulf of Mexico
346	having two (2) judicial districts, and wherein U.S. Highways 90
347	and 49 intersect, the salary of the county prosecuting attorney
348	shall be not less than Nineteen Thousand Dollars (\$19,000.00) per
349	year. The Board of Supervisors of Harrison County, Mississippi,
350	may, in its discretion, and by agreement with the county
351	prosecuting attorney, employ the county prosecuting attorney and
352	his/her assistant during his/her term of office, and designate
353	additional duties and responsibilities of the office and pay
354	additional compensation up to, but not in excess of, ninety
355	percent (90%) of the annual compensation and salary of the county
356	court judges of Harrison County as authorized by law and provide
357	adequate office space and reasonable office expenses to the county
358	prosecuting attorney and his/her assistant. The salary authorized
359	by this paragraph (i) for the county prosecuting attorney and
360	his/her assistant shall be the sole and complete salary paid by
361	the county for such prosecuting attorney and his/her assistant in
362	each county to which this paragraph applies, notwithstanding any
363	other provision of law to the contrary.

- In any county bordering on the State of Alabama, 364 (j) having a population in excess of seventy-five thousand (75,000) 365 according to the 1980 decennial census in which is located an 366 367 institution of higher learning and a United States military 368 installation and which is traversed by an interstate highway, the salary of the county prosecuting attorney shall not be less than 369 370 Twelve Thousand Dollars (\$12,000.00) nor more than the amount of the annual salary received by a member of the board of supervisors 371 372 of that county.
- 373 (k) In any county with a land area wherein Mississippi 374 Highways 8 and 9 intersect, the salary of the county prosecuting 375 attorney shall be not less than Eight Thousand Five Hundred 376 Dollars (\$8,500.00) per year.
- (1) In any Class 2 county wherein Mississippi Highways

 6 and 3 intersect, the salary of the county prosecuting attorney

 shall be not less than Twelve Thousand Dollars (\$12,000.00) per

 year nor more than the amount of the annual salary received by a

 member of the board of supervisors of that county.
- 382 (m) In any county wherein Interstate Highway 55 and
 383 State Highway 8 intersect, the salary of the county prosecuting
 384 attorney shall be not less than Twelve Thousand Dollars
 385 (\$12,000.00) per year.
- (n) In any county wherein U.S. Highway 51 intersects

 Mississippi Highway 6, and having two (2) judicial districts, the

 salary of the county prosecuting attorney shall be not less than

 Three Thousand Six Hundred Dollars (\$3,600.00) per year.
- (o) In any county bordering on the Alabama state line,
 having a population of greater than fifteen thousand (15,000)

 according to the 1970 federal decennial census, wherein U.S.

 Highway 45 and Mississippi Highway 18 intersect, the salary of the
 county prosecuting attorney shall be not less than Three Thousand

 Six Hundred Dollars (\$3,600.00) nor greater than that of a member
 of the board of supervisors of such county. All prior acts,

- 397 orders and resolutions of the board of supervisors of such county
- 398 which authorized the payment of the salary in conformity with the
- 399 provisions of this paragraph, whether or not heretofore
- 400 specifically authorized by law are hereby ratified, approved and
- 401 confirmed.
- 402 (p) In any county wherein is located a state-supported
- 403 institution of higher learning and wherein U.S. Highway 82 and
- 404 Mississippi Highway 389 intersect, the board of supervisors, in
- 405 its discretion, may pay the county prosecuting attorney an annual
- 406 salary equal to the annual salary of members of the board of
- 407 supervisors in the county.
- 408 (q) In any county having two (2) judicial districts
- 409 wherein Mississippi Highway 32 intersects U.S. Highway 49E, the
- 410 salary of the county prosecuting attorney shall be not less than
- 411 Twelve Thousand Seven Hundred Dollars (\$12,700.00).
- 412 (r) In any county traversed by the Natchez Trace
- 413 Parkway wherein U.S. Highway 45 and Mississippi Highway 4
- 414 intersect, the board of supervisors, in its discretion, may pay
- 415 the county prosecuting attorney an annual salary equal to the
- 416 annual salary of justice court judges in the county.
- 417 (s) In any county having a population of more than
- 418 fourteen thousand (14,000) according to the 1970 census and which
- 419 county is bordered on the north by the State of Tennessee and on

- The board of supervisors of any county having two (2)

- 948 regular office hours and is personally present in the office he

- 950 having a population greater than eight thousand (8,000) but less

than eight thousand five hundred (8,500) according to the 1990 951 federal decennial census and in which U.S. Highway 61 and 952 Mississippi Highway 4 intersect, the board of supervisors * * *, 953 954 in its discretion, may pay such justice court judges an additional 955 amount not to exceed the sum of Eleven Thousand Five Hundred Fifty 956 Dollars (\$11,550.00) per year, payable beginning April 1, 1997. 957 In any county having a population greater than ten thousand (10,000) but less than ten thousand five hundred (10,500) 958 according to the 1990 federal decennial census and in which 959 Mississippi Highway 3 and Mississippi Highway 6 intersect, the 960 961 board of supervisors * * *, in its discretion, may pay such justice court judges an additional amount not to exceed One 962 963 Thousand Four Hundred Fifty Dollars (\$1,450.00) per year, payable beginning April 1, 1997. In any county having a population 964 965 greater than twenty-four thousand seven hundred (24,700) and less 966 than twenty-four thousand nine hundred (24,900), according to the 1990 federal census, wherein Mississippi Highways 15 and 16 967 968 intersect, the board of supervisors shall pay such justice court judge an additional amount equal to Two Thousand Five Hundred 969 970 Dollars (\$2,500.00) per year. 971

- (2) Notwithstanding the provisions of subsection (1) of this section, in the event that the number of justice court judges authorized pursuant to Section 9-11-2(1) is exceeded pursuant to the provisions of Section 9-11-2(4), the aggregate of the salaries paid to the justice court judges of such a county shall not exceed the amount sufficient to pay the number of justice court judges authorized pursuant to Section 9-11-2(1), and such amount shall be equally divided among those justice court judges continuing to hold office under the provisions of Section 9-11-2(4).

- In any county having a population of less than 1063 (d) twenty-seven thousand (27,000) according to the 1980 federal 1064 1065 census, the county judge shall receive an annual salary of not less than Four Thousand Eight Hundred Thirty Dollars (\$4,830.00) 1066 1067 and not more than Nine Thousand Seven Hundred Seventy-five Dollars (\$9,775.00), in the discretion of the board of supervisors of that 1068 1069 county. The county judge shall not be eligible for any additional salary except as may be authorized in subsection (4). 1070
- 1071 (4) The county judge of any county described in this
 1072 subsection shall be paid the compensation, and he shall be subject
 1073 to any restrictions, set forth in the following paragraphs:
- 1074 The county judge of any such Class 1 county with population according to the latest federal decennial census of 1075 forty-five thousand (45,000) or more and lying wholly within a 1076 levee district and having two (2) judicial districts * * *, in the 1077 discretion of the board of supervisors of such county, shall 1078 receive an annual salary not exceeding Forty Thousand Dollars 1079 (\$40,000.00), or a sum which is One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00) 1080 1081 less than the salary which is now or shall hereafter be provided

- 1092 The office of county judge in any such Class 1 county with a population according to the 1970 federal decennial 1093 1094 census of greater than thirty-nine thousand (39,000), and where U.S. Highway 61 and Mississippi Highway 6 intersect, shall receive 1095 an annual salary to be paid in monthly installments of not less 1096 than an amount equal to ninety percent (90%) of the annual salary 1097 which is now or shall hereafter be provided for circuit and 1098 1099 chancery judges of the state, as follows: The salary of the county judge shall be increased by ten percent (10%) annually 1100 1101 above the base salary of the preceding year until such time as the judge's salary is equal to the amount that is provided by this 1102 subsection. The county judge in any county having a population 1114 1115 of at least forty-two thousand one hundred eleven (42,111), according to the 1970 census, and where U.S. Highway 49E and U.S. 1116 1117 Highway 82 intersect, shall receive an annual salary to be paid in 1118 monthly installments of not less than Thirty Thousand Dollars (\$30,000.00) but not more than Two Thousand Five Hundred Dollars 1119 (\$2,500.00) less than the annual salary of the circuit judge, in 1120 the discretion of the board of supervisors of that county. 1121 (f) The county judge in any Class 1 county bordering on 1122 the Mississippi River and having an area of less than four hundred 1123 1124 fifty (450) square miles wherein U.S. Highways 84 and 61 intersect shall receive an annual salary of Four Thousand Dollars 1125 1126 (\$4,000.00) less than the annual salary of a circuit judge, and such county judge shall not practice law in any manner. 1127 county judge in such county shall not be eligible to receive any 1128 additional salary authorized by this section or from any other 1129 source other than that set out and authorized by this paragraph. 1130 1131 The county judge of any Class 1 county bordering on the Mississippi River on the west and the State of Tennessee on 1132 1133

- The county judge of any county having a population 1147 in excess of sixty-six thousand (66,000) according to the 1980 1148 federal decennial census, wherein is located a state-supported 1149 1150 university and in which U.S. Highways 49 and 11 intersect, shall 1151 receive an annual salary of One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00) less 1152 than that paid to a circuit court judge. The office of such county judge shall be a full-time position, and the holder thereof 1153 shall not otherwise engage in the practice of law. 1154
- The county judge of any county having two (2) 1155 (j) 1156 judicial districts, having a population in excess of sixty-one 1157 thousand nine hundred (61,900) according to the 1980 federal decennial census, in which U.S. Interstate Highway 59 intersects 1158 1159 with U.S. Highway 84, shall receive an annual salary of One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00) less than the salary which is now or 1160 hereafter authorized to be paid circuit and chancery court judges 1161 of this state. The office of such county judge shall be a 1162 full-time position, and the holder thereof shall not otherwise 1163 1164 engage in the practice of law.
- The office of county judge of any Class I county 1165 1166 wherein U.S. Highway 51 and U.S. Highway 98 intersect shall be a full-time position and the holder thereof shall not otherwise 1167 1168 engage in the practice of law. The annual salary for the office of county judge in that county may be fixed, in the discretion of 1169 the board of supervisors of the county, at a sum not to exceed Two 1170 1171 Thousand Dollars (\$2,000.00) less than the salary which is now or shall hereafter be provided for circuit and chancery judges of 1172 1173 this state.
- (1) The county judge of any county having a population of more than forty-one thousand six hundred (41,600) but less than forty-one thousand six hundred fifty (41,650) according to the 1980 federal census, and wherein U.S. Highway 49 intersects with Mississippi Highway 22, shall receive an annual salary in an amount established by the board of supervisors, but in no event to

1180 exceed the salary provided now or hereafter for circuit and

1181 chancery judges of this state.

1182 (m) The county judge of any county having a population

of more than fifty-seven thousand (57,000) but less than

1184 fifty-seven thousand one hundred (57,100) according to the 1980

1185 federal census, wherein U.S. Highway 45 intersects with

1186 Mississippi Highway 6, shall receive an annual salary in an amount

1187 established by the board of supervisors, but in no event to exceed

1188 the salary provided now or hereafter for circuit and chancery

1189 judges of this state.

1190 (n) The county judge of any county having a population

1191 of more than fifty-seven thousand three hundred (57,300) according

1192 to the 1980 federal decennial census, wherein is located a

1193 state-supported university and wherein United States Highways 82

1194 and 45 intersect, shall receive an annual salary in an amount

1195 established by the board of supervisors, but in no event to exceed

the salary provided now or hereafter for circuit and chancery

1197 judges of this state.

1198 (5) The salary of a county court judge or justice court

judge shall not be reduced during his term of office as a result

of a population decrease based upon the 1990 federal decennial

1201 census.

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1203 (6) From and after October 1, 1993, * * * in addition to the

salaries set forth in this section, the board of supervisors of

1205 any county, in its discretion, may pay any county court judge

1206 whose salary is not established herein in relation to the salary

1207 paid to chancery and circuit court judges, an additional amount

1208 not to exceed ten percent (10%) of the maximum allowable salary

1209 for that judge.

1210 SECTION 8. Section 41-61-59, Mississippi Code of 1972, is

1211 amended as follows:

- 1225 (b) Death caused by thermal, chemical, electrical or

- 1227 (c) Death caused by criminal abortion, including
- 1228 self-induced abortion, or abortion related to or by sexual abuse.
- 1229 (d) Death related to disease thought to be virulent or
- 1230 contagious which may constitute a public hazard.
- 1231 (e) Death that has occurred unexpectedly or from an
- 1232 unexplained cause.
- 1233 (f) Death of a person confined in a prison, jail or
- 1234 correctional institution.
- 1235 (g) Death of a person where a physician was not in
- 1236 attendance within thirty-six (36) hours preceding death, or in
- 1237 prediagnosed terminal or bedfast cases, within thirty (30) days
- 1238 preceding death.
- (h) Death of a person where the body is not claimed by
- 1240 a relative or a friend.
- 1241 (i) Death of a person where the identity of the
- 1242 deceased is unknown.
- 1243 (j) Death of a child under the age of two (2) years
- 1244 where death results from an unknown cause or where the

1245 circumstances surrounding the death indicate that sudden infant 1246 death syndrome may be the cause of death.

- 1247 (k) Where a body is brought into this state for
 1248 disposal and there is reason to believe either that the death was
 1249 not investigated properly or that there is not an adequate
 1250 certificate of death.
- 1251 Where a person is presented to a hospital emergency room unconscious and/or unresponsive, with cardiopulmonary 1252 resuscitative measures being performed, and dies within 1253 twenty-four (24) hours of admission without regaining 1254 1255 consciousness or responsiveness, unless a physician was in attendance within thirty-six (36) hours preceding presentation to 1256 1257 the hospital, or in cases in which the decedent had a prediagnosed terminal or bedfast condition, unless a physician was in 1258 attendance within thirty (30) days preceding presentation to the 1259 hospital. 1260

The State Medical Examiner is empowered to investigate

1262 deaths, under the authority hereinafter conferred, in any and all political subdivisions of the state. The county medical examiners 1263 1264 and county medical examiner investigators, while appointed for a specific county, may serve other counties on a regular basis with 1265 1266 written authorization by the State Medical Examiner, or may serve 1267 other counties on an as-needed basis upon the request of the 1268 ranking officer of the investigating law enforcement agency. 1269 county medical examiner or county medical examiner investigator of any county which has established a regional medical examiner 1270 district under subsection (4) of Section 41-61-77 may serve other 1271 counties which are parties to the agreement establishing the 1272 district, in accordance with the terms of the agreement, and may 1273 contract with counties which are not part of the district to 1274 provide medical examiner services for such counties. If a death 1275 1276 affecting the public interest takes place in a county other than the one where injuries or other substantial causal factors leading 1277

to the death have occurred, jurisdiction for investigation of the
death may be transferred, by mutual agreement of the respective
medical examiners of the counties involved, to the county where
such injuries or other substantial causal factors occurred, and
the costs of autopsy or other studies necessary to the further
investigation of the death shall be borne by the county assuming
jurisdiction.

The chief county medical examiner or chief county 1285 medical examiner investigator may receive from the county in which 1286 he serves a salary of Eight Hundred Sixty-three Dollars (\$863.00) 1287 1288 per month, in addition to the fees specified in Sections 41-61-69 and 41-61-75, provided that no county shall pay the chief county 1289 1290 medical examiner or chief county medical examiner investigator less than One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) per month as a salary, in 1291 addition to other compensation provided by law. In any county 1292 having one or more deputy medical examiners or deputy medical 1293 examiner investigators, each deputy may receive from the county in 1294 1295 which he serves, in the discretion of the board of supervisors, a salary of not more than Eight Hundred Sixty-three Dollars 1296 1297 (\$863.00) per month, in addition to the fees specified in Sections 41-61-69 and 41-61-75. For this salary the chief shall assure 1298 1299 twenty-four-hour daily and readily available death investigators for the county, and shall maintain copies of all medical examiner 1300 death investigations for the county for at least the previous five 1301 1302 (5) years. He shall coordinate his office and duties and cooperate with the State Medical Examiner, and the State Medical 1303 1304 Examiner shall cooperate with him.

(5) A body composed of the State Medical Examiner, whether appointed on a permanent or interim basis, the Director of the State Board of Health or his designee, the Attorney General or his designee, the President of the Mississippi Coroners' Association (or successor organization) or his designee, and a certified pathologist appointed by the Mississippi State Medical Association

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shall adopt, promulgate, amend and repeal rules and regulations as 1311 1312 may be deemed necessary by them from time to time for the proper enforcement, interpretation and administration of Sections 1313 1314 41-61-51 through 41-61-79, in accordance with the provisions of 1315 the Mississippi Administrative Procedures Law, being Sections 1316 25-43-1 through 25-43-19. SECTION 9. Section 9-13-19, Mississippi Code of 1972, is 1317 1318 amended as follows: 9-13-19. The additional compensation shall be submitted to the Administrative Office of 1331 1332 Courts for approval. The several counties in each respective court district 1333 (2) 1334 shall transfer from the general funds of those county treasuries 1335 to the Administrative Office of Courts a proportionate amount to be paid toward the annual compensation of the court reporter, 1336 1337 including any additional compensation paid for the performance of 1338 court administrator duties. The amount to be paid by each county shall be determined by the number of weeks in which court is held 1339 in each county in proportion to the total number of weeks court is 1340 1341 held in the district. For purposes of this section, the term

"compensation" means the gross salary plus all amounts paid for

benefits, or otherwise, as a result of employment or as required

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1344 by employment, but does not include transcript fees otherwise

1345 authorized to be paid by or through the counties. However, only

1346 salary earned for services rendered shall be reported and credited

1347 for retirement purposes. Amounts paid for transcript fees,

1348 benefits or otherwise, including reimbursement for travel

1349 expenses, shall not be reported or credited for retirement

1350 purposes.

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For example, if there are thirty-eight (38) scheduled court

1352 weeks in a particular district, a county in which court is

scheduled five (5) weeks out of the year would have to pay

1358 has been duly authorized by the appointing judge or chancellor and

1359 an order duly placed on the minutes of the court. Each county

1360 shall transfer to the Administrative Office of Courts one-twelfth

1369 (4) From and after October 1, 1996, all circuit and chancery

1370 court reporters will be employees of the Administrative Office of

1371 Courts.

1372 (5) No circuit or chancery court reporter shall be entitled

1373 to any compensation for any special or extended term of court

1374 after passage of this section.

1375 (6) No chancery or circuit court reporter shall practice law

1376 in the court within which he or she is the court reporter.

- 1377 (7) For all travel required in the performance of official 1378 duties, the circuit or chancery court reporter shall be paid mileage by the county in which the duties were performed at the 1379 1380 same rate as provided for state employees in Section 25-3-41. 1381 court reporter shall file in the office of the clerk of the court 1382 which he serves a certificate of mileage expense incurred during that term and payment of such expense to the court reporter shall 1383 be paid on allowance by the judge of such court. 1384
- SECTION 10. Section 19-25-31, Mississippi Code of 1972, is amended as follows:
- 1387 19-25-31. Each judge of a circuit, chancery or county court, or a court of eminent domain * * *, in the judge's discretion, by 1388 1389 order entered on the minutes of the court, may allow the sheriff riding bailiffs to serve in the respective court of such judge, 1390 not to exceed four (4) bailiffs. Any such person so employed 1391 shall be paid by the county on allowances of the court on issuance 1392 of a warrant therefor in an amount of Seventy Dollars (\$70.00) for 1393 1394 each day, or part thereof, for which he serves as bailiff when the court is in session. No full-time deputy sheriff shall be paid as 1395 1396 a riding bailiff of any court. County court judges shall be limited to one (1) bailiff per each court day. 1397
- SECTION 11. Section 23-15-225, Mississippi Code of 1972, is amended as follows:
- 1400 23-15-225. (1) The registrar shall be entitled to such 1401 compensation, payable monthly out of the county treasury, which 1402 the board of supervisors of the county shall allow on an annual 1403 basis in the following amounts:
