SENATE BILL NO. 2639

AN ACT TO AMEND SECTION 41-23-37, MISSISSIPPI CODE OF 1972, 1 TO CLARIFY REQUIREMENTS FOR THE IMMUNIZATION OF SCHOOL CHILDREN 2 ENTERING MIDDLE SCHOOL AND TO PROVIDE THAT IT IS UNLAWFUL FOR A 3 CHILD TO ATTEND MIDDLE SCHOOL WITHOUT PROPER IMMUNIZATION; AND FOR 4 5 RELATED PURPOSES.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MISSISSIPPI: 6 7 SECTION 1. Section 41-23-37, Mississippi Code of 1972, is amended as follows: 8

41-23-37. Whenever indicated, the State Health Officer shall 9 specify such immunization practices as may be considered best for 10 11 the control of vaccine preventable diseases. A listing shall be 12 promulgated annually or more often, if necessary.

13 Except as provided hereinafter, it shall be unlawful for any 14 child to attend any school, kindergarten or similar type facility intended for the instruction of children (hereinafter called 15 "schools"), either public or private, with the exception of any 16 17 legitimate home instruction program as defined in Section 37-13-91, Mississippi Code of 1972, for ten (10) or less children 18 who are related within the third degree computed according to the 19 20 civil law to the operator, unless they shall first have been vaccinated against those diseases specified by the State Health 21 Officer, as hereinafter provided: The State Department of Health 22 23 shall promulgate rules and regulations governing the immunization against poliomyelitis, rubella, rubeola, mumps, tetanus, 24 pertussis, diphtheria and hepatitis B, to be required of children 25 entering middle school, including public, private, parochial or 26 parish schools. Such rules and regulations may modify the 27 immunizations that are required of children in this subsection. 28 *SS01/R991* S. B. No. 2639

29 The immunizations required and the manner and frequency of their 30 administration shall conform to recognized standards of medical practice. The State Department of Health shall supervise and 31 32 secure the enforcement of the required immunization program. It 33 is unlawful for any student to attend school unless he or she has 34 been immunized as required under this section pursuant to the rules and regulations of the State Department of Health, and can 35 provide satisfactory evidence of such immunization; except that if 36 he or she produces satisfactory evidence of having begun the 37 process of immunization, he or she may continue to attend school 38 39 as long as the immunization process is being accomplished in the prescribed manner. It is unlawful for any parent or guardian to 40 41 refuse or neglect to have his or her child immunized as required by this section, unless the child is properly exempted. This 42 section shall not apply to any child if one (1) parent or guardian 43 objects in writing to his or her school administrator against the 44 immunization of the child, because of religious beliefs or medical 45 46 contraindications. In cases where any such objection is for reasons of medical contraindications, a statement from a duly 47 48 licensed physician must also be provided to the school administrator. Each school superintendent, whether of a public, 49 50 private, parochial or parish school, shall cause to be prepared a record showing the immunization status of every child enrolled in 51 or attending a school under his or her jurisdiction. The name of 52 53 any parent or guardian who neglects or refuses to permit a 54 nonexempted child to be immunized against diseases as required by 55 the rules and regulations promulgated pursuant to the provisions 56 of this section shall be reported by the school superintendent to the State Department of Health. The immunization required may be 57 done by any duly licensed physician or by someone under his or her 58 59 direction. If the parent or guardian is unable to pay, the child shall be immunized at public expense by a physician or nurse at or 60 61 from the county, district, city public health center or a school *SS01/R991* S. 62 nurse or by a nurse or physician in the private office or clinic 63 of the child's personal physician with the costs of immunization 64 paid through the state Medicaid program, private insurance or in a 65 manner to be determined by the State Department of Health subject 66 to state and federal appropriations and after consultation with the school superintendent. Funds for the administration of this 67 section and for the purchase of vaccines for children of families 68 69 unable to afford them shall be appropriated by the Legislature to 70 the State Department of Health from available federal or other 71 funds.

A certificate of exemption from vaccination for medical reasons may be offered on behalf of a child by a duly licensed physician and may be accepted by the local health officer when, in his opinion, such exemption will not cause undue risk to the community.

77 Certificates of vaccination shall be issued by local health 78 officers or physicians on forms specified by the Mississippi State 79 Board of Health. These forms shall be the only acceptable means 80 for showing compliance with these immunization requirements, and 81 the responsible school officials shall file the form with the 82 child's record.

If a child shall offer to enroll at a school without having completed the required vaccinations, the local health officer may grant a period of time up to ninety (90) days for such completion when, in the opinion of the health officer, such delay will not cause undue risk to the child, the school or the community. No child shall be enrolled without having had at least one (1) dose of each specified vaccine.

90 Within thirty (30) days after the opening of the fall term of 91 school (on or before October 1 of each year) the person in charge 92 of each school shall report to the county or local health officer, 93 on forms provided by the Mississippi State Board of Health, the 94 number of children enrolled by age or grade or both, the number 5. 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95 fully vaccinated, the number in process of completing vaccination 96 requirements, and the number exempt from vaccination by reason for 97 such exemption.

98 Within one hundred twenty (120) days after the opening of the 99 fall term (on or before December 31), the person in charge of each 100 school shall certify to the local or county health officer that 101 all children enrolled are in compliance with immunization 102 requirements.

For the purpose of assisting in supervising the immunization status of the children the local health officer, or his designee, may inspect the children's records or be furnished certificates of immunization compliance by the school.

107 It shall be the responsibility of the person in charge of 108 each school to enforce the requirements for immunization. Any 109 child not in compliance at the end of ninety (90) days from the 110 opening of the fall term must be suspended until in compliance, 111 unless the health officer shall attribute the delay to lack of 112 supply of vaccine or some other such factor clearly making 113 compliance impossible.

Failure to enforce provisions of this act shall constitute a misdemeanor and upon conviction be punishable by fine or imprisonment or both.

SECTION 2. Section 41-23-37, Mississippi Code of 1972, is amended as follows:

119 41-23-37. Whenever indicated, the State Health Officer shall 120 specify such immunization practices as may be considered best for 121 the control of vaccine preventable diseases. A listing shall be 122 promulgated annually or more often, if necessary.

Except as provided hereinafter, it shall be unlawful for any child to attend any school, kindergarten or similar type facility intended for the instruction of children (hereinafter called "schools"), either public or private, with the exception of any legitimate home instruction program as defined in Section S. A certificate of exemption from vaccination for medical reasons may be offered on behalf of a child by a duly licensed physician and may be accepted by the local health officer when, in his opinion, such exemption will not cause undue risk to the community.

Certificates of vaccination shall be issued by local health officers or physicians on forms specified by the Mississippi State Board of Health. These forms shall be the only acceptable means for showing compliance with these immunization requirements, and the responsible school officials shall file the form with the child's record.

168 It shall be the responsibility of the person in charge of 169 each school to enforce the requirements for immunization. Failure to enforce provisions of this act shall constitute a misdemeanor and upon conviction be punishable by fine or imprisonment or both.

178 SECTION 3. This act shall take effect and be in force from 179 and after July 1, 2001.
