- 45 of Forty-seven Thousand Eight Hundred Sixty-eight Dollars
- 46 (\$47,868.00);
- 47 (c) For counties having a total assessed valuation of
- 48 at least Thirty-five Million Dollars (\$35,000,000.00) but less
- 49 than Seventy-five Million Dollars (\$75,000,000.00), a salary of
- 50 Forty-four Thousand Five Hundred Eighty-four Dollars (\$44,584.00);
- 51 (d) For counties having a total assessed valuation of
- 52 at least Twenty Million Dollars (\$20,000,000.00) but less than
- 53 Thirty-five Million Dollars (\$35,000,000.00), a salary of
- 54 Forty-one Thousand Two Hundred Forty-five Dollars (\$41,245.00);
- (e) For counties having a total assessed valuation of

- The annual salary established for the assessor-tax collector
- 65 shall not be reduced as a result of a reduction in total assessed
- 66 valuation. The salaries may be increased as a result of an
- 67 increase in total assessed valuation.

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          In addition to all other compensation paid to assessor-tax
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     collectors in counties having two (2) judicial districts, the
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     board of supervisors shall allow that * * * assessor-tax collector
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     be paid an additional Three Thousand Five Hundred Dollars
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     ($3,500.00) per year. In addition to all other compensation paid
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     to assessors or tax collectors, in counties maintaining two (2)
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     full-time offices, the board of supervisors may allow that * * *
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     assessor or tax collector be paid an additional Three Thousand
     Five Hundred Dollars ($3,500.00) per year.
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          In addition to all other compensation paid to assessor-tax
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     collectors, the board of supervisors of a county shall allow for
     such assessor-tax collector to be paid additional compensation
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     when there is a contract between the county and one or more
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     municipalities providing that the assessor-tax collector shall
     assess and/or collect taxes for the municipality or
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     municipalities; and such assessor-tax collector shall be
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     authorized to receive such additional compensation from the county
     and/or the municipality or municipalities in any amount allowed by
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     the county and the municipality or municipalities for performing
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     those services.
          When any tax assessor holds a valid certificate of
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     educational recognition from the International Association of
     Assessing Officers or is a licensed appraiser under Section
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     73-34-1 et seq., he shall receive an additional One Thousand Five
     Hundred Dollars ($1,500.00) annually beginning the next fiscal
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     year after completion. When any tax assessor is a licensed state
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     certified Residential Appraiser (RA) or licensed state certified
     Timberland Appraiser (TA) under Section 73-34-1 et seq., or when
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     any tax assessor holds a valid designation from the International
     Association of Assessing Officers as a Cadastral Mapping
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     Specialist (CMS) or Personal Property Specialist (PPS) or
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     Residential Evaluation Specialist (RES), he shall receive an
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     additional Six Thousand Five Hundred Dollars ($6,500.00) annually
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- 101 beginning the next fiscal year after completion. When any tax

- 113 monthly on the first day of each calendar month by chancery

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     board of supervisors shall allow that * * * assessor or tax
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collector be paid an additional Three Thousand Five Hundred

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     Dollars ($3,500.00) per year. In addition to all other
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     compensation paid to assessors or tax collectors, in counties
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     maintaining two (2) full-time offices, the board of supervisors
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     may allow that * * * assessor or tax collector be paid an
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     additional Three Thousand Five Hundred Dollars ($3,500.00) per
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     year.
          In addition to all other compensation paid to tax assessors

- 231 Hundred Seventy Dollars (\$23,870.00).
- 232 (d) For counties with a total population of more than
- 233 thirty-five thousand (35,000) and not more than fifty thousand
- 234 (50,000), a salary not to exceed Twenty-two Thousand Four Hundred
- 235 Forty Dollars (\$22,440.00).
- (e) For counties with a total population of more than
- 237 twenty-five thousand (25,000) and not more than thirty-five
- 238 thousand (35,000), a salary not to exceed <a href="Twenty-one Thousand Two">Twenty-one Thousand Two</a>
- 239 Hundred Thirty Dollars (\$21,230.00).
- 240 (f) For counties with a total population of more than
- 241 fifteen thousand (15,000) and not more than twenty-five thousand
- 242 (25,000), a salary not to exceed Nineteen Thousand Four Hundred
- 243 Seventy Dollars (\$19,470.00).
- 244 (g) For counties with a total population of more than
- ten thousand (10,000) and not more than fifteen thousand (15,000),
- 246 a salary not to exceed Seventeen Thousand Seven Hundred Ten
- 247 Dollars (\$17,710.00).
- 248 (h) For counties with a total population of more than
- 249 six thousand (6,000) and not more than ten thousand (10,000), a
- 250 salary not to exceed Fifteen Thousand Nine Hundred Fifty Dollars
- 251 (\$15,950.00).
- 252 (i) For counties with a total population of six
- 253 thousand (6,000) or less, the board of supervisors, in its
- 254 discretion, may appoint a county prosecuting attorney, and it may
- 255 pay such county prosecuting attorney an annual salary not to
- 256 exceed Fourteen Thousand One Hundred Ninety Dollars (\$14,190.00).
- In all cases of conviction there shall be taxed against the
- 258 convicted defendant, as an item of cost, the sum of Three Dollars
- 259 (\$3.00), which shall be turned in to the county treasury as a part
- of the general county funds; however, the Three Dollars (\$3.00)
- 261 shall not be taxed in any case in which it is not the specific
- 262 duty of the county attorney to appear and prosecute.

- 271 In any county bordering upon the Mississippi River (a) and having a population of not less than thirty thousand (30,000) 272 273 and not more than thirty-five thousand five hundred (35,500) 274 according to the federal census of 1990, and in counties having a 275 population of not more than thirty-seven thousand (37,000) 276 according to the federal census of 1990 in which Interstate 277 Highway 55 and U.S. Highway 98 intersect, the county prosecuting 278 attorney shall receive a salary equal to the justice court judge 279 of such county; and in any county wherein is located the state's 280 oldest state-supported institution of higher learning and wherein Mississippi State Highways 7 and 6 intersect, the county 281 282 prosecuting attorney shall receive an annual salary equal to that 283 of a member of the board of supervisors of such county.
- 284 In counties having a population in excess of fifty 285 thousand (50,000) in the 1960 federal census, wherein is located a state-supported university and in which U.S. Highways 49 and 11 286 287 intersect, the salary of the county prosecuting attorney shall be 288 not less than Seventeen Thousand Four Hundred Dollars (\$17,400.00) 289 per year. The Board of Supervisors of Forrest County, 290 Mississippi, may, in its discretion, and by agreement with the county prosecuting attorney, employ the county prosecuting 291 292 attorney as a full-time elected official during his/her term of 293 office, designate additional duties and responsibilities of the 294 office and pay additional compensation up to, but not in excess 295 of, ninety percent (90%) of the annual compensation and salary of \*SS26/R918\* S. B. No. 2672

- the county court judge and the youth court judge of Forrest County 297 as authorized by law and provide a reasonable office and 298 reasonable office expenses to the county prosecuting attorney. 299 The salary authorized by this paragraph (b) for the county 300 prosecuting attorney shall be the sole and complete salary for
- 301 such prosecuting attorney in each county to which this paragraph
- 302 applies, notwithstanding any other provision of law to the 303 contrary.
- 304 In any county wherein is housed the seat of state government, wherein U.S. Highways 80 and 49 intersect, and having 305 306 two (2) judicial districts, the board of supervisors, in its 307 discretion, may pay the county prosecuting attorney an annual 308 salary equal to the annual salary of members of the board of 309 supervisors in the county.
- 310 In any county which has two (2) judicial districts (d) and wherein Highway 8 and Highway 15 intersect, having a 311 312 population of greater than seventeen thousand (17,000), according 313 to the 1980 federal decennial census, the board of supervisors shall pay the county prosecuting attorney a salary equal to that 314 of a member of the board of supervisors of such county; provided 315 316 that if such county prosecuting attorney is paid a sum for the 317 purpose of defraying office or secretarial expenses, then the 318 salary prescribed herein shall be reduced by that amount.
- In any county bordering the State of Tennessee and 319 320 in which Mississippi Highways No. 4 and 15 intersect, and having a population of less than twenty thousand (20,000) in the 1970 321 322 federal census, the salary of the county prosecuting attorney 323 shall be no less than Six Thousand Dollars (\$6,000.00).
- 324 In any county having a population of more than 325 twenty-five thousand (25,000) and in which U.S. Highways 72 and 45 326 intersect, the salary of the county attorney shall be paid not 327 less than Eight Thousand Dollars (\$8,000.00).

In addition, such county prosecuting attorney shall receive the sum of One Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$1,500.00) per month for the purpose of defraying secretarial expense.

331 (g) In any county wherein I-20 and State Highway 15
332 intersect; and in any county wherein I-20 and State Highway 35
333 intersect, the salary of the county prosecuting attorney shall be
334 not less than Eight Thousand Four Hundred Dollars (\$8,400.00).

(h) In any Class 1 county bordering on the Mississippi River, lying in whole or in part within a levee district, wherein U.S. Highways 82 and 61 intersect, bounded by the Sunflower River and Stales Bayou, the board of supervisors, in its discretion, may pay an annual salary equal to the annual salary of members of the board of supervisors in the county. In addition, such county prosecuting attorney shall receive the sum of One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00) per month for the purpose of defraying secretarial expenses.

In any county bordering on the Gulf of Mexico (i) having two (2) judicial districts, and wherein U.S. Highways 90 and 49 intersect, the salary of the county prosecuting attorney shall be not less than Nineteen Thousand Dollars (\$19,000.00) per year. The Board of Supervisors of Harrison County, Mississippi, may, in its discretion, and by agreement with the county prosecuting attorney, employ the county prosecuting attorney and his/her assistant during his/her term of office, and designate additional duties and responsibilities of the office and pay additional compensation up to, but not in excess of, ninety percent (90%) of the annual compensation and salary of the county court judges of Harrison County as authorized by law and provide adequate office space and reasonable office expenses to the county prosecuting attorney and his/her assistant. The salary authorized by this paragraph (i) for the county prosecuting attorney and his/her assistant shall be the sole and complete salary paid by the county for such prosecuting attorney and his/her assistant in

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- each county to which this paragraph applies, notwithstanding any other provision of law to the contrary.
- 363 (j) In any county bordering on the State of Alabama,
- 364 having a population in excess of seventy-five thousand (75,000)
- 365 according to the 1980 decennial census in which is located an
- 366 institution of higher learning and a United States military
- 367 installation and which is traversed by an interstate highway, the
- 368 salary of the county prosecuting attorney shall not be less than
- 369 Twelve Thousand Dollars (\$12,000.00) nor more than the amount of
- 370 the annual salary received by a member of the board of supervisors
- 371 of that county.
- 372 (k) In any county with a land area wherein Mississippi
- 373 Highways 8 and 9 intersect, the salary of the county prosecuting
- 374 attorney shall be not less than Eight Thousand Five Hundred
- 375 Dollars (\$8,500.00) per year.
- 376 (1) In any Class 2 county wherein Mississippi Highways
- 377 6 and 3 intersect, the salary of the county prosecuting attorney
- 378 shall be not less than Twelve Thousand Dollars (\$12,000.00) per
- 379 year nor more than the amount of the annual salary received by a
- 380 member of the board of supervisors of that county.
- 381 (m) In any county wherein Interstate Highway 55 and
- 382 State Highway 8 intersect, the salary of the county prosecuting
- 383 attorney shall be not less than Twelve Thousand Dollars
- 384 (\$12,000.00) per year.
- 385 (n) In any county wherein U.S. Highway 51 intersects
- 386 Mississippi Highway 6, and having two (2) judicial districts, the
- 387 salary of the county prosecuting attorney shall be not less than
- 388 Three Thousand Six Hundred Dollars (\$3,600.00) per year.
- 389 (o) In any county bordering on the Alabama state line,
- 390 having a population of greater than fifteen thousand (15,000)
- 391 according to the 1970 federal decennial census, wherein U.S.
- 392 Highway 45 and Mississippi Highway 18 intersect, the salary of the
- 393 county prosecuting attorney shall be not less than Three Thousand

- 394 Six Hundred Dollars (\$3,600.00) nor greater than that of a member
- 395 of the board of supervisors of such county. All prior acts,
- 396 orders and resolutions of the board of supervisors of such county
- 397 which authorized the payment of the salary in conformity with the
- 398 provisions of this paragraph, whether or not heretofore
- 399 specifically authorized by law are hereby ratified, approved and
- 400 confirmed.
- 401 (p) In any county wherein is located a state-supported
- 402 institution of higher learning and wherein U.S. Highway 82 and
- 403 Mississippi Highway 389 intersect, the board of supervisors, in
- 404 its discretion, may pay the county prosecuting attorney an annual
- 405 salary equal to the annual salary of members of the board of
- 406 supervisors in the county.
- 407 (q) In any county having two (2) judicial districts
- 408 wherein Mississippi Highway 32 intersects U.S. Highway 49E, the
- 409 salary of the county prosecuting attorney shall be not less than
- 410 Twelve Thousand Seven Hundred Dollars (\$12,700.00).
- 411 (r) In any county traversed by the Natchez Trace
- 412 Parkway wherein U.S. Highway 45 and Mississippi Highway 4
- 413 intersect, the board of supervisors, in its discretion, may pay
- 414 the county prosecuting attorney an annual salary equal to the
- 415 annual salary of justice court judges in the county.
- 416 (s) In any county having a population of more than
- 417 fourteen thousand (14,000) according to the 1970 census and which
- 418 county is bordered on the north by the State of Tennessee and on
- 419 the east by the State of Alabama and in which U.S. Highway No. 72
- 420 and Highway No. 25 intersect, the board of supervisors, in its

- 1241 (j) Death of a child under the age of two (2) years
- 1242 where death results from an unknown cause or where the

1243 circumstances surrounding the death indicate that sudden infant 1244 death syndrome may be the cause of death.

- 1245 (k) Where a body is brought into this state for
  1246 disposal and there is reason to believe either that the death was
  1247 not investigated properly or that there is not an adequate
  1248 certificate of death.
- 1249 (1) Where a person is presented to a hospital emergency 1250 room unconscious and/or unresponsive, with cardiopulmonary resuscitative measures being performed, and dies within 1251 twenty-four (24) hours of admission without regaining 1252 1253 consciousness or responsiveness, unless a physician was in attendance within thirty-six (36) hours preceding presentation to 1254 1255 the hospital, or in cases in which the decedent had a prediagnosed 1256 terminal or bedfast condition, unless a physician was in attendance within thirty (30) days preceding presentation to the 1257 hospital. 1258
- 1259 The State Medical Examiner is empowered to investigate 1260 deaths, under the authority hereinafter conferred, in any and all political subdivisions of the state. - 1320 of Courts. In addition, any court reporter performing the duties
- 1321 of a court administrator in the same judicial district in which
- 1322 the person is employed as a court reporter may be paid additional
- 1323 compensation for performing the court administrator duties. The
- 1324 annual amount of the additional compensation shall be set by vote
- 1325 of the judges and chancellors for whom the court administrator
- 1326 duties are performed, with consideration given to the number of
- 1327 hours per month devoted by the court reporter to performing the
- 1328 duties of a court administrator. The additional compensation
- 1329 shall be submitted to the Administrative Office of Courts for
- 1330 approval.
- 1331 (2) The several counties in each respective court district
- 1332 shall transfer from the general funds of those county treasuries
- 1333 to the Administrative Office of Courts a proportionate amount to
- 1334 be paid toward the annual compensation of the court reporter,
- 1335 including any additional compensation paid for the performance of
- 1336 court administrator duties. The amount to be paid by each county
- 1337 shall be determined by the number of weeks in which court is held
- 1338 in each county in proportion to the total number of weeks court is
- 1339 held in the district. For purposes of this section, the term
- 1340 "compensation" means the gross salary plus all amounts paid for
- 1341 benefits, or otherwise, as a result of employment or as required

- 1342 by employment, but does not include transcript fees otherwise
- 1343 authorized to be paid by or through the counties. However, only
- 1344 salary earned for services rendered shall be reported and credited
- 1345 for retirement purposes. Amounts paid for transcript fees,
- 1346 benefits or otherwise, including reimbursement for travel
- 1347 expenses, shall not be reported or credited for retirement
- 1348 purposes.
- For example, if there are thirty-eight (38) scheduled court
- 1350 weeks in a particular district, a county in which court is
- 1351 scheduled five (5) weeks out of the year would have to pay
- 1352 five-thirty-eighths (5/38) of the total annual compensation.
- 1353 (3) The salary and any additional compensation for the
- 1354 performance of court administrator duties shall be paid in twelve
- 1355 (12) installments on the last working day of each month after it
- 1356 has been duly authorized by the appointing judge or chancellor and
- 1357 an order duly placed on the minutes of the court. Each county
- 1358 shall transfer to the Administrative Office of Courts one-twelfth
- 1359 (1/12) of the amount required to be paid pursuant to subsection
- 1360 (2) of this section by the twentieth day of each month for the
- 1361 salary that is to be paid on the last working day of the month.
- 1362 The Administrative Office of Courts shall pay to the court
- 1363 reporter the total amount of salary due for that month. Any
- 1364 county may pay, in the discretion of the board of supervisors, by
- 1365 the twentieth day of January of any year, the amount due for a
- 1366 full twelve (12) months.
- 1367 (4) From and after October 1, 1996, all circuit and chancery
- 1368 court reporters will be employees of the Administrative Office of
- 1369 Courts.
- 1370 (5) No circuit or chancery court reporter shall be entitled
- 1371 to any compensation for any special or extended term of court
- 1372 after passage of this section.
- 1373 (6) No chancery or circuit court reporter shall practice law
- 1374 in the court within which he or she is the court reporter.

- (7) For all travel required in the performance of official duties, the circuit or chancery court reporter shall be paid mileage by the county in which the duties were performed at the same rate as provided for state employees in Section 25-3-41. The court reporter shall file in the office of the clerk of the court which he serves a certificate of mileage expense incurred during that term and payment of such expense to the court reporter shall
- SECTION 10. Section 19-25-31, Mississippi Code of 1972, is amended as follows:

be paid on allowance by the judge of such court.

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- 1385 19-25-31. Each judge of a circuit, chancery or county court, 1386 or a court of eminent domain may, in the judge's discretion, by 1387 order entered on the minutes of the court, allow the sheriff 1388 riding bailiffs to serve in the respective court of such judge, not to exceed four (4) bailiffs. Any such person so employed 1389 shall be paid by the county on allowances of the court on issuance 1390 of a warrant therefor in an amount of Seventy Dollars (\$70.00) for 1391 1392 each day, or part thereof, for which he serves as bailiff when the court is in session. No full-time deputy sheriff shall be paid as 1393 1394 a riding bailiff of any court. County court judges shall be limited to one (1) bailiff per each court day. 1395
- SECTION 11. Section 23-15-225, Mississippi Code of 1972, is amended as follows:
- 23-15-225. (1) The registrar shall be entitled to such compensation, payable monthly out of the county treasury, which the board of supervisors of the county shall allow on an annual basis in the following amounts:
- 1402 (a) For counties with a total population of more than

  1405 than Ten Thousand One Hundred Twenty Dollars (\$10,120.00).
- 1406 (b) For counties with a total population of more than

  1407 one hundred thousand (100,000) and not more than two hundred

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- 1408 thousand (200,000), an amount not to exceed Twenty-seven Thousand
- 1409 Eight Hundred Thirty Dollars (\$27,830.00), but not less than Ten
- 1410 Thousand One Hundred Twenty Dollars (\$10,120.00).
- 1411 (c) For counties with a total population of more than
- 1412 fifty thousand (50,000) and not more than one hundred thousand
- 1413 (100,000), an amount not to exceed Twenty-five Thousand Three
- 1414 Hundred Dollars (\$25,300.00), but not less than Ten Thousand One
- 1415 <u>Hundred Twenty Dollars (\$10,120.00)</u>.
- 1416 (d) For counties with a total population of more than
- 1417 thirty-five thousand (35,000) and not more than fifty thousand
- 1418 (50,000), an amount not to exceed Twenty-two Thousand Seven
- 1419 <u>Hundred Seventy Dollars (\$22,770.00)</u>, but not less than <u>Ten</u>
- 1420 Thousand One Hundred Twenty Dollars (\$10,120.00).
- 1421 (e) For counties with a total population of more than
- 1422 twenty-five thousand (25,000) and not more than thirty-five
- 1423 thousand (35,000), an amount not to exceed Twenty Thousand Two
- 1424 Hundred Forty Dollars (\$20,240.00), but not less than Ten Thousand
- 1425 One Hundred Twenty Dollars (\$10,120.00).
- 1426 (f) For counties with a total population of more than
- 1427 fifteen thousand (15,000) and not more than twenty-five thousand
- 1428 (25,000), an amount not to exceed Seventeen Thousand Seven Hundred
- 1429 Ten Dollars (\$17,710.00), but not less than Ten Thousand One
- 1430 Hundred Twenty Dollars (\$10,120.00).
- 1431 (g) For counties with a total population of more than
- 1432 ten thousand (10,000) and not more than fifteen thousand (15,000),
- 1433 an amount not to exceed Fifteen Thousand One Hundred Eighty
- 1434 Dollars (\$15,180.00), but not less than Eight Thousand Eight
- 1435 Hundred Fifty-five Dollars (\$8,855.00).
- 1436 (h) For counties with a total population of more than
- 1437 six thousand (6,000) and not more than ten thousand (10,000), an
- 1438 amount not to exceed Twelve Thousand Six Hundred Fifty Dollars
- 1439 (\$12,650.00), but not less than Eight Thousand Eight Hundred
- 1440 <u>Fifty-five Dollars (\$8,855.00)</u>.

- 1441 (i) For counties with a total population of not more
  1442 than six thousand (6,000), an amount not to exceed <u>Ten Thousand</u>
  1443 <u>One Hundred Twenty Dollars (\$10,120.00)</u>, but not less than <u>Six</u>
  1444 <u>Thousand Nine Hundred Fifty-eight Dollars (\$6,958.00)</u>.
- 1445 (j) For counties having two (2) judicial districts, the 1446 board of supervisors of the county may allow, in addition to the 1447 sums prescribed herein, in its discretion, an amount not to exceed 1448 Twelve Thousand Six Hundred Fifty Dollars (\$12,650.00).
- (2) In the event of a reregistration within such county, or a redistricting which necessitates the hiring of additional deputy registrars, the board of supervisors may by contract compensate the county registrar amounts in addition to the sums prescribed in this section, in its discretion.
- 1454 (3) As compensation for their services in assisting the county election commissioners in performance of their duties in 1455 1456 the revision of the registration books and the pollbooks of the 1457 several voting precincts of the several counties and in assisting 1458 the election commissioners, executive committees or boards of supervisors in connection with any election, the registrar shall 1459 1460 receive the same daily per diem and limitation on meeting days as provided for the board of election commissioners as set out in 1461 1462 Sections 23-15-153 and 23-15-227 to be paid from the general fund 1463 of the county.
- 1464 (4) In any case where an amount has been allowed by the
  1465 board of supervisors pursuant to this section, such amount shall
  1466 not be reduced or terminated during the term for which the
  1467 registrar was elected.
- 1468 (5) The circuit clerk shall, in addition to any other
  1469 compensation provided for by law, be entitled to receive as
  1470 compensation from the board of supervisors the amount of Two
  1471 Thousand Dollars (\$2,000.00) per year. This payment shall be for
  1472 the performance of his duties in regard to the conduct of
  1473 elections and the performance of his other duties.

- 1474 (6) The municipal clerk shall, in addition to any other
  1475 compensation for performance of duties, be eligible to receive as
  1476 compensation from the municipality's governing authorities a
  1477 reasonable amount of additional compensation for reimbursement of
  1478 costs and for additional duties associated with mail-in
  1479 registration of voters.
- 1480 (7) The board of supervisors shall not allow any additional compensation authorized under this section for services as county registrar to any circuit clerk who is receiving fees as compensation for his services equal to the limitation on compensation prescribed in Section 9-1-43.
- SECTION 12. The Attorney General of the State of Mississippi shall submit this act, immediately upon approval by the Governor, or upon approval by the Legislature subsequent to a veto, to the Attorney General of the United States or to the United States

  District Court for the District of Columbia in accordance with the provisions of the Voting Rights Act of 1965, as amended and extended.
- SECTION 13. This act shall take effect and be in force from 1492 1493 and after October 1, 2001, if it is effectuated on or before that date under Section 5 of the voting Rights Act of 1965, as amended 1494 1495 and extended. If it is effectuated under Section 5 of the Voting Rights Act of 1965, as amended and extended, after October 1, 1496 1497 2001, this act shall take effect and be in force from and after 1498 the date it is effectuated under Section 5 of the Voting Rights 1499 Act of 1965, as amended and extended.
