HOUSE BILL NO. 1424

- AN ACT TO AMEND SECTION 41-79-5, MISSISSIPPI CODE OF 1972, TO REQUIRE ALL PUBLIC SCHOOLS TO EMPLOY A SCHOOL NURSE BEGINNING IN
- 3 THE 2002-2003 SCHOOL YEAR AND TO PROVIDE THAT THE SCHOOL NURSE
- 4 PROGRAM WILL BE FUNDED FROM MONIES APPROPRIATED FROM THE HEALTH
- 5 CARE EXPENDABLE FUND; AND FOR RELATED PURPOSES.
- BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MISSISSIPPI:
- 7 **SECTION 1.** Section 41-79-5, Mississippi Code of 1972, is
- 8 amended as follows:
- 9 41-79-5. (1) There is * * * established * * * a school
- 10 nurse * * * program in all public school districts in the state.
- 11 (2) Beginning in the 2002-2003 school year * * *, each
- 12 public school * * * shall employ a school nurse, to be known as a
- 13 Health Service Coordinator * * *. The school nurse * * * shall
- 14 offer any of the following specific preventive services, and other
- 15 additional services appropriate to each grade level and the age
- 16 and maturity of the pupils:
- 17 (a) Reproductive health education and referral to
- 18 prevent teen pregnancy and sexually transmitted diseases, which
- 19 education shall include abstinence;
- 20 (b) Child abuse and neglect identification;
- 21 (c) Hearing and vision screening to detect problems
- 22 which can lead to serious sensory losses and behavioral and
- 23 academic problems;
- 24 (d) Alcohol, tobacco and drug abuse education to reduce
- 25 abuse of these substances;
- 26 (e) Scoliosis screening to detect this condition so
- 27 that costly and painful surgery and lifelong disability can be
- 28 prevented;

- 29 (f) Coordination of services for handicapped children
- 30 to ensure that these children receive appropriate medical
- 31 assistance and are able to remain in public school;
- 32 (g) Nutrition education and counseling to prevent
- 33 obesity and/or other eating disorders which may lead to
- 34 life-threatening conditions, for example, hypertension;
- 35 (h) Early detection and treatment of head lice to
- 36 prevent the spread of the parasite and to reduce absenteeism;
- 37 (i) Emergency treatment of injury and illness to
- 38 include controlling bleeding, managing fractures, bruises or
- 39 contusions and cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR);
- 40 (j) Applying appropriate theory as the basis for
- 41 decision making in nursing practice;
- 42 (k) Establishing and maintaining a comprehensive school
- 43 health program;
- 44 (1) Developing individualized health plans;
- 45 (m) Assessing, planning, implementing and evaluating
- 46 programs and other school health activities, in collaboration with
- 47 other professionals;
- 48 (n) Providing health education to assist students,
- 49 families and groups to achieve optimal levels of wellness;
- 50 (o) Participating in peer review and other means of
- 51 evaluation to assure quality of nursing care provided for students
- 52 and assuming responsibility for continuing education and
- 53 professional development for self while contributing to the
- 54 professional growth of others;
- (p) Participating with other key members of the
- 56 community responsible for assessing, planning, implementing and
- 57 evaluating school health services and community services that
- 58 include the broad continuum or promotion of primary, secondary and
- 59 tertiary prevention; and
- 60 (q) Contributing to nursing and school health through
- 61 innovations in theory and practice and participation in research.

- 62 (3) Public school nurses <u>are</u> prohibited <u>specifically</u> from
 63 providing abortion counseling to any student or referring any
 64 student to abortion counseling or abortion clinics. Any violation
 65 of this subsection shall disqualify the school district employing
 66 such public school nurse from receiving any state administered
 67 funds under this section.
- (4) The school nurse program will be funded from monies
 appropriated to the State Department of Education from the Health
 Care Expendable Fund established under Section 43-13-407.
 - that federal or state funds are available therefor and pursuant to appropriation therefor by the Legislature, * * * the State

 Department of Health shall establish and implement a Prevention of Teen Pregnancy Pilot Program to be located in the public school districts with the highest numbers of teen pregnancies. The Teen Pregnancy Pilot Program shall provide, directly through public school nurses in the pilot school districts, health education sessions that target issues including reproductive health, teen pregnancy prevention and sexually transmitted diseases, including syphilis, HIV and AIDS. When these services are provided by a school nurse, training and counseling on abstinence shall be
- In addition to * * * the Teen Pregnancy Pilot Program (6) 84 funds administered under subsection (5), to the extent that 85 86 federal or state funds are available therefor and pursuant to appropriation therefor by the Legislature, the State Department of 87 88 Health shall establish and implement an Abstinence Education Pilot Program to provide abstinence education, mentoring, counseling and 89 adult supervision to promote abstinence from sexual activity, with 90 a focus on those groups which are most likely to bear children out 91 of wedlock. Such abstinence education services shall be provided 92 93 by the State Department of Health through its clinics, public health nurses, school nurses and through contracts with rural and 94

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included.

- 95 community health centers in order to reach a larger number of
- 96 targeted clients. For purposes of this subsection, the term
- 97 "abstinence education" means an educational or motivational
- 98 program which:
- 99 (a) Has as its exclusive purpose, teaching the social,
- 100 psychological and health gains to be realized by abstaining from
- 101 sexual activity;
- 102 (b) Teaches abstinence from sexual activity outside
- 103 marriage as the expected standard for all school-age children;
- 104 (c) Teaches that abstinence from sexual activity is the
- 105 only certain way to avoid out-of-wedlock pregnancy, sexually
- 106 transmitted diseases and other associated health problems;
- 107 (d) Teaches that a mutually faithful monogamous
- 108 relationship in context of marriage is the expected standard of
- 109 human sexual activity;
- 110 (e) Teaches that sexual activity outside of the context
- 111 of marriage is likely to have harmful psychological and physical
- 112 effects;
- 113 (f) Teaches that bearing children out of wedlock is
- 114 likely to have harmful consequences for the child, the child's
- 115 parents and society;
- 116 (g) Teaches young people how to reject sexual advances
- 117 and how alcohol and drug use increase vulnerability to sexual
- 118 advances; and
- (h) Teaches the importance of attaining
- 120 self-sufficiency before engaging in sexual activity.
- 121 (7) Beginning with the 2002-2003 school year * * *, in
- 122 addition to those funds allotted under the adequate education
- 123 program, each school district shall be allotted sufficient funding
- 124 for the purpose of employing qualified public school nurses in the
- 125 schools within that school district. * * *
- 126 (8) School nurses shall be employed by the local school
- 127 district and shall be designated as "health service coordinators,"

- and shall be required to possess a bachelor's degree in nursing as a minimum qualification.
- 130 (9) Upon each student's enrollment, the parent or guardian
- 131 shall be provided with information regarding the scope of the
- 132 school nurse * * * program. The parent or guardian may provide
- 133 the school administration with a written statement refusing all or
- 134 any part of the nursing service. No child shall be required to
- 135 undergo hearing and vision or scoliosis screening or any other
- 136 physical examination or tests whose parent objects thereto on the
- 137 grounds such screening, physical examination or tests are contrary
- 138 to his sincerely held religious beliefs.
- 139 (10) A consent form for reproductive health education shall
- 140 be sent to the parent or guardian of each student upon his
- 141 enrollment. If a response from the parent or guardian is not
- 142 received within seven (7) days after the consent form is sent, the
- 143 school shall send a letter to the student's home notifying the
- 144 parent or guardian of the consent form. If the parent or guardian
- 145 fails to respond to the letter within ten (10) days after it is
- 146 sent, then the school principal shall be authorized to allow the
- 147 student to receive reproductive health education. Reproductive
- 148 health education shall include the teaching of total abstinence
- 149 from premarital sex and, wherever practicable, reproductive health
- 150 education should be taught in classes divided according to gender.
- 151 All materials used in the reproductive health education program
- 152 shall be placed in a convenient and easily accessible location for
- 153 parental inspection. School nurses shall not dispense birth
- 154 control pills or contraceptive devices in the school. Dispensing
- 155 of such shall be the responsibility of the State Department of
- 156 Health on a referral basis only.
- 157 (11) No provision of this section shall be construed as
- 158 prohibiting local school districts from accepting financial
- 159 assistance of any type from the State of Mississippi or any other
- 160 governmental entity, or any contribution, donation, gift, decree

- or bequest from any source which may be utilized for
- 162 the employment of a school nurse * * * in a public school * * * of
- 163 this state.
- 164 SECTION 2. This act shall take effect and be in force from
- 165 and after July 1, 2002.
