HOUSE BILL NO. 1625

AN ACT TO AMEND SECTIONS 93-5-23 AND 93-11-65, MISSISSIPPI CODE OF 1972, TO REQUIRE THE PAYMENT OF CHILD SUPPORT TO BEGIN IMMEDIATELY UPON GRANTING AN ORDER OF CUSTODY; AND FOR RELATED PURPOSES.

5 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MISSISSIPPI:

6 **SECTION 1.** Section 93-5-23, Mississippi Code of 1972, is

7 amended as follows:

9 matrimony, the court may, in its discretion, having regard to the 10 circumstances of the parties and the nature of the case, as may 11 seem equitable and just, make all orders touching the care,

93-5-23. When a divorce shall be decreed from the bonds of

12 custody and maintenance of the children of the marriage, and also

13 touching the maintenance and alimony of the wife or the husband,

or any allowance to be made to her or him, and shall, if need be,

15 require bond, sureties or other guarantee for the payment of the

16 sum so allowed. Orders touching on the custody of the children of

17 the marriage shall be made in accordance with the provisions of

18 Section 93-5-24. The court may afterwards, on petition, change

19 the decree, and make from time to time such new decrees as the

20 case may require. However, where proof shows that both parents

21 have separate incomes or estates, the court may require that each

22 parent contribute to the support and maintenance of the children

23 of the marriage in proportion to the relative financial ability of

24 each. In the event a legally responsible parent has health

25 insurance available to him or her through an employer or

26 organization that may extend benefits to the dependents of such

27 parent, any order of support issued against such parent may

28 require him or her to exercise the option of additional coverage

in favor of such children as he or she is legally responsible to support.

Whenever the court has ordered a party to make periodic payments for the maintenance or support of a child, but no bond, sureties or other guarantee has been required to secure such payments, and whenever such payments as have become due remain unpaid for a period of at least thirty (30) days, the court may, upon petition of the person to whom such payments are owing, or such person's legal representative, enter an order requiring that bond, sureties or other security be given by the person obligated to make such payments, the amount and sufficiency of which shall be approved by the court. The obligor shall, as in other civil actions, be served with process and shall be entitled to a hearing in such case.

Whenever in any proceeding in the chancery court concerning the custody of a child a party alleges that the child whose custody is at issue has been the victim of sexual or physical abuse by the other party, the court may, on its own motion, grant a continuance in the custody proceeding only until such allegation has been investigated by the Department of Human Services. At the time of ordering such continuance the court may direct the party, and his attorney, making such allegation of child abuse to report in writing and provide all evidence touching on the allegation of abuse to the Department of Human Services. The Department of Human Services shall investigate such allegation and take such action as it deems appropriate and as provided in such cases under the Youth Court Law (being Chapter 21 of Title 43, Mississippi Code of 1972) or under the laws establishing family courts (being Chapter 23 of Title 43, Mississippi Code of 1972).

If after investigation by the Department of Human Services or final disposition by the youth court or family court allegations of child abuse are found to be without foundation, the chancery court shall order the alleging party to pay all court costs and

- 62 reasonable attorney's fees incurred by the defending party in
- 63 responding to such allegation.
- The court may investigate, hear and make a determination in a
- 65 custody action when a charge of abuse and/or neglect arises in the
- 66 course of a custody action as provided in Section 43-21-151, and
- 67 in such cases the court shall appoint a guardian ad litem for the
- 68 child as provided under Section 43-21-121, who shall be an
- 69 attorney. Unless the chancery court's jurisdiction has been
- 70 terminated, all disposition orders in such cases for placement
- 71 with the Department of Human Services shall be reviewed by the
- 72 court or designated authority at least annually to determine if
- 73 continued placement with the department is in the best interest of
- 74 the child or public.
- 75 The duty of support of a child terminates upon the
- 76 emancipation of the child. The court may determine that
- 77 emancipation has occurred and no other support obligation exists
- 78 when the child:
- 79 (a) Attains the age of twenty-one (21) years, or
- 80 (b) Marries, or
- 81 (c) Discontinues full-time enrollment in school and
- 82 obtains full-time employment prior to attaining the age of
- 83 twenty-one (21) years, or
- 84 (d) Voluntarily moves from the home of the custodial
- 85 parent or guardian and establishes independent living arrangements
- 86 and obtains full-time employment prior to attaining the age of
- 87 twenty-one (21) years.
- The payment of child support shall begin immediately upon the
- 89 granting of an order for custody, whether such order is temporary
- 90 or permanent.
- 91 **SECTION 2.** Section 93-11-65, Mississippi Code of 1972, is
- 92 amended as follows:
- 93 93-11-65. (1) (a) In addition to the right to proceed
- 94 under Section 93-5-23, Mississippi Code of 1972, and in addition

to the remedy of habeas corpus in proper cases, and other existing 95 remedies, the chancery court of the proper county shall have 96 jurisdiction to entertain suits for the custody, care, support and 97 98 maintenance of minor children and to hear and determine all such 99 matters, and shall, if need be, require bond, sureties or other 100 guarantee to secure any order for periodic payments for the maintenance or support of a child. In the event a legally 101 responsible parent has health insurance available to him or her 102 103 through an employer or organization that may extend benefits to the dependents of such parent, any order of support issued against 104 105 such parent may require him or her to exercise the option of additional coverage in favor of such children as he or she is 106 107 legally responsible to support. Proceedings may be brought by or against a resident or nonresident of the State of Mississippi, 108 whether or not having the actual custody of minor children, for 109 110 the purpose of judicially determining the legal custody of a child. All actions herein authorized may be brought in the county 111 112 where the child is actually residing, or in the county of the residence of the party who has actual custody, or of the residence 113 of the defendant. Process shall be had upon the parties as 114 provided by law for process in person or by publication, if they 115 116 be nonresidents of the state or residents of another jurisdiction 117 or are not found therein after diligent search and inquiry or are unknown after diligent search and inquiry; provided that the court 118 119 or chancellor in vacation may fix a date in termtime or in vacation to which process may be returnable and shall have power 120 to proceed in termtime or vacation. Provided, however, that if 121 the court shall find that both parties are fit and proper persons 122 to have custody of the children, and that either party is able to 123 adequately provide for the care and maintenance of the children, 124 and that it would be to the best interest and welfare of the 125 126 children, then any such child who shall have reached his twelfth

- 127 birthday shall have the privilege of choosing the parent with whom
- 128 he shall live.
- 129 (b) An order of child support shall specify the sum to
- 130 be paid weekly or otherwise. In addition to providing for support
- 131 and education, the order shall also provide for the support of the
- 132 child prior to the making of the order for child support, and such
- 133 other expenses as the court may deem proper.
- 134 (c) The court may require the payment to be made to the
- 135 custodial parent, or to some person or corporation to be
- 136 designated by the court as trustee, but if the child or custodial
- 137 parent is receiving public assistance, the Department of Human
- 138 Services shall be made the trustee.
- 139 (d) The noncustodial parent's liabilities for past
- 140 education and necessary support and maintenance and other expenses
- 141 are limited to a period of one (1) year next preceding the
- 142 commencement of an action.
- 143 (2) Provided further, that where the proof shows that both
- 144 parents have separate incomes or estates, the court may require
- 145 that each parent contribute to the support and maintenance of the
- 146 children in proportion to the relative financial ability of each.
- 147 (3) Whenever the court has ordered a party to make periodic
- 148 payments for the maintenance or support of a child, but no bond,
- 149 sureties or other guarantee has been required to secure such
- 150 payments, and whenever such payments as have become due remain
- 151 unpaid for a period of at least thirty (30) days, the court may,
- 152 upon petition of the person to whom such payments are owing, or
- 153 such person's legal representative, enter an order requiring that
- 154 bond, sureties or other security be given by the person obligated
- 155 to make such payments, the amount and sufficiency of which shall
- 156 be approved by the court. The obligor shall, as in other civil
- 157 actions, be served with process and shall be entitled to a hearing
- 158 in such case.

When a charge of abuse or neglect of a child first 159 arises in the course of a custody or maintenance action pending in 160 the chancery court pursuant to this section, the chancery court 161 162 may proceed with the investigation, hearing and determination of 163 such abuse or neglect charge as a part of its hearing and determination of the custody or maintenance issue as between the 164 parents, as provided in Section 43-21-151, notwithstanding the 165 other provisions of the Youth Court Law. The proceedings in 166 167 chancery court on the abuse or neglect charge shall be confidential in the same manner as provided in youth court 168 169 proceedings, and the chancery court shall appoint a guardian ad litem in such cases, as provided under Section 43-21-121 for youth 170 171 court proceedings, who shall be an attorney. Unless the chancery court's jurisdiction has been terminated, all disposition orders 172 in such cases for placement with the Department of Human Services 173 shall be reviewed by the court or designated authority at least 174 annually to determine if continued placement with the department 175 176 is in the best interest of the child or the public.

- Each party to a paternity or child support proceeding 177 178 shall notify the other within five (5) days after any change of In addition, the noncustodial and custodial parent shall 179 address. 180 file and update, with the court and with the state case registry, 181 information on that party's location and identity, including social security number, residential and mailing addresses, 182 183 telephone numbers, photograph, driver's license number, and name, address and telephone number of the party's employer. This 184 information shall be required upon entry of an order or within 185 five (5) days of a change of address. 186
- 187 (6) In any case subsequently enforced by the Department of
 188 Human Services pursuant to Title IV-D of the Social Security Act,
 189 the court shall have continuing jurisdiction.
- 190 (7) In any subsequent child support enforcement action

- 210 (9) Upon motion of a party requesting temporary child
- 211 support pending a determination of parentage, temporary support
- 212 shall be ordered if there is clear and convincing evidence of
- 213 paternity on the basis of genetic tests or other evidence, unless
- 214 the court makes written findings of fact on the record that the
- 215 award of temporary support would be unjust or inappropriate in a
- 216 particular case.
- 217 (10) The payment of child support shall begin immediately
- 218 upon the granting of an order for custody, whether such order is
- 219 temporary or permanent.
- 220 **SECTION 3.** This act shall take effect and be in force from
- 221 and after July 1, 2002.
