- 4 WHEREAS, Judge Joe Brown is a nationally acclaimed judge,
- 5 presiding in a nontraditional manner as judge of a syndicated
- 6 reality courtroom show entitled "Judge Joe Brown"; and
- 7 WHEREAS, born in Washington, D.C., the only child of
- 8 hard-working teachers, Judge Brown relocated to South Central Los
- 9 Angeles early in life, gaining and exhibiting the early philosophy
- 10 of tough-love; and
- 11 WHEREAS, Judge Brown, determined not to become another
- 12 statistic of the harsh inner city, modeled his parents, and chose
- 13 the avenue proffered by education, one surely to grant success and
- 14 opportunities; and
- WHEREAS, graduating at the top of his high school class,
- 16 Judge Brown entered the University of California, Los Angeles
- 17 (UCLA), paying his way through college by loading trucks and
- 18 digging ditches, and earning his bachelor's degree in political
- 19 science; and
- 20 WHEREAS, Judge Brown, upon completion of his undergraduate
- 21 studies, was accepted into UCLA's School of Law, earning his Juris
- 22 Doctorate in 1973; and
- WHEREAS, in 1974, Judge Brown moved to Memphis, Tennessee,
- 24 taking a legal service position with the Equal Employment
- 25 Opportunity Commission (EEOC), and later becoming the first
- 26 African-American Prosecutor for the City of Memphis; and

WHEREAS, after serving as Director of Memphis' Public 27 28 Defender's Office, Judge Brown, in 1978, entered into private practice, working therein for 12 years before returning to public 29 30 service in 1990 upon being elected as Division 9 Judge of the 31 State Criminal Courts of Shelby County, Tennessee; and WHEREAS, Judge Brown's alternative sentencing method placed 32 him in the national spotlight, with appearances on "Nightline" and 33 "Street Stories," as well as being the feature of many prominent 34 magazines such as "Newsweek," "Time" and "Life Magazine"; and 35 36 WHEREAS, it was Judge Brown's appearance on "Nightline" that 37 caught the attention of Big Ticket Television President, Larry Lyttle, opening the door of opportunity for a televised program; 38 39 and WHEREAS, with a magnetic and dynamic personality, coupled 40 with a unique background, Judge Brown spends many weekends in the 41 toughest Memphis communities encouraging the youth to maintain a 42 43 positive outlook on life and to distance themselves from trouble; 44 and WHEREAS, Judge Brown, who currently lives in Memphis and 45 46 actively participates in the upbringing of his two sons, has been chosen to be guest speaker for the Mississippi Baptist Seminary 47 48 Founder's Day on February 23, 2002; and WHEREAS, it is the policy of the House of Representatives of 49 the State of Mississippi to commend excellence in such an 50 51 outstanding and exemplary individual as Judge Joe Brown, whose contributions to society have been influential in positively 52 53 altering the lives of many: NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE HOUSE OF 54 REPRESENTATIVES OF THE STATE OF MISSISSIPPI, That we do hereby 55 commend and congratulate Judge Joe Brown on his many achievements 56
