HOUSE RESOLUTION NO. 28

1 A RESOLUTION COMMENDING JUDGE JOE BROWN FOR HIS MANY
2 ACHIEVEMENTS AS A JUDGE AND AS A SYNDICATED TELEVISION
3 PERSONALITY.

4 WHEREAS, Judge Joe Brown is a nationally acclaimed judge,
5 presiding in a nontraditional manner as judge of a syndicated
6 reality courtroom show entitled "Judge Joe Brown"; and

7 WHEREAS, born in Washington, D.C., the only child of
8 hard-working teachers, Judge Brown relocated to South Central Los
9 Angeles early in life, gaining and exhibiting the early philosophy
10 of tough-love; and

11 WHEREAS, Judge Brown, determined not to become another
12 statistic of the harsh inner city, modeled his parents, and chose
13 the avenue proffered by education, one surely to grant success and
14 opportunities; and

15 WHEREAS, graduating at the top of his high school class,
16 Judge Brown entered the University of California, Los Angeles
17 (UCLA), paying his way through college by loading trucks and
18 digging ditches, and earning his bachelor's degree in political
19 science; and

20 WHEREAS, Judge Brown, upon completion of his undergraduate
21 studies, was accepted into UCLA's School of Law, earning his Juris
22 Doctorate in 1973; and

23 WHEREAS, in 1974, Judge Brown moved to Memphis, Tennessee,
24 taking a legal service position with the Equal Employment
25 Opportunity Commission (EEOC), and later becoming the first
26 African-American Prosecutor for the City of Memphis; and



27 WHEREAS, after serving as Director of Memphis' Public
28 Defender's Office, Judge Brown, in 1978, entered into private
29 practice, working therein for 12 years before returning to public
30 service in 1990 upon being elected as Division 9 Judge of the
31 State Criminal Courts of Shelby County, Tennessee; and

32 WHEREAS, Judge Brown's alternative sentencing method placed
33 him in the national spotlight, with appearances on "Nightline" and
34 "Street Stories," as well as being the feature of many prominent
35 magazines such as "Newsweek," "Time" and "Life Magazine"; and

36 WHEREAS, it was Judge Brown's appearance on "Nightline" that
37 caught the attention of Big Ticket Television President, Larry
38 Lyttle, opening the door of opportunity for a televised program;

40 WHEREAS, with a magnetic and dynamic personality, coupled
41 with a unique background, Judge Brown spends many weekends in the
42 toughest Memphis communities encouraging the youth to maintain a
43 positive outlook on life and to distance themselves from trouble;

45 WHEREAS, Judge Brown, who currently lives in Memphis and
46 actively participates in the upbringing of his two sons, has been
47 chosen to be guest speaker for the Mississippi Baptist Seminary
48 Founder's Day on February 23, 2002; and

49 WHEREAS, it is the policy of the House of Representatives of
50 the State of Mississippi to commend excellence in such an
51 outstanding and exemplary individual as Judge Joe Brown, whose
52 contributions to society have been influential in positively
53 altering the lives of many:

54 NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE HOUSE OF
55 REPRESENTATIVES OF THE STATE OF MISSISSIPPI, That we do hereby
56 commend and congratulate Judge Joe Brown on his many achievements
57 as a judge and syndicated television personality.
