SENATE BILL NO. 2962

- AN ACT TO AMEND SECTION 37-21-7, MISSISSIPPI CODE OF 1972, TO REMOVE THE PROHIBITION ON USING STATE FUNDS TO EMPLOY LICENSED 1 2
- TEACHERS IN LIEU OF ASSISTANT TEACHERS; AND FOR RELATED PURPOSES. 3
- 4 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MISSISSIPPI:
- SECTION 1. Section 37-21-7, Mississippi Code of 1972, is 5
- amended as follows: 6
- 7 37-21-7. (1) This section shall be referred to as the
- "Mississippi Elementary Schools Assistant Teacher Program," the 8
- purpose of which shall be to provide an early childhood education 9
- program that assists in the instruction of basic skills. The 10
- State Board of Education is authorized, empowered and directed to 11
- implement a statewide system of assistant teachers in kindergarten 12
- 13 classes and in the first, second and third grades. The assistant
- teacher shall assist pupils in actual instruction under the strict 14
- supervision of a licensed teacher. 15
- (2) (a) Except as otherwise authorized under subsection 16
- (7), each school district shall employ the total number of 17
- assistant teachers funded under subsection (6) of this section. 18
- The superintendent of each district shall assign the assistant 19
- 20 teachers to the kindergarten, first-, second- and third-grade
- 21 classes in the district in a manner that will promote the maximum
- 22 efficiency, as determined by the superintendent, in the
- instruction of skills such as verbal and linguistic skills, 23
- logical and mathematical skills, and social skills. 24
- If a licensed teacher to whom an assistant teacher (b) 25
- 26 has been assigned is required to be absent from the classroom, the
- 27 assistant teacher may assume responsibility for the classroom in

- 28 lieu of a substitute teacher. However, no assistant teacher shall
- 29 assume sole responsibility of the classroom for more than three
- 30 (3) consecutive school days. Further, in no event shall any
- 31 assistant teacher be assigned to serve as a substitute teacher for
- 32 any teacher other than the licensed teacher to whom that assistant
- 33 teacher has been assigned.
- 34 (3) Assistant teachers shall have, at a minimum, a high
- 35 school diploma or a GED equivalent, and shall show demonstratable
- 36 proficiency in reading and writing skills. The State Department
- 37 of Education shall develop a testing procedure for assistant
- 38 teacher applicants to be used in all school districts in the
- 39 state.
- 40 (4) (a) In order to receive funding, each school district
- 41 shall:
- 42 (i) Submit a plan on the implementation of a
- 43 reading improvement program to the State Department of Education;
- 44 and
- 45 (ii) Develop a plan of educational accountability
- 46 and assessment of performance, including pretests and posttests,
- 47 for reading in Grades 1 through 6.
- 48 (b) Additionally, each school district shall:
- 49 (i) Provide annually a mandatory preservice
- 50 orientation session, using an existing in-school service day, for
- 51 administrators and teachers on the effective use of assistant
- 52 teachers as part of a team in the classroom setting and on the
- 53 role of assistant teachers, with emphasis on program goals;
- 54 (ii) Hold periodic workshops for administrators
- 55 and teachers on the effective use and supervision of assistant
- 56 teachers;
- 57 (iii) Provide training annually on specific
- 58 instructional skills for assistant teachers;



- 59 (iv) Annually evaluate their program in accordance
- 60 with their educational accountability and assessment of
- 61 performance plan; and
- (v) Designate the necessary personnel to supervise
- 63 and report on their program.
- (5) The State Department of Education shall:
- 65 (a) Develop and assist in the implementation of a
- 66 statewide uniform training module, subject to the availability of
- 67 funds specifically appropriated therefor by the Legislature, which
- 68 shall be used in all school districts for training administrators,
- 69 teachers and assistant teachers. The module shall provide for the
- 70 consolidated training of each assistant teacher and teacher to
- 71 whom the assistant teacher is assigned, working together as a
- 72 team, and shall require further periodical training for
- 73 administrators, teachers and assistant teachers regarding the role
- 74 of assistant teachers;
- 75 (b) Annually evaluate the program on the district and
- 76 state level. Subject to the availability of funds specifically
- 77 appropriated therefor by the Legislature, the department shall
- 78 develop: (i) uniform evaluation reports, to be performed by the
- 79 principal or assistant principal, to collect data for the annual
- 80 overall program evaluation conducted by the department; or (ii) a
- 81 program evaluation model that, at a minimum, addresses process
- 82 evaluation; and
- (c) Promulgate rules, regulations and such other
- 84 standards deemed necessary to effectuate the purposes of this
- 85 section. Noncompliance with the provisions of this section and
- 86 any rules, regulations or standards adopted by the department may
- 87 result in a violation of compulsory accreditation standards as
- 88 established by the State Board of Education and Commission on
- 89 School Accreditation.
- 90 (6) In addition to other funds allotted under the Minimum
- 91 Education or Adequate Education Program, each school district

- 92 shall be allotted sufficient funding for the purpose of employing
- 93 assistant teachers. No assistant teacher shall be paid less than
- 94 the amount he or she received in the prior school year. No school
- 95 district shall receive any funds under this section for any school
- 96 year during which the aggregate amount of the local contribution
- 97 to the salaries of assistant teachers by the district shall have
- 98 been reduced below such amount for the previous year.
- 99 For the 2001-2002 school year, the minimum salary for
- 100 assistant teachers shall be Nine Thousand Three Hundred Sixty-five
- 101 Dollars (\$9,365.00).
- For the 2002-2003 school year, the minimum salary for
- 103 assistant teachers shall be Nine Thousand Nine Hundred Dollars
- 104 (\$9,900.00).
- For the 2003-2004 school year, the minimum salary for
- 106 assistant teachers shall be Ten Thousand Five Hundred Dollars
- 107 (\$10,500.00).
- For the 2004-2005 school year, the minimum salary for
- 109 assistant teachers shall be Eleven Thousand Two Hundred Dollars
- 110 (\$11,200.00).
- For the 2005-2006 school year and school years thereafter,
- 112 the minimum salary for assistant teachers shall be Twelve Thousand
- 113 Dollars (\$12,000.00).
- In addition, for each one percent (1%) that the Sine Die
- 115 General Fund Revenue Estimate Growth exceeds five percent (5%) in
- 116 fiscal year 2003, 2004, 2005 or 2006, as certified by the
- 117 Legislative Budget Office to the State Board of Education and
- 118 subject to the specific appropriation therefor by the Legislature,
- 119 the State Board of Education shall revise the salary scale in the
- 120 appropriate year to provide an additional one percent (1%) across
- 121 the board increase in the base salaries for assistant teachers.
- 122 The State Board of Education shall revise the salaries prescribed
- 123 above for assistant teachers to conform to any adjustments made in
- 124 prior fiscal years due to revenue growth over and above five

- percent (5%). The assistant teachers shall not be restricted to 125 working only in the grades for which the funds were allotted, but 126 may be assigned to other classes as provided in subsection (2)(a) 127 128 of this section.
- 129 (7) (a) As an alternative to employing assistant teachers, 130 any school district may use the adequate education program allotments * * * for the purpose of employing licensed teachers 131 132 for kindergarten, first-, second- and third-grade classes; however, no school district shall be authorized to use the funds 133 for assistant teachers for the purpose of employing licensed 134 teachers unless the district has established that the employment 135 of licensed teachers using such funds will reduce the 136 137 teacher:student ratio in the kindergarten, first-, second- and third-grade classes. All adequate education program funds for 138 assistant teachers shall be applied to reducing teacher:student
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ratio in Grades K-3.

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- 142 In the event any school district meets Level 4 or 5 accreditation requirements, the State Board of Education, in its 143 144 discretion, may exempt such school district from any accreditation requirements for the district's early childhood education program 145 146 or reading improvement program.
- This act shall take effect and be in force from 147 SECTION 2. and after July 1, 2002. 148
