SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION NO. 566

1 A CONCURRENT RESOLUTION COMMENDING AND CONGRATULATING THE  
2 VILLAGE OF TAYLOR, MISSISSIPPI, AS THE WINNER OF THE 2002  
3 GOVERNOR'S EXCELLENCE IN THE ARTS AWARD IN THE CATEGORY OF CIVIC  
4 LEADERSHIP IN THE ARTS.

5 WHEREAS, in the red clay hills of Northern Mississippi, just  
6 nine miles south of Oxford, sits the rural town of Taylor  
7 (population 288); and

8 WHEREAS, at the turn of the 20th Century, Taylor thrived as a  
9 train depot for the Illinois Central Railroad, but after a fire in  
10 1910, the town was quieted; and

11 WHEREAS, Taylor was featured in a scene with Temple Drake in  
12 *Sanctuary*, the William Faulkner novel; and

13 WHEREAS, by the turn of the 21st Century, Taylor might have  
14 dropped off the map altogether had not a cluster of talented  
15 artists made it their home: William Beckwith, in 1982, was the  
16 first to open shop in Taylor. His statues brought distinction to  
17 many high profile places, including the statue honoring the Ole  
18 Miss students in the 11th Mississippi Infantry Regiment "the  
19 University Greys" who fought in the Pickett/Pettigrew Charge at  
20 the Battle of Gettysburg. Next came Obie Clark, whose top quality  
21 raku pottery earned him a coveted spot in both *Art in Mississippi*  
22 *1720-1980* and *The Mississippi Almanac*. Then came Jane Rule  
23 Burdine, whose color photography documenting the Mississippi Delta  
24 since the 1960's has found fame in museums, galleries and private  
25 collections. Keith Stewart, a fourth generation potter whose  
26 family recently won the Governor's Award for Excellence in the  
27 Arts, brought prestige with his fine ceramics. In September 2000,  
28 Marc Deloach and Christine Schultz opened a seven-room art



29 gallery, displaying Taylor artists such as Jim Daigle, a local  
30 landscape painter from the Savannah College of Art and Design;  
31 Delta State graduate Jared Spears, an accomplished stone carver;  
32 Alice Hammell, a popular self-taught abstract painter, who married  
33 Obie Clark and opened a studio shop in Taylor; Christine Schultz,  
34 a national magazine writer and recipient of the Mississippi Arts  
35 Commission's Literary Arts Fellowship; and Marc Deloach, a noted  
36 furniture maker working with old cypress, featured on ETV; and

37 WHEREAS, Taylor is home to the world-famous Taylor Grocery &  
38 Restaurant serving catfish to such noted persons as Jimmy Buffett  
39 and William Styron; and

40 WHEREAS; tourists nationwide leave Taylor with first-rate art  
41 and a story to tell about a place of people working together to  
42 capture the offbeat beauty that is found in Mississippi; and

43 WHEREAS, it is with great pride that we recognize the  
44 artistic contributions of Taylor, Mississippi, whose civic  
45 dedication brings honor to its citizens and to the State of  
46 Mississippi:

47 NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE SENATE OF THE STATE OF  
48 MISSISSIPPI, THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES CONCURRING THEREIN, That  
49 we do hereby commend and congratulate the Village of Taylor,  
50 Mississippi, as the Winner of the 2002 Governor's Excellence in  
51 the Arts Award in the Category of Civic Leadership in the Arts,  
52 and wish its citizens continued success in their future endeavors.

53 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That this resolution be presented to  
54 the Mayor of Taylor at induction ceremonies in February 2002, in  
55 Jackson, Mississippi, and be made available to the Capitol Press  
56 Corps.
