HOUSE BILL NO. 1008 (As Passed the House)

AN ACT TO AMEND SECTION 37-43-24, MISSISSIPPI CODE OF 1972, TO DIRECT THE DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION TO PLACE TEXTBOOK, EQUIPMENT AND SCHOOL SUPPLY PROCUREMENT ORDERS BEFORE THE BEGINNING OF THE FISCAL YEAR FOR STUDENTS ATTENDING CERTAIN SCHOOLS; AND FOR RELATED PURPOSES.

6 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MISSISSIPPI: 7 SECTION 1. Section 37-43-24, Mississippi Code of 1972, is 8 amended as follows:

9 37-43-24. (1) This section shall be referred to and may be 10 cited as the "Timely Acquisition of Braille and Large Print 11 Textbooks Act of 2002."

(2) The State Department of Education is hereby authorized 12 and directed to place textbook procurement orders for visually 13 14 impaired and hearing impaired students in the schools of this state prior to the beginning of the fiscal year for which the 15 expenditure for such order has been authorized by the Legislature. 16 After June 1 of any year, the State Department of Education may 17 order additional books, as needed. In addition, the State 18 Department of Education is authorized and directed to place 19 textbook, equipment and school supply procurement orders for 20 students attending the state-supported schools administered by the 21 22 State Board of Education before the beginning of the fiscal year for which the expenditure for the order has been authorized by the 23 Legislature. The department shall insure that the appropriate 24 procedures for textbook procurement are followed according to 25 state law and board policy as described in the Textbook 26 27 Administration Handbook.

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28 <u>SECTION 2.</u> Beginning with the 2004-2005 school year, the 29 State Board of Education shall require that any textbook that 30 includes the teaching of evolution in its contents shall have the 31 following language inserted on the inside front cover of those 32 textbooks:

33 "The word 'theory' has many meanings:
34 systematically organized knowledge, abstract reasoning,
35 a speculative idea or plan, or a systematic statement of
36 principles. Scientific theories are based on both
37 observations of the natural world and assumptions about
38 the natural world. They are always subject to change in
39 view of new and confirmed observations.

40 This textbook discusses evolution, a controversial 41 theory some scientists present as a scientific 42 explanation for the origin of living things. No one was 43 present when life first appeared on earth. Therefore, 44 any statement about life's origins should be considered 45 a theory.

Evolution refers to the unproven belief that 46 47 random, undirected forces produced living things. There are many unanswered questions about the origin of life 48 49 that are not mentioned in your textbook, including: the major groups of animals suddenly appear in the fossil 50 record (known as the Cambrian Explosion), no new major 51 52 groups of other living things appeared in the fossil record, major groups of plants and animals have no 53 transitional forms in the fossil record, and all living 54 things possess a complete and complex set of 55 instructions for building a living body. Study hard and 56 57 keep an open mind."

58 SECTION <u>3</u>. This act shall take effect and be in force from 59 and after July 1, 2003.
