## SENATE BILL NO. 2355

- AN ACT TO AMEND SECTION 25-3-25, MISSISSIPPI CODE OF 1972, TO AUTHORIZE THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS OF COAHOMA COUNTY, MISSISSIPPI, 1 2
- TO PAY AN ANNUAL SUPPLEMENT TO THE SHERIFF OF THE COUNTY; AND FOR 3
- 4 RELATED PURPOSES.
- BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MISSISSIPPI: 5
- SECTION 1. Section 25-3-25, Mississippi Code of 1972, is 6
- amended as follows: 7
- 25-3-25. (1) Except as otherwise provided in subsections 8
- 9 (2) through (9), the salaries of sheriffs of the various counties
- are hereby fixed as full compensation for their services. 10
- From and after October 1, 1998, the annual salary for each 11
- sheriff shall be based upon the total population of his county 12
- according to the latest federal decennial census in the following 13
- categories and for the following amounts; however, no sheriff 14
- shall be paid less than the salary authorized under this section 15
- to be paid the sheriff based upon the population of the county 16
- according to the 1980 federal decennial census: 17
- (a) For counties with a total population of more than 18
- two hundred thousand (200,000), a salary of Seventy-five Thousand 19
- Dollars (\$75,000.00). 20
- For counties with a total population of more than 21
- one hundred thousand (100,000) and not more than two hundred 22
- thousand (200,000), a salary of Seventy Thousand Dollars 23
- (\$70,000.00). 24
- For counties with a total population of more than 25
- 26 forty-five thousand (45,000) and not more than one hundred
- thousand (100,000), a salary of Sixty-five Thousand Dollars 27
- 28 (\$65,000.00).

- 29 (d) For counties with a total population of more than
- 30 thirty-four thousand (34,000) and not more than forty-five
- 31 thousand (45,000), a salary of Sixty Thousand Dollars
- 32 (\$60,000.00).
- 33 (e) For counties with a total population of more than
- 34 twenty-five thousand (25,000) and not more than thirty-four
- 35 thousand (34,000), a salary of Fifty-two Thousand Dollars
- 36 (\$52,000.00).
- 37 (f) For counties with a total population of more than
- 38 fifteen thousand (15,000) and not more than twenty-five thousand
- 39 (25,000), a salary of Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$50,000.00).
- 40 (g) For counties with a total population of more than
- 41 nine thousand five hundred (9,500) and not more than fifteen
- 42 thousand (15,000), a salary of Forty-seven Thousand Dollars
- 43 (\$47,000.00).
- (h) For counties with a total population of more than
- 45 seven thousand five hundred (7,500) and not more than nine
- 46 thousand five hundred (9,500), a salary of Forty-five Thousand
- 47 Dollars (\$45,000.00).
- 48 (i) For counties with a total population of not more
- 49 than seven thousand five hundred (7,500), a salary of Forty-two
- 50 Thousand Dollars (\$42,000.00).
- 51 (2) In addition to the salary provided for in subsection (1)
- 52 of this section, the Board of Supervisors of Leflore County may,
- 53 in its discretion, pay an annual supplement to the sheriff of the
- 54 county in an amount not to exceed Ten Thousand Dollars
- 55 (\$10,000.00). The Legislature finds and declares that the annual
- 56 supplement authorized by this subsection is justified in such
- 57 county for the following reasons:
- 58 (a) The Mississippi Department of Corrections operates
- 59 and maintains a restitution center within the county;
- (b) The Mississippi Department of Corrections operates
- and maintains a community work center within the county;

- (c) There is a resident circuit court judge in the
- 63 county whose office is located at the Leflore County Courthouse;
- (d) There is a resident chancery court judge in the
- 65 county whose office is located at the Leflore County Courthouse;
- (e) The Magistrate for the Fourth Circuit Court
- 67 District is located in the county and maintains his office at the
- 68 Leflore County Courthouse;
- (f) The Region VI Mental Health-Mental Retardation
- 70 Center, which serves a multicounty area, calls upon the sheriff to
- 71 provide security for out-of-town mental patients, as well as
- 72 patients from within the county;
- 73 (g) The increased activity of the Child Support
- 74 Division of the Department of Human Services in enforcing in the
- 75 courts parental obligations has imposed additional duties on the
- 76 sheriff; and
- 77 (h) The dispatchers of the enhanced E-911 system in
- 78 place in Leflore County has been placed under the direction and
- 79 control of the sheriff.
- 80 (3) In addition to the salary provided for in subsection (1)
- 81 of this section, the Board of Supervisors of Rankin County may, in
- 82 its discretion, pay an annual supplement to the sheriff of the
- 83 county in an amount not to exceed Ten Thousand Dollars
- 84 (\$10,000.00). The Legislature finds and declares that the annual
- 85 supplement authorized by this subsection is justified in such
- 86 county for the following reasons:
- 87 (a) The Mississippi Department of Corrections operates
- 88 and maintains the Central Mississippi Correctional Facility within
- 89 the county;
- 90 (b) The State Hospital is operated and maintained
- 91 within the county at Whitfield;
- 92 (c) Hudspeth Regional Center, a facility maintained for
- 93 the care and treatment of the mentally retarded, is located within
- 94 the county;

- 95 (d) The Mississippi Law Enforcement Officers Training
- 96 Academy is operated and maintained within the county;
- 97 (e) The State Fire Academy is operated and maintained
- 98 within the county;
- 99 (f) The Pearl River Valley Water Supply District,
- 100 ordinarily known as the "Reservoir District," is located within
- 101 the county;
- 102 (g) The Jackson International Airport is located within
- 103 the county;
- 104 (h) The patrolling of the state properties located
- 105 within the county has imposed additional duties on the sheriff;
- 106 and
- 107 (i) The sheriff, in addition to providing security to
- 108 the nearly one hundred thousand (100,000) residents of the county,
- 109 has the duty to investigate, solve and assist in the prosecution
- 110 of any misdemeanor or felony committed upon any state property
- 111 located in Rankin County.
- 112 (4) In addition to the salary provided for in subsection (1)
- of this section, the Board of Supervisors of Neshoba County shall
- 114 pay an annual supplement to the sheriff of the county an amount
- equal to Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000.00).
- 116 (5) In addition to the salary provided for in subsection (1)
- 117 of this section, the Board of Supervisors of Tunica County may, in
- 118 its discretion, pay an annual supplement to the sheriff of the
- 119 county an amount equal to Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000.00),
- 120 payable beginning April 1, 1997.
- 121 (6) In addition to the salary provided for in subsection (1)
- 122 of this section, the Board of Supervisors of Hinds County shall
- 123 pay an annual supplement to the sheriff of the county in an amount
- 124 equal to Fifteen Thousand Dollars (\$15,000.00). The Legislature
- 125 finds and declares that the annual supplement authorized by this
- 126 subsection is justified in such county for the following reasons:

- 131 (b) Hinds County is home to the state capitol and the

- 137 districts, each having a courthouse and county office buildings;
- (e) There are four (4) resident circuit judges, four
- 139 (4) resident chancery judges, and three (3) resident county judges
- 140 in Hinds County, the most of any county, with the sheriff acting
- 141 as chief executive officer and provider of bailiff services for
- 142 all;
- 143 (f) The main offices for the clerk and most of the
- 144 judges and magistrates for the United States District Court for
- 145 the Southern District of Mississippi are located within the
- 146 county;
- 147 (g) The state's only urban university, Jackson State
- 148 University, is located within the county;
- (h) The University of Mississippi Medical Center,
- 150 combining the medical school, dental school, nursing school and
- 151 hospital, is located within the county;
- 152 (i) Mississippi Veterans Memorial Stadium, the state's
- 153 largest sports arena, is located within the county;
- 154 (j) The Mississippi State Fairgrounds, including the
- 155 Coliseum and Trade Mart, are located within the county;
- 156 (k) Hinds County has the largest criminal population in
- 157 the state, such that the Hinds County Sheriff's Department
- 158 operates the largest county jail system in the state, housing

- 159 almost one thousand (1,000) inmates in three (3) separate
- 160 detention facilities;
- 161 (1) The Hinds County Sheriff's Department handles more
- 162 mental and drug and alcohol commitments cases than any other
- 163 sheriff's department in the state;
- 164 (m) The Mississippi Department of Corrections maintains
- 165 a restitution center within the county;
- 166 (n) The Mississippi Department of Corrections regularly
- 167 houses as many as one hundred (100) state convicts within the
- 168 Hinds County jail system; and
- 169 (o) The Hinds County Sheriff's Department is regularly
- 170 asked to provide security services not only at the Fairgrounds and
- 171 Memorial Stadium, but also for events at the Mississippi Museum of
- 172 Art and Jackson City Auditorium.
- 173 (7) In addition to the salary provided for in subsection (1)
- 174 of this section, the Board of Supervisors of Wilkinson County, in
- 175 its discretion, may pay an annual supplement to the sheriff of the
- 176 county in an amount not to exceed Ten Thousand Dollars
- 177 (\$10,000.00). The Legislature finds and declares that the annual
- 178 supplement authorized by this subsection is justified in such
- 179 county because the Mississippi Department of Corrections contracts
- 180 for the private incarceration of state inmates at a private
- 181 correctional facility within the county.
- 182 (8) In addition to the salary provided for in subsection (1)
- 183 of this section, the Board of Supervisors of Marshall County, in
- 184 its discretion, may pay an annual supplement to the sheriff of the
- 185 county in an amount not to exceed Ten Thousand Dollars
- 186 (\$10,000.00). The Legislature finds and declares that the annual
- 187 supplement authorized by this subsection is justified in such
- 188 county because the Mississippi Department of Corrections contracts
- 189 for the private incarceration of state inmates at a private
- 190 correctional facility within the county.



191	(9) In addition to the salary provided in subsection (1) of
192	this section, the Board of Supervisors of Greene County, in its
193	discretion, may pay an annual supplement to the sheriff of the
194	county in an amount not to exceed Ten Thousand Dollars
195	(\$10,000.00). The Legislature finds and declares that the annual
196	supplement authorized by this subsection is justified in such
197	county for the following reasons:

- 198 (a) The Mississippi Department of Corrections operates 199 and maintains the South Mississippi Correctional Facility within 200 the county;
- (b) In 1996, additional facilities to house another one thousand four hundred sixteen (1,416) male offenders were constructed at the South Mississippi Correctional Facility within the county; and
- 205 (c) The patrolling of the state properties located 206 within the county has imposed additional duties on the sheriff 207 justifying additional compensation.
- (10) In addition to the salary provided for in subsection
  (1) of this section, the Board of Supervisors of Coahoma County,
  in its discretion, may pay an annual supplement to the sheriff of
  the county in an amount not to exceed Fifteen Thousand Dollars
  (\$15,000.00). The Legislature finds and declares that the annual
  supplement authorized by this subsection is justified in the
  county for the following reasons:
- 215 <u>(a) A circuit court judge and chancery court judge</u>
  216 <u>reside in the county and maintain offices located in the Coahoma</u>
  217 <u>County Courthouse;</u>
- (b) The Region One Mental Health Center, which serves a multi-county area, calls upon the sheriff to provide security for out-of-town patients as well as patients within the county;
- 221 <u>(c) The Mississippi Department of Corrections operates</u>
  222 <u>and maintains a Parchman facility adjacent to the county;</u>

SECTION 2. The Attorney General of the State of Miss:	issippi
245 shall submit this act, immediately upon approval by the Go	vernor,
246 or upon approval by the Legislature subsequent to a veto,	to the
247 Attorney General of the United States or to the United Stat	tes
248 District Court for the District of Columbia in accordance	with the
249 provisions of the Voting Rights Act of 1965, as amended and	d
250 extended.	
SECTION 3. This act shall take effect and be in force	e from
and after the date it is effectuated under Section 5 of the	e Voting
Rights Act of 1965, as amended and extended, or October 1,	2002,

whichever occurs later.

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
