SENATE BILL NO. 2627 (As Passed the Senate)

- AN ACT TO AMEND SECTION 37-3-11, MISSISSIPPI CODE OF 1972, TO 1
- REQUIRE SCHOOL DISTRICTS TO PROVIDE AN ANNUAL REPORT OF TEACHER 2 3
- VACANCIES BY INSTRUCTIONAL AREA TO THE STATE SUPERINTENDENT OF 4

- EDUCATION FOR SUBMISSION TO THE LEGISLATURE; <u>TO REQUIRE SCHOOL</u> DISTRICTS TO PROVIDE AN ANNUAL REPORT OF SCHOOL-RELATED <u>FUND-RAISING ACTIVITIES BY STUDENTS;</u> AND FOR RELATED PURPOSES. 6
- 7 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MISSISSIPPI:
- SECTION 1. Section 37-3-11, Mississippi Code of 1972, is 8
- amended as follows: 9
- 10 37-3-11. (1) Until July 1, 1984, the State Superintendent
- of Public Education shall have the power and it shall be his duty: 11
- To supervise in the manner provided by law the 12
- public free schools, agricultural high schools and junior colleges 13
- of the state and to prescribe such rules and regulations for the 14
- efficient organization and conduct of same, as he may deem 15
- 16 necessary.
- To preside over all meetings of the State Board of 17 (b)
- Education. 18
- To collect data for determining the proper 19
- 20 distribution of the state common school funds.
- (d) To have bound and preserved in his office, as the 21
- property of the state, all such school documents from other states 22
- and governments, books and pamphlets on educational subjects, 23
- school books, apparatus, maps, charts and the like, as shall be or 24
- have been purchased or donated for the use of his office. 25
- To keep a complete record of all his official acts 26
- and the acts of the State Board of Education. 27
- (f) To prepare, have printed and furnish all officers 28
- charged with the administration of the laws pertaining to the 29

30 public schools, such blank forms and books as may be necessary to

31 the proper discharge of their duties; all of this printing shall

32 be paid for out of funds provided by the Legislature.

33 (q) To have printed in pamphlet form the laws

34 pertaining to the public schools and publish therein forms for

35 conducting school business, the rules and regulations for the

36 government of schools that he or the board of education may

37 recommend, and such other matters as may be deemed worthy of

38 public interest pertaining to the public schools; all of this

39 printing shall be paid for out of funds provided by the

40 Legislature.

41 (h) To meet the county superintendents annually at such

42 time and place as he shall appoint for the purpose of accumulating

43 facts relative to schools, to review the educational progress made

44 in the various sections of the state, to compare views, discuss

45 problems, hear discussions and suggestions relative to

46 examinations and qualifications of teachers, methods of

47 instruction, textbooks, summer schools for teachers, visitation of

schools, consolidation of schools, health work in the schools,

vocational education and other matters pertaining to the public

50 school system.

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51 (i) To advise the county superintendents upon all

52 matters involving the welfare of the schools, and at the request

53 of any county superintendent to give his opinion upon a written

54 statement of facts on all questions and controversies arising out

of the interpretation and construction of the school laws, in

56 regard to rights, powers and duties of school officers and county

57 superintendents, and to keep a record of all such decisions.

58 Before giving any opinion, the superintendent may submit the

59 statement of facts to the Attorney General for his advice thereon,

and it shall be the duty of the Attorney General forthwith to

61 examine such statement, and suggest the proper decision to be made

62 upon such facts.

To require annually, and as often as he may deem 63 64 proper, of county superintendents, detailed reports on the educational business of the various counties. 65 66 To make reports concerning agricultural high 67 schools and serve on various committees and boards as provided by 68 law. (1)On or before January 10 in each year in which the 69 Legislature meets in regular session, to prepare, and have printed 70 a report to the Legislature showing: 71 The receipts and disbursements of all school 72 (i) 73 funds officially handled by him; (ii) The number of school districts, school 74 75 teachers employed, and pupils taught therein, and the attendance 76 of pupils; 77 (iii) County and district levies for common schools, high schools, agricultural high schools, consolidated 78 schools and junior colleges; 79 80 (iv) The conditions of vocational education in the State of Mississippi, a list of schools to which federal and state 81 82 aid has been given, and a detailed statement of the expenditures of federal funds and the state funds that may be provided; 83 84 (v) Such general matters, information and recommendations as relate, in his opinion, to the educational 85 interests of the state; 86 87 (vi) A report of all school district teacher vacancies, including the instructional area of such teacher 88 89 vacancies, for the previous school year. Failure to report such vacancies may result in the withholding of state funds as provided 90 in Section 37-151-95; and 91 (vii) A report of all school district or 92 parent-teacher-association/related fund-raising activities that 93

offer incentives, prizes or awards to students based upon the

amount of money that such student raises. This report shall

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- 96 include 1. the nature of such fund-raising activities, 2. the
- 97 amount of money raised by such fund-raising activities for the
- 98 reporting period, 3. the purposes for which the money was raised
- 99 and an accounting of the expenditure of such funds, and 4. an
- 100 estimate of the amount of instructional time taken by students,
- 101 teachers, school administrators and parents in participating in
- 102 <u>such fund-raising activities</u>. Failure to report such fund-raising
- 103 <u>activities may result in the withholding of state funds as</u>
- 104 provided in Section 37-151-95. This reporting requirement shall
- 105 not apply to fund-raising activities authorized for the school
- 106 activity fund such as the sale of school pictures, the rental of
- 107 caps and gowns, the sale of school jewelry, or the sale of tickets
- 108 to school banquets or events.
- 109 (m) To determine the number of educable children in the
- 110 several school districts of the state under rules and regulations
- 111 to be prescribed by the State Board of Education.
- 112 (n) To perform such other duties in the administration
- of the public schools as may be required by law.
- 114 (2) From and after July 1, 1984, the State Superintendent of
- 115 Public Education shall perform the duties assigned to him by the
- 116 State Board of Education, and he shall have the following duties:
- 117 (a) To serve as secretary for the State Board of
- 118 Education;
- (b) To be the Chief Administrative Officer of the State
- 120 Department of Education;
- 121 (c) To recommend to the State Board of Education for
- 122 its consideration rules and regulations for the supervision of the
- 123 public free schools and agricultural high schools of the state and
- 124 for the efficient organization and conduct of the same;
- 125 (d) To collect data and make it available to the State
- 126 Board for determining the proper distribution of the state common
- 127 school funds;



- (e) To keep a complete record of all official acts of
 the state superintendent and the acts of the State Board of
 Education;
- (f) To prepare, have printed and furnish all officers

 charged with the administration of the laws pertaining to the

 public schools, such blank forms and books as may be necessary to

 the proper discharge of their duties, said printing to be paid for

 out of funds provided by the Legislature;
- To have printed in pamphlet form the laws 136 pertaining to the public schools and publish therein forms for 137 138 conducting school business, the rules and regulations for the government of schools that the State Superintendent or the Board 139 of Education may recommend, and such other matters as may be 140 deemed worthy of public interest pertaining to the public schools, 141 said printing to be paid for out of funds provided by the 142 143 Legislature;
 - (h) To meet all superintendents annually at such time and place as the State Superintendent shall appoint for the purpose of accumulating facts relative to schools, to review the educational progress made in the various sections of the state, to compare views, discuss problems, hear discussions and suggestions relative to examinations and qualifications of teachers, methods of instruction, textbooks, summer schools for teachers, visitation of schools, consolidation of schools, health work in the schools, vocational education and other matters pertaining to the public school system;
- (i) To advise all superintendents upon all matters
 involving the welfare of the schools, and at the request of any
 superintendent to give an opinion upon a written statement of
 facts on all questions and controversies arising out of the
 interpretation and construction of the school laws, in regard to
 rights, powers and duties of school officers and superintendents,
 and to keep a record of all such decisions. Before giving any

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- 162 the Attorney General, and it shall be the duty of the Attorney
- 163 General forthwith to examine such statement and suggest the proper
- 164 decision to be made upon such fact;
- 165 (j) To require annually, and as often as the State
- 166 Superintendent may deem proper, of all superintendents, detailed
- 167 reports on the educational business of the various districts;
- 168 (k) On or before January 10 in each year to prepare
- 169 under the direction of the State Board of Education and have
- 170 printed the annual report of the board to the Legislature showing:
- 171 <u>(i)</u> The receipts and disbursements of all school
- 172 funds handled by the board;
- 173 (ii) The number of school districts, school
- 174 teachers employed, school administrators employed, pupils taught
- 175 and the attendance record of pupils therein;
- 176 (iii) County and district levies for each school
- 177 district and agricultural high school;
- 178 (iv) The condition of vocational education, a list
- 179 of schools to which federal and state aid has been given, and a
- 180 detailed statement of the expenditures of federal funds and the
- 181 state funds that may be provided, and the ranking of subjects
- 182 taught as compared with the state's needs;
- 183 (v) Such general matters, information and
- 184 recommendations as relate, in the board's opinion, to the
- 185 educational interests of the state;
- (1) To determine the number of educable children in the
- 187 several school districts under rules and regulations prescribed by
- 188 the State Board of Education;
- 189 (m) To perform such other duties as may be prescribed
- 190 by the State Board of Education.
- 191 **SECTION 2.** This act shall take effect and be in force from
- 192 and after July 1, 2003.
