10	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MISSISSIPPI:	
11	SECTION 1. Section 25-3-31, Mississippi Code of 1972, is	
12	amended as follows:	
13	25-3-31. The annual salaries of the following elected state

## 29 SECTION 2. Section 25-3-34, Mississippi Code of 1972, is 30 amended as follows:

In addition to the salary provided in Section 31 25 - 3 - 34. (1) 32 25-3-31 or 25-3-33, any elective or appointive state and district official and employee provided therein shall receive the award of 33 an education benchmark as defined in State Personnel Board rules 34 35 for the possession or attainment of any of the following:

(C)

The Certified Public Manager designation; (a) A job-related Ph.D (Doctor of Philosophy) degree 37 (b) which is not required as a minimum qualification of the position; 38

A job related certification, licensure or 39 registration requiring the passage of an examination, which is not 40 required as a minimum qualification of the position. 41

No such official or employee may receive more than a 42 (2) 43 total of three (3) eligible benchmarks, only one of which may be for a job related certification, licensure or registration. 44

The State Personnel Board shall promulgate rules and (3) 45 regulations to carry out the provisions of this section. 46

SECTION 3. Section 25-3-35, Mississippi Code of 1972, is 47 48 amended as follows:

25-3-35. (1) The annual salaries of the following judges 49 50 are fixed as follows, to begin at the commencement of the next term of office immediately succeeding the existing term: 51

52 Chief Justice of the Supreme Court..... \$115,390.00 Presiding Justice of the Supreme Court..... 53 113,190.00 Associate Justices of the Supreme Court, each.... 54 112,530.00 55 However, in addition to their present official duties, there are imposed upon the Supreme Court justices the extra duties of 56 making a special study of existing laws and reporting to each 57 regular session of the Legislature such constructive suggestions 58 59 as they may deem necessary for the improvement of the administration of justice, and of advising and counseling with the 60 State Librarian in the selection of law books for purchase and use 61 62 in the State Law Library, advising with the librarian thereof upon the removal from the library of any books which may be the least 63

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frequently used, and for the placing of same in a convenient 64 location so as to provide additional space for such books and 65 other current publications which may be more frequently used or 66 67 called for. For such extra services each justice, from and after 68 June 17, 1999, shall receive a sum sufficient when added to the 69 present salaries of the justices to aggregate One Hundred Fifteen 70 Thousand Three Hundred Ninety Dollars (\$115,390.00) for the Chief 71 Justice, One Hundred Thirteen Thousand One Hundred Ninety Dollars (\$113,190.00) for the presiding justice, and One Hundred Twelve 72 Thousand Five Hundred Thirty Dollars (\$112,530.00) for associate 73 74 justices, per annum. As each existing term expires and the above-captioned salaries become effective in due course, the extra 75 duties and compensation provided for shall cease. 76

77 (2) The annual salaries of the judges of the Court of78 Appeals of Mississippi are fixed as follows:

(3) The annual salaries of the chancery and circuit court

82 judges are fixed as follows:

83 Chancery Judges, each..... \$104,170.00 Circuit Judges, each..... 84 104,170.00 85 In addition to their present official duties, there are imposed upon the chancery and circuit court judges the extra 86 duties of making a special study of existing laws relating to 87 88 trial courts and reporting to the Supreme Court of the State of Mississippi such constructive suggestions as they may deem 89 necessary for the improvement of the administration of justice, 90 which shall be recommended to the Legislature by the Supreme Court 91 in the manner provided by law. The judges shall advise and 92 supervise in the purchase of law books for the libraries of each 93 district, and shall study and evaluate the inventory of books and 94 95 facilities now existing in the libraries of each district to effect the removal and relocation of obsolete publications so as 96

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to provide additional space for those books and current 97 98 publications more frequently used. The judges shall study the existing rules promulgated by the circuit and chancery court 99 100 judicial associations governing the operation of chancery and 101 circuit courts, and revise the same pursuant to existing laws. 102 For such extra services each judge, from and after June 17, 1999, 103 shall receive a sum sufficient when added to the present salaries of the judges to aggregate One Hundred Four Thousand One Hundred 104 Seventy Dollars (\$104,170.00) per annum for each judge. Upon the 105 expiration of the existing term, the above-captioned salaries 106 107 become effective in due course, and the extra duties and compensation provided for shall cease. 108

(4) The Supreme Court shall prepare a payroll for chancery
judges and circuit judges and submit such payroll to the
Department of Finance and Administration.

(5) The annual salary of the full-time district attorneys
shall be <u>Eighty-seven Thousand Eight Hundred Thirteen Dollars</u>
(\$87,813.00).

(6) The annual salary of the full-time legal assistants
shall be not less than <u>Sixteen Thousand Five Hundred Dollars</u>
(\$16,500.00) nor more than <u>Seventy-four Thousand Two Hundred Fifty</u>
<u>Dollars (\$74,250.00)</u>, as established by the district attorney.

SECTION 4. Section 25-31-10, Mississippi Code of 1972, is amended as follows:

121 25-31-10. (1) Any district attorney may appoint a full-time122 criminal investigator.

(2) The district attorneys of the Third, Fifth, Ninth,
Tenth, Eleventh, Twelfth, Fifteenth, Sixteenth, Seventeenth and
Twentieth Circuit Court Districts may appoint one (1) additional
full-time criminal investigator for a total of two (2) full-time
criminal investigators.

132 (4) No district attorney or assistant district attorney
133 shall accept any private employment, civil or criminal, in any
134 matter investigated by such criminal investigators.

135 (5) The full and complete compensation for all public duties rendered by said criminal investigators shall be not more than 136 Forty-nine Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$49,500.00) per annum, 137 to be determined at the discretion of the district attorney based 138 upon the qualifications, education and experience of the criminal 139 140 investigator, plus necessary travel and other expenses, to be paid in accordance with Section 25-31-8. However, the maximum salary 141 142 under this subsection for a criminal investigator who has a law degree may be supplemented by the district attorney from other 143 available funds, but not to exceed the maximum salary for a legal 144 assistant to a district attorney. 145

Any criminal investigator may be designated by the 146 (6) 147 district attorney to attend the Law Enforcement Officers Training Program set forth in Section 45-6-1 et seq., Mississippi Code of 148 149 1972. The total expenses associated with attendance by criminal 150 investigators at the Law Enforcement Officers Training Program 151 shall be paid out of the funds of the appropriate district 152 attorney.

153 SECTION 5. The Attorney General of the State of Mississippi 154 shall submit this act, immediately upon approval by the Governor, 155 or upon approval by the Legislature subsequent to a veto, to the 156 Attorney General of the United States or to the United States 157 District Court for the District of Columbia in accordance with the 158 provisions of the Voting Rights Act of 1965, as amended and 159 extended.

160 **SECTION 6**. This act shall take effect and be in force from 161 and after the date it is effectuated under Section 5 of the Voting 162 Rights Act of 1965, as amended and extended, or January 1, 2004, 163 whichever is later.
