- WHEREAS, House Speaker Pro Tempore Robert George Clark, the 4

- WHEREAS, he is completing a third 4-year term as Speaker Pro 10
- Tempore of the House of Representatives, of which he was elected 11
- to the second top leadership post in 1992. As Speaker Pro 12
- 13 Tempore, he presides in the absence of the Speaker and serves as
- ex officio Chairman of the House Management Committee and ex 14
- officio member of the House Rules Committee; and 15
- WHEREAS, Robert George Clark, a Democrat from Ebenezer, 16
- Mississippi, was elected in 1967 during a time of racial unrest in 17
- the South, arriving at the State House of Representatives two 18
- years after passage of the federal Voting Rights Act of 1965. 19
- 35-year tenure in the Mississippi House of Representatives 20
- 21 symbolized the fight for change and a better society for all
- Mississippians; and 22
- WHEREAS, over the years since his election to the House of 23
- Representatives, Robert George Clark has gained stature in the 24
- Mississippi Legislature, rising from a freshman lawmaker to House 25
- 26 Education Committee Chairman, handling and authoring the historic
- 27 Education Reform Act of 1982; and
