Amend by striking all after the enacting clause and inserting in lieu thereof the following:

13	SECTION 1. (1) As used in this section:
14	(a) "Department" means the Mississippi State Department

29	enforcement personnel, fire department personnel, emergency
3 0	medical personnel and public works personnel who may be deployed
31	to bioterrorism attacks, terrorist attacks, catastrophic or

natural disasters and emergencies.

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- 33 (2) The department shall offer a vaccination program for
- 34 first responders who may be exposed to infectious diseases when
- 35 deployed to disaster locations. The vaccinations shall include,
- 36 but are not limited to, hepatitis A vaccination, hepatitis B
- 37 vaccination, diptheria-tetanus vaccination, influenza vaccination,
- 38 pneumococcal vaccination and other vaccinations when recommended
- 39 by the United States Public Health Service and in accordance with
- 40 Federal Emergency Management Directors Policy. Immune globulin
- 41 will be made available when necessary.
