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- TO PROVIDE THAT A REPORT OF THE ADVISORY COUNCIL SHALL BE
- SUBMITTED BEFORE THE CONVENING OF THE 2007 LEGISLATIVE SESSION; 5
- 6 AND FOR RELATED PURPOSES.
- 7 WHEREAS, Hepatitis C is a silent killer that is largely
- 8 asymptomatic until irreversible liver damage occurs; and
- 9 WHEREAS, infecting approximately four million five hundred
- 10 thousand (4,500,000) people in the United States, with thirty-five
- thousand (35,000) new infections each year, Hepatitis C is 11
- referred to as the "silent epidemic"; and 12
- WHEREAS, Hepatitis C infects three times more people than 13
- does AIDS, and is responsible for one-third (1/3) of all liver 14
- transplants; and 15
- WHEREAS, being one (1) of the most significant preventable 16
- 17 and treatable public health problems facing our nation today,
- Hepatitis C may be carried by individuals who expose others to the 18
- virus for more than twenty (20) years without showing any 19
- 20 symptoms; and
- WHEREAS, Hepatitis C does not have a vaccine, and as a 21
- 22 result, emphasis must be placed on other means of awareness and
- prevention of this disease, including, but not limited to, 23
- 24 educating individuals who are at high risk for contracting
- Hepatitis C, law enforcement officers, fire fighters, health care 25
- workers and the general public; and 26
- 27 WHEREAS, educating the public and health care community
- throughout the state about Hepatitis C will help to ensure an 28

- 29 optimal approach to controlling this lethal disease; NOW,
- 30 THEREFORE,
- 31 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MISSISSIPPI:
- 32 **SECTION 1.** (1) There is established the State Advisory
- 33 Council on Hepatitis C Virus (HCV).
- 34 (2) The advisory council shall consist of ten (10) members
- 35 as follows:
- 36 (a) One (1) member of the House Public Health and Human
- 37 Services Committee who is appointed by the Speaker of the House of
- 38 Representatives;
- 39 (b) One (1) member of the Senate Public Health and
- 40 Welfare Committee who is appointed by the Lieutenant Governor;
- 41 (c) One (1) member of the House Military Affairs
- 42 Committee who is appointed by the Speaker of the House of
- 43 Representatives;
- (d) One (1) member of the Senate Veterans and Military
- 45 Affairs Committee who is appointed by the Lieutenant Governor;
- (e) One (1) member shall be an internist who is
- 47 appointed by the Governor;
- 48 (f) One (1) member shall be a hematologist who is
- 49 appointed by the Governor;
- 50 (h) One (1) member shall be a hepatologist who is
- 51 appointed by the Governor;
- 52 (i) One (1) member shall be a clinical researcher
- 53 specializing in the diseases of the liver who is appointed by the
- 54 Governor;
- (j) One (1) member shall be a member of the general
- 56 public who is appointed by the Governor; and
- 57 (k) One (1) member shall be a nurse practitioner who is
- 58 appointed by the Governor.
- 59 (3) The duties of the advisory council shall include, but
- 60 are not limited to, the following:

- 61 (a) Collecting and analyzing data regarding the extent
- 62 to which Mississippians suffer from HCV, and the programs and
- 63 services currently available to meet the needs of those
- 64 individuals and to identify those who may be infected;
- (b) Collecting and analyzing data to demonstrate the
- 66 economic impact on the state of treating HCV and the estimated
- 67 cost savings of implementing a comprehensive statewide prevention
- 68 and management model;
- (c) Establishing and maintaining a resources data bank
- 70 containing information about HCV and related subjects accessible
- 71 to educational and research institutions, as well as members of
- 72 the general public;
- 73 (d) Establishing recommendations to enhance funding for
- 74 effective prevention and management programs and services,
- 75 including Medicaid, private health insurance programs and other
- 76 state and federal funds;
- 77 (e) Recommending policy to enhance clinical education
- 78 curricula in medical, nursing and other schools of higher
- 79 education to implement comprehensive, coordinated HCV awareness
- 80 and education courses;
- 81 (f) Recommending policy to increase education and
- 82 awareness among primary care physicians, other health care
- 83 professionals, veterans, law enforcement officers and fire
- 84 fighters regarding the recognition, prevention and effective
- 85 management of HCV;
- 86 (g) Considering a state prevention campaign to increase
- 87 public awareness of the need for early prevention and management
- 88 of HCV that may include the following:
- 89 (i) A broad-based public education campaign
- 90 outlining health risks associated with failure to receive
- 91 treatment for HCV;
- 92 (ii) A professional training campaign; and

- 93 (iii) A targeted public education campaign
- 94 directed towards those at high risk.
- 95 (h) Coordinating with the United States Department of
- 96 Health and Human Services, the United States Centers for Disease
- 97 Control, and the National Center for Chronic Disease Prevention to
- 98 share resources and information in order to ensure a comprehensive
- 99 approach to preventing and controlling HCV; and
- 100 (i) Coordinating with the State Department of Health
- 101 and the Division of Medicaid to share resources and information in
- 102 order to ensure a comprehensive approach to prevent and control
- 103 HCV.
- 104 (4) The members of the advisory council shall serve terms of
- 105 two (2) years, and if a member resigns before the end of his or
- 106 her term, then his or her successor shall be appointed to complete
- 107 the unexpired term. At its first meeting, the advisory council
- 108 shall elect a chairman and vice chairman from its membership, and
- 109 shall adopt rules for transacting its business and keeping
- 110 records. If sufficient funds are available to the advisory
- 111 council, members of the advisory council other than legislative
- 112 members may receive reimbursement for travel expenses incurred
- 113 while engaged in official business of the advisory board in
- 114 accordance with Section 25-3-41.
- 115 (5) The advisory council shall conduct meetings at least
- 116 quarterly. Meetings of the council shall be open to the public
- 117 and opportunity for public comment shall be made available at each
- 118 meeting.
- 119 (6) The advisory council shall be assigned to the Department
- 120 of Human Services for administrative purposes only, and it shall
- 121 designate staff to assist the council. The council may solicit
- 122 grants, donations and other funds, and may accept and expend any
- 123 funds that are made available to the council to carry out its
- 124 purpose. However, no state general funds may be used to pay any
- 125 expenses of the advisory council.

- (7) All agencies, departments, offices and institutions of the state, including the state universities and the community and junior colleges, shall cooperate with the advisory council with such assistance as requested by the council.
- 130 (8) Before December 1, 2006, the advisory council shall

  131 submit a report, including any proposed legislation if necessary,

  132 to the Governor and to the House Public Health and Human Services

  133 Committee and the Senate Public Health and Welfare Committee. The

  134 report shall include a comprehensive state plan for implementation

  135 of services and programs in the state that will increase

  136 prevention and control of HCV, and an estimate of the cost of the
- implementation of such a plan.

  (9) The advisory council shall be dissolved on July 1, 2008.

  SECTION 2. This act shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage.
