HOUSE BILL NO. 1240

1 AN ACT TO AMEND SECTION 49-7-31, MISSISSIPPI CODE OF 1972, TO
2 REQUIRE PERSONS ENTERING OR EXISTING ANY WOODED AREA IN ANY OPEN
3 SEASON FOR GAME ANIMALS OR GAME BIRDS DURING THE PERIOD FROM
4 SUNSET TO SUNRISE TO DISPLAY AND OPERATE A FLASHLIGHT OR OTHER
5 LIGHT EMITTING DEVICE VISIBLE TO OTHER HUNTERS OR PERSONS IN THE
6 IMMEDIATE AREA; AND FOR RELATED PURPOSES.

7 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MISSISSIPPI:

8 **SECTION 1.** Section 49-7-31, Mississippi Code of 1972, is
9 amended as follows:

10 49-7-31. (1) The open season for game birds and game
11 animals shall be as follows:

12 (a) On bobwhite quail: The season shall open on
13 Thanksgiving day and run through the first Saturday in March next
14 following.

15 (b) On pheasant: There shall be no open season on
16 pheasant.

17 (c) On wild turkey: The commission shall fix the
18 spring season between the Saturday nearest March 20 and May 1 in
19 designated areas. In addition, the commission may fix special
20 fall either-sex seasons.

21 (d) On squirrel:

22 (i) Zone 1: For areas north of Highway 82 plus
23 those portions of Sunflower County and Washington County south of
24 Highway 82 the season shall open on the Saturday nearest October 1
25 and run through February 28.

26 (ii) Zone 2: For areas between Highway 82 and
27 Highway 84, plus such portions of the state south of Highway 84
28 and west of Interstate 55, the season shall open on the Saturday
29 nearest October 15 and run through February 28.

30 (iii) Zone 3: For areas south of Highway 84 and
31 east of Interstate 55 the season shall open on the last Saturday
32 in October and run through February 28.

33 (e) On deer:

34 (i) With bow and arrow: October 1 through the
35 Friday prior to Thanksgiving.

36 (ii) With guns and with dogs: From the Saturday
37 prior to Thanksgiving through December 1.

38 (iii) With primitive weapons and without dogs:
39 December 2 through December 15.

40 (iv) With guns and without dogs: December 16
41 through December 23. However, the commission may allow hunting
42 statewide or in specific areas with any legal weapon which it may
43 designate without dogs after the end of the last season for
44 hunting deer with guns and with dogs, but the season with legal
45 designated weapons and without dogs shall not extend beyond
46 January 31.

47 (v) With guns and with dogs: December 24 through
48 a date fixed by the commission that will provide a total of
49 thirty-nine (39) days of hunting deer with guns and with dogs when
50 added to the number of days provided for hunting deer with guns
51 and with dogs in paragraph (e)(ii).

52 (vi) When hunting deer during any gun season on
53 deer, a hunter must wear in full view five hundred (500) square
54 inches of solid unbroken fluorescent orange.

55 (vii) In order to set and regulate the deer
56 seasons, the commission may:

57 A. Set and regulate the deer seasons on
58 wildlife management areas which it administers;

59 B. Allow the harvesting of antlerless deer in
60 the districts or zones upon the recommendation of the executive
61 director based upon good and substantial quantitative data and
62 research evaluations that demonstrate that the harvesting is

63 necessary to properly manage the herd. The commission, only upon
64 the recommendation of the executive director, may allow the
65 harvesting of antlerless deer during the deer season with guns and
66 with dogs by a majority vote of the commission. Nothing in this
67 section prohibits the harvesting of either sex deer by landowners
68 or leaseholders on private lands under a deer management program
69 prescribed or approved by the executive director.

70 C. Provide a special permit for the
71 harvesting of deer when they are depredating and destroying crops.
72 The department shall supervise the harvesting and provide for the
73 salvaging of the meat of the animals. The commission may
74 authorize the department to assist any farmer in this state, who
75 sustains crop damage by wildlife, in eradication of the problem
76 wildlife.

77 (viii) The commission shall establish a special
78 hunting season for youth under the age of sixteen (16) and for
79 handicapped persons in the Natchez State Park. The commission
80 shall also establish a primitive weapon season in the Natchez
81 State Park. The selection of participants in the primitive weapon
82 season shall be by public drawing from all qualified applications.
83 The commission shall set the number of permits to be issued and
84 the length of the special seasons. The commission may also
85 establish a special hunting season for youth and handicapped
86 persons or a primitive weapon season as provided in this
87 subparagraph in any other state park under the jurisdiction of the
88 department but shall only do so upon the recommendation of the
89 staff of the department as approved by the commission. The
90 commission shall select participants and set the number of permits
91 to be issued and the length of the special seasons in the manner
92 provided in this subparagraph.

93 (ix) The commission may establish and regulate
94 special youth hunts for all nonmigratory game birds and animals

95 outside of the open season on wildlife management areas and on
96 private lands.

97 (f) On fur-bearing animals: The commission may fix the
98 open season on fur-bearing animals between November 1 and March 1
99 next following and fix the open season for hunting opossums,
100 raccoons and bobcats with dogs and guns by licensed hunters from
101 October 1 to February 28 next following; but raccoons and bobcats
102 may be run, hunted, chased or pursued throughout the year with
103 dogs by licensed hunters. The commission may establish an
104 additional open season on raccoon from July 1 through October 1,
105 and the bag limit on raccoon during the additional open season
106 shall be one (1) per party, per night.

107 (g) On rabbits: The season shall open on the Saturday
108 nearest October 15 and run through February 28 next following, and
109 when rabbits are depredating or destroying crops, the owner of the
110 crops or his tenants may shoot the rabbits with guns.

111 (h) On predatory animals: The hunting of predatory
112 animals shall be restricted to the open seasons for hunting any
113 game animal or game bird, using only the firearms, ammunition,
114 primitive weapons or archery equipment legal for use during that
115 open season. Landowners, agricultural leaseholders or their
116 designated agents may take predatory animals year-round on lands
117 owned or leased by them. The taking of any animal or animals
118 other than beavers or coyote by the use of a trap or traps is
119 unlawful except during the time the season is open for the taking
120 of fur-bearing animals. Fox and coyote may be run, chased or
121 pursued with dogs except as provided in Section 49-7-32 year-round
122 by licensed hunters.

123 (i) On migratory birds: The open season for migratory
124 birds shall be the season prescribed by the Federal Migratory Bird
125 Treaty regulations.

126 (j) It is unlawful to trap fox after the closed season
127 for trapping of other fur-bearing animals, except on property
128 owned or leased by the person trapping.

129 (2) When entering or existing any wooded area in any open
130 season for game animals or game birds during the period from
131 sunset to sunrise, every person shall display and operate a
132 flashlight or other light emitting device visible to other hunters
133 or persons in the immediate area.

134 (3) It is the intent of the Legislature that the open season
135 for game birds and game animals shall be stabilized unless some
136 unforeseen calamity affecting the resource necessitates earlier
137 change.

138 **SECTION 2.** This act shall take effect and be in force from
139 and after July 1, 2004.
