HOUSE BILL NO. 1405

1 AN ACT TO AMEND SECTION 3-3-7, MISSISSIPPI CODE OF 1972, TO 2 PROVIDE THAT THE THIRD SATURDAY IN JUNE SHALL BE DECLARED TO BE 3 JUNETEENTH NATIONAL FREEDOM DAY; TO PROVIDE THAT THIS DAY SHALL 4 NOT BE RECOGNIZED AS A LEGAL HOLIDAY, BUT SHALL BE A DAY OF 5 COMMEMORATION; AND FOR RELATED PURPOSES.

6 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MISSISSIPPI: 7 SECTION 1. Section 3-3-7, Mississippi Code of 1972, is 8 amended as follows:

9 3-3-7. (1) Except as otherwise provided in subsection (2) of this section, the following are declared to be legal holidays, 10 viz: the first day of January (New Year's Day); the third Monday 11 of January (Robert E. Lee's birthday and Dr. Martin Luther King, 12 13 Jr.'s birthday); the third Monday of February (Washington's 14 birthday); the last Monday of April (Confederate Memorial Day); the last Monday of May (National Memorial Day and Jefferson Davis' 15 16 birthday); the fourth day of July (Independence Day); the first Monday of September (Labor Day); the eleventh day of November 17 (Armistice or Veterans' Day); the day fixed by proclamation by the 18 19 Governor of Mississippi as a day of Thanksqiving, which shall be fixed to correspond to the date proclaimed by the President of the 20 21 United States (Thanksgiving Day); and the twenty-fifth day of 22 December (Christmas Day). In the event any holiday hereinbefore 23 declared legal shall fall on Sunday, then the next following day 24 shall be a legal holiday.

(2) In lieu of any one (1) legal holiday provided for in
subsection (1) of this section, with the exception of the third
Monday in January (Robert E. Lee's and Martin Luther King, Jr.'s
birthday), the governing authorities of any municipality or county

29 may declare, by order spread upon its minutes, Mardi Gras Day or 30 any one (1) other day during the year, to be a legal holiday.

31 (3) August 16 is declared to be Elvis Aaron Presley Day in 32 recognition and appreciation of Elvis Aaron Presley's many 33 contributions, international recognition and the rich legacy left 34 to us by Elvis Aaron Presley. This day shall be a day of 35 recognition and observation and shall not be recognized as a legal 36 holiday.

May 8 is declared to be Hernando De Soto Day in 37 (4) 38 recognition, observation and commemoration of Hernando De Soto, 39 who led the first and most imposing expedition ever made by Europeans into the wilds of North America and the State of 40 41 Mississippi, and in further recognition of the Spanish explorer's 187-day journey from the Tombigbee River basin on our state's 42 eastern boundary, westward to the place of discovery of the 43 Mississippi River on May 8, 1541. This day shall be a day of 44 commemoration, recognition and observation of Hernando De Soto and 45 46 European exploration and shall not be recognized as a legal 47 holiday.

48 (5) Insofar as possible, Armistice Day shall be observed by 49 appropriate exercises in all the public schools in the State of 50 Mississippi at the eleventh hour in the morning of the eleventh 51 day of the eleventh month of the year.

52 (6) The third Saturday of June is declared to be Juneteenth 53 National Freedom Day, in recognition of the oldest

54 <u>African-American holiday observed in the United states.</u> This day 55 <u>celebrates:</u>

- 56 (a) The announcement of the Emancipation Proclamation
 57 by United States President Abraham Lincoln issued on September 22,
 58 1862, which provided that all persons held as slaves within
- 59 <u>certain designated states would be declared free on January 1,</u>
- 60 1863;

61	(b) The passage of the Thirteenth Amendment to the
62	United States Constitution on December 18, 1865, which officially
63	ended slavery in the United States of America; and
64	(c) The communication to former slaves of African
65	descent of the fact that slavery had ended, which became known
66	throughout the nation by June of 1865.
67	Juneteenth National Freedom Day commemorates and recognizes
68	the joy of former slaves when they learned of the message of their
69	freedom, and this holiday is a reminder to all Americans of the
70	contributions and legacy of Americans of African descent. This
71	day shall be a day of commemoration and observation, and it shall
72	not be recognized as a legal holiday.
73	SECTION 2. This act shall take effect and be in force from
74	and after July 1, 2004.
