 WHEREAS, the security of our nation and people is the first
 and foremost obligation of our United States federal government;
 and

WHEREAS, the men and women of our United States Armed Forces 6 7 now serving in the Army, Navy, Air Force, Marine Corps, Coast 8 Guard, Merchant Marines, National Guard and Reserves have shown 9 great courage and self-sacrifice and deserve to be equipped with the best weapons and resources to protect our nation; and 10 11 WHEREAS, in past years politicians have delayed passing the 12 defense appropriations bill until late in the budget year so that the defense appropriations bill was misused as a dumping ground 13

14 for pork barrel spending and as a political hostage to pork barrel 15 spending on other appropriations bills; and

16 WHEREAS, in the wake of the terrorist attacks of September 17 11, 2001, on America, President Bush asked that the Congress of 18 the United States pass the defense appropriations bill before 19 passing other spending bills; and

20 WHEREAS, Congress acted responsibly in the Spring of 2002, 21 when it passed the defense appropriations bill first, thereby 22 protecting the men and women in our Armed Forces from becoming 23 pawns for politicians' spending maneuvers:
