SENATE BILL NO. 2825

AN ACT TO DESIGNATE THE AMERICAN ALLIGATOR AS THE STATE 1 REPTILE; AND FOR RELATED PURPOSES. 2 3 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MISSISSIPPI: 4 WHEREAS, the American Alligator is found in the southeastern United States, from Texas to Florida, and from South Carolina to 5 the Gulf Coast. They are found in both natural and manmade 6 7 freshwater lakes, ponds, rivers and wetland areas; and 8 WHEREAS, the Mississippi Department of Wildlife, Fisheries 9 and Parks estimates that there are 32,000-38,000 alligators and about 408,000 acres of alligator habitat in Mississippi. 10 11 Alligator reports have come from as far north as Coahoma, Lafayette and Itawamba Counties, and as far south as the coastal 12 counties of Jackson, Harrison and Hancock; and 13 WHEREAS, alligators are important to the ecology of their 14 15 habitat. During droughts, they dig holes, or dens, which provide water for the wildlife community. The alligators construct these 16 "gator holes" with their large sweeping tails that retain water 17 during periods of drought. This provides water and foraging space 18 for many other species, such as wading birds; and 19 20 WHEREAS, alligators are unique in that, unlike other reptiles, female alligators will protect their young for up to two 21 22 years after hatching. We feel this sets a good example for all 23 animal parents. They have proven themselves to be highly resilient to both natural and induced mortality. In fact, they 24 25 are known to have existed before the dinosaurs -- more than two 26 hundred million years ago; and

27 WHEREAS, alligators are one of the few animals that has been 28 listed as endangered and rallied back again.

29 **SECTION 1.** The American Alligator (Alligator

30 Mississippiensis) is hereby designated the State Reptile of

31 Mississippi.

32 **SECTION 2.** This act shall take effect and be in force from 33 and after July 1, 2004.
