SENATE BILL NO. 2976

AN ACT TO AMEND SECTION 37-3-11, MISSISSIPPI CODE OF 1972, TO 1 2 REQUIRE SCHOOL DISTRICTS TO PROVIDE AN ANNUAL REPORT OF TEACHER 3 VACANCIES BY INSTRUCTIONAL AREA TO THE STATE SUPERINTENDENT OF EDUCATION FOR SUBMISSION TO THE LEGISLATURE; AND FOR RELATED 4 5 PURPOSES BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MISSISSIPPI: б 7 SECTION 1. Section 37-3-11, Mississippi Code of 1972, is amended as follows: 8 37-3-11. (1) Until July 1, 1984, the State Superintendent 9 of Public Education shall have the power and it shall be his duty: 10 (a) To supervise in the manner provided by law the 11 public free schools, agricultural high schools and junior colleges 12 13 of the state and to prescribe such rules and regulations for the 14 efficient organization and conduct of same, as he may deem 15 necessary. 16 To preside over all meetings of the State Board of (b) 17 Education. (c) To collect data for determining the proper 18 19 distribution of the state common school funds. 20 (d) To have bound and preserved in his office, as the property of the state, all such school documents from other states 21 22 and governments, books and pamphlets on educational subjects, 23 school books, apparatus, maps, charts and the like, as shall be or 24 have been purchased or donated for the use of his office. (e) To keep a complete record of all his official acts 25 and the acts of the State Board of Education. 26 27 (f) To prepare, have printed and furnish all officers charged with the administration of the laws pertaining to the 28

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29 public schools, such blank forms and books as may be necessary to 30 the proper discharge of their duties; all of this printing shall 31 be paid for out of funds provided by the Legislature.

32 To have printed in pamphlet form the laws (a) 33 pertaining to the public schools and publish therein forms for 34 conducting school business, the rules and regulations for the government of schools that he or the board of education may 35 recommend, and such other matters as may be deemed worthy of 36 public interest pertaining to the public schools; all of this 37 38 printing shall be paid for out of funds provided by the 39 Legislature.

To meet the county superintendents annually at such 40 (h) 41 time and place as he shall appoint for the purpose of accumulating 42 facts relative to schools, to review the educational progress made in the various sections of the state, to compare views, discuss 43 problems, hear discussions and suggestions relative to 44 45 examinations and qualifications of teachers, methods of 46 instruction, textbooks, summer schools for teachers, visitation of schools, consolidation of schools, health work in the schools, 47 48 vocational education and other matters pertaining to the public 49 school system.

50 (i) To advise the county superintendents upon all matters involving the welfare of the schools, and at the request 51 52 of any county superintendent to give his opinion upon a written 53 statement of facts on all questions and controversies arising out of the interpretation and construction of the school laws, in 54 55 regard to rights, powers and duties of school officers and county superintendents, and to keep a record of all such decisions. 56 57 Before giving any opinion, the superintendent may submit the statement of facts to the Attorney General for his advice thereon, 58 59 and it shall be the duty of the Attorney General forthwith to 60 examine such statement, and suggest the proper decision to be made 61 upon such facts.

(j) To require annually, and as often as he may deem 62 63 proper, of county superintendents, detailed reports on the educational business of the various counties. 64 65 To make reports concerning agricultural high (k) 66 schools and serve on various committees and boards as provided by 67 law. On or before January 10 in each year in which the 68 (1) Legislature meets in regular session, to prepare, and have printed 69 a report to the Legislature showing: 70 71 (i) The receipts and disbursements of all school 72 funds officially handled by him; (ii) The number of school districts, school 73 74 teachers employed, and pupils taught therein, and the attendance 75 of pupils; 76 (iii) County and district levies for common 77 schools, high schools, agricultural high schools, consolidated schools and junior colleges; 78 79 (iv) The conditions of vocational education in the State of Mississippi, a list of schools to which federal and state 80 81 aid has been given, and a detailed statement of the expenditures of federal funds and the state funds that may be provided; 82 83 (v) Such general matters, information and recommendations as relate, in his opinion, to the educational 84 interests of the state; 85 86 (vi) A report of all school district teacher vacancies, including the instructional area of such teacher 87 88 vacancies, for the previous school year. Failure to report such 89 vacancies may result in the withholding of state funds as provided in Section 37-151-95; and 90 To determine the number of educable children in the 91 (m) 92 several school districts of the state under rules and regulations 93 to be prescribed by the State Board of Education.

94 (n) To perform such other duties in the administration95 of the public schools as may be required by law.

96 (2) From and after July 1, 1984, the State Superintendent of
97 Public Education shall perform the duties assigned to him by the
98 State Board of Education, and he shall have the following duties:

99 (a) To serve as secretary for the State Board of100 Education;

101 (b) To be the Chief Administrative Officer of the State102 Department of Education;

103 (c) To recommend to the State Board of Education for 104 its consideration rules and regulations for the supervision of the 105 public free schools and agricultural high schools of the state and 106 for the efficient organization and conduct of the same;

107 (d) To collect data and make it available to the State 108 Board for determining the proper distribution of the state common 109 school funds;

(e) To keep a complete record of all official acts of the state superintendent and the acts of the State Board of Education;

(f) To prepare, have printed and furnish all officers charged with the administration of the laws pertaining to the public schools, such blank forms and books as may be necessary to the proper discharge of their duties, said printing to be paid for out of funds provided by the Legislature;

118 To have printed in pamphlet form the laws (g) pertaining to the public schools and publish therein forms for 119 120 conducting school business, the rules and regulations for the government of schools that the State Superintendent or the Board 121 of Education may recommend, and such other matters as may be 122 123 deemed worthy of public interest pertaining to the public schools, 124 said printing to be paid for out of funds provided by the 125 Legislature;

126 To meet all superintendents annually at such time (h) 127 and place as the State Superintendent shall appoint for the 128 purpose of accumulating facts relative to schools, to review the 129 educational progress made in the various sections of the state, to 130 compare views, discuss problems, hear discussions and suggestions 131 relative to examinations and qualifications of teachers, methods of instruction, textbooks, summer schools for teachers, visitation 132 of schools, consolidation of schools, health work in the schools, 133 134 vocational education and other matters pertaining to the public 135 school system;

136 To advise all superintendents upon all matters (i) 137 involving the welfare of the schools, and at the request of any 138 superintendent to give an opinion upon a written statement of facts on all questions and controversies arising out of the 139 140 interpretation and construction of the school laws, in regard to rights, powers and duties of school officers and superintendents, 141 142 and to keep a record of all such decisions. Before giving any 143 opinion, the superintendent may submit the statement of facts to the Attorney General, and it shall be the duty of the Attorney 144 145 General forthwith to examine such statement and suggest the proper decision to be made upon such fact; 146

147 (j) To require annually, and as often as the State Superintendent may deem proper, of all superintendents, detailed 148 reports on the educational business of the various districts; 149 150 (k) On or before January 10 in each year to prepare under the direction of the State Board of Education and have 151 152 printed the annual report of the board to the Legislature showing: 153 (i) The receipts and disbursements of all school funds handled by the board; 154 155 (ii) The number of school districts, school 156 teachers employed, school administrators employed, pupils taught

157 and the attendance record of pupils therein;

158 <u>(iii)</u> County and district levies for each school 159 district and agricultural high school;

160 (iv) The condition of vocational education, a list 161 of schools to which federal and state aid has been given, and a 162 detailed statement of the expenditures of federal funds and the 163 state funds that may be provided, and the ranking of subjects 164 taught as compared with the state's needs;

165 <u>(v)</u> Such general matters, information and 166 recommendations as relate, in the board's opinion, to the 167 educational interests of the state;

168 (1) To determine the number of educable children in the
169 several school districts under rules and regulations prescribed by
170 the State Board of Education;

171 (m) To perform such other duties as may be prescribed172 by the State Board of Education.

173 **SECTION 2.** This act shall take effect and be in force from 174 and after July 1, 2004.
