## Withdrawn AMENDMENT NO 2 PROPOSED TO

## House Bill No. 1269

## Amend by striking all after the enacting clause and inserting in lieu thereof the following:

5 **SECTION 1.** The Legislature of the State of Mississippi finds 6 and declares that:

7 (a) During the period from 1933 to 1945, six million 8 (6,000,000) Jews and millions of other Europeans were murdered in 9 Nazi concentration camps as part of a carefully orchestrated 10 program of cultural, social and political genocide known as 11 Holocausts;

Following the American Civil War and immediately 12 (b) 13 following the end of Reconstruction in the 1880's until the mid 14 1960's the United States, experienced an ugly episode of its national history that has been neglected. During this period, 15 16 characterized by white supremacist control primarily in the South 17 and a "laissez-fair" policy in regard to the African American nationally, which resulted in disenfranchisement, social, 18 19 educational and employment discrimination, African Americans were 20 betrayed by their country and reduced to a status of quasi slavery or "second-class" citizenship. There existed a tense atmosphere 21 22 of racial hatred, ignorance and fear which bred lawless massacres,

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mass violence, murder, and lynching which claimed the lives of 23 24 thousands of African American men, women and children, including 25 soldiers in the United States military forces, so much so that the 26 lynching of African Americans in the South and border states 27 became an institutionalized method used to terrorize them as a 28 means to maintain white supremacy. According to the Tuskegee 29 Institute of Alabama, which began to make a systematic collection and tabulation of lynching statistics in 1892, between 1882 and 30 1951, three thousand four hundred and thirty-seven (3,437) African 31 32 Americans were lynched in the United States. The systematic 33 perpetration of violence based on race resulting in thousands of deaths to African Americans is a "hollocaust." 34

35 (c) Prior to the arrival of Christopher Columbus, it is 36 estimated that the areas which constituted the forty-eight (48) 37 contiguous states of America was populated with in excess of twelve million (12,000,000) indigenous people or Native Americans. 38 39 Four Centuries later the Native American population had been 40 reduced by ninety-five percent (95%) to approximately two hundred thirty-seven thousand (237,000). After the American Revolution, 41 42 the United States adopted a policy toward the native Americans 43 known as the "conquest" theory. Based upon official policies and 44 practices toward the native Americans and through the implementation of slavery, mass extermination, massacres, hangings 45 46 en masse, roasting, hacking children into pieces, forced mass 47 sterilization of women, intentionally contaminating them with deadly diseases, such as smallpox, violent and forceful removal 48 49 and "clearing" from homelands, which resulted in military 50 slaughter of tribal villages, placing bounties on scalps, and forced assimilation including destruction of indigenous culture, 51 the Native American has suffered losses of millions of people. 52 53 From the beginning of European control of what is now the United

54 States there has been an unrelenting drive to commit genocide of 55 Native Americans resulting in a "hollocaust."

(d) All people should remember horrible atrocities
committed in Nazi Germany, at other times in human history as the
result of bigotry and tyranny, and therefore should continually
rededicate themselves to the principles of human rights and equal
protection under the laws of a democratic society;

(e) It is desirable to educate our citizens about the
events leading up to the Nazi Holocaust and other Holocausts and
about the organizations and facilities that were created and used
purposefully for the systematic destruction of human beings;

(f) Holocaust history is the proper concern of all
people, particularly students enrolled in the schools, colleges
and universities of the State of Mississippi;

(g) Programs, workshops, institutes, seminars,
exhibits, and other teacher-training activities for the study of
Holocausts have taken place during recent years at various middle
schools, high schools, colleges and universities in this state;
and

(h) It is desirable to create a permanent state commission, which as an organized body and on a continuous basis, will survey, design, encourage and promote implementation of Holocaust education and awareness programs in Mississippi, and will be responsible for organizing and promoting the memorialization of the Nazi Holocaust and other Holocausts on a regular basis throughout the state.

80 <u>SECTION 2.</u> (1) There is created the Mississippi Commission 81 on Holocausts in the executive branch of state government. The 82 commission shall be assigned to the Office of the Secretary of 83 State for administrative purposes only.

84 (2) The commission shall be composed of the following85 members:

86 (a) Ex officio members as follows: 87 (i) The State Superintendent of Public Education 88 or his or her designee; 89 (ii) Commissioner of Institutions of Higher 90 Learning or his or her designee; 91 (b) Public members as follows: 92 Seven (7) public members, at least one (1) (i) from each of the congressional districts, to be appointed by the 93 94 Governor; (ii) Five (5) public members, at least one (1) 95 96 from each of the congressional districts, to be appointed by the Speaker of the House of Representatives; and 97 98 (iii) Five (5) public members, at least one (1) from each of the congressional districts, to be appointed by the 99 Lieutenant Governor. 100 The public members of the commission shall be 101 (C) residents of this state and shall be appointed with due regard for 102 103 broad geographic representation. The public members should 104 include, but are not be limited to, the following: 105 (i) Individuals who have served prominently as 106 spokespersons for or as leaders of organizations or corporations 107 that serve members of religious, ethnic, national heritage, or 108 social groups that were subjected to genocide, torture, wrongful deprivation of liberty or property, officially imposed or 109 110 sanctioned violence, and other forms of human rights violations and persecution at the hands of the Nazis and their collaborators 111 112 during the Nazi era; (ii) Individuals who are experienced in the field 113 of Holocaust education; 114 (iii) Individuals who represent liberators of 115 victims of Holocausts; or 116

117 (iv) Lay persons who have an interest in Holocaust 118 education.

(d) Public members of the commission shall be appointed 119 120 for the terms of five (5) years and until their respective 121 successors are appointed and qualified. Public members may be 122 eligible for reappointment. The office of any member of the commission who fails to attend more than two (2) consecutive 123 124 meetings of the commission without an excuse approved by a 125 resolution of the commission shall become vacant. All vacancies shall be filled by appointment in the same manner as the original 126 127 appointment, and the person appointed to fill a vacancy shall 128 serve for the remainder of the unexpired term.

(e) The commission shall have a chairperson who shall
be appointed by the Governor for a term of five (5) years and
until his or her successor is appointed and qualified.

(f) Seven (7) members of the commission shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of the business of the commission. Public members shall have the right to vote on any matter before the commission, but ex officio members and their designees shall not have the right to vote.

137 (g) The Speaker of the House of Representatives shall
138 appoint a member of the House of Representatives and the
139 Lieutenant Governor shall appoint a member of the Senate to serve
140 as advisors to the commission.

141 (3) The Mississippi Commission on Holocausts shall adopt 142 rules and regulations and set standards and policies for the 143 organization, operation, management, budgeting and programs of the 144 commission.

(a) The commission shall provide, based upon the
collective knowledge and experience of its members, assistance and
advice to public and private schools, colleges and universities

148 with respect to the implementation of Holocaust education and 149 awareness programs.

(b) The commission shall meet with appropriate
education officials and other interested public and private
organizations, including service organizations, for the purpose of
providing information, planning, coordination, or modification of
courses of study or programs dealing with the subject of
Holocausts.

(c) The commission shall survey and catalogue the extent of Holocausts and genocide education presently being incorporated into the curricula and taught in the educational system of this state.

160 (d) The commission shall inventory those Holocaust memorials, exhibits and resources that could not be incorporated 161 into courses of study or programs at various locations and other 162 163 educational agencies for the development and implementation of 164 Holocaust and genocide education programs. In furtherance of this 165 responsibility, the commission may contact and cooperate with existing Holocaust and genocide public and private nonprofit 166 167 resource organizations and may act as a liaison concerning Holocaust and genocide education or members of the United States 168 169 Senate and House of Representatives, the Mississippi Senate and 170 House of Representatives, the United States Holocaust Memorial Museum and other national and international Holocaust agencies. 171

172 (e) The commission shall compile a roster of individual volunteers who are willing to share their verifiable knowledge and 173 174 experience in classrooms, seminars and workshops on the subject of 175 Holocausts. The volunteers may be survivors of Holocausts, liberators of concentration camps, scholars, members of the 176 clergy, community relations professionals, and other persons who, 177 178 by virtue of their experience, education, or interest, have 179 experience with Holocausts.

(f) The commission shall coordinate events memorializing Holocausts and seeks volunteers who are willing and able to participate in commemorative events that will enhance public awareness of the significance of Holocausts.

184 (g) The commission shall prepare reports for the 185 Governor and the Legislature regarding its findings and 186 recommendations to facilitate the inclusion of Holocaust studies 187 and special programs memorializing Holocausts in educational 188 systems of this state.

189 (h) The commission shall appoint advisory committees to190 advise the commission on the fulfillment of its duties.

191 (4) The commission may receive gifts, grants and donations 192 from any public or private sources. Members of the commission may 193 not be compensated for the performance of their duties except from 194 funds that are specifically appropriated therefor by the 195 Legislature or from gifts, grants or donations.

196 SECTION 3. This act shall take effect and be in force from 197 and after July 1, 2004.

Further, amend by striking the title in its entirety and inserting in lieu thereof the following:

1 AN ACT TO CREATE THE MISSISSIPPI COMMISSION ON HOLOCAUSTS; TO 2 PROVIDE FOR THE MEMBERSHIP OF THE COMMISSION; TO PROVIDE FOR THE 3 POWERS AND DUTIES OF THE COMMISSION; AND FOR RELATED PURPOSES.
