## SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION NO. 502

A CONCURRENT RESOLUTION COMMENDING THE LIFE AND LEGACY OF 1 DR. JULIUS JOHN "J.J." HAYDEN, JR., OF PASS CHRISTIAN, 2 3 MISSISSIPPI, WHO IS CREDITED WITH EXPANDING RURAL PERKINSTON JUNIOR COLLEGE INTO THE STATE'S FIRST MULTI-CAMPUS JUNIOR COLLEGE, 4 AND EXPRESSING THE SYMPATHY OF THE LEGISLATURE. 5 б WHEREAS, Dr. Julius John "J.J." Hayden, Jr.'s career as a 7 junior college administrator was unprecedented in Mississippi 8 history; and 9 WHEREAS, "J.J." Hayden, who died Sunday, October 10, 2004, at age 84, took charge of a small rural junior college with 10 facilities valued at just over \$1 Million and turned it into 11 Mississippi's first multi-campus institution with a net worth of 12 13 more than \$35 Million when he retired; and 14 WHEREAS, during his tenure, the single Mississippi Gulf Coast Community College installation at Perkinston grew to seven major 15 16 facilities, at least one of which was located in each of the four counties comprising the college's service district - Harrison, 17 Stone, Jackson and George; and 18 19 WHEREAS, Dr. Hayden, a native of Pass Christian, played 20 football at Harrison-Stone-Jackson Junior College at Perkinston. Graduating in 1940, he entered military service; he later earned 21 22 bachelor's and master's degrees from Mississippi State; and in 1950, he and his wife, Lillian, returned to "Perk"; and 23 24 WHEREAS, he taught history for two years and in 1952 was appointed Dean of Men. The following year, at the age of 33, he 25 became the ninth Chief Executive Officer (the second to hold the 26 27 official title of president) of the institution which was then

28 styled Perkinston Junior College and Agricultural High School; and

29 WHEREAS, World War II caused the growth of Coast towns and 30 Hayden realized the people of the Coast could not come to Perk for 31 an education, so Perk would have to establish educational 32 installations throughout the Gulf Coast to serve them. In early 33 May 1962, the Legislature established the Mississippi Gulf Coast 34 Junior College District. This landmark legislation became the model for the formation of junior college districts throughout the 35 36 state; and

37 WHEREAS, the National Education Association (NEA) recognized 38 Dr. Hayden's efforts in establishing Mississippi's first 39 multi-campus junior college by naming him the NEA Pacemaker Award 40 recipient for 1966. The NEA particularly commended Hayden's 41 efforts on behalf of vocational-technical education; and

WHEREAS, when Hayden became President of Perkinston Junior 42 College and Agricultural High School in 1953, the single 43 installation at Perkinston enrolled 473 full-time students and 44 45 produced 104 graduates. In the school year preceding Hayden's retirement on December 31, 1985, the college's seven installations 46 enrolled 4,511 full-time students and graduated 772. The growth 47 48 in facilities has permitted the college to expand its offerings to 49 include more than 30 university parallel programs, nearly 50 50 occupational programs, plus adult and continuing education 51 programs; and

52 WHEREAS, his civic activities included membership on the 53 Board of Governors for the Southern Association of Colleges and 54 Schools. He served as President of the Mississippi Education 55 Association; and

56 WHEREAS, it is with sadness that we note the passing of this 57 visionary Mississippi educator, who touched the lives of millions 58 of students and their families:

59 NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE SENATE OF THE STATE OF 60 MISSISSIPPI, THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES CONCURRING THEREIN, That 61 we do hereby commend the life and legacy of Dr. Julius John "J.J." 5. No. 502 \*SS01/R3\* 043E/SS01/R3 PAGE 2 Hayden, Jr., of Pass Christian, Mississippi, who is credited with expanding rural Perkinston Junior College into the state's first multi-campus junior college today known as Mississippi Gulf Coast Community College, and express to his wife of 61 years Lillian Ruth (Aschbacher) Hayden and his surviving family the sympathy of the Legislature on his passing.
