HOUSE BILL NO. 182

- AN ACT TO AMEND SECTIONS 23-15-297 AND 23-15-977, MISSISSIPPI CODE OF 1972, TO REVISE FEES REQUIRED TO BE PAID BY A CANDIDATE 2.
- UPON ENTERING CERTAIN RACES FOR PARTY NOMINATIONS; TO AMEND 3
- SECTION 23-15-299, MISSISSIPPI CODE OF 1972, TO CONFORM TO THE PRECEDING SECTIONS; AND FOR RELATED PURPOSES. 4
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- 6 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MISSISSIPPI:
- 7 SECTION 1. Section 23-15-297, Mississippi Code of 1972, is
- amended as follows:
- 9 23-15-297. Any candidate entering the race for party
- nominations for office shall first pay to the proper officer as 10
- provided for in Section 23-15-299 for each primary election the 11
- following amounts: 12
- (a) Candidates for Governor, the sum of One Thousand 13
- 14 Dollars (\$1,000.00).
- (b) Candidates for Lieutenant Governor, the sum of Nine 15
- 16 Hundred Dollars (\$900.00).
- 17 (c) Candidates for Attorney General, State Treasurer,
- Auditor of Public Accounts, Commissioner of Insurance, Secretary 18
- of State and Commissioner of Agriculture and Commerce, the sum of 19
- Eight Hundred Dollars (\$800.00). 20
- 21 (d) Candidates for Mississippi Transportation
- 22 Commissioner and State Public Service Commissioner, the sum of
- 23 Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00).
- (e) Candidates for State Senator and State 2.4
- Representative, the sum of One Hundred Fifty Dollars (\$150.00). 25
- (f) Candidates for district attorney, the sum of Five 26
- 27 Hundred Dollars (\$500.00).

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- 28 (g) Candidates for sheriff, chancery clerk, circuit
- 29 clerk, tax assessor, county attorney, tax collector, county
- 30 superintendent of education, the sum of Seventy-five Dollars
- 31 (\$75.00).
- 32 (h) Candidates for justice court judge, constable,
- 33 county board of supervisors and county coroner, the sum of Fifty
- 34 Dollars (\$50.00).
- 35 (i) Candidates for county surveyor and ranger, the sum
- of Twenty-five Dollars (\$25.00).
- 37 (j) Candidates for county board of education, the sum
- 38 of Fifteen Dollars (\$15.00).
- 39 (k) Candidates for United States Senator, the sum of
- 40 One Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$1,500.00).
- 41 (1) Candidates for United States Representative, the
- 42 sum of Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00).
- 43 **SECTION 2.** Section 23-15-299, Mississippi Code of 1972, is
- 44 amended as follows:
- 45 23-15-299. (1) (a) Assessments made pursuant to paragraphs
- 46 (a), (b), (c), (d) and (f) of Section 23-15-297 and assessments
- 47 made pursuant to paragraph (e) of Section 23-15-297 for
- 48 legislative offices shall be paid by each candidate to the
- 49 Secretary of the State Executive Committee with which the
- 50 candidate is affiliated by 5:00 p.m. on March 1 of the year in
- 51 which the primary election for the office is held or on the date
- 52 of the qualifying deadline provided by statute for the office,
- 53 whichever is earlier.
- 54 (b) If the 2010 federal decennial census has not been
- 55 received from the United States Secretary of Commerce by the
- 56 Governor of the State of Mississippi by January 1, 2011, then the
- 57 qualifying deadline for legislative offices shall be changed for
- 58 the year 2011 only, as follows: Assessments made pursuant to
- 59 paragraph (d) of Section 23-15-297 for legislative offices shall
- 60 be paid by each candidate to the Secretary of the State Executive

- 61 Committee with which the candidate is affiliated by 5:00 p.m. on
- 62 June 1, 2011. This paragraph (b) shall stand repealed on July 1,
- 63 2012.
- (2) Assessments made pursuant to paragraphs (g), (h), (i)
- 65 and (j) shall be paid by each candidate to the circuit clerk of
- 66 such candidate's county of residence by 5:00 p.m. on March 1 of
- 67 the year in which the primary election for the office is held or
- 68 on the date of the qualifying deadline provided by statute for the
- 69 office, whichever is earlier; provided, however, that no such
- 70 assessments may be paid before January 1 of the year in which the
- 71 election for the office is held. The circuit clerk shall forward
- 72 the fee and all necessary information to the secretary of the
- 73 proper county executive committee within two (2) business days.
- 74 (3) Assessments made pursuant to paragraphs (k) and (l) of
- 75 Section 23-15-297 must be paid by each candidate to the Secretary
- 76 of the State Executive Committee with which the candidate is
- 77 affiliated by 5:00 p.m. sixty (60) days before the presidential
- 78 preference primary in years in which a presidential preference
- 79 primary is held. Assessments made pursuant to paragraphs (k) and
- 80 (1) of Section 23-15-297, in years when a presidential preference
- 81 primary is not being held, shall be paid by each candidate to the
- 82 Secretary of the State Executive Committee with which the
- 83 candidate is affiliated by 5:00 p.m. on March 1 of the year in
- 84 which the primary election for the office is held.
- 85 (4) (a) The fees paid pursuant to subsections (1), (2) and
- 86 (3) of this section shall be accompanied by a written statement
- 87 containing the name and address of the candidate, the party with
- 88 which he or she is affiliated and the office for which he or she
- 89 is a candidate.
- 90 (b) The State Executive Committee shall transmit to the
- 91 Secretary of State a copy of the written statements accompanying
- 92 the fees paid pursuant to subsections (1) and (2) of this section.
- 93 All copies must be received by the Office of the Secretary of

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State by not later than 6:00 p.m. on the date of the qualifying 94 95 deadline; provided, however, the failure of the Office of the 96 Secretary of State to receive such copies by 6:00 p.m. on the date 97 of the qualifying deadline shall not affect the qualification of a 98 person who pays the required fee and files the required statement 99 by 5:00 p.m. on the date of the qualifying deadline. The name of any person who pays the required fee and files the required 100 statement after 5:00 p.m. on the date of the qualifying deadline 101

shall not be placed on the primary election ballot.

- 103 The secretary or circuit clerk to whom such payments are 104 made shall promptly receipt for same stating the office for which such candidate making payment is running and the political party 105 106 with which he or she is affiliated, and he or she shall keep an 107 itemized account in detail showing the exact time and date of the receipt of each payment received by him or her and, where 108 applicable, the date of the postmark on the envelope containing 109 the fee and from whom, and for what office the party paying same 110 111 is a candidate.
- The secretaries of the proper executive committee shall 112 113 hold said funds to be finally disposed of by order of their 114 respective executive committees. Such funds may be used or 115 disbursed by the executive committee receiving same to pay all necessary traveling or other necessary expenses of the members of 116 117 the executive committee incurred in discharging their duties as 118 committeemen, and of their secretary and may pay the secretary such salary as may be reasonable. 119
- 120 (7) Upon receipt of the proper fee and all necessary
 121 information, the proper executive committee shall then determine
 122 whether each candidate is a qualified elector of the state, state
 123 district, county or county district which they seek to serve, and
 124 whether each candidate meets all other qualifications to hold the
 125 office he is seeking or presents absolute proof that he will,
 126 subject to no contingencies, meet all qualifications on or before

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the date of the general or special election at which he could be 127 128 elected to office. The committee also shall determine whether any 129 candidate has been convicted of any felony in a court of this 130 state, or has been convicted on or after December 8, 1992, of any 131 offense in another state which is a felony under the laws of this 132 state, or has been convicted of any felony in a federal court on or after December 8, 1992. Excepted from the above are 133 convictions of manslaughter and violations of the United States 134 Internal Revenue Code or any violations of the tax laws of this 135 state unless the offense also involved misuse or abuse of his 136 137 office or money coming into his hands by virtue of his office. the proper executive committee finds that a candidate either (a) 138 139 is not a qualified elector, (b) does not meet all qualifications to hold the office he seeks and fails to provide absolute proof, 140 subject to no contingencies, that he will meet the qualifications 141 on or before the date of the general or special election at which 142 143 he could be elected, or (c) has been convicted of a felony as 144 described in this subsection, and not pardoned, then the name of such candidate shall not be placed upon the ballot. 145

146 Where there is but one (1) candidate for each office 147 contested at the primary election, the proper executive committee 148 when the time has expired within which the names of candidates shall be furnished shall declare such candidates the nominees. 149

- 150 No candidate may qualify by filing the information 151 required by this section by using the Internet.
- SECTION 3. Section 23-15-977, Mississippi Code of 1972, is 152 153 amended as follows:
- 154 23-15-977. (1) Any candidates for judicial office as defined in Section 23-15-975 of this subarticle shall file their 155 156 intent to be a candidate with the proper officials not later than 157 5:00 p.m. on the first Friday after the first Monday in May prior 158 to the general election for judicial office and shall pay to the
- 159 proper officials the following amounts:

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- 160 (a) Candidates for Supreme Court judge and Court of
- 161 Appeals, the sum of One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00).
- 162 (b) Candidates for circuit judge and chancellor, the
- 163 sum of Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00).
- 164 (c) Candidates for county judge and family court judge,
- the sum of Seventy-five Dollars (\$75.00).
- 166 (2) Candidates for judicial offices listed in paragraphs (a)
- 167 and (b) of subsection (1) of this section shall file their intent
- 168 to be a candidate with, and pay the proper assessment made
- 169 pursuant to subsection (1) of this section to, the State Board of
- 170 Election Commissioners.
- 171 (3) Candidates for judicial offices listed in paragraph (c)
- 172 of subsection (1) of this section shall file their intent to be a
- 173 candidate with, and pay the proper assessment made pursuant to
- 174 subsection (1) of this section to, the circuit clerk of the proper
- 175 county. The circuit clerk shall notify the county commissioners
- 176 of election of all persons who have filed their intent to be a
- 177 candidate with, and paid the proper assessment to, such clerk.
- 178 Such notification shall occur within two (2) business days and
- 179 shall contain all necessary information.
- 180 **SECTION 4.** The Attorney General of the State of Mississippi
- 181 shall submit this act, immediately upon approval by the Governor,
- 182 or upon approval by the Legislature subsequent to a veto, to the
- 183 Attorney General of the United States or to the United States
- 184 District Court for the District of Columbia in accordance with the
- 185 provisions of the Voting Rights Act of 1965, as amended and
- 186 extended.
- 187 **SECTION 5.** This act shall take effect and be in force from
- 188 and after the date it is effectuated under Section 5 of the Voting
- 189 Rights Act of 1965, as amended and extended.
