## HOUSE BILL NO. 543

AN ACT ENTITLED THE MISSISSIPPI IDENTITY AND HERITAGE 1 2 PROTECTION ACT OF 2005; TO SET FORTH PROVISIONS THAT PROTECT AN INDIVIDUAL'S RIGHT TO CONTROL, EXPLOIT AND LICENSE THE COMMERCIAL USE OF HIS OR HER IDENTITY; TO CREATE A PROPERTY RIGHT IN AN 3 4 INDIVIDUAL'S IDENTITY; TO DEFINE IDENTITY AS ANY INCIDENT OF AN 5 б INDIVIDUAL'S PERSONA, INCLUDING AN INDIVIDUAL'S NAME, VOICE, 7 SIGNATURE, PHOTOGRAPH OR LIKENESS; TO CREATE A CIVIL ACTION 8 AGAINST ANY PERSON WHO USES AN INDIVIDUAL'S IDENTITY WITHOUT THE 9 INDIVIDUAL'S CONSENT; TO MAKE AN EXCEPTION FOR THE FAIR USE OF AN IDENTITY THAT INCLUDES ITS USE IN NEWS, PUBLIC AFFAIRS AND 10 11 EDUCATION; TO PROVIDE REMEDIES FOR THE UNLAWFUL USE OF AN IDENTITY; TO PROVIDE THAT WHEN THE PROPERTY RIGHT IS ABANDONED OR 12 TERMINATED, IT FALLS INTO THE PUBLIC DOMAIN; AND FOR RELATED 13 14 PURPOSES.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MISSISSIPPI: **SECTION 1.** For purposes of this act, the following words and phrases shall have the meanings ascribed to them in this section: (a) "Individual" means a human being, whether living or deceased.

20 "Identity" means one or more incidents of an (b) 21 individual's persona or combination thereof, including his or her name, voice, signature, photograph or likeness, by which the 22 uniqueness of that particular individual could be discerned and 23 distinguished from others, so that the biography, fame, 24 accomplishments, talents, reputation or other tangible and 25 intangible elements of his or her persona could be used for 26 27 commercial purposes by other persons.

(c) "Person" means any living human being, firm,
association, partnership, corporation, limited liability company,
limited liability partnership, joint-stock company, syndicate,
receiver, common-law trust, conservator, statutory trust, or any
other concern by whatever name known or however organized, formed,
or created, and includes not-for-profit corporations,

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34 associations, educational and religious institutions, political 35 parties, community, civic or other organization.

(d) "Definable group" means an assemblage of
individuals existing or brought together with or without
interrelation, orderly form, or arrangement, including, but not
limited to, a crowd at any sporting event, parade, or festival;
crowd in the street or at a public building; the audience at any
theatrical or stage production; a glee club; or sports team.

(e) "Photograph" means any photograph or photographic
reproduction, still or moving, or any videotape, digital video
file or live television transmission of any individual so that the
individual is readily identifiable.

46 (f) "Fair use" means the use of an individual's
47 identity for purposes of criticism, comment, news reporting,
48 public affairs, sports broadcasts, teaching, scholarship and
49 research by another person.

50 <u>SECTION 2.</u> (1) On the effective date of this act, every 51 individual shall have a property right in his or her identity and 52 its use in any medium and in any manner whatsoever.

53 (2) The individual's right set forth in subsection (1) of 54 this section is freely assignable in whole or in part. Such right 55 does not expire upon the death of the individual so protected, whether or not the right was commercially exploited by the 56 individual during his or her lifetime, but is descendible to the 57 58 executors, heirs, assigns or legatees of the deceased individual, 59 subject only to the abandonment and termination provisions of this 60 act.

**SECTION 3.** Any person who uses the identity of any 61 62 individual, in any manner which does not constitute a fair use, or in any medium as an item of commerce on or for purposes of 63 64 advertising products, merchandise, goods or services, for purposes 65 of fund raising, solicitation of donations, or for purposes of the 66 purchase of products, merchandise, goods or services, shall be \*HR12/R975\* 543 H. 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liable in a civil action, unless the person has obtained (a) the 67 68 prior consent of the individual, (b) the prior consent of the 69 minor's parent or legal guardian if the individual is a minor, or 70 (c) the prior consent of the executor or administrator, heirs, 71 legatees or assigns of the individual, if the individual is 72 deceased. The fair use of an individual's identity by a person 73 does not infringe on the individual's property right in his 74 identity and does not create liability under this section.

75 <u>SECTION 4.</u> (1) The chancery court shall have original 76 jurisdiction for any action arising under the provisions of this 77 act. In the exercise of its sound discretion and upon proper 78 proof, the court may grant all appropriate equitable relief, 79 including any injunctive relief deemed necessary to prevent or 80 restrain the unauthorized use or infringement of the property 81 right set forth in this act.

An individual, or in the case of a deceased individual, 82 (2)83 his or her executor, administrator, heir or legatees, shall be 84 entitled to recover the actual damages suffered as a result of the infringement of the individual's property right in his identity, 85 86 together with any profits attributable to the use or infringement 87 that are not taken into account in computing actual damages. The 88 profit, or lack therof, attributable to any unauthorized use or infringement of an individual's right shall not be criteria for 89 90 finding liability.

91 In addition to all other equitable and legal remedies (3) that are provided in this act or under any other state law, at any 92 93 time while an action under this act is pending, the court may 94 order the impoundment, on such terms as it may deem reasonable, of all materials or any part thereof claimed to have been made or 95 used in violation of the individual's property right in his 96 97 identity, and of all plates, molds, matrices, masters, tapes, film 98 negatives, digital computer files or other articles by means of 99 which the materials may be reproduced.

No. 543 \*HR12/R975\* 05/HR12/R975 PAGE 3 (CJR\DO) 100 (4) As part of a final judgment or decree, the court may 101 order the destruction or other reasonable disposition of all 102 materials found to have been made or used in violation of the 103 individual's property right in his identity, and of all plates, 104 molds, matrices, masters, tapes, film negatives, digital computer 105 files or other articles by means of which the materials may be 106 reproduced.

107 (5) In any civil action under this act, the court may allow, 108 in its discretion, the recovery of punitive damages in 109 circumstances involving intentional or reckless disregard of an 110 individual's right conferred under this act. Further, the court, 111 in its discretion, may grant to the prevailing party or parties in 112 any action under this act reasonable attorney's fees and costs 113 associated with the action.

114 (6) All remedies provided for in the act are cumulative and 115 shall be in addition to any others provided by law or equity.

116 **SECTION 5.** (1) With regard only to deceased individuals, 117 the property right in identity granted under this act shall be deemed to be permanently abandoned when the executors, assigns, 118 119 heirs, or devisees of the deceased individual discontinue good faith efforts to commercially exploit the individual's right in 120 121 the ordinary course of trade and with intent not to resume those 122 efforts. Failure to commercially exploit these rights for three (3) consecutive years after the effective date of this act shall 123 124 be prima facie evidence that the property right has been abandoned. Upon a finding by a court of competent jurisdiction 125 126 that the property right has been abandoned, the right shall fall into the public domain. 127

128 (2) In the event that there is no personal representative,
129 heir, legatee or assign of a deceased individual, the individual
130 and property right in his identity set forth herein shall
131 terminate, and it shall fall into the public domain.
