## HOUSE BILL NO. 1045

AN ACT TO REQUIRE ELECTORS TO PRESENT VALID IDENTIFICATION 1 BEFORE VOTING; TO PROVIDE THAT ANY ELECTOR WITHOUT VALID 2 IDENTIFICATION SHALL SIGN A STATEMENT UNDER OATH AFFIRMING THAT HE 3 IS THE PERSON IDENTIFIED ON THE POLLBOOKS; TO PRESCRIBE A PENALTY 4 5 FOR FALSELY AFFIRMING THE STATEMENT; TO AMEND SECTIONS 23-15-11 б AND 23-15-541, MISSISSIPPI CODE OF 1972, IN CONFORMITY THERETO; 7 AND FOR RELATED PURPOSES. 8 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MISSISSIPPI: SECTION 1. (1) Each elector shall present valid 9 10 identification to an election manager, or the circuit clerk or deputy circuit clerk in the case of absentee voting, before he 11 shall be allowed to vote. Valid identification shall consist of 12 any one (1) of the following: 13 A valid Mississippi driver's license; 14 (a) 15 (b) A valid identification card issued by a branch, department, agency or entity of the State of Mississippi; 16 17 (c) A valid United States passport; 18 (d) A valid employee identification card containing a photograph of the elector and issued by any branch, department, 19 20 agency or entity of the United States government, the State of Mississippi, or any county, municipality, board, authority or 21 22 other entity of this state; 23 (e) A valid employee identification card containing a 24 photograph of the elector and issued by any employer of the elector in the ordinary course of the employer's business; 25 (f) A valid student identification card containing a 26 photograph of the elector from any public or private college, 27 28 university, or postgraduate, technical or professional school 29 located within the State of Mississippi;

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States;

35 (i) A valid United States military identification card;
36 (j) A certified copy of the elector's birth
37 certificate;
38 (k) A valid social security card;

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(1) Certified naturalization documentation;

(m) Official voter registration card; or

41 (n) Any other generally recognized form of photographic42 identification.

If an elector is unable to produce any of the items of 43 (2) identification listed in subsection (1) of this section, he or she 44 shall sign a statement under oath in a form approved by the State 45 Board of Election Commissioners, swearing or affirming that he or 46 47 she is the person identified on the pollbooks. One (1) of the election managers, or the circuit clerk or deputy circuit clerk in 48 49 the case of absentee voting, shall sign the statement as a witness 50 to the oath taken by the elector. The person shall be allowed to 51 vote without undue delay. Any elector who falsely swears or affirms the statement prescribed in this subsection shall be 52 guilty of a felony and, upon conviction, shall be fined not more 53 54 than Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000.00) or imprisoned not less than 55 one (1) year, but not more than five (5) years, or both.

56 **SECTION 2.** Section 23-15-11, Mississippi Code of 1972, is 57 amended as follows:

58 23-15-11. Every inhabitant of this state, except idiots and 59 insane persons, who is a citizen of the United States of America, 60 eighteen (18) years old and upwards, who has resided in this state 61 for thirty (30) days and for thirty (30) days in the county in 62 which he offers to vote, and for thirty (30) days in the H. 05/HR40/R1820 PAGE 2 (GT\BD) 63 incorporated city or town in which he offers to vote, and who 64 shall have been duly registered as an elector pursuant to Section 65 23-15-33, and who has never been convicted of any crime listed in 66 Section 241, Mississippi Constitution of 1890, shall be a 67 qualified elector in and for the county, municipality and voting 68 precinct of his residence, and shall be entitled to vote at any 69 election, provided he complies with the provisions of Section 1 of 70 this act. Any person who will be eighteen (18) years of age or older on or before the date of the general election and who is 71 72 duly registered to vote not less than thirty (30) days prior to 73 the primary election associated with such general election, may vote in such primary election even though such person has not 74 75 reached his or her eighteenth birthday at the time such person 76 offers to vote at such primary election. No others than those 77 above included shall be entitled, or shall be allowed, to vote at any election. 78

79 SECTION 3. Section 23-15-541, Mississippi Code of 1972, is 80 amended as follows:

23-15-541. At all elections, the polls shall be opened at 81 82 seven o'clock in the morning and be kept open until seven o'clock 83 in the evening and no longer. Upon the opening of the polls, and 84 not before, the managers of the election shall designate two (2) of their number, other than the manager theretofore designated to 85 receive the blank ballots, who shall thereupon be known 86 87 respectively as the initialing manager and the alternate 88 initialing manager. The alternate initialing manager, in the 89 absence of the initialing manager, shall perform all of the duties and undertake all of the responsibilities of the initialing 90 91 manager. When any person entitled to vote shall appear to vote, the managers shall first identify the voter by requiring the voter 92 93 to present valid identification as provided in Section 1 of this 94 act; and then the person shall \* \* \* sign his name in a receipt book or booklet provided for that purpose and to be used at that 95 \*HR40/R1820\* H. election only and said receipt book or booklet shall be used in 96 97 lieu of the list of voters who have voted formerly made by the 98 managers or clerks; whereupon and not before, the initialing 99 manager or, in his absence, the alternate initialing manager shall 100 indorse his initials on the back of an official blank ballot, 101 prepared in accordance with law, and at such place on the back of 102 the ballot that the initials may be seen after the ballot has been marked and folded, and when so indorsed he shall deliver it to the 103 voter, which ballot the voter shall mark in the manner provided by 104 105 law, which when done the voter shall deliver the same to the 106 initialing manager or, in his absence, to the alternate initialing manager, in the presence of the others, and the manager shall see 107 108 that the ballot so delivered bears on the back thereof the genuine 109 initials of the initialing manager, or alternate initialing manager, and if so, but not otherwise, the ballot shall be put 110 into the ballot box; and when so done one (1) of the managers or a 111 112 duly appointed clerk shall make the proper entry on the pollbook. 113 If the voter is unable to write his name on the receipt book, a manager or clerk shall note on the back of the ballot that it was 114 115 receipted for by his assistance.

SECTION 4. The Attorney General of the State of Mississippi shall submit this act, immediately upon approval by the Governor, or upon approval by the Legislature subsequent to a veto, to the Attorney General of the United States or to the United States District Court for the District of Columbia in accordance with the provisions of the Voting Rights Act of 1965, as amended and extended.

123 **SECTION 5.** This act shall take effect and be in force from 124 and after the date it is effectuated under Section 5 of the Voting 125 Rights Act of 1965, as amended and extended.
