 27 MISSISSIPPI CODE OF 1972, TO CREATE THE TWENTY-FOURTH CIRCUIT
 28 COURT DISTRICT FROM AND AFTER JANUARY 1, 2014; TO AMEND SECTIONS
 29 23-15-982 AND 23-15-983, MISSISSIPPI CODE OF 1972, IN CONFORMITY
 30 THERETO; AND FOR RELATED PURPOSES.

31 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MISSISSIPPI:

32 **SECTION 1.** Section 9-5-1, Mississippi Code of 1972, is
 33 amended as follows:

34 9-5-1. A chancellor shall be elected for and from each of
 35 the chancery court districts as provided in this chapter and the
 36 listing of individual precincts shall be those precincts as they
 37 existed on October 1, 2000. He shall hold court in any other
 38 district with the consent of the chancellor thereof when in their
 39 opinion the public interest may be thereby promoted. The terms of
 40 all chancellors elected at the regular election for the year 1930
 41 shall begin on the first day of January, 1931, and their terms of

42 office shall continue for four (4) years. A chancellor shall be a
43 resident of the district in which he serves but shall not be
44 required to be a resident of a subdistrict if the district is
45 divided into subdistricts.

46 **SECTION 2.** Section 9-5-3, Mississippi Code of 1972, is
47 brought forward as follows:

48 9-5-3. (1) The state shall be divided into an appropriate
49 number of chancery court districts, severally numbered and
50 comprised of the counties as set forth in the sections which
51 follow. A court to be styled "The Chancery Court of the County of
52 ____" shall be held in each county, and within each judicial
53 district of a county having two (2) judicial districts, at least
54 twice a year. From and after January 1, 1995, the dates upon
55 which court shall be held in chancery court districts consisting
56 of a single county shall be the same dates state agencies and
57 political subdivisions are open for business excluding legal
58 holidays. The dates upon which terms shall commence and the
59 number of days for which terms shall continue in chancery court
60 districts consisting of more than one (1) county shall be set by
61 order of the chancellor in accordance with the provisions of
62 subsection (2) of this section. A matter in court may extend past
63 such terms if the interest of justice so requires.

64 (2) An order establishing the commencement and continuation
65 of terms of court for each of the counties within a chancery court
66 district consisting of more than one (1) county shall be entered
67 annually and not later than October 1 of the year immediately
68 preceding the calendar year for which such terms of court are to
69 become effective. Notice of the dates upon which the terms of
70 court shall commence and the number of days for which such terms
71 shall continue in each of the counties within a chancery court
72 district shall be posted in the office of the chancery clerk of
73 each county within the district and mailed to the office of the
74 Secretary of State for publication and distribution to all members

75 of the Mississippi Bar. In the event that an order is not timely
76 entered as herein provided, the terms of court for each of the
77 counties within any such chancery court district shall remain
78 unchanged for the next calendar year.

79 (3) The number of chancellorships for each chancery court
80 district shall be determined by the Legislature based upon the
81 following criteria:

- 82 (a) The population of the district;
- 83 (b) The number of cases filed in the district;
- 84 (c) The case load of each chancellor in the district;
- 85 (d) The geographic area of the district;
- 86 (e) An analysis of the needs of the district by the
87 court personnel of the district; and
- 88 (f) Any other appropriate criteria.

89 (4) The Judicial College of the University of Mississippi
90 Law Center and the Administrative Office of Courts shall determine
91 the appropriate:

- 92 (a) Specific data to be collected as a basis for
93 applying the above criteria;
- 94 (b) Method of collecting and maintaining the specified
95 data; and
- 96 (c) Method of assimilating the specified data.

97 (5) In a district having more than one (1) office of
98 chancellor, there shall be no distinction whatsoever in the
99 powers, duties and emoluments of those offices except that the
100 chancellor who has been for the longest time continuously a
101 chancellor of that court or, should no chancellor have served
102 longer in office than the others, the chancellor who has been for
103 the longest time a member of the Mississippi Bar, shall be the
104 senior chancellor. The senior chancellor shall have the right to
105 assign causes and dockets and to set terms in districts consisting
106 of more than one (1) county.

107 **SECTION 3.** Section 9-5-5, Mississippi Code of 1972, is
108 amended as follows:

109 9-5-5. (1) The First Chancery Court District shall be
110 comprised of the following counties:

- 111 (a) Alcorn County;
- 112 (b) Itawamba County;
- 113 (c) Lee County;
- 114 (d) Monroe County;
- 115 (e) Pontotoc County;
- 116 (f) Prentiss County;
- 117 (g) Tishomingo County; and
- 118 (h) Union County.

119 (2) The First Chancery Court District shall be divided into
120 two (2) subdistricts as follows:

121 (a) Subdistrict 1-1 shall consist of Itawamba, Lee,
122 Monroe, Pontotoc and Union Counties.

123 (b) Subdistrict 1-2 shall consist of Alcorn, Prentiss
124 and Tishomingo Counties.

125 **SECTION 4.** Section 9-5-7, Mississippi Code of 1972, is
126 amended as follows:

127 9-5-7. (1) There shall be four (4) chancellors for the
128 First Chancery Court District. Three (3) chancellors shall be
129 elected from Subdistrict 1-1 and one (1) chancellor shall be
130 elected from Subdistrict 1-2.

131 (2) For purposes of appointment and election, the three (3)
132 chancellorships in Subdistrict 1-1 shall be separate and distinct
133 and denominated for purposes of appointment and election only as
134 "Place One," "Place Two" and "Place Three."

135 **SECTION 5.** Section 9-5-9, Mississippi Code of 1972, is
136 brought forward as follows:

137 9-5-9. The Second Chancery Court District shall be comprised
138 of the following counties:

- 139 (a) Jasper County;

140 (b) Newton County; and

141 (c) Scott County.

142 **SECTION 6.** Section 9-5-11, Mississippi Code of 1972, is
143 brought forward as follows:

144 9-5-11. (1) The Third Chancery Court District shall be
145 comprised of the following counties:

146 (a) DeSoto County;

147 (b) Grenada County;

148 (c) Montgomery County;

149 (d) Panola County;

150 (e) Tate County; and

151 (f) Yalobusha County.

152 (2) The Third Chancery Court District shall be divided into
153 two (2) subdistricts as follows:

154 (a) Subdistrict 3-1 shall consist of DeSoto County.

155 (b) Subdistrict 3-2 shall consist of Grenada County,
156 Montgomery County, Panola County, Tate County and Yalobusha
157 County.

158 **SECTION 7.** Section 9-5-13, Mississippi Code of 1972, is
159 amended as follows:

160 9-5-13. (1) There shall be three (3) chancellors for the
161 Third Chancery Court District.

162 (2) One (1) chancellor of Subdistrict 3-1 shall be elected
163 from Subdistrict 3-1. * * * Two (2) chancellors * * * shall be
164 elected from Subdistrict 3-2.

165 (3) For purposes of appointment and election, the two (2)
166 chancellorships in Subdistrict 3-2 shall be separate and distinct
167 and denominated for purposes of appointment and election only as
168 "Place One" and "Place Two."

169 **SECTION 8.** Section 9-5-15, Mississippi Code of 1972, is
170 brought forward as follows:

171 9-5-15. The Fourth Chancery Court District shall be
172 comprised of the following counties:

- 173 (a) Amite County;
174 (b) Franklin County;
175 (c) Pike County; and
176 (d) Walthall County.

177 **SECTION 9.** Section 9-5-17, Mississippi Code of 1972, is
178 amended as follows:

179 9-5-17. (1) The Fifth Chancery Court District shall be
180 comprised of Hinds County.

181 (2) The Fifth Chancery Court District shall be divided into
182 the following four (4) subdistricts:

183 (a) Subdistrict 5-1 shall consist of the following
184 precincts in Hinds County: Precincts 33, 34, 35, 36, 44, 45, 46,
185 78, 79, 72, 73, 74, 75, 76, 77, 92, 93, 96, 1, 2, 4, 5, 6, 8, 9,
186 10, 32, 47 and 97.

187 (b) Subdistrict 5-2 shall consist of the following
188 precincts in Hinds County: Precincts 37, 38, 39, 40, 41, 42, 43,
189 80, 81, 82, 83, 84, 11, 12, 13, 14, 15, 16, 17, * * * 27, * * *
190 29, 30 and 85, Brownsville, Cynthia, Pocahontas and Tinnin
191 Precincts.

192 (c) Subdistrict 5-3 shall consist of the following
193 precincts in Hinds County: Precincts 21, 22, 23, 25, 28, 31, 86,
194 58, 59, 66, 67, 68, 69, 70, 71, 89, 24, 26, 54, 55, 56, 57, 60,
195 61, 62, 18, 19, 20, 50, 51, 52, 53, 63 and 64 and Jackson State
196 Precinct.

197 (d) Subdistrict 5-4 shall consist of the following
198 precincts in Hinds County: Precincts 94, 95, 87, 88, 90 and 91,
199 Bolton, Edwards, Pine Haven, Utica 1, Utica 2, Byram 1, Byram 2,
200 Cayuga, Learned, Clinton 1, Clinton 2, Clinton 3, Clinton 4,
201 Clinton 5, Clinton 6, Raymond 1, Raymond 2, Spring Ridge, St.
202 Thomas, Old Byram, Terry, Chapel Hill and Dry Grove Precincts.

203 **SECTION 10.** Section 9-5-19, Mississippi Code of 1972, is
204 brought forward as follows:

205 9-5-19. (1) There shall be four (4) chancellors for the
206 Fifth Chancery Court District. One (1) chancellor shall be
207 elected from each subdistrict.

208 (2) While there shall be no limitation whatsoever upon the
209 powers and duties of the said chancellors other than as cast upon
210 them by the Constitution and laws of this state, the court in the
211 First Judicial District of Hinds County, in the discretion of the
212 senior chancellor, may be divided into four (4) divisions as a
213 matter of convenience by the entry of an order upon the minutes of
214 the court.

215 **SECTION 11.** Section 9-5-21, Mississippi Code of 1972, is
216 brought forward as follows:

217 9-5-21. The Sixth Chancery Court District shall be comprised
218 of the following counties:

- 219 (a) Attala County;
- 220 (b) Carroll County;
- 221 (c) Choctaw County;
- 222 (d) Kemper County;
- 223 (e) Neshoba County; and
- 224 (f) Winston County.

225 **SECTION 12.** Section 9-5-22, Mississippi Code of 1972, is
226 brought forward as follows:

227 9-5-22. There shall be two (2) chancellors for the Sixth
228 Chancery Court District.

229 **SECTION 13.** Section 9-5-23, Mississippi Code of 1972, is
230 brought forward as follows:

231 9-5-23. (1) The Seventh Chancery Court District shall be
232 comprised of the following counties:

- 233 (a) Bolivar County;
- 234 (b) Coahoma County;
- 235 (c) Leflore County;
- 236 (d) Quitman County;
- 237 (e) Tallahatchie County; and

238 (f) Tunica County.

239 (2) The Seventh Chancery Court District shall be divided
240 into two (2) subdistricts as follows:

241 (a) Subdistrict 7-1 shall consist of Bolivar County and
242 Coahoma County;

243 (b) Subdistrict 7-2 shall consist of Leflore County,
244 Quitman County, Tallahatchie County and Tunica County.

245 **SECTION 14.** Section 9-5-25, Mississippi Code of 1972, is
246 brought forward as follows:

247 9-5-25. There shall be two (2) chancellors for the Seventh
248 Chancery Court District. One (1) chancellor shall be elected from
249 each subdistrict.

250 **SECTION 15.** Section 9-5-27, Mississippi Code of 1972, is
251 brought forward as follows:

252 9-5-27. The Eighth Chancery Court District shall be
253 comprised of the following counties:

254 (a) Hancock County;

255 (b) Harrison County; and

256 (c) Stone County.

257 **SECTION 16.** Section 9-5-29, Mississippi Code of 1972, is
258 brought forward as follows:

259 9-5-29. (1) There shall be four (4) chancellors for the
260 Eighth Chancery Court District.

261 (2) For purposes of appointment and election, the four (4)
262 chancellorships shall be separate and distinct and denominated for
263 purposes of appointment and election only as "Place One," "Place
264 Two," "Place Three" and "Place Four."

265 (3) While there shall be no limitation whatsoever upon the
266 powers and duties of said chancellors other than as cast upon them
267 by the Constitution and laws of this state, the court in the
268 Eighth Chancery Court District, in the discretion of the senior
269 chancellor, may be divided into four (4) divisions as a matter of

270 convenience by the entry of an order upon the minutes of the
271 court.

272 **SECTION 17.** Section 9-5-31, Mississippi Code of 1972, is
273 amended as follows:

274 9-5-31. (1) The Ninth Chancery Court District shall be
275 comprised of the following counties:

- 276 (a) Humphreys County;
- 277 (b) Issaquena County;
- 278 (c) Sharkey County;
- 279 (d) Sunflower County;
- 280 (e) Warren County; and
- 281 (f) Washington County.

282 (2) The Ninth Chancery Court District shall be divided into
283 three (3) subdistricts as follows:

284 (a) Subdistrict 9-1 shall consist of the following
285 precincts in the following counties:

286 (i) Sunflower County: Indianola 3 North,
287 Indianola 3 South, Ruleville, Boyer-Linn, Fairview-Hale, Rome,
288 Sunflower Plantation, Drew and Ruleville North Precincts; and

289 (ii) Washington County: Buster Brown Community
290 Center, Extension Building, Faith Lutheran Church, Brent Center,
291 William Percy Library, American Legion, Metcalf City Hall, Elks
292 Club, Leland Health Department Clinic, Leland Light and Water
293 Plant and Greenville Industrial College Precincts.

294 (b) Subdistrict 9-2 shall consist of Humphreys County
295 and the following precincts in the following counties:

296 (i) Sunflower County: Inverness, Indianola 1,
297 Moorhead, Indianola 2 West, Indianola 2 East, Sunflower, Indianola
298 3 Northeast, Doddsville and Sunflower 4 Precincts; and

299 (ii) Washington County: St. James Episcopal
300 Church, Swiftwater Baptist Church, Glen Allan Health Clinic,
301 Italian Club, Ward's Recreation Center, Avon Health Center, Arcola
302 City Hall, Kapco Co., Hollandale City Hall, Darlove Baptist

303 Church, Mangelardi Bourbon Store and Grace Methodist Church
304 Precincts.

305 (c) Subdistrict 9-3 shall consist of Issaquena County,
306 Sharkey County and Warren County.

307 **SECTION 18.** Section 9-5-33, Mississippi Code of 1972, is
308 brought forward as follows:

309 9-5-33. There shall be three (3) chancellors for the Ninth
310 Chancery Court District. One (1) chancellor shall be elected from
311 each subdistrict.

312 **SECTION 19.** Section 9-5-35, Mississippi Code of 1972, is
313 brought forward as follows:

314 9-5-35. The Tenth Chancery Court District shall be comprised
315 of the following counties:

- 316 (a) Forrest County;
- 317 (b) Lamar County;
- 318 (c) Marion County;
- 319 (d) Pearl River County; and
- 320 (e) Perry County.

321 **SECTION 20.** Section 9-5-36, Mississippi Code of 1972, is
322 amended as follows:

323 9-5-36. (1) There shall be four (4) chancellors for the
324 Tenth Chancery Court District.

325 (2) For purposes of appointment and election, the four (4)
326 chancellorships shall be separate and distinct and denominated for
327 purposes of appointment and election only as "Place One," "Place
328 Two," * * * "Place Three" and "Place Four," respectively. The
329 chancellor to fill Place One shall be a resident of Forrest,
330 Lamar, Marion, Pearl River or Perry County. The chancellor to
331 fill Place Two shall be a resident of Lamar, Marion, Pearl River
332 or Perry County. The chancellor to fill Place Three shall be a
333 resident of Forrest County. The chancellor to fill Place Four
334 shall be a resident of Forrest, Lamar, Marion, Pearl River or
335 Perry County. Election of the four (4) offices of chancellor

336 shall be by election to be held in every county within the Tenth
337 Chancery Court District of Mississippi.

338 **SECTION 21.** Section 9-5-37, Mississippi Code of 1972, is
339 amended as follows:

340 9-5-37. (1) The Eleventh Chancery Court District shall be
341 comprised of the following counties:

- 342 (a) Holmes County;
- 343 (b) Leake County;
- 344 (c) Madison County; and
- 345 (d) Yazoo County.

346 (2) The Eleventh Chancery Court District shall be divided
347 into two (2) subdistricts as follows:

348 (a) Subdistrict 11-1 shall consist of Holmes County,
349 Yazoo County and Canton Precinct 4, Canton Precinct 5, Smith
350 School, Magnolia Heights, Flora and Bible Church Precincts of
351 Madison County;

352 (b) Subdistrict 11-2 shall consist of Leake County and
353 Ratliff Ferry, Madisonville, Trace Harbor, Canton Precinct 1,
354 Canton Precinct 2, Canton Precinct 3, Canton Precinct 7, Cameron
355 Street, Main Harbor, Victory Baptist Church, Bear Creek, Madison
356 1, Madison 2, Madison 3, Ridgeland 1, Ridgeland 3, Ridgeland 4,
357 Ridgeland First Methodist Church, Gluckstadt, Lorman/Cavalier,
358 Tougaloo, Cobblestone Church of God, Highland Colony Baptist
359 Church, Whisper Lake, Virililia, Liberty, New Industrial Park,
360 Madison County Baptist Family Life Center, Cameron, Couparle,
361 Camden, Sharon and Luther Branson School Precincts of Madison
362 County.

363 **SECTION 22.** Section 9-5-38, Mississippi Code of 1972, is
364 brought forward as follows:

365 9-5-38. There shall be two (2) chancellors for the Eleventh
366 Chancery Court District. One (1) chancellor shall be elected from
367 each subdistrict.

368 **SECTION 23.** Section 9-5-39, Mississippi Code of 1972, is
369 brought forward as follows:

370 9-5-39. The Twelfth Chancery Court District shall be
371 comprised of the following counties:

- 372 (a) Clarke County; and
- 373 (b) Lauderdale County.

374 **SECTION 24.** Section 9-5-40, Mississippi Code of 1972, is
375 brought forward as follows:

376 9-5-40. There shall be two (2) judges for the Twelfth
377 Chancery Court District.

378 **SECTION 25.** Section 9-5-41, Mississippi Code of 1972, is
379 brought forward as follows:

380 9-5-41. The Thirteenth Chancery Court District shall be
381 comprised of the following counties:

- 382 (a) Covington County;
- 383 (b) Jefferson Davis County;
- 384 (c) Lawrence County;
- 385 (d) Simpson County; and
- 386 (e) Smith County.

387 **SECTION 26.** Section 9-5-43, Mississippi Code of 1972, is
388 amended as follows:

389 9-5-43. (1) The Fourteenth Chancery Court District shall be
390 comprised of the following counties:

- 391 (a) Chickasaw County;
- 392 (b) Clay County;
- 393 (c) Lowndes County;
- 394 (d) Noxubee County;
- 395 (e) Oktibbeha County; and
- 396 (f) Webster County.

397 (2) The Fourteenth Chancery Court District shall be divided
398 into three (3) subdistricts as follows:

- 399 (a) Subdistrict 14-1 shall consist of Chickasaw County,
400 Webster County and the following precincts in Oktibbeha County:

401 West Starkville, Adaton, North Longview, Self Creek, Double
402 Springs, Northeast Starkville, East Starkville, North Starkville,
403 Maben, South Starkville, South Longview, Craig Springs, Bradley,
404 Center Grove and Sturgis Precincts.

405 (b) Subdistrict 14-2 shall consist of the following
406 precincts in the following counties:

407 (i) Clay County: Vinton, East West Point, Siloam,
408 Central West Point, South West Point and Cedar Bluff Precincts;
409 and

410 (ii) Lowndes County: Caledonia, Steens A, Steens
411 B, Caldwell, Stokes Beard B, Fairview, Sale, Rural Hill B, Lee
412 High, Brandon A, Brandon B, Franklin A, Franklin B, Air Base A,
413 Air Base B, Air Base C, Air Base D, Steens C, Rural Hill A, New
414 Hope A, Mitchell, New Hope B, Union Academy A and University A
415 Precincts.

416 (c) Subdistrict 14-3 shall consist of Noxubee County
417 and the following precincts in the following counties:

418 (i) Clay County: North West Point, Union Star,
419 Tibbee, Cairo, Caradine, Una, West Point, Pheba and Pine Bluff
420 Precincts;

421 (ii) Lowndes County: Co-op A, Co-op B, Trinity,
422 Coleman, Stokes Beard A, Fairgrounds A, Fairgrounds B, Fairgrounds
423 C, Coleman, Plum Grove A, Crawford A, Hunt C, Hunt B, Hunt A,
424 Union Academy B, University B, West Lowndes, Artesia, Mayhew,
425 Crawford B, Crawford C, New Hope C, Plum Grove B and Plum Grove C
426 Precincts; and

427 (iii) Oktibbeha County: Osborn, Hickory Grove,
428 Bell Schoolhouse, Central Starkville, Gillespie Street Center,
429 Sessums and Oktoc Precincts.

430 **SECTION 27.** Section 9-5-45, Mississippi Code of 1972, is
431 brought forward as follows:

432 9-5-45. There shall be three (3) chancellors for the
433 Fourteenth Chancery Court District. One (1) chancellor shall be
434 elected from each subdistrict.

435 **SECTION 28.** Section 9-5-47, Mississippi Code of 1972, is
436 brought forward as follows:

946 **SECTION 67.** Section 9-7-46, Mississippi Code of 1972, is
947 amended as follows:

950 Seventeenth Circuit Court District.

951 (2) For the purpose of appointment and election, the four
952 (4) judgeships shall be separate and distinct, and two (2) judges
953 shall be elected from Subdistrict 17-1 and two (2) judges shall be

954 elected from Subdistrict 17-2. For purposes of appointment and
955 election, the two (2) judgeships in Subdistrict 17-1 shall be
956 separate and distinct and denominated for purposes of appointment
957 and election only as "Place One" and "Place Two."

976 George and Greene Counties, the amount of their present local

997 9-7-54. (1) There shall be two (2) judges for the Twentieth
998 Circuit Court District.

999 (2) For the purposes of appointment and election, the two
1000 (2) judgeships shall be separate and distinct and denominated for
1001 purposes of appointment and election only as "Place One" and
1002 "Place Two."

1003 **SECTION 73.** Section 9-7-55, Mississippi Code of 1972, is
1004 brought forward as follows:

1005 9-7-55. The Twenty-first Circuit Court District shall be
1006 comprised of the following counties:

- 1007 (a) Holmes County;
1008 (b) Humphreys County; and
1009 (c) Yazoo County.

1010 **SECTION 74.** Section 9-7-57, Mississippi Code of 1972, is
1011 brought forward as follows:

1012 9-7-57. The Twenty-second Circuit Court District shall be
1013 comprised of the following counties:

- 1014 (a) Claiborne County;
1015 (b) Copiah County; and
1016 (c) Jefferson County.

1017 **SECTION 75.** The following shall be codified as Section
1018 9-7-59, Mississippi Code of 1972:

1019 9-7-59. The Twenty-third Circuit Court District shall be
1020 Madison County and shall be divided into two (2) subdistricts as
1021 follows:

1022 (a) (i) Subdistrict 23-1 shall consist of the
1023 following precincts: Ratliff Ferry, Canton Precinct 2, Canton
1024 Precinct 3, Canton Precinct 7, Smith School, Magnolia Heights,
1025 Flora, Virililia, Canton Precinct 5, Liberty, New Industrial Park,
1026 Madison County Baptist Family Life Center, Cameron, Couparle,
1027 Camden, Sharon, Canton Precinct 1, Canton Precinct 4, Luther
1028 Branson School and Bible Church Precincts.

1029 (ii) Subdistrict 23-1 shall consist of the
1030 following partial precincts: Madisonville, Bear Creek and
1031 Gluckstadt Precincts. The Split Precinct Block List developed in
1032 conjunction with Chapter 761, Laws of 2002, that details portions
1033 of partial or split precincts that are contained within a
1034 subdistrict by census tract and block number and was utilized in
1035 developing the partial or split precincts of this subdistrict is
1036 hereby incorporated and shall be construed to be an integral part
1037 of this section.

1044 (ii) Subdistrict 23-2 shall consist of that
1045 portion of the following partial precincts not included in
1046 Subdistrict 23-1: Madisonville, Bear Creek and Gluckstadt
1047 Precincts.

1048 **SECTION 76.** The following shall be codified as Section
1049 9-7-60, Mississippi Code of 1972:

1050 9-7-60. There shall be two (2) judges for the Twenty-third
1051 Circuit Court District. One (1) judge shall be elected from each
1052 subdistrict.

1054 9-7-61, Mississippi Code of 1972:

1055 9-7-61. (1) The Twenty-fourth Circuit Court District shall
1056 be DeSoto County.

1057 (2) This section shall take effect and be in force from and
1058 after January 1, 2014.

1059 **SECTION 78.** The following shall be codified as Section
1060 9-7-62, Mississippi Code of 1972:

1061 9-7-62. (1) There shall be two (2) judges for the
1062 Twenty-fourth Circuit Court District.

1063 (2) For the purposes of appointment and election, the two
1064 (2) judgeships shall be separate and distinct and denominated for
1065 purposes of appointment and election only as "Place One" and
1066 "Place Two."

1067 (3) This section shall take effect and be in force from and
1068 after January 1, 2014.

1069 **SECTION 79.** Section 23-15-982, Mississippi Code of 1972, is
1070 amended as follows:

1071 23-15-982. (1) Majority of vote equals any excess of the
1072 total vote for all candidates divided by the number of judgeships
1073 to be filled divided by two (2).

1074 If some or all candidates in a multijudge election do not
1075 receive a majority of the vote, then candidates equal in number to
1076 twice the number of remaining positions to be filled and having
1077 the highest votes shall run in a runoff election. In such event,
1078 if there is not a sufficient number of remaining candidates equal
1079 to twice the number of remaining positions to be filled, then all
1080 remaining candidates shall run in the runoff election.

1081 (2) Any tie votes which require resolution to determine who
1082 shall enter a runoff election shall be determined by the

1083 commissioners of election in the manner prescribed by Sections
1084 23-15-601 and 23-15-605.

1085 Candidates equal to the remaining number of positions to be
1086 filled who have the highest votes in the runoff election are
1087 elected.

1088 Any tie votes which must be determined in order to decide who
1089 is elected as a result of a runoff election shall be determined by
1090 the State Election Commission in the manner prescribed by Sections
1091 23-15-601 and 23-15-605.

1092 (3) The provisions of this section shall apply only to
1093 districts and subdistricts which are multijudge districts except
1094 for the First, Eighth, Tenth, Sixteenth, Eighteenth and Twentieth
1095 Chancery Court Districts and the Subdistrict 1-2, Second, Third,
1096 Eighth, Subdistrict 17-1, Nineteenth and Twentieth Circuit Court
1097 Districts.

1098 **SECTION 80.** Section 23-15-983, Mississippi Code of 1972, is
1099 amended as follows:

1100 23-15-983. At the general election, the candidates equal to
1101 the number of positions to be filled and having the highest votes
1102 shall be elected.

1103 Any tie votes in the general election which must be resolved
1104 in order to determine who is elected shall be resolved in the
1105 manner prescribed by Sections 23-15-601 and 23-15-605.

1106 The provisions of this section shall apply only to districts
1107 and subdistricts which are multijudge districts except for the
1108 First, Eighth, Tenth, Sixteenth, Eighteenth and Twentieth Chancery
1109 Court Districts and the Subdistrict 1-2, Second, Third, Eighth,
1110 Subdistrict 17-1, Nineteenth and Twentieth Circuit Court
1111 Districts.

1112 **SECTION 81.** No new judgeships or chancellorships created by
1113 this act shall be filled until the judicial elections are
1114 conducted in 2006. Any district attorneys for circuit court
1115 districts created by this act whose term of office begins on

1116 January 1, 2007, shall be elected at a special election to be held
1117 at the same time as the judicial elections in 2006. Thereafter,
1118 such district attorneys shall be elected at the time and in the
1119 manner provided by law for electing district attorneys.

1120 **SECTION 82.** The Attorney General of the State of Mississippi
1121 shall submit this act, immediately upon approval by the Governor,
1122 or upon approval by the Legislature subsequent to a veto, to the
1123 Attorney General of the United States or to the United States
1124 District Court for the District of Columbia in accordance with the
1125 provisions of the Voting Rights Act of 1965, as amended and
1126 extended.

1127 **SECTION 83.** This act shall take effect and be in force from
1128 and after January 1, 2006, provided that it is effectuated under
1129 Section 5 of the Voting Rights Act of 1965, as amended and
1130 extended.
