HOUSE BILL NO. 1332

AN ACT TO CREATE THE MISSISSIPPI YOUTHBUILD ACT TO BE 1 2 ADMINISTERED BY THE OFFICE OF FAMILY AND CHILDREN'S SERVICES OF 3 THE DEPARTMENT OF HUMAN SERVICES; TO PROVIDE THAT CERTAIN 4 DISADVANTAGED YOUTH WILL BE PROVIDED WITH OPPORTUNITIES FOR EMPLOYMENT, EDUCATION, LEADERSHIP DEVELOPMENT, ENTREPRENEURIAL 5 б SKILLS DEVELOPMENT AND TRAINING IN THE CONSTRUCTION OR 7 REHABILITATION OF HOUSING FOR SPECIAL NEED POPULATIONS, VERY 8 LOW-INCOME HOUSEHOLDS OR LOW-INCOME HOUSEHOLDS; TO ESTABLISH REQUIREMENTS FOR YOUTHBUILD PROGRAMS, ELIGIBLE ACTIVITIES, 9 10 ENTITIES ELIGIBLE TO ADMINISTER A YOUTHBUILD PROGRAM AND GRANT 11 APPLICATIONS TO ADMINISTER A YOUTHBUILD PROGRAM; AND FOR RELATED 12 PURPOSES. 13 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MISSISSIPPI: SECTION 1. This act may be cited as the "Mississippi 14 Youthbuild Act." 15 16 SECTION 2. The purpose of this act is: (a) To enable economically disadvantaged youth, 17 especially youth who have not finished high school, to obtain the 18 education, job skills training, personal counseling, leadership 19 development skills training, job placement assistance and 20 long-term follow-up services necessary for them to achieve 21 permanent economic self-sufficiency, while at the same time 22 providing valuable community service that addresses urgent 23 community needs, including the demand for affordable housing and 24 25 the need for young role models and mentors for younger teenagers and children; 26 27 (b) To provide communities the opportunity to establish or rebuild neighborhood stability in economically depressed and 28 low-income areas, as well as historic areas requiring restoration 29 30 or preservation, while providing economically disadvantaged youth

31 and youth who have not finished high school an opportunity for

32 meaningful participation in society;

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33 (c) To allow communities to expand the supply of
 34 affordable housing for homeless and other low-income individuals
 35 by utilizing the energies and talents of economically

36 disadvantaged youth and young people who have not graduated from 37 high school; and

38 (d) To foster the development of leadership skills and39 a commitment to community development among youth.

40 SECTION 3. As used in this act:

41 (a) "Applicant" means a public or private
42 not-for-profit agency eligible to provide education and employment
43 training under federal or state employment training programs.

44 (b) "Director" means the Director of the Office of
45 Family and Children's Services of the Department of Human
46 Services.

(c) "Very low-income" means a person or household whose income is at or below fifty percent (50%) of the median family income, adjusted for household size, for the county where the household is located.

(d) "Youthbuild" means any program that provides disadvantaged youth with opportunities for employment, education, leadership development, entrepreneurial skills development, and training in the construction or rehabilitation of housing for special-need populations, very low-income households or low-income households.

57 <u>SECTION 4.</u> The director is authorized to make grants to 58 applicants for the purpose of carrying out Youthbuild programs as 59 approved under this section. All programs funded under the 60 provisions of this section shall reflect strong youth and 61 community involvement. In addition, funding provided under this 62 section shall be used by each Youthbuild program to provide, at a 63 minimum, the following services:

64 (a) Acquisition, rehabilitation, acquisition and 65 rehabilitation, or construction of housing and related facilities H. B. No. 1332 *HR03/R1375* 05/HR03/R1375 PAGE 2 (CTE\LH) to be used for the purpose of providing home ownership for
disadvantaged persons, residential housing for homeless
individuals, and low-income and very low-income families, or
transitional housing for persons who are homeless, have
disabilities, are ill, are deinstitutionalized, or have special
needs, and rehabilitation or construction of community facilities
by not-for-profit or public agencies.

73 Integrated education and job skills training (b) services and activities, which are evenly divided within the 74 program, with fifty percent (50%) of students' time spent in 75 76 classroom-based instruction, counseling, and leadership development instruction and fifty percent (50%) of their time 77 78 spent in experimental training on the construction site. The 79 programs shall include, at a minimum, the following elements:

80 An education component that includes basic (i) skills instruction, secondary education services, and other 81 82 activities designed to lead to the attainment of a high school 83 diploma or its equivalent. The curriculum for this component shall include math, language arts, vocational education, life 84 85 skills training, social studies related to the cultural and community history of the students, leadership skills and other 86 87 topics at the discretion of the programs. Bilingual services shall be available for individuals with limited English 88 proficiency. The desired minimum teacher to student ratio shall 89 90 be one (1) teacher for every twelve (12) students.

(ii) A work experience and skills training 91 92 component apprenticeship program that includes the construction and rehabilitation activities described in paragraph (a) of this 93 The process of construction must be coupled with skills 94 section. training and with close on-site supervision by experienced 95 96 trainers. The curriculum for this component shall contain a set 97 of locally agreed upon skills and competencies that are systematically taught, with a student's mastery assessed 98 *HR03/R1375* H. B. 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99 individually on a regular, ongoing basis. Safety skills shall be 100 taught at the outset. The desired trainer to student ratio shall 101 be one (1) trainer for every seven (7) students. The work 102 experience and skills training component shall be coordinated to 103 the maximum extent feasible with preapprenticeship and 104 apprenticeship programs.

105 (iii) Assistance in attaining post secondary 106 education and required financial aid shall be made available to 107 participants before graduation.

108 (c) Counseling services designed to assist participants 109 to positively participate in society, which should include all of the following if necessary: outreach, assessment and orientation; 110 111 individual and peer counseling; life skills training; drug and alcohol abuse education and prevention; and referral to 112 appropriate drug rehabilitation, medical, mental health, legal, 113 housing, and other services and resources in the community. 114 The 115 desired counselor to participant ratio shall be one (1) counselor 116 for every twenty-four (24) students.

Leadership development training that provides 117 (d) 118 participants with meaningful opportunities to develop leadership skills such as decision making, problem solving and negotiating. 119 120 The program must also encourage participants to develop strong peer group ties that support their mutual pursuit of skills and 121 122 values. All programs must establish a youth council in which 123 participants are afforded opportunities to develop public speaking and negotiating skills, and management and policy making 124 125 participation in specific aspects of the program.

(e) A training subsidy, living allowance or stipend
that is no less than the minimum wage must be provided to program
participants for the time spent at the work site in construction
training. For those participants who receive public assistance,
this training subsidy, living allowance, or stipend will not
affect their housing benefits, medical benefits, child care
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05/HR03/R1375 PAGE 4 (CTE\LH) 132 benefits or food stamp benefits. Stipends and wages may be 133 distributed in a manner that offers incentives for good 134 performance.

(f) Full-time participation in a Youthbuild program shall be offered for a period of not less than six (6) months and not more than twenty-four (24) months.

A concentrated effort shall be made to find 138 (a) construction, construction-related and nonconstruction jobs for 139 all graduates of the program who have performed well. The skills 140 141 training curriculum shall provide participants with basic 142 preparation for seeking and maintaining a job. Follow-up counseling and assistance in job seeking also shall be provided to 143 144 participants for twelve (12) months following graduation from the 145 program.

(h) All programs serving twenty-four (24) trainees or
more are required to have a full-time director responsible for the
coordination of all aspects of the Youthbuild program.

149 <u>SECTION 5.</u> Implementation grants may be used to carry out 150 the activities listed in Section 4 of this act. Other eligible 151 activities include the following:

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(a) Legal fees for housing acquisition.

(b) Administrative costs of the applicant, which may not exceed fifteen percent (15%) of the amount of assistance provided, or such higher percentage as the director determines is necessary to support capacity development of a private nonprofit community-based organization.

(c) Defraying costs for the ongoing training and technical assistance needs of the recipients that are related to developing and carrying out the Youthbuild program, including the following: the director may reserve up to five percent (5%) of the Mississippi Youthbuild program appropriations to enter into a contract with Youthbuild USA to provide assistance to the director in providing training and technical assistance to, or in the H. 167 <u>SECTION 6.</u> Eligible participants are youth sixteen (16) to 168 twenty-four (24) years old who are economically disadvantaged as 169 defined in 29 USCS Section 1508, and who are part of one (1) of 170 the following groups:

171 (a) Persons who are not attending any school and have172 not received a secondary school diploma or its equivalent.

(b) Persons currently enrolled in a traditional or alternative school setting or a GED program and who are in danger of dropping out of school.

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(c) Very low-income persons.

Up to twenty-five percent (25%) of the participants in the program may be individuals who do not meet the requirements of paragraphs (a), (b) and (c) of this section, but who have educational needs despite the attainment of a high school diploma.

181 <u>SECTION 7.</u> (1) Those eligible to be awarded funds under 182 this act are not-for-profit private agencies, or public agencies 183 with experience operating a Youthbuild program or with a plan to 184 incubate a Youthbuild program until it can be established as a 185 not-for-profit private agency.

186 (2) Priority in the awarding of funds under this act shall 187 be given to applicants with experience in operating Youthbuild 188 programs. Organizations claiming to have operated Youthbuild 189 programs must be licensed by Youthbuild USA or be organizations 190 that have received federal HUD Youthbuild funding.

191SECTION 8.The director shall require that an application192for Youthbuild funds under this act contain at a minimum:

193 (a) A request for an implementation grant, specifying194 the amount of the grant requested and its proposed uses;

(b) A description of the applicant and a statement of
its qualifications, including a description of the applicant's
past experience running a Youthbuild program, and with housing

202 (c) A description of the proposed construction site for203 the program and evidence of site control;

204 (d) A description of the educational and job training
205 activities, work opportunities and other services that will be
206 provided to participants;

207 (e) A description of the proposed construction or
208 rehabilitation activities to be undertaken and the anticipated
209 schedule for carrying out those activities;

210 (f) A description of the manner in which eligible youths will be recruited and selected, including a description of 211 the arrangements that will be made with community-based 212 organizations, local education agencies, including agencies of 213 214 Native American nations, public assistance agencies, the courts of 215 jurisdiction for status and youth offenders, shelters for homeless individuals and other agencies that serve homeless youth, foster 216 217 care agencies, and other appropriate public and private agencies;

(g) A description of the special efforts that will be undertaken to recruit eligible young women (including young women with dependent children) with appropriate supports, especially child care;

(h) A description of how the proposed program will be coordinated with other federal, state, and local activities and activities conducted by Native American nations, including public schools, national service, crime prevention programs, vocational, adult, and bilingual education programs and job training;

(i) Assurances that there will be a sufficient number
of adequately trained supervisory personnel in the program who
have attained the level of journeyman or its equivalent;

any local building trade unions that may exist, regarding their
involvement in training, and the relationship of the Youthbuild
program with established apprenticeship programs;

(k) A description of activities that will be undertaken to develop the leadership skills of participants, including their role in decision making;

(1) A detailed budget and a description of the systems
of fiscal controls and auditing and accountability procedures that
will be used to ensure fiscal soundness;

(m) A description of any contracts and arrangements entered into between the applicant and other agencies and entities, including all in-kind donations and grants from both public and private entities that will serve to augment funds appropriated for this act;

(n) Identification and description of the financing proposed for any acquisition of the property, rehabilitation or construction;

(o) Identification and description of the entity thatwill operate and manage the property;

(p) A certification that the applicant will comply with the requirements of the Fair Housing Act, Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, and the Age Discrimination Act of 1975, and will affirmatively further fair housing; and

255 (q) The qualifications and past experience of the 256 person who will fill the full-time director position.

257 **SECTION 9.** This act shall take effect and be in force from 258 and after July 1, 2005.
