| 3 | WHEREAS, as people of decency, integrity and honor should       |
| 4 | condemn lynching that was performed due to racial and religious |
| 5 | prejudice; and  |
| 6 | WHEREAS, lynching stemmed from racial and religious             |
| 7 | persecution; and  |

- 8 WHEREAS, the great State of Mississippi agrees with the
- 9 United States Senate anti-lynching resolution; and
- 10 WHEREAS, at least 4,742 people, predominantly African
- 11 Americans, were reported lynched in the United States between 1882
- 12 and 1968; and

- 13 WHEREAS, the act occurred throughout the United States until
- 14 the middle of the twentieth century, with documented incidents in
- 15 all but four states; and
- WHEREAS, 99% of all perpetrators escaped from punishment by
- 17 state or local officials; and
- 18 WHEREAS, nearly 200 anti-lynching bills were introduced in
- 19 Congress during the first half of the twentieth century, between
- 20 1890 and 1952, seven presidents petitioned Congress to end
- 21 lynching, and between 1920 and 1940, the House of Representatives
- 22 passed three strong anti-lynching measures; and
- 23 WHEREAS, only by coming to terms with history can the United
- 24 States effectively champion human rights abroad; and
- NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE HOUSE OF
- 26 REPRESENTATIVES OF THE STATE OF MISSISSIPPI, THE SENATE CONCURRING

- 27 THEREIN, That we do commend and express appreciation to the United
- 28 States Senate for passing the anti-lynching resolution.
- 29 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That copies of this resolution be
- 30 furnished to any member of Congress, any United States citizen and
- 31 to the Capitol Press Corps.
